


And I'll let you in on a little secret.


Al And Suzi Larpenteur



GREW UP AROUND cars. My mom and dad (CMCS members Kevin and Judy Jewell) bought their first sports car, a 1967 Sunbeam Tiger, when I was six months old. My dad installed seat belts in the package tray, and my sister and I went to auto-crosses, car shows and other car events in the Tiger. Later my dad bought a Mustang GT so I grew up around Ford V8-powered vehicles and it led me to own three Mustangs before I bought my Corvette. Rumor is I was the first Mustang invited

to a the CMCS School Daze. You might remember the Black 1999 Mustang Cobra.

I started to get more involved in track days about 12 years ago. I looked for ways to make my Mustang lighter, quicker and put more tire underneath it for track days. My wife Melissa suggested I just replace my Mustang with something that had all of those things to start with. One is going into third grade and one is starting kindergarten in the fall so you can imagine I don't have a lot of opportunity to attend many CMCS events. 
We are also offering a photo opportunity for those members who want to have a photo of their car in front of the vintage gas pumps. We'll take your photo and send you a digital copy.

Celebrating 60

Corvette fans ready to commemorate 60 years of an American icon

MERICA'S MOST ICONIC sports car — the Chevrolet Corvette — is having a major birthday this year, and enthusiasts are celebrating the car's milestone in a big way this summer.

At the age of 60, the Corvette continues to endure as a favorite in the world of high-speed, high-performance vehicles because it has evolved, says Stan Trask, president of the Corvette Marque Club of Seattle. Over the decades, Corvettes have transformed radically from one generation to the next, with sweeping overhauls instead of just minor tweaks, says Trask, who drives a red 1963 split-window coupe.

"The cars have stayed relevant because no one generation has lasted very long," he says. "The C-1 only lasted from '53-'62. The C-2 only from '63-'67. When one came out, it seemed like GM was already working on the next one."

One of the major events celebrating the Corvette's anniversary is the 60 Years of Vette exhibit opening Friday at LeMay — America's Car Museum. The exhibit will highlight the Corvette's evolution throughout the years with models from each generation, as well as concepts and modified versions.

"What GM has done well is retain the soul of the original Corvette but they continue to be built with contemporary design and technology equal to anything in the marketplace today," says Scot Keller, the museum's Chief Marketing and Communications Officer. "It's America's sports car. People love an emotional connection with the cars."

The Corvette Marque Club of Seattle, which boasts 238 active members, is planning a pilgrimage to Bowling Green, Ky., to visit the Corvette factory next August. It's also organizing a show at Triple XXX Rootbeer Drive-in on Aug. 25.

The group's members say enthusiasts are often torn between more recent models — which emphasize comfort and handling — and mid-60s models, which have cool retro appeal. Many club members solve that problem by owning one of each.

Club vice president Lorrie Montgomery (CQ) drives a newer model - a 2006 Monterey red convertible. "It has everything I want," she says. "It's my everyday driver, but it has power and you can get there quickly if you want to."

She says myths still abound about the Corvette, such as the perception that they're expensive. However, a new Corvette costs about as much as the average SUV, she says.

Another myth is that they get poor mileage. A V-8 engine on a newer model (with over 400 horsepower) can still achieve high 20s to low 30s mpg on the highway thanks to the well-designed weight-to-power ratio and low profile, Trask says.

The highly anticipated seventh-generation Corvette, due out in 2014, is the first major redesign for the car in eight years. Its launch is sure to reignite the "best years" debate among enthusiasts.

"If you ask 10 different people in a room, you'll get 10 different answers," Trask says. "The best year is the year you own. Or the one that you wish you had back." •

We discovered that some teen group had cleaned our section just a few days before, and that the area had been recently mowed. Still, we did a careful job and picked up a lot of stuff. One interesting item was a heavy-duty battery charger. It could not be determined if it is functional, but the finder took it home with the idea that even the heavy-duty charger cables and clamps are valuable. We wondered if this had been missed by the youth cleanup crew or whether they had been discarded just a day or two before our work.

We have a new contact person, Doug Young, at Washington State Department of Transportation. After this recent youth-crew cleanup just prior to our scheduled cleanup, I filed our notice with Doug in an e-mail. 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

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



Too Much Information? Not from Corvette Stingray

DETROIT - The advanced cluster display in the 2014 Corvette Stingray can provide up to 69 unique sources of information, ranging from an interactive performance timer to a tire tread temperature display. The crisp and bright display features make this information



easily accessible via three configurable modes that prioritize information for daily commuting, weekend canyon carving and track events.

Flanked by three analog gauges for speed, fuel level, and engine-coolant temperature, the eight-inch liquid-crystal display screen in the center of the cluster is organized into sport, tour and track themes that change with the Driver Mode Selector. Each display theme is designed for a specific driving scenario and can be configured through applications found in the "app tray."

"The new Corvette Stingray features many advanced technologies, so our challenge when designing the driver's displays was to ensure that those technologies could be easily found in common driving scenarios," said Jason Stewart, General Motors interaction designer.

"The touring theme places more emphasis on multimedia and infotainment; the sport theme emphasizes performance features with a prominent shift indicator and a large radial tachometer; track theme offers a race-inspired layout containing a sweeping tachometer, Corvette racing inspired shift lights and permanent lap-time displays," Stewart said. "Each of these three themes can also be configured so that drivers can personalize their experience in the Stingray."

Here are 10 configurable display features that will help drivers realize the Stingray's capabilities:

- 1. **Tour theme** Displayed when the Stingray is in Weather, Eco, or Tour drive mode, this is the most modern display, providing essential vehicle information drivers want for commuting or long-distance driving and includes key vehicle information and multimedia displays
- 2. **Sport theme** Displayed when the Stingray is in Sport mode, this theme is designed to recall the classic sports-car experience, with a single, radial tachometer dominating the display

- 3. **Track theme** Inspired by the cluster of the Corvette Racing C6.R, this theme prioritizes the information vital for a successful track outing, including a "hockey stick" style tachometer, large gear indicator and shift lights
- 4. Adjustable redline All themes feature an adjustable redline that shows the suggested maximum engine speed as low as 3,500 rpm when the engine is cold
- 5. **Tachometer 'halo'** The Sport theme features a ring around the tachometer that glows from yellow to amber to red as engine rpms increase
- 6. Shift lights The track theme features shift lights influenced by the C6.R, which illuminate from the outside-in, transition from green to yellow to blue and flash at redline providing an easy-to-see shift notification at high speeds
- 7. **Friction-bubble/cornering force** The friction bubble that displays lateral and longitudinal G-forces allows drivers to measure how close they are to the Stingray's limits
- 8. **Tire temperature gauge** Leveraging the existing Tire Pressure Monitoring System, this patented system informs the driver as the tires warm up from cold to warm to hot, with hot being the optimal temperature for peak grip and track performance
- 9. Acceleration timer The interactive timer features programmable start/end speeds, which enable drivers to measure any acceleration run, from a traditional 0-60 mph to acceleration from 70-100 mph in top gear 10. 50 Laps Ago: September '63 Dick Stanley is the chairman of a committee that was devoted to forming a new club, breaking away from the Pacific Northwest Corvette Association in order to establish a Corvette owners-only club, a requirement the PNCA lacked. (This factoid provided by John Thomas's information on the early-years of the club forming. Also, the name Corvette Marque Club of Seattle was not made official until November when the club formally was recognized by Washington State as a car club—Ben). There was no record of minutes for an initial, formal club meeting in the histories.



40 Laps Ago: September '73 President Ernie Kahler got the monthly meeting started at sponsor Bill Hazelett Chevrolet in Kent. The club representative for WWSCC (Western Washington Sports Car Council) noted that the council is discussing what should be done about the unsafe practices of two associate clubs (Yakima & Wenatchee) at their autocrosses due to some previous incidents. The women's class PPs (Powder Puff) has been split into PPSA & PPSB due to the class size. (NOTE-having separate men's and women's classes was common during these times-Ben & John Thomas) Nominations for NWACC (Northwest Association of Corvette Clubs) were made known. Their Awards Banquet was scheduled for November in Salem, Oregon. A Progressive Dinner Tour was organized, beginning at the home of Neil Millen. Belinda McLees took over the duty as newsletter editor. Kit and Judy James and Arnie Blankers were voted into full membership, with Diane Star joining as an Affiliate member (no mention of the membership total—Ben). There was mention of two police officers that wanted to join CMCS, but due to their work schedules their participation would be minimal. With some discussions it was suggested they turn in their applications and try to attend at least one club-sponsored event for them to qualify. Kevin Christian is checking into acquiring club winter jackets. Ernie brought up an idea of creating a club scrapbook and suggested that Cindy proceed with the workup. Jerry Patton was to be in charge of cleaning up the signs used in the parade lap at SIR (Seattle International Raceway). John Thomas, Rick Stark and Sharon Webster were to assist with the project. L&M Continental at SIR requested about 30 cars to chauffeur drivers before the race. Kevin Christian suggested having a winter event of a rally with Pacific Rallye Club.

30 Laps Ago: September '83 President Bob Johansen got the monthly meeting started at Mother Trucker's Food Experience. Gary & Marion Bryon were accepted into full membership, bringing the total to 135. There was a CMCS Drag/Swap Meet at SIR, and a tour to Leavenworth that departed from Northgate. Jan Cockrum was accepting orders for club windbreakers. Mike Shelly discussed the need for the club to purchase walkie-talkies. Frank Olsheski resigned his post as club secretary. A tour to Leavenworth for the Washington State Autumn Leaf Festival took off from the Northgate Mall, led by Ernie Kahler. Some of the club members took in the new movie "Heart Like a Wheel"—the story of Shirley Muldowney, the first woman drag racer. Over one hundred members met at the Red Lion-SeaTac Inn to celebrate CMCS's 20th "Reunion." Willamette Valley Corvette Association put on a two-day autocross at the Woodburn Drag Strip, just south of Salem, Oregon.

20 Laps Ago: September '93 President Dee Esping conducted the monthly meeting at the home of the Nelsons in Seattle. Don & Carol Reddaway became the latest club members, bringing the total to 103. SIR needed to know if we are interested in reserving track time at SIR next summer for the Corvette-Porsche School. John Bell was to contact them and report back for a July date. Tom Armstrong indicated willingness to host a membership meeting at his shop. Bob Johansen and John Paul Nelson III will keep in touch with him to secure a date and time. The Meguiar representative and Detail Shop had a demonstration they would like to present at one of our meetings. There was discussion of adopting a family for Christmas as we have done in the past. There were 81 people that attended the club's 30th Anniversary celebration at Columbia Winery in Woodinville, WA; a BBQ by Armadillo provided the eats. A car show took place at the north end of the Burgermaster Drive-In. The Northwest Corvette Association put on a three-day event, "Challenge IV" in Portland, Oregon. Members Marlow & Ian Krein signed co-dependence paperwork for the care and maintenance of their Corvette.

10 Laps Ago: September '03 Rick & Lauri Milsow's 2003 C5 Millennium Yellow Convertible was featured on the OYM newsletter cover. President Dennis Montgomery called the monthly meeting to order. Michelle Clark and Michael Rapkin were the newest members voted into full membership (except for Roger Smith's vote) bringing the total to 284. The annual Cascade Loop overnight tour led by Rick Milsow saw 30 Corvettes and 60 people attend. Petersen took over co-production of the newsletter. Eventually, thanks go to Oran Petersen for taking over full duties of OYM newsletter editor. The Fast Woman's Weekend (WOW) returned to Cannon Beach for a 'women's only' overnighter, while 'the guys' take in bird watching at "Hooters." CMCS's 40th Anniversary celebration began with a car show at Crista Ministries in Shoreline, then a formal dinner at the Museum of Flight in Seattle.

5 Laps Ago: September '08 Leslie & Doris Wagner's 1958 Red Roadster was featured on the OYM newsletter cover. Vice President David Ormerod got the monthly meeting started following a buffet at Chengdu Chinese Restaurant in Overlake Square in Bellevue. Some club members were absent due to being away to support the Vettes for Veterans event. Membership stood at 280. Lorrie Montgomery reported that there were 118 Corvettes that participated in the latest XXX Root Beer Drive-In All Corvette Show and Burger Bash in Issaguah. Mike Armstrong noted that so far 170 people have booked reservations for the SIS 2008 (Seattle In September) event. We had a dessert night at the Ronald McDonald house in Seattle, and a "packing session" to box up items to send to the troops overseas. Stan Trask announced that NCRS held its NW Regional Meet in Bend, OR, at the Inn of the Seventh Mountain. He also mentioned that owners of 1993 or older Corvettes are now eligible to join.



TOUR TIPS

NE OF THE things CMCS members love to do is go on tours. These can be day tours or "overnighters" like the Wine Tour and Wet Weekend. We are fortunate enough to have a good number of new members, and some may like to know



what to do and look for in a tour.

This is not meant to be a "RULES OF THE ROAD" item, but rather just some thoughts on how to make tours more enjoyable and less stressful for all.

It's not the end of the world if a non-Corvette gets into our caravan lane.

Too often, it is easy to tailgate, speed up, slow down or any perform some other less-than-safe maneuver in order to make sure that a steel car doesn't get in line. It just doesn't matter! In fact, it may be the biggest thrill the steel car driver will have all day by being in line with all those beautiful Corvettes! Sooner or later (usually sooner) the steel car will change lanes, turn off, or just vaporize, and we'll all be back together.

Learn to pass correctly in a caravan, on the freeway or otherwise.

On a freeway, it is very dangerous to try to pass someone and then squeeze back in line too soon with the other Corvettes. When you are passing and try to get back in line or get "hung out," or a turn-off or exit is coming up, learn to leap-frog ahead of the Corvette just ahead of the passed vehicle. If the Corvette you want to get behind has slowed down (this happens all too often after passing; don't be guilty of doing this!) keep going past the next Corvette(s) until to you can safely merge back into line. It is very important that we all learn this and pay attention with what's happening behind us. If we see another Corvette that wants to get back in line, safely allow a space for them AHEAD of you so they can get back in line easily. This leap-frog maneuver will take all the stress and most of the danger out of passing, and is a great example of teamwork.

If you don't have a radio that works with the club's frequencies...GET ONE!

The radio allows you to relax and enjoy the drive because you are in touch with the tour leaders and others on the tour. Therefore you stand a significantly less chance of getting lost (a thoroughly not-fun experience on a tour) because you know what's coming next and what may have changed. It is also really nice to have something pointed out that might have been missed, such as bicyclists, wildlife, landmarks, Mustangs broken down on the side of the road and other items of interest. In addition, there are some pretty clever people out there who can provide some entertaining comments over the radio, too.

We all need to know that use of the radio implies taking on some responsibility. We have to be sure to use them as if our kids were listening (or even worse, our parents!) and not use profanity, off-color jokes/comments, blaring music from your Corvette's speakers, endless monologues or anything else that would be inappropriate to other members.

Remember, you bought your radio to help make the use of your Corvette more pleasant, so use your radio and have fun with it!

Make sure the Corvette behind you knows where to turn.

If you make a scheduled turn and the Corvette behind you is too far back to see you make that turn, they may miss it. The best way to make sure no one gets lost is to take a turn and wait until the Corvette behind you sees you before you proceed. If everyone did this, no one would get lost because you would be "watching out" for the Corvette behind you and the Corvette ahead would be 'watching out" for you!

I hope this has been informative, and remember: have fun on those tours! That's why you bought that beautiful Corvette! ❖

CMCS Radio Tips

OW THAT WE are in the cruising/parade/tour season, we offer the following tips for the use of club radios. Most of us have them and we all realize what a great tool they are to help make club events and activities more fun and less stressful. So we thought the following would help.

First, hold the radio the right distance from your mouth. There is a natural tendency to hold the radio close to our mouths because we think it will help others hear us better. Actually, holding the radio too close is the main reason a lot of us are not understood. The recommended distance is three inches from mouth to radio, but that

should be treated as a minimum. A distance of four inches makes it much easier to be understood.

Second, be careful using the transmit button. A lot of us start talking before the button is fully depressed and the first part of what we say is lost. The best way to handle this is to press the transmit button, wait a second, and <u>then</u> start talking. The same is true when finishing our transmittal. We need to finish what we have to say and then wait a second to release to button. If we all follow this procedure we will not have any part of our "pearls of wisdom" fail to be transmitted.

Third, we must be aware of how loudly we are talking when we transmit. It is natural to speak in a louder voice than normal to make sure we are heard, but the radios we have—be they old or new—are very efficient. Loud talking or yelling is just not needed. Believe me, if we are not talking loud enough to be heard, someone will tell us!

Fourth, let's all try to be "tuned in" to radio usage. If we hear someone who is hard to understand, we should let them know (in a nice way) so we can get used to correct usage.

Fifth, use your radio to alert others to such things as bicyclists on the road, potholes, road hazards, police presence, errors in directions, etc.

Last, use your radio to make your club activities more enjoyable for yourself and others. While the radio's main purpose is to be used for safety and convenience, feel free to use it for those things which may make the tour or event more enjoyable for others. Such things might be to alert others to see certain landmarks, animal life, views etc. While dominating all radio usage is not a good way to go, the radio is your property. So, using common sense as your guide, have fun with your radio! •
