The road to the facility is paved but the parking lot is gravel. The tour begins at 2:00 pm and lasts about an hour.


PSE can accommodate a maximum of 50 people per tour group. You must RSVP by June 7th to get a tour registration form

If you missed the May meeting at Speedway, you missed a great meeting. Speedway Corvette guru Joe Harvey brought a C7 into our meeting area and described the features of both the base car and the upcoming Z06 in detail. He also related his experiences in driving the C7 at speed on the track. Certainly his description made me envious. The meetings at our sponsor location's are generally very well attended. They give us an opportunity to add more to the meeting date than just a meal and meeting. Nothing wrong with just the latter, but these sponsor based meetings always give us lots of time for socializing and learning. We are hoping to add a meeting at the Kirkland location either later this year or early next year. A few years ago, we had one of the chief plant engineers from Bowling Green in town and Lee Johnson put together a seminar that probably lasted 1 ½ hours. # Cover Car - Robb Mitchell's 2009 Coupe







#### Maryhill Hill Climb Tour Friday October 3 to Sunday, Oct 5, 2014 by Kevin Jewell

Did you know the oldest asphalt highway in Washington was built in 1911 and is located near Goldendale. The Maryhill Loops Road was built by Sam Hill to connect the Columbia River and the railroad terminal with his planned Quaker community. The road was bypassed by Highway 97 after WW II, and is now owned by the Maryhill Museum of Art. This highway is only open to vehicles two weekends/year and one of them is in Oct in conjunction with the Maryhill Car Show and Hill-climb. The all margue car show is on Saturday on the grounds of the Maryhill Museum. During the show, we are excused from noon to 2:00 PM, to drive the hill-climb route. The SOVREN (Society of Vintage Racing Enthusiasts) cars have will have time trials all morning and the race cars are given a police escort on the highway so they can join the car show display in the afternoon. Hearing them approach with their police escort and then seeing the wide variety of race cars is worth the price of admission in itself. The road was recently re-paved. I drove the road about 4 years ago, and had to admit that the race drivers have to be a bit wacko to drive this multiple turn, 1 1/2 lane wide road at speed. Then on Sunday the vintage race cars compete in the formal SOVREN hill-climb. There will always be a few C1-C3 Corvettes in the grid. We know of a great spot to watch the hill-climb from a major pull off on Highway 97.

The plan is to tour to the Goldendale area on Friday, attend the car show and drive the Loops Road on Saturday, watch the SOVREN competitors Sunday morning and then when everyone is ready, depart for home. There are other attractions as well. The well known Maryhill Winery is just a couple of miles from the Museum grounds. The Maryhill Museum underwent a multi-million dollar renovation a couple of years ago, and without a doubt is one of the best museums in the state and is well worth a couple of hours. Close by is also the Stonehenge replica that Sam Hill constructed.

The best place to stay is the

#### Quality Inn and Suites in Goldendale, (509) 773.5881.

Typical rates are \$90/night with 10% AAA discount. There are only 48 units available, and when we attended a few years ago, the motel was fully booked months before October. There is not much else in Goldendale, so the overflow crowd heads to Biggs, OR across the Columbia, or even downriver to The Dalles. The trouble with Biggs is that this is a major truck stop with 24 hour truck traffic, and the only motel has a 1 star rating according to Priceline. The Quality Inn has a very generous 24 hour cancellation policy, so now is the time to book your room and avoid having to stay in Biggs.

The car show registration is \$12-15 depending on date received and the watching the race cars on the hill-climb is free. The Concours d'Maryhill Car Show is organized by the Goldendale Motorsports Assoc. There will be more information coming, but for now if this sounds like fun to you, reserve the dates, AND most important reserve your room at the Quality Inn in Goldendale. You can always cancel later.

#### North to Alaska...

(in search of rock chips & road rash)

**5/14/04**: Bright-n-sunny. 70 degrees. Perfect topdown weather. 2-weeks worth of "stuff" packed in the 1967 and the top can still go down. That's the rule! Leisurely drive to Bellingham to the Alaska Marine Highway System (AMHS) terminal. Topped off with fuel. \$2.30/gal. Ouch! Clam chowder in the terminal is \$3/large bowl and is excellent.

Got the dog sniffin' test

twice. First dog looking for explosives, ammunition, and guns. Second dog looking for drugs. Didn't find any of either in the 1967 but had a swell time looking. Waited in line for*ever* to load. Vehicles were packed in like sardines.

We were next-to-last car on, but the reason soon became evident. The car deck workers had taken an interest in the 1967 and saved us



a spot away from the other vehicles where nobody could hit us with a door. Very nice of them to do that. Being the last to load also put us at the tail end of a huge line to check in with the purser to get our berth assigned. Ferry departed exactly on time @ 6PM. The US Coast Guard escorted us all the way to Canadian waters, then cut us loose. Finally, it's official. We're on our way!

This ain't no cruise ship. Not nearly so big, not nearly so lavish, but in many ways it's much better. First & foremost, there's NO SMOKI NG anywhere on the boat except for a small area outside on the aft deck. Sweet. There are no casinos, no TV's, no formal entertainment (unless you count people-watching, which is always entertaining) and no non-stop eating. It's clean, it's quiet, the berths are small but very well appointed, food in the dining room is excellent, and most of all, the scenery passing by is spectacular. At night some of the outside decks and lounges become "tent cities" as many passengers don't rent berths ... they simply sleep out under the stars. Would be a different story, I suppose, if the weather was nasty, but tonight it looked like a lot of fun.

5/15/04 – Day 2: Got up at the crack of 9AM today. Light overcast and much cooler. Perhaps in the 50's, but who would know? There's no TV weatherbabe to tell us! Very pleasant. The scenery continues to be spectacular. From our dining room window seat at breakfast we saw a group of harbor seals lounging on the rocks seeking sunshine. Later in the morning a group of dolphins, perhaps 30 or so, played tag in the boat's bow wake. Saw a lone bald eagle gliding at tree-top level, probably in search of breakfast. Made good time during the first half of the day, running about 17 knots until we passed Queen Charlotte I sland. Went through a section of open ocean (read: boring ... nothing to see but water) so we watched a conveniently scheduled documentary on the removal of Ripple Rock. The area's now known as Ripple Shoals, since the top 40 feet of the original underwater mountain was blown up by 614,000# of explosives. A fascinating story. (Continued on next page)

Spent some time in the forward observation lounge watching a lady doing a 16<sup>th</sup> century German craft of making lace. (Photo Right) I t's called Kloppelei, which translates to Bobbin Lace.

After that some of the channels got very narrow and we spent much of the afternoon running about 5 knots or

less. Very slow, but very scenic, so who cares if we're not getting very far very fast. The channel must be very deep. In some places it's perhaps only 30-40 feet from the side of the boat to the rock walls on either side. The rock walls rise straight up out of the water. Lots of lighthouses and a couple small fishing villages. Otherwise not too many signs of civilization seen today. Would really be fun to explore some of these remote coves in a kayak. By nightfall we're maybe only 50 miles from Ketchikan, our first stop, but puttin' along at only 5 knots it will take another 10 hours to get there.

5/16/04 - Day 3: Out of the bunk @ 5:30AM so we'd be ready to dock in Ketchikan @ 6AM. Walked a mile or so from the terminal in search of Creek Street so we could look at some kind of architectural marvel that my bride wanted me to see. Never did find it so walked the same mile back to the boat just barely in time to re-board.

Saw an interesting sign on our hike in Ketchikan. Reagan may have brought down the "evil empire" but apparently the KGB is still alive and well in Ketchikan. All of this before breakfast!

The ferry waits for nobody so we didn't dare be late. So far it has departed on time, every time, exactly on schedule. I mpressive. Next stop was Wrangell. This one was a "bump-ngo" stop, just long enough to drop a few passengers and load

a few new ones. It was accomplished in less than an hour, start to finish. No wasted motion by the ferry crew. They are really organized. From Wrangell we headed for Petersburg, about 10-hours away. Went through some really narrow, shallow channels that required a crew member to be posted on the bow watching for fresh sand bars or other obstacles. Some times it seemed that you could reach out and touch the trees along the bank. You couldn't, of course, but it seemed that way.

> Saw another seal and another pod of dolphins today, as well as a dozen or so Bald Eagles in Ketchikan and many more as we got near Petersburg. Gorgeous sunset as we steamed out of Petersburg and across Frederick Sound. Took 95 photos today. Digital cameras. How did we ever get along with out them! Tomorrow morning we're scheduled to arrive in Juneau @ 4AM and depart at 5:30AM. I'll miss this one. One early morning is

enough. This is, after all, supposed to be VACATION. Getting up at zerodark-thirty more than once just doesn't fit the blueprint. I did my "once" today. No more!







5/17/04 – Day 4: The stop in Juneau happened right on schedule, but of course I didn't know it. When I finally managed to drag my bones out of the sack we were already bound for Haines, our next-to-last stop on the Inside Passage route. Overcast with some sun breaks for most of the morning. Water smooth as glass. Hundreds of Puffins on the water in and around Haines and again around Skagway. Ferry nearly empty when we got to Skagway as most of the remaining passengers and vehicles got off at Haines.



Ours was the last car off the boat. Spent so much idle time during the load & unload process that the 1967 got pretty well carboned up and was only hitting on about half the holes as we left the parking lot. Ran it up the highway for a few miles at high RPM to "blow the cobs out" then returned to Skagway to do a bit of exploring. Skagway has less than 900 year-round residents, with tourism being by far the largest and pretty much only industry

#### today.

That wasn't always the case. Skagway came to life during the Gold Rush days. Population exploded to over 8,000 by April, 1898 then quickly disappeared when the Gold Rush ended. Skagway: originally a Tlingit word with many different spellings. Among them, are: Shkagway, Skaguay, Schkague, and Schkawai. Most say it means, "home of the north wind". Others say it's, "end of the salt water". Still others suggest it means, "lady relieving herself on a rock". At least that's what local historian Frank Norris claims. Much of the town has been restored to look like the Gold Rush days so we spent an hour or so taking pictures of the 1967 in front of some of the neat old buildings.

The only road out of Skagway begins with an 11-mile climb to the 3,292 foot summit of White Pass. Spectacular scenery on this winding mountain road. The road itself was clear and dry, but still had lots of snow on both sides and waterfalls all over the place. At the top we stopped for yet another photo op at this "Welcome" sign. Then we motored on toward Canada, passing through customs



near Fraser, BČ and on to Whitehorse, Yukon Territory for the night. We have about 700 miles between us and Anchorage. Hope to make it there by Wednesday night in time to attend the monthly meeting of the Anchorage Corvette Assoc.

Found a bed at the "no tell motel" in Whitehorse, YT. The proprietor was a delightful little old granny who must have been 85+ and who spoke fluent French, but very little English. Since I speak relatively fluent English and ZERO French, we had a wonderful time trying to cut a deal. Ask me about it sometime. summer is just around the corner.

Guests were announced then prospective members eligible to be voted into full membership were announced; Ed & Kitty Zabinski, Terry House, Ken Nearing, and, Charles Sienkiewicz (no mention of the total number was mentioned in the minutes- Ben). Names were recorded for those wishing to help develop and support a Corvette

Marque Club of Seattle (CMCS) display at the National Auto Show to be held at the Seattle Center. Club activities were discussed. The meeting was adjourned to return to the beach activities, and of course the excellent food.

The Board discussed putting together a New Membership Kit, while other discussions involved a Nominations Section to the Club's Constitution/By-Laws, and a decision would be presented to the general membership at a future meeting. Bob Morse read a draft of a letter he had written to Alan Green Chevrolet concerning their sponsorship suggestions specified at the past May meeting. It was approved to accept Ray & Nina Deckman as Honorary Members of our Club. It was approved to drop the point-system and any remaining standing be terminated as well. Club activities were discussed

40 LAPS AGO: June 1974. President Dee Esping conducted the monthly meeting held at the Ebb Tide Restaurant in Kent. Tom Stansfield was voted into full membership (no mention of the total membership number was mentioned in the minutes- Ben). Kevin (no last name was recorded in the minutes- Ben) mentioned he would like to see a Club first aid kit be created for our autocrosses. Volunteers were needed for the mid June Parking Session at the Seattle International Raceway (SIR) in Kent. The Phone Committee needs to contact the members early enough to inform them of upcoming events, and asked for volunteers to assist Club sponsored activities. We will be acquiring a post office box in Kirkland at the end of the summer and it will be the Club's official mailing address. There still was the position of Club editor for our monthly newsletter. John R. Thomas, editor of the monthly newsletter, would like to see the next newsletter be a dedicated Memorial to Frank Olsheski. Club Activities included a "31" Party at the home of the Hodges, a GM Picnic in Graham, Board meeting at the Johansen's, and a 2nd Annual Corvette Show in South Tacoma. John R. Don Gord was working on a Club patch. A motion was made to go with a black jacket, but was tabled until the Board meeting for further discussions. (Olsheski) Memorial Award to be passed on each year at the Club Christmas party to a CMCS member who has been the most active the past few years. (Note: this trophy remains a prized award throughout the years, awarded first by the Board Officers selection as who was the most deserving of a Club members dedication to the Club over the past year, to today's standard of being nominated by/from the general membership -Ben). There was also a discussion of making a donation to the Frank O. Scholarship Fund, which was tabled for the Board's attention. Ben Benninghoff reported that for the Everett Giant's ball game scheduled in July, our Club had been invited to attend and put on a Corvette display for the fans as they enter the park. Ben has placed an order form in the newsletter for any wishing to order t-shirts, sweatshirts, hats with the Club logo on them.

10 LAPS AGO: June 2004. President Tim and wife Mona Cox's Millennium Yellow 2003 Z06 Coupe was featured on the newsletter cover. #### The Story of the '62

Every car in our Museum has a story, and the story of the 1962 Corvette donated by David Donoho has been in the limelight since February 12, when a sinkhole attempted to claim the car.

David Donoho was a die-hard Corvette enthusiast, developing an infatuation from a young age and even saving up enough money to buy his first – a brand new 1962 – when he was in high school. David was so obsessed, in fact, that he earned the nickname "The Weather Man" because his friends would tease him about how closely he would watch the weather, and quickly take his Corvette home when there was a chance of rain.



"David was an unassuming and simple man," said longtime friend and attorney Beth Sease. She added that as a long time blue-collar worker, David saved his money and invested it wisely to have the funds to support his Corvette hobby. David was the proud owner of four Corvettes in his lifetime – a 1987, 2001 and 2006 (in addition to the 1962) and all were garage kept.

In 2011, David turned over the keys to his beloved car – a car he had owned all of its life... just over 50 years. Beth says that turning the car over to the museum seemed to be the best thing to benefit David and preserve his memory.
