Cover Story - Kevin Wilson/Emily Evans - 1962 Convertible



A Corvette was a dream of mine for many years. When I was 24 I came close to buying a used Blue 1972 T-Top, until after test driving it for a day I called my insurance dealer who patiently explained to my chagrin, the insurance payments would be more than the car payments! Talk about dousing the ownership dream.

As a red-blooded American male I went to classic cars shows

whenever I could (thereby keeping the dream alive) and I was always attracted to the C-1 Corvette. There is something compelling about the lines of these Corvettes, with their trademark side coves, the long, swooping graceful lines of the hood and front fenders and all the chrome and stainless steel details. And of course they were America's First Sports Car!

I retired after working for 33 years at "The Phone Company" (Pacific Northwest Bell, U.S. West & Qwest) in 2007. After looking at old Corvettes for many years, I began my search for just the right early Corvette in earnest, scouring dealers (particularly Pro-Team Corvette & Mershon's), various ads and E-bay on the internet. I bought books about old Corvettes so I knew more what to look for and what questions to ask. When I was looking at C-1 Corvettes it was difficult to decide which I liked best. I was somewhat attracted to the contrasting coves of the 1956 – 1961 Corvettes, but ultimately decided that the smooth and monochromatic look of the 1962 captured the streamlined look I wanted. It didn't hurt that 1962 was also the first year for the 327 c.i. V-8 in the Corvette.

In April of 2008 I found my Corvette on E-Bay and bid on it. (I'd bid on about 8 others over the last couple years, and had never even hit the reserve price). To my shock with my first bid (I was the first bidder) E-bay came back & said "you are the high bidder & have met the reserve price". OOPS! Time to tell my wife! There were still 6 days to go on the Auction & I thought I'd actually never be the high bidder. I told her all about it, stating there was a 50/50 chance I could end up buying this Corvette. As the days went by there were only a couple other small incremental bids that didn't meet my initial bid. Each day I'd tell

Emily, well there's a 60% chance I could end up with this car, and each day the percentage was higher, 70% 80%, 90% IT'S YOURS!



The car was in Southern California and I'd made a couple calls to the person auctioning the car. He was the Police Chief of the LA suburb (giving me hope he was honest!) and was auctioning off the car for his nephew who was a "bad boy" professional

baseball player. What that meant was he'd gotten into some trouble as young people sometimes do when they have early fame and seemingly limitless cash. He'd purchased the Corvette when the money was rolling in and when it stopped unexpectedly he needed to raise some cash. As I talked with the Chief I learned he was also a Corvette owner and had a resto-mod 1958 Corvette. I asked him if he thought I could drive the car from Southern California to Seattle and he said yes, he thought so as he'd driven it from Scottsdale to the outskirts of Long Beach. I asked him if he had a good mechanic & he said anyone with a car this old has a good mechanic, so he took the car to the shop he uses for a road worthiness assessment.

A few days later I flew out of Seattle at 7am with a tool bag packed in my suitcase with an assortment of tools I thought I might need, some wire, old nylons (for emergency belt replacement), vinyl tape, duct tape and chewing gum. When my flight arrived the Police Chief met me at the airport in his Dodge and when he opened the trunk there were door panels for a 1958 Corvette in the trunk and other parts, so I knew he really was a Corvette guy. He drove me to the shop where the car was sitting & I got a chance to talk with the mechanic who was just finishing replacing the flexible fan with a rigid one so it would run cooler. He and the Chief spent about 2 hours filling me in on what they knew about the car and its idiosyncrasies. He gave me the documentation he had to go with the car, I test drove it, looked it over as best I could at the time, we put the hardtop on, I put my suitcase & tools in the trunk and at 1:30 pm off I went, heading north for Seattle.

I drove 1200 miles in 2.5 days, staying with friends near San Francisco on the first night, then friends in Medford, OR on the second night, and on home. I drove through a dust storm in Southern California for about 3 hours and got dust everywhere in the car, and then it rained as I neared Eugene and finally stopped as I got to Longview. I had to stop in Eugene and buy some towels as the weather-stripping doesn't exactly keep all the rain out when driving at freeway speeds and I

needed to mop off the dash frequently. The windshield wipers sort of worked, and the Rain-X on the windshield helped a lot.

I listened very intently to all the sounds of the car as I drove and as time went on relaxed a little and enjoyed it more and more. One thing about putting so many miles on a car in just a few days is you learn quite a bit about it rather quickly. What I learned about this car (and I assume most C-1's are similar) is the car is a BEAST. With no power anything except the powerful engine, no power steering, no power brakes, no air conditioning, no ABS, no air bags, no GPS, no Traction Control systems. I needed to keep my attention focused and as they say "aim high in driving and plan ahead". Even with a 4 speed transmission the gearing is low and the car winds pretty high when cruising at modern freeway speeds (70-80). It would be nice to have an additional gear or two, but then it wouldn't be an authentic C-1 experience. And you need to stop for gas – a lot! You also get a lot of thumbs up, waves "cool car dude", "awesome ride" "what year is it?" and people who want to drive beside you for a while.

As I backed into the driveway arriving home my wife Emily was forewarned by the growl of the exhaust system and came trotting out to greet me with "Oh, it's a lot cuter than I thought it would be". I guess she likes it. While she isn't nearly as enthusiastic about the car as I am, she is a good sport and will ride along in the shotgun position.

I took the car to the CMCS all Corvette show in August 2008 and had a great time, even though I didn't get home prior to the rainstorm hitting. The car is Sateen Silver (a correct 1962 color) and has a numbers matching 327 c.i. 300 HP engine with a Carter 600 CFM AFB 4 Barrel Carburetor. The engine is linked to a Borg Warner T-10 4 speed transmission with Hurst Shifter and Posi-traction rear end. Overall it is a fairly complete and authentic 1962 Corvette, although there are still some items that I need to correct, but that's part of the fun! I got a Vanity License plate for it: VETT-62 and people still ask what year it is.

One thing about owning a Corvette this old (47 years) is it has a past that is often unknown. This is the case with my car – I know nothing about it prior to 1987, who knows what adventures it saw? In the year plus since I've owned the car I've learned a lot more about it specifically and C-1 Corvettes in general. I spent some time this last winter gathering parts (I maintain a daily watch list on E-bay and am good friends with Corvette Central, Ecklers and Paragon) to replace worn or incorrect parts on the car and have spent a fair amount of time crawling around the car and in the engine compartment replacing

parts. It also has a rather spacious trunk (by Corvette standards) so I can keep tools, coolant, fire-extinguisher, oil and other supplies nearby. It helps to be somewhat mechanically inclined with this old of a car and the good news is the mechanical systems are quite simple by today's standards, so I can do a lot of tinkering myself.

It's running great for now and since it's summer again I decided to join a club so I could have more fun with my Corvette. After researching a couple clubs I decided on the CMCS because they are all about CORVETTES and there are so many events and activities to choose from and I'm looking forward to getting out there with my Corvette. We've already done the fabulous 50's tour and plan on participating in a couple upcoming parades. What Fun!

One of my mottoes is: "Any Day I Can Drive the Corvette is a Good Day!"

On Your Marque Covers & History

For May of 1994 and earlier, OYM used "generic" covers of a different colored paper each month. They were about 20 page black & white booklets. The first use of a member "cover car" was in June of 1994 per my old newsletters.

Cloyd Jackson was the editor in those days, with the previous editor, John Thomas designated as "Assistant" editor. John was no longer listed as of December 1996, with Cloyd doing the duty through August of 2003. The first color cover (only) was April 1996. This was "special" as the next one was a year later, with a smattering after that. Color was not used inside at all.

While selected sheets were done in color earlier, the first all color issue was March 1998. All issues since that time have been done with color printers. With the October 1999 issue came the solid ink printers that we use today. These are the printers that give us the waxy shiny ink feel.

I took over as editor in September 2003. Prior to that I had been helping Cloyd with the printing, not editing and composition, to take the load off of what was then a two to three day process. I had one of the solid ink printers that I was using for other things as well. So Cloyd had about a 10 year stretch as OYM editor. That is a long time.

This August issue marks the end of my 6th year as editor. That makes 72 issues and counting. I am still having fun with it. The great support that I get with inputs, reports, proofing and assembly help a lot. I also now have a new version of the solid ink printer that is much faster and more trouble free, so we are good to go for a while yet. (When retired, my two old printers had almost a million images each.)

For several years now, OYM has also been available as a pdf on the club Web Site in a reduced size linear version, not booklet version. This version includes many hyperlinks to make your life easier.

As for cover cars, we have about 140 member families that have had their car on the cover one or more times. The high repeat couple, well deserved, is Gary & Kayla Main, with 8 cover issues. One of these, however, is a crop circle, not a car. If you want to know more you will have to ask Gary or Kayla. They also hold the record car, their 1967 convertible with 4 issues. Three of their other cars have also been featured. Three other members have been featured 3 times.

Cover Car Criteria

So let's review how you get on the cover. It is simple and fun. There are three criteria for club members. Non-members need not apply.

- 1. A good quality digital photo of your Corvette. These are best if posed with a good background.
- 2. A photo of you (both if a couple). These can be your "new member" photo or one posed with your car, or your choice from elsewhere.
- 3. A profile (bio) of your Corvette and personal history. This can be as long or as short as you wish.

I always have my camera with me on our outings and events. I will be happy to help you get the photos we need. The Buzz Inn, our destination for the August general meeting, has a good spot to use for background. We have taken many photos there.

Corvette Technical Tips

Here is another C6 fix. This comes from the Corvette Forum and David Melk, AKA QwikC on the forum. Caution: It's been stated to NEVER start the car without first re-

Caution: It's been stated to NEVER start the car without first replugging power to the mirror... otherwise memory loss will occur to various modules and will require reprogramming.

I need some Wiggle Relief!!!!!!

If your Rear View Mirror is Wiggling, this post may be for you. I have found out unfortunately through personal experience and while helping out fellow-Corvette owners ~ in the majority of C6 cases, the Rear View Mirror "Wiggle" problem is not the Rear View Mirror!!! If you have about an hour (or longer, take your time ... no need to rush), I have an easy ~ much less expensive DIY fix you may want to try before shelling out the big bucks for a new Rear View Mirror Unit (mirror, bracket, etc).

Believe it or not, in viewing member's posts and in discussions with my fellow Corvette brethren over past couple of years, in the majority of cases; My Rear View Mirror wiggles or my Mirror is lose ~ they indicate the problem didn't surface until after the dreaded "stone-chip" or "cracked" windshield replacement initiation we all seem to face sooner ... if not later. In actuality, I have found in 99% of the cases I've been involved with, the culprit is this little, poorly designed thing called the Cam-Lock ~ which as shown below; is a 2-part unit that attaches to the Mounting Bracket and the Windshield. Basically, the Cam-Lock acts as the device for attaching the Mounting Bracket w/Rear View Mirror, to the windshield.





In the left photo (topical view), you are actually looking at what we will refer to has Part "A" of the Cam-Lock device, which is attached to the base of the Mounting Bracket w/Rear View Mirror still attached. In the right photo, you are looking at what we will refer to has Part "B" of the Cam-Lock device, which is still attached to the windshield. The rotary looking opening in Part "A" (Left photo), surrounded by the Torx screws interfaces/ attaches to Part "B" (Right photo).

FYI ~ don't be overly concerned about the 3-tiny raised metal-points that run counter to the Torx screws. They don't actually hold the Cam-Lock on, but they will wear-down ... if the Mounting Bracket is removed/reinstalled too often and could end-up being the source of some degree of looseness, but unless you have taken this mirror off several times, shouldn't be an issue.

Mounting Bracket/Rear View Mirror Unit Removal: The "unit" will detach from the windshield as one complete unit (mirror w/bracket). Yes, with a little effort, you can detach the Rear View Mirror from the Mounting Bracket ~ but for this minor repair, there is no need to separate the mirror from the mounting bracket - so don't!

MAKE SURE YOU HAVE DISCONNECTED YOUR POWER CORD AT THE REAR OF THE MIRROR BEFORE ATTEMPTING THIS STEP! Swivel the mirror as if you were adjusting it ... about 1/4 to 1/3 turn. Then turn the Mounting Bracket (a counter-clock wise twist) and the whole unit will detach from the windshield.

Okay, in order to fix the "wiggle" problem ~ or repair the Cam-Lock, you first have to remove the 3-Torx screws to expose the source of the problem.

Take a #8 Torx Driver and unscrew the 3-Torx screws. When you pull-off the face-plate of the Cam-Lock, it will expose 3-pins ~ if the pins fall out when you are removing the face-plate - no worries, but keep them handy because you are going to reuse them. If I'm right, you are about to discover the source of your "wiggle" problem. Examine the pins ... if you notice that any of the 3-pins are bent, then you have identified the gremlin! Ah yes, the problem ~ this poorly designed Cam-Lock relies on these pin being perfectly straight and aligned in there respective bays (easy to see how they lay or align into cut-outs or slots in the base of the Cam-Lock casting) in order for the Cam-Lock to function properly.

Take a pair (2) of pliers ... or whatever you are comfortable working with, because in order to correct the problem, you need to straighten the pins. Once they are straight, you are ready to reassemble. Dab a little Vaseline (whatever) on the ends of the pins ~ only to help hold them in place while you reassemble the Cam-Lock disk. Reassemble; pin, disk, Torx screws ... once you have the Cam-Lock reassembled, you are ready to reinstall the Rear View Mirror Unit (including mounting bracket) onto the windshield.

Mounting Bracket/Rear View Mirror Unit Installation: To reinstall the unit, keep the mirror at that setting/angle at the time of removal; then line-up the Mounting Bracket/Cam-Lock (Part "A") with the Cam-Lock (Part "B"), located on the windshield at about a 90 degree angle; then turn the Mounting Bracket w/Rear View Mirror attached (clock-wise twist). Done ... the whole Rear View Mirror Unit should be reattached to the windshield! Okay, your almost there; just 3 more steps ~ Connect your Rear View Mirror Power Cord, adjust your personal Rear View Mirror setting, take her for a test ride and HOPEFULLY, no more wiggles!


Wild West Vette Fest 2009



40 LAPS AGO: August '69. (Minutes of the General Meeting not available in the histories, the following are highlights recorded in the Board of Director's minutes: Ben) President Frank Olsheski gets the meeting started being held at the home of Joe & Donna Bridgeman. 
