Ferrous Fanny 500 - Event Report

Epilog to the ...



It all started innocently enough. The seeds were planted perhaps 20+ years ago. For at least that long, Kayla had dreamed of "someday" driving her Corvette all the way around the rim of Crater Lake, at midnight, top down, under a full moon. Those seeds remained

semi-dormant for a couple decades, never forgotten but just under the surface and never quite seeing the light of day. Something stirred the seeds again last fall (*RAD* withdrawal, maybe?) and they began to sprout. "Next summer", she said, "we're going to do it." Out came the Farmer's Almanac to see when, during the coming summer months, there would be a full moon on or at least near a weekend that didn't already have another conflicting event. It would be a couple long hard days of driving to pull it off on a weekend but maybe, if we advertised it a bit, we'd still get a half dozen or so other Corvettes to go with us. A dozen at most. So we put the word out.

Fast-forward to the present:
Friday morning, Aug 7, at Zero-dark-thirty, 52 people in 27
Corvettes from 3 clubs (CMCS,
Corvettes deOlympia and Yakima
Valley Vettes) all launched from
various places and headed off in
the general direction of Yakima. By
mid-morning we had all converged
on the Yakima Visitor Center near
Exit 33A on I-82. (Note to self:



Yakima Visitor Center is a GREAT place to gather a group or just stop enroute to somewhere. Plenty of parking, easy off-easy back on the freeway, rest rooms, coffee, very hospitable staff. It doesn't get much better than that.) From there it was a straight shot all the way to Biggs Junction & our lunch stop. Grab some lunch, fill the tank,

drain the passengers & we're southbound again on Oregon Hwy 97. Speed limit drops to 55 now so we're very careful, especially as we approach Moro(n), OR. Lotsa time to smell the roses when you're only puttin' along at 55. Business seemed to grind to a halt in several of the little towns as our Caravan of Corvettes passed thru. Same could be said for some of the crews in several road construction projects along the way. Some of the group (intentionally) dropped out at Bend where they'd be spending the night. Some others, who should have been continuing on to LaPine for the night, inadvertently followed the wrong set of tail lights and had a nice scenic tour of Bend before getting back on track. The rest of us stopped in LaPine & scattered for dinner. Saturday morning a few adventurous souls (the names Walden, Foreman & Jewell come to mind) took off for the park very early in order to do the 1.1 mile hike down the crater, catch the 10AM boat tour around Crater Lake, then hike 2.2 miles back UP the very same trail. OK, so maybe it only seemed like it was twice as far going back uphill. The rest of us had a leisurely breakfast at the hotels then took a leisurely (except for the "ground squirrel auto-x" on Hwy 138) drive into the north entrance to Crater Lake National Park. At the ranger station, the geezers among us simply flashed our GOOF cards (Genuine Official Old Fart) and drove thru the gate FREE. Everybody else paid \$10/car. Gettin' old may not be for sissies but it does have a FEW advantages!



The whole caravan stopped at the first pull-out we came to so everybody could hike up to the crater rim & get our first real view of the lake. Awesome sight. While we were looking at the lake, all the other tourists were looking and taking pictures of this huge string of Corvettes parked nose-to-tail and filling up what turned out to be the entire TOUR BUS parking area. We figured out the error of our ways just as the first tour bus arrived. Buses are big. Vettes are little. We jumped in the cars and scattered in all directions. At 5PM, right on schedule, all 52 of us swarmed the Crater Lake Lodge Dining Room for a First Class dinner. Only 76 seats in the dining room and we had most of them. The staff had set us up in tables of 8 – 12, each with

its own server assigned. They had a special menu just for our group and they did separate checks for us. Try to get that for a group this size anywhere else! It should be noted here that the dining room staff, in fact, the entire Crater Lake Lodge staff, treated us like royalty for the whole weekend.

Promptly at 11PM the caravan again formed for the **Midnight Moonlight Cruise** around the lake. 33 miles takes about 1.5 hrs with a couple stops, one on the east side where the lake was somewhat obscured by smoke from area forest fires then, at straight up midnight, another on the west side where the moonlight reflecting off the lake was absolutely spectacular. A perfect finish to a perfect day. 44°F at the high point of the rim but some of us did the whole lap with the tops down anyway. And, the heater on, too!

By the 11AM check-out time on Sunday, many in the group had already scattered to the four winds. A much smaller caravan headed back to Seattle, doing 500 miles in 10.25 hours, including one fuel stop, a couple rest area "inspections" and, of course, dinner with Strawberry Shortcake at Tebo's in Gladstone.



During the course of the weekend, within the group we celebrated three birthdays, a 40th wedding anniversary, shared old memories with old friends and made new memories with new friends.



A chance conversation between two couples who previously did not know one another revealed that one was looking for the Corvette of their dreams and the other

knew where just such a car was for sale. A few days later, purchase made, dream realized. All that, AND strawberry shortcake. Life is good.

Next year? We understand that some kinda tour is being conjured up in the Republic area by some very experienced Corvette travelers. Should be a load of fun!



Corvette Technical Tips

Running a Ground With Your C5 Vette

This may apply to the C4 and C6 Corvettes as well. C6 Corvettes may be free from grounding issues by virtue of the fact that they have not been in service as long.


Recently we began to have some trouble with the headlights on our pride and joy (a 2002 Corvette Convertible). I had not anticipated any problems so I was not very well prepared to deal with it. All of a sudden the headlight doors failed to open even though the lights were on. In the old days I would just simply shell out 30-40 dollars for the appropriate maintenance manual and go after the problem. However today the manuals are not available through the dealers but through a company called Helm and the three volume maintenance manual set sells for over two hundred dollars. When it comes to common problems this is where the Internet really shines. It appears from the various articles that problems with headlight control often are due to either the Headlight Control Module or the grounds associated with it.

My years in the technical end of the electronics industry have taught me several very practical trouble shooting rules:

- Digital stuff either works or it doesn't.
- Intermittent problems usually reside outside the digital device.
- Troubleshooting begins at the easiest less costly point and proceeds from there.

Years ago with the advent of the C4 Corvette the designers realized that they needed to develop a new more reliable electrical connector. Poor electrical connections would be a major disaster when microprocessor controls were integrated into automobiles. They came up with the Packard Weather Pak Connector. Essentially it is an electrical connector that has a weathertight seal for both the male and female pins. Unfortunately the folks that did the work on the grounding system did not get the memo. There are nine major ground junction points on a C5 Corvette. They consist of a mounting stud with a 10 mm nut, a ground wire with a lug, and a small module that bolts to the stud and has a number of wires coming from it. The module is nothing more than a connector with all of it's pins tied to the mounting tab. Unfortunately none of these modules are the least bit weather tight. I was impressed with just how much corrosion I found in the module on the Drivers Side (the one on the passenger side was clean as a whistle). There is a tendency to not pay a lot of attention to the ground side of things but this is a major mistake in today's automobiles. In the old days a tail light might be dim or a starter would crank over slow but in today's cars voltage levels are very critical.

Every circuit can be boiled down to three basic elements. The voltage source, load and voltage return. All three are vital for the circuit to operate. When digital equipment is involved the control is carried out through data that is essentially ones and zeros represented by two distinctly different voltage levels (representing yes and no). When you



add resistance to either the *Source* side or the *Return* side the corresponding levels inside the load are shifted downward. Now the digital stuff is no longer dealing with yes or no but instead moves toward no and maybe. If things get really bad it moves to no and never. This is my over simplification of the digital world and it has served me well over the years.

This is what the little ground assembly looks like there is nine of these in a C5 Vette and two of them are easily located on either side of the radiator. A 10 mm deep socket will easily remove the module and a small bladed screwdriver will be necessary to separate the two halves of the assembly. Below this assembly will be a ground wire with a



lug on it and it is essential that this lug be clean and free of corrosion.



Here you can see what is inside after you gently pry the assembly apart with a small bladed screwdriver. It may be hard to see in the picture on the left but the pins are mildly corroded. This means whatever was trying to be grounded through these circuits were in reality not getting a good ground. Each of the wires going

into this assembly represent a circuit or function that required a ground. The lug and wire that this assembly was bolted to was in fact the actual chassis ground so it is essential that the lug be clean and free of corrosion.

So how do we make sure this is not an issue in the future. The following steps outline a solution that should be a one time once and for all fix:

- Clean the wire lug and the mounting tab with sandpaper (400 to 600 grit).
- Remove all corrosion and try to avoid removing the coating and exposing the brass.
- Give the female pins a good shot of contact cleaner.
- Coat the mounting tab and the wire lug with a conductive paste/corrosion preventive like Copper shield (you may have to go to an electrical supply house to get this).
- Install a star washer between the wire lug and the mounting tab (copper shield there would be helpful).

The Copper Shield will deny the mechanical connection of water and oxygen and that will effectively, put an end to the corrosion process. This will make for a permanent fix and allow you to put this problem behind you. However if you cannot find a suitable compound like Copper Shield you may use LPS1 or WD40 and that should resolve the problem for many years to come.
