Because of this popularity, any and all members are invited to stop by the Plum Delicious Restaurant, 3212 NE Sunset Blvd.,




Renton, around 9:00 to 9:30 a.m. on any Saturday. Odds are good you will find a Corvette enthusiast to join for breakfast.



SOVREN Vintage Races & Success for CMCS racer Rick Stark

EVIN JEWELL WORKED hard to organize our CMCS participation in the Corral for the 25th Annual Pacific Northwest Historics—vintage races to benefit Seattle Children's Hospital. This race series has been held at Pacific Raceways on the weekend closest to July 4 for these many years, and many Guild members for Children's Hospital work hard to make this a financial success. As Kevin has explained, our club must guarantee payment for Corral entrants (with some limit to the number each year) by an early date, in this case May 31. We had ten participants who enjoyed the preferred parking and the parade laps. A couple of non-member Corvette drivers tried to crash our area, but the tight spacing this year did not allow them to stay. Our members who participated included Steve Yabroff, Richard Worthen and Alicelee (good to see her getting about well now), Harvey and Ada Hawks, Bill Roberts, Mike Senko, Cary Auguston, Richard Bond, Clarke Jewell, and of course Kevin and Judy Jewell and me.

Richard Worthen won 2nd place in the show and shine for the category of 1990's and newer. He lost out to a new lotus.

Over a many-month preparation period, 49-year CMCS member Rick Stark was working to get his vintage Corvette racecar prepared to run fast with consistency. He had good engine performance in

Portland at their vintage races the week prior to our Historics, but he had some clutch problems. In the last week, he went through everything inside the scatter shield (clutch, pressure plate, throw-out bearing, starter motor, flywheel, etc.) to eliminate this problem. Finally, at our Historics he and the car performed perfectly and Rick had an outstanding weekend.

Our Corral participants did many different things besides the three parade laps we took during the lunch break. This parade was impressive because there were about 300 cars of many different marques in the corral. The featured and leadoff marque this year was Lotus. There were Cobras, Camaros, Mustangs, Mercedes, Porsches and many others. The clubs in the Corral were divided into three groups for parading; thus, the first group did three laps, then the second group did three laps, and finally our group had three laps. I believe all of us, including several who have had many laps at Pacific, enjoyed these three laps. Before and after the parade, we could wander the pits to see all the vintage race cars up close or watch the six morning races and later the six after-lunch races from wherever we chose. Between races the track crossing was opened to pedestrians to walk into the infield, from where there are many great viewing spots.

I chose to find Rick's pit and then made sure to watch carefully his morning and afternoon race. He had the pole position for the first race and held onto the lead for the whole race with several more powerful cars chasing him. Thus, he got the pole for the second race. You should understand that in vintage races, a race group is composed of a varied group of cars without mixing fendered sports cars with open wheels and with an attempt to get some parity of performance. However, there is still quite a variation in performance potential. Rick runs a '69 Corvette convertible very authentic to B Production racecars of the day. He had to compete against several big

block (A Production) Corvettes plus very different cars such as a Camaro with a very powerful big block and an FIA-spec Ford Falcon, which had a big motor and very light weight. During the afternoon race, a wellprepared big block Corvette (#95 driven by Eric Dolson) managed to pull Rick down the straight after several laps, but never opened a big gap, and

Rick held on to second. Both races were exciting to watch. It should be noted that Rick races on a shoestring budget compared to most of his competition, especially the fast cars in his group. That group, Group 5 in the Historics races, comprises what is called the big-bore production cars and so is generally most interesting to us Corvette fans.

I hope that in future years CMCS will turn out a larger group of Corvettes for the Corral, and generally, to support this Seattle Children's benefit event. We filled only 10 of our 20 allotted slots this year. This year the event attracted an exceptionally large total number of cars for the Corral, partly because the local Evergreen Lotus Car Club was hosting the West Coast Lotus Meet and included participation in this Corral as part of a four-day event being hosted for the first time in Seattle. \diamondsuit





Laps From The Past, Or Marque-In-Time

50 Laps Ago: August '63 The Corvette Marque Club meeting held on August 10, 1963, was called to order by Bob Morse, in absence of the Chairman, Dick Stanley. The meeting was held at the summer cottage of Paul & Karen Wailes; fourteen members were in attendance. The minutes of the last meeting were not read because of the absence of the Secretary Pro-Tempore. The Temporary Chairman appointed Karen Wailes to record the minutes of this meeting. The appointed Treasurer, Bill Trippett, and his assistant, Ken Jones presented a formal statement of



the financial needs of the club. Several topics of the club's start-up expenses and the club's needs to formalize a constitution and by-laws were discussed, and discussions will take place over the next several months before finalizing. It was agreed upon that starting annual membership dues would be set at \$10, plus \$1 for spouses; \$10 Initiation fees would cover the costs for a membership card, jacket patch, and car badge. Contributions from the charter members were requested by the next meeting in September, or by the time of incorporation (November-Ben). Some fund raising ideas involved tune-up sessions, dinner dances, and tours. Ed & Phyllis Baker were commended for being the first charter members to pay their dues. Activities announced included a Conference Race at Arlington following a tour led by Mo Morse, a SCCA Divisional Race at Newport Oregon, with an overnight tour led by Mo Morse, another tour & over night tour to Birch Bay over the Labor Day weekend led by Grant Westenberg, the possibility of a Club Gymkhana by Bill Fowler, and a possible tour to Laguna Seca in October. Bob Morse headed up a committee to go over the proposed club Constitution & By-Laws, and an open discussion was conducted at the meeting to go over items for clarifications. The next scheduled monthly meeting was set for September at either the Seattle Center, or at Alan Green Chevrolet. Another discussion was raised for the members to vote at the next meeting to agree upon the final name for our club: 1) Corvette Club of Washington; 2) Seattle Corvette Club; or, 3) Margue Corvette Club of Seattle. (NOTE: This is the first "recorded" minutes of a CMCS membership meeting. There is mention of at least one previous meeting in the above text, but, this is the first time minutes from the club's monthly meetings were placed in the histories. There may be previous minutes before

this, but, they have not been submitted to the club's historical documents for safe keeping.- Ben)

40 Laps Ago: August '73 The monthly meeting was held in conjunction with the annual Beach Party at the home of John Thomas's parents on Vashon Island. A motion was made and approved to dispense with the usual business and make the meeting as short as possible to get on with the beach picnic. Dave & Joe Hill were voted into membership. Sharon Webster asked if the club would buy either a color or black & white Polaroid camera to take pictures of our events in order to update the bulletin board at Bill Hazelett Chevrolet. Carl Mollnow said he would donate one to the club; the membership agreed to the gift and the club will purchase film for each club function. Cindy McPherson suggested starting a club scrapbook, taking pictures of the club members, and featuring a club member each month in the newsletter. The suggestion was to be presented at the next Board meeting for discussion.

<u>30 Laps Ago:</u> August '83 President Bob Johansen got the monthly membership meeting started on the back lawn of Ken & Carolyn Martin's home. The Northwest Corvette Restorers Society (NCRS) had a meeting in Bend Oregon. Other club activities for the month included a Parking Session for SIR Funny Cars, a Drag Race & Board Meeting at the Johansen's, an Adult Night Out at the Seattle Center Fun Forest, the club's 20th Anniversary Party, and an All Corvette Drag & Swap & Car Show at Seattle International Raceway (SIR). The club membership then stood at 135 members.

20 Laps Ago: August '93 President Dee Esping got the monthly meeting started following dinner at the RAM's American Grill & Fish House at Shilshole, just south of Golden Gardens in Seattle. Treasurer Gary Main noted that the club's finances were current, reflecting a positive financial success with the SIR event, and monies received for registrations for the upcoming CMCS 30th Anniversary event. Cloyd Jackson and David Barlia were to help with staging the cars on the lawn of the Columbia Winery in Woodinville for the event. Gary Main also submitted a corrected version of the SIR budget that was to be forwarded to the Rain Country Treasurer. As Membership Chair Jan Cockrum was unavailable, the committee estimated that there were then 102 members, with the new members being voted into full membership-Robert Newman and Jim Gwinn. Newsletter editor John Thomas noted he was generating a 30th Anniversary Edition and had sufficient materials to make an interesting and informative edition for September. John also researched details for an overnight Wine-Country Tour in October in the Richland area. Gary Main filled in for Cece Nelson and

reported on club activities where approximately 36 cars went on the Mt. St. Helens tour, and dash plaques were given to all participants. Before the meeting closed word was received and announced that a brand new grandson was born for Dee Esping, a potential 3rd generation future CMCS member.

James & Michelle Clark, John & Charlene Carmody, Neil & Sheri Maddy, Manish Sambhu, Bill & Marty Cameron, Ada & Harvey Hawks, and, Ron & Pat Schmaltz (now that's a lot of pizza!- Ben). Activities Chair Ed Bloom went over the scheduled club events, including the 7th Annual Seaview Chevrolet All Corvette Show and Shine in Lynnwood. The Show was not a NWACC event, but if someone wanted to organize one for next year, they were encouraged to do so. Lorrie reported for absent Charity Chair Cassie Black that there was a meeting to discuss charitable support in the coming year. Supported Charities to be included were: the GM-ASEP mechanic sponsorship program at Shoreline Community College, Snohomish County Battered Women's Fund through the Boeing StratoCruisers car club, a children's charity function for this year, and a Santa visit at a nursing home. Sheila Wylie reported on the club supported summer's parades and Lorrie reported on the club's 40th Anniversary event progress for next month. Cloyd Jackson announced his retirement as the club's newsletter editor. Cloyd served in this capacity for 10 years. Oran Petersen volunteered to take over the duties of editor.

C6 Manual Tranny Owners, Avoid Clutch Troubles with this Simple Maintenance

By Steve Yabroff THE CLUTCH FLUID in the C6 (and maybe earlier generations, too) can get very cruddy in a hurry. When this happens, the clutch fluid must be changed. Otherwise you may have the clutch pedal not release, or experience other clutch problems.

So when should you change the clutch fluid? Anytime it looks dark—sorta like coffee. It should be a light honey color. Now that we know we need to do this



maintenance, how

hard is it? Really very easy, normally taking less than five minutes.

Here is what you need:

A can of DOT 4 brake fluid (the owner's manual specifies GM Super DOT 4 Clutch/Brake Fluid,



Chevrolet), a medical syringe (I use a 2 oz. one) which is available for a couple of bucks at most medical supply stores. I like these versus a turkey baster, because the syringes don't dribble ~important because brake fluid ruins paint!!

Finally, you will need a container for the old fluid that is removed (I like a glass Peanut Butter jar so I can see how dirty the old stuff is).

As a special precaution, I also drape a towel over the fender.



Twist off the cap on the smaller reservoir (the larger one is for the brakes), put your syringe and withdraw all of the fluid. As an extra precaution, when moving the now full syringe to the jar, I put a folded paper towel under the syringe nose to catch any potential dribbles.



Typically one draw will get the bulk of it. Fill the Clutch reservoir no higher than the full line on the reservoir side. If the rubber gasket in the cap is really gunky, carefully pull it out from the cap and gently clean it with a paper towel, reinsert it and replace the cap.

If the fluid was fairly dirty, pump the clutch about

30 times and repeat this process a couple more times. It may take a number of cycles before the clutch fluid finely stays moderately clean over a longer period of time. For example, I find that I now change the clutch fluid about twice a year and that seems to suffice. Before, I was changing fluid every couple of weeks.

This is an easy and cheap maintenance item we can all easily perform and it will save a lot of grief later on. If you have any questions, please feel free to contact me. Good luck, and Save the Wave!!

NE OF THE things CMCS members love to do is go on tours. These can be day tours or "overnighters" like the Wine Tour and Wet Weekend. We are fortunate enough to have a good number of new members, and some may like to know



what to do and look for in a tour.

This is not meant to be a "RULES OF THE ROAD" item, but rather just some thoughts on how to make tours more enjoyable and less stressful for all.

It's not the end of the world if a non-Corvette gets into our caravan lane.

Too often, it is easy to tailgate, speed up, slow down or any perform some other less-than-safe maneuver in order to make sure that a steel car doesn't get in line. It just doesn't matter! In fact, it may be the biggest thrill the steel car driver will have all day by being in line with all those beautiful Corvettes! Sooner or later (usually sooner) the steel car will change lanes, turn off, or just vaporize, and we'll all be back together.

Learn to pass correctly in a caravan, on the freeway or otherwise.

On a freeway, it is very dangerous to try to pass someone and then squeeze back in line too soon with the other Corvettes. When you are passing and try to get back in line or get "hung out," or a turn-off or exit is coming up, learn to leap-frog ahead of the Corvette just ahead of the passed vehicle. If the Corvette you want to get behind has slowed down (this happens all too often after passing; don't be guilty of doing this!) keep going past the next Corvette(s) until to you can safely merge back into line. It is very important that we all learn this and pay attention with what's happening behind us. If we see another Corvette that wants to get back in line, safely allow a space for them AHEAD of you so they can get back in line easily. This leap-frog maneuver will take all the stress and most of the danger out of passing, and is a great example of teamwork. $\underline{\mathscr{P}}$

If you don't have a radio that works with the club's frequencies...GET ONE!

The radio allows you to relax and enjoy the drive because you are in touch with the tour leaders and others on the tour. Therefore you stand a significantly less chance of getting lost (a thoroughly not-fun experience on a tour) because you know what's coming next and what may have changed. It is also really nice to have something pointed out that might have been missed, such as bicyclists, wildlife, landmarks, Mustangs broken down on the side of the road and other items of interest. In addition, there are some pretty clever people out there who can provide some entertaining comments over the radio, too.

We all need to know that use of the radio implies taking on some responsibility. We have to be sure to use them as if our kids were listening (or even worse, our parents!) and not use profanity, off-color jokes/comments, blaring music from your Corvette's speakers, endless monologues or anything else that would be inappropriate to other members.

Remember, you bought your radio to help make the use of your Corvette more pleasant, so use your radio and have fun with it!

(Check out "CMCS Radio Tips" on page 35)

Make sure the Corvette behind you knows where to turn.

If you make a scheduled turn and the Corvette behind you is too far back to see you make that turn, they may miss it. The best way to make sure no one gets lost is to take a turn and wait until the Corvette behind you sees you before you proceed. If everyone did this, no one would get lost because you would be "watching out" for the Corvette behind you and the Corvette ahead would be 'watching out" for you!

I hope this has been informative, and remember: have fun on those tours! That's why you bought that beautiful Corvette! �





CMCS Radio Tips

OW THAT WE are in the cruising/parade/tour season, we offer the following tips for the use of club radios. Most of us have them and we all realize what a great tool they are to help make club events and activities more fun and less stressful. So we thought the following would help.

First, hold the radio the right distance from your mouth. There is a natural tendency to hold the radio close to our mouths because we think it will help others hear us better. Actually, holding the radio too close is the main reason a lot of us are not understood. The recommended distance is three inches from mouth to radio, but that

should be treated as a minimum. A distance of four inches makes it much easier to be understood.

Second, be careful using the transmit button. A lot of us start talking before the button is fully depressed and the first part of what we say is lost. The best way to handle this is to press the transmit button, wait a second, and <u>then</u> start talking. The same is true when finishing our transmittal. We need to finish what we have to say and then wait a second to release to button. If we all follow this procedure we will not have any part of our "pearls of wisdom" fail to be transmitted.

Third, we must be aware of how loudly we are talking when we transmit. It is natural to speak in a louder voice than normal to make sure we are heard, but the radios we have—be they old or new—are very efficient. Loud talking or yelling is just not needed. Believe me, if we are not talking loud enough to be heard, someone will tell us!

Fourth, let's all try to be "tuned in" to radio usage. If we hear someone who is hard to understand, we should let them know (in a nice way) so we can get used to correct usage.

Fifth, use your radio to alert others to such things as bicyclists on the road, potholes, road hazards, police presence, errors in directions, etc.

Last, use your radio to make your club activities more enjoyable for yourself and others. While the radio's main purpose is to be used for safety and convenience, feel free to use it for those things which may make the tour or event more enjoyable for others. Such things might be to alert others to see certain landmarks, animal life, views etc. While dominating all radio usage is not a good way to go, the radio is your property. So, using common sense as your guide, have fun with your radio!
