

Maybe next time.


Hope not.



Chinatown Parade: Sun., July 21, parade at 6:00 - need 8 cars

Greenwood Parade: Wed., July 24, Wednesday, parade at 6:00 - need 15 cars

Torchlight Parade: Sat., July 27, Saturday night 7:00, need 25 cars.

Magnolia Parade: Sat, August 3, parade at 10, - need 8 cars.

Woodinville Celebration Day Parade: Sat., Aug. 10th, Need 7 cars.

We have some ten parades scheduled for the coming two months. For most parades I have the required 8 convertibles. Torchlight participants still has to be determined and I am waiting for a response from Seafair as to the numbers needed. 





In earlier days, CMCS was a major player in the Northwest autocross scene. Of late, there has been a renewed interest in autocross among CMCS members, with several new people coming out to try the sport. If you have been thinking about trying autocross, this could be your year. Complete rules and classifications are



# Three different councils, very similar acronyms By John R. Thomas

HOSE OF US who have worked with the development of the Corvette Marque Club and various affiliated organizations often speak in a shorthand language of abbreviated names. I recommend explaining these acronyms on first usage in any article. For those new to the club, I should first explain that, to sports car or marque clubs, a Council means a group or association of such clubs formed to help carry out goals common to the various member clubs. One of the earliest but still current examples is the National Council of Corvette Clubs, NCCC, pronounced to those familiar with it as "N Triple C."

Now let me discuss three councils to which CMCS has belonged, and which can be easily confused: They are WSCC (Western States Corvette Council), WWSCC (Western Washington Sports Car Council), and WCCC (Washington Car Club Council).

The Western States Corvette Council was started about 1965 by a super Corvette salesman, Bob Wingate, in the Southern California area. Bob worked for Clippinger Chevrolet in Covina, CA. Joe Pike encouraged Bob in this endeavor to attract Corvette owners in the West Coast states, partly because NCCC had not appealed to us out here. There were only a few Corvette clubs in the Pacific Northwest in that era. CMCS and the large Portland club worked together to stage the WSCC annual convention in Portland in the summer of 1969. Joe and Donna Bridgeman and my wife at the time (Maralyn) and I designed the rally course that wandered up the Columbia gorge and which was well received. The autocross and concours were also very successful. I had forgotten many subsequent details, but Frank Diss refreshed me on some points. There were disagreements on how much WSCC was charging the Northwest clubs. Within a few years after this, the Northwest Association of Corvette Clubs (NWACC) separated from WSCC, and NWACC has continued to be our "council" since 1973. Frank Diss, our CMCS president in 1971 and into early '72, was the first president of NWACC, which just celebrated its 40th anniversary. WSCC still exists as a functioning council mainly for clubs in California or thereabouts, and it has an active Web site at http://www.wscc.ws.

The Western Washington Sports Car Council had a strong CMCS influence on its origin in the late '60s. Bob Morse, vice president of CMCS in the first year of existence under president Dick Stanley, led the formation



of WWSCC to provide communication among local sports car clubs such as the MG (Morris Garage) Car Club, Tyee Triumph, Jaguar Drivers' Club, CMCS, and non-marque clubs such as the local region of Sports Car Club of America (SCCA). Bob Morse and his wife Maureen attended our 40th Reunion, but Mo passed away about two years ago. Mo was our 4th president (after me, before Bruce Kelly). As the number of Corvette owners and local Corvette clubs increased, CMCS, had less need to find fellow autocross or rally participants in these other clubs, and so we ceased to be a member of WWSCC quite a while ago. However, WWSCC exists today as an organization dedicated mostly to autocrossing. Its Web site is http://www.wwscc.org.

The member clubs today appear to be mostly non-marque clubs such as Boeing Employees' Autosports Club (BEAC), Torque Steerers, Pacific Northwest Region of SCCA, Bremerton Sports Car Club (BSCC) and Autocross & Convertible Enthusiasts (ACE) plus marque clubs for Datsun (yes, Datsun, not Nissan) and Miata.

The Washington Car Club Council, the third council in this group that begins with W and ends with CC, was formed by clubs that were interested in influencing auto-related legislation in Olympia. In the late '70s or early '80s there was a significant push in the Washington State Legislature to get rid of older cars by paying a bounty for each one that was turned in to be crushed. The owners of various classic cars were strongly opposed to this idea because it meant the loss of a good source of spare parts and of possible entry vehicles to the hobby. There were other issues regarding taxes and gasoline, and many CMCS members felt a common bond in these issues. Hence, we were a member of WCCC for quite a few years. This council is now essentially defunct. However, if you Google Washington Car Club Council, you will be led to http://www.classiccarcommunity.com/car-club which apparently links to thousands of classic car clubs throughout the United States.

I hope this short treatise will help members differentiate between the various organizations with similar acronyms. ��

Bob and Gaye Engle, and Don and Nina Gord became the latest members voted into full membership, bringing the total to 131. The Activities

schedule noted a June SCCA Solo 2 at the Boeing facilities in Kent and again twice in July, a WWSCC event at the Cheney Stadium in Tacoma, and an Acme event at Boeing. # **ZORA-1 Corvette Donated to NCM**

If you are a Corvette fan, chances are you've seen a beautiful photograph of Zora Arkus-Duntov standing next to a red 1984 Corvette at the foot of Mount Rushmore. You can't help but feel a rush of American pride seeing two of our Founding Fathers in the same picture as someone who lived the



American dream so well - Zora, the immigrant who was the Father of Corvette.

The Corvette in that picture is known as "ZORA-1" and has been donated to the NCM by Francis Mariano. It was originally ordered in 1983 by a Chevrolet dealership in Fargo, ND, specifically to be driven by Zora himself during the Black Hills Corvette Classic that year. Zora drove it accompanied by his wife Elfi. His successor as Chief Engineer, Dave McLellan, also used the car to lead the caravan, and both engineers signed it to commemorate those events.

# **CMCS Radio Tips**

OW THAT WE are in the cruising/parade/tour season, we offer the following tips for the use of club radios. Most of us have them and we all realize what a great tool they are to help make club events and activities more fun and less stressful. So we thought the following would help.

First, hold the radio the right distance from your mouth. There is a natural tendency to hold the radio close to our mouths because we think it will help others hear us better. Actually, holding the radio too close is the main reason a lot of us are not understood. The recommended distance is three inches from mouth to radio, but that

should be treated as a minimum. A distance of four inches makes it much easier to be understood.

Second, be careful using the transmit button. A lot of us start talking before the button is fully depressed and the first part of what we say is lost. The best way to handle this is to press the transmit button, wait a second, and <u>then</u> start talking. The same is true when finishing our transmittal. We need to finish what we have to say and then wait a second to release to button. If we all follow this procedure we will not have any part of our "pearls of wisdom" fail to be transmitted.

Third, we must be aware of how loudly we are talking when we transmit. It is natural to speak in a louder voice than normal to make sure we are heard, but the radios we have—be they old or new—are very efficient. Loud talking or yelling is just not needed. Believe me, if we are not talking loud enough to be heard, someone will tell us!

Fourth, let's all try to be "tuned in" to radio usage. If we hear someone who is hard to understand, we should let them know (in a nice way) so we can get used to correct usage.

Fifth, use your radio to alert others to such things as bicyclists on the road, potholes, road hazards, police presence, errors in directions, etc.

Last, use your radio to make your club activities more enjoyable for yourself and others. While the radio's main purpose is to be used for safety and convenience, feel free to use it for those things which may make the tour or event more enjoyable for others. Such things might be to alert others to see certain landmarks, animal life, views etc. While dominating all radio usage is not a good way to go, the radio is your property. So, using common sense as your guide, have fun with your radio! •

# **TOUR TIPS**

NE OF THE things CMCS members love to do is go on tours. These can be day tours or "overnighters" like the Wine Tour and Wet Weekend. We are fortunate enough to have a good number of new members, and some may like to know



what to do and look for in a tour.

This is not meant to be a "RULES OF THE ROAD" item, but rather just some thoughts on how to make tours more enjoyable and less stressful for all.

# It's not the end of the world if a non-Corvette gets into our caravan lane.

Too often, it is easy to tailgate, speed up, slow down or any perform some other less-than-safe maneuver in order to make sure that a steel car doesn't get in line. It just doesn't matter! In fact, it may be the biggest thrill the steel car driver will have all day by being in line with all those beautiful Corvettes! Sooner or later (usually sooner) the steel car will change lanes, turn off, or just vaporize, and we'll all be back together.

# Learn to pass correctly in a caravan, on the freeway or otherwise.

On a freeway, it is very dangerous to try to pass someone and then squeeze back in line too soon with the other Corvettes. When you are passing and try to get back in line or get "hung out," or a turn-off or exit is coming up, learn to leap-frog ahead of the Corvette just ahead of the passed vehicle. If the Corvette you want to get behind has slowed down (this happens all too often after passing; don't be guilty of doing this!) keep going past the next Corvette(s) until to you can safely merge back into line. It is very important that we all learn this and pay attention with what's happening behind us. If we see another Corvette that wants to get back in line, safely allow a space for them AHEAD of you so they can get back in line easily. This leap-frog maneuver will take all the stress and most of the danger out of passing, and is a great example of teamwork.

# If you don't have a radio that works with the club's frequencies...GET ONE!

The radio allows you to relax and enjoy the drive because you are in touch with the tour leaders and others on the tour. Therefore you stand a significantly less chance of getting lost (a thoroughly not-fun experience on a tour) because you know what's coming next and what may have changed. It is also really nice to have something pointed out that might have been missed, such as bicyclists, wildlife, landmarks, Mustangs broken down on the side of the road and other items of interest. In addition, there are some pretty clever people out there who can provide some entertaining comments over the radio, too.

We all need to know that use of the radio implies taking on some responsibility. We have to be sure to use them as if our kids were listening (or even worse, our parents!) and not use profanity, off-color jokes/comments, blaring music from your Corvette's speakers, endless monologues or anything else that would be inappropriate to other members.

Remember, you bought your radio to help make the use of your Corvette more pleasant, so use your radio and have fun with it!

# Make sure the Corvette behind you knows where to turn.

If you make a scheduled turn and the Corvette behind you is too far back to see you make that turn, they may miss it. The best way to make sure no one gets lost is to take a turn and wait until the Corvette behind you sees you before you proceed. If everyone did this, no one would get lost because you would be "watching out" for the Corvette behind you and the Corvette ahead would be 'watching out" for you!

I hope this has been informative, and remember: have fun on those tours! That's why you bought that beautiful Corvette! ❖
