Workers need to wear long pants and sleeves and bring gloves. We (from WSDOT) supply reflective vests and safety helmets.


A worker gets to keep anything valuable that he or she finds, and items such as \$5 bills and various tools have been found.

Tech Article - Hyper-milling a 2014 Stingray

Stan Trask recently sent me an article from the July/August issue of **Popular Mechanics**; written by John Pearley Huffman. It documents his experience of hyper-milling a new Stingray Z51 with the 7-speed manual transmission.

Hyper-milling is the "art" (more so than science although both are involved) of maximizing the number of miles per gallon you can stretch out of a vehicle. The "book" number for this Corvette is about 28 mpg.

Bottom line: He went about 125 miles on 3.43 gallons for 37.3 mpg. Not bad for a 460 hp high performance sports car. John feels that it is possible to do even better.

Overall, *our* Stingray gets about 26.7 mpg in our average driving. Of course as John mentions, you miss out on the "fun" factor at 37 mpg. Find a copy of the magazine if you wish to read to article.



Maryhill Hill Climb Tour Friday October 3 to Sunday, Oct 5, 2014 by Kevin Jewell

Did you know the oldest asphalt highway in Washington was built in 1911 and is located near Goldendale? The Maryhill Loops Road was built by Sam Hill to connect the Columbia River and the railroad terminal with his planned Quaker community. The road

was bypassed by Highway 97 after WW II, and is now owned by the Maryhill Museum of Art. This highway is only open to vehicles two weekends/year and one of them is in Oct in conjunction with the Maryhill Car Show and Hill-climb. The all marque car show is on Saturday on the grounds of the Maryhill Museum. During the show, we are excused from noon to 2:00 PM, to drive the hill-climb route. The SOVREN (Society of Vintage Racing Enthusiasts) cars have will have time trials all morning and the race cars are given a police escort on the highway so they can join the car show display in the afternoon. Hearing them approach with their police escort and then seeing the wide variety of race cars is worth the price of admission in itself. The road was recently re-paved. I drove the road about 4 years ago, and had to admit that the race drivers have to be a bit wacko to drive this multiple turn, 1 ½ lane wide road at speed. Then on Sunday the vintage race cars compete in the formal SOVREN hill-climb. There will always be a few C1-C3 Corvettes in the grid. We know of a great spot to watch the hill-climb from a major pull off on Highway 97.

The plan is to tour to the Goldendale area on Friday, attend the car show and drive the Loops Road on Saturday, watch the SOVREN competitors Sunday morning and then when everyone is ready, depart for home. There are other attractions as well. The well known Maryhill Winery is just a couple of miles from the Museum grounds. The Maryhill Museum underwent a multi-million dollar renovation a couple of years ago, and without a doubt is one of the best museums in the state and is well worth a couple of hours. Close by is also the Stonehenge replica that Sam Hill constructed.

The best place to stay is the

Quality Inn and Suites in Goldendale, (509) 773.5881.

Typical rates are \$90/night with 10% AAA discount. There are only 48 units available, and when we attended a few years ago, the motel was fully booked months before October. There is not much else in Goldendale, so the overflow crowd heads to Biggs, OR across the Columbia, or even downriver to The Dalles. The trouble with Biggs is that this is a major truck stop with 24 hour truck traffic, and the only motel has a 1 star rating according to Priceline. The Quality Inn has a very generous 24 hour cancellation policy, so now is the time to book your room and avoid having to stay in Biggs.

The car show registration is \$12-15 depending on date received and the watching the race cars on the hill-climb is free. The Concours d'Maryhill Car Show is organized by the Goldendale Motorsports Assoc. There will be more information coming, but for now if this sounds like fun to you, reserve the dates, AND most important reserve your room at the Quality Inn in Goldendale. You can always cancel later.

North to Alaska...

(in search of rock chips & road rash)

Editors Notes: This is a reprint from the September 2004 CMCS Newsletter.

Day 7 is repeated from the August I ssue to add a missing photo and provide continuity to the article.

5/20/04 - Day 7: We made it to "The End of the Road" in Homer, AK today. Followed the Sterling Hwy all the way across the Kenai Peninsula to where the road just about runs right into Kachemak Bay. It's as far WEST as you can drive in these United States. Saw 3 other Vettes today. All appeared to be locals,



a White C5 coupe, a Blue C5 FRC, and a 78 Silver Anniv coupe. All returned the "Corvette wave" except the guy in the White C5. He was too busy yakkin on his cell phone. Must have been a transplant from Bellevue. Homer's not at all what I envisioned. For one thing, it's much larger. Much of it sits on a hillside so lots of folks have million dollar views of Kachemak Bay.



We didn't find Tom Bodett's Motel-6, but thanks to the MilePost book, we did find the Pioneer Inn, a delightful little inn on the hillside overlooking Kachemak Bay. For 79 bucks we got a 3-room king suite with a commanding view of the bay. How can you beat a deal like that? The innkeeper suggested we try the Homestead Restaurant for dinner. "Just take a left at

the end of the driveway and head out of town", she said. "Go about 9-miles or until you see the place with the full parking lot. You can't miss it," she said. "I t's where all the locals go when they want a nice upscale meal." She was absolutely correct. I t's a Thursday night and the place is packed. The food and the service were First Class. We'll go back there again. As I write this, it's nearly 11:30PM and there's still enough daylight that I can clearly see all the way across the bay to the snow capped mountains above Seldovia. Before we left Anchorage this morning we made arrangements to store the '67 for the summer. I knew immediately upon walking in that this storage facility was my kinda place. American flags hanging all over the walls. Pictures and references to US Veterans all over the place. Rush Limbaugh's program on the radio. To top it off, the owner has a beautiful '70 roadster. My kinda people. My kinda place. Won't actually put the '67 in the box until Sunday afternoon but now everything's all set up and we can breathe a sigh of relief for our remaining days in AK this month. 404 miles today.

5/21/04 - Day 8: Took one more lap around the Homer Spit this morning. Sure is peaceful at the "end of the road".



Every available pole or high perch still has a bald eagle sitting on it. Good thing we took our Homer pictures yesterday as this morning there's a low fog on the water that pretty much covers everything. Pointed the nose of the '67 eastward and re-traced our path on the Sterling Highway back through Soldotna and Cooper Point but turned right at the "T" and headed south toward Seward. Thought we saw a crane flying ahead of us, but it turned out to be just another bald eagle.

I magine. "Just another" bald eagle! They are so common around here that seeing another one is almost becoming a non-event. Other parts of the country aren't so fortunate, but here at least, our national symbol is thriving. Saw a flock of them, perhaps a couple dozen, congregating to "meet-n-eat meat" in a field along the Sterling. May be "just another" but it's still a magnificent sight. Drove along the beach of Resurrection Sound and checked out the houses on stilts. Don't know why they build 'em that way.



Visited the starting point of the original I ditarod Trail. In 1925 it went 938 miles via dog sled from Seward to Nome to deliver serum to counter the diphtheria epidemic. Tonight we're shacked up in Wasilla (the city that has the current Home of the I ditarod Headquarters) at the Best Western on Lake Lucille. Put a couple loads of laundry in the machines (when traveling long distances in a Vette with the top down, you do laundry often because you packed light, remember?) then wandered

around the lakeshore @ 11:30PM taking "no-flash" pictures. We're 30-days away from the summer solstice, the longest day, and there's still plenty of daylight at nearly midnight. 372 miles today. About 1,720 car miles so far this week.

5/22/04 - Day 9: First thing this morning we made another trip to the car wash to remove the memories of yesterday's loop around the Kenai Peninsula. This car wash in Wasilla was far superior to the last one in Anchorage. Less expensive, too. On this trip we're learning where to find the best car wash facilities, best restaurants, and best off-the-beaten-path hotels. Internet access in our current hotel is down for repairs, so we're incommunicado with the rest of the world for the next couple days.



Inconvenient in some respects, but maybe not such a bad deal, all things considered. Have no idea what's happening in the "real world" as we haven't seen a TV or heard a radio broadcast for well over a week. I gnorance is bliss! Today we drove back to Anchorage to take part in the ACA's spring Show-n-Shine & BBQ at Alaska Sales & Service, the club's sponsor.



This was a laid back "for fun" show with no judging. Just burning a few burgers, sharing Corvette camaraderie, and entertaining the sponsor's customers. If there had been a "Best of Show" award given, my vote would have gone to this one. Fantastic paint work recognizing veterans, 9/11, and the correct wording of the Pledge of Allegiance. Only 130 miles today.

5/23/04 - Day 10: Today we ran into the first significant rain of the whole trip. Lots of it. Knew it was coming and hoped to get back to Anchorage and the storage unit before the skies opened up. It was not to be. Still, we've been mighty lucky to have fantastic weather for the past 10-days so who are we to complain. By now we've logged a bit over 1,900 miles (on the driving part) of our Akaskan Odyssey. It's been the trip of a lifetime but it's not over yet. Not by a



lona shot!



Put the '67 in the storage unit where it will remain for the next 3-weeks and headed for the airport. Next time the Vette will see daylight will be on June 12th when we return to be a part of the NCM caravan from Anchorage to Whittier. I can hardly wait...

Laps from the Past

50 LAPS AGO: August 1964. President Dick Stanley conducted the monthly meeting held at Alki Beach in West Seattle. The ordered Club jacket patches and car badges have finally arrived and are now available for purchase at Club events. Sponsor Alan Green Chevrolet approved most of the Club's requests for support except for the 'sponsorship of teams' open for discussion (there was no further explanation in the minutes regarding this-Ben). Bruce Kelly commented on his committee looking

into the Club's Point System and noted that there should be some modifications for clarity, but they have not yet agreed upon a final draft to present to the Club for approval. Dennis Waskevich, a guest from the Corvette Club of Michigan, suggested the Point System be dropped to prevent subsequent dissension and possible breaks in the Club's membership. Activities Chair Bob Morse discussed upcoming Club events posted in the newsletter. The president invited all

members in good standing to attend Board meetings. New prospective members voted into full membership were; Larry Gibson, Wally Arrowsmith, Cathy Deyoung, and, Roger Sweeney (no mention of the total number was noted in the minutes- Ben).

40 LAPS AGO: August 1974. The monthly meeting took place during the annual Beach Party at Joe & Donna Bridgeman's home. John Thomas has submitted his resignation as Vice President due to relocating to New Mexico because of his work. A special election was held for the following candidates: Sam Sakura, Gene Glidden, and, Cindy Rathbone. Sam Sakura received the most votes and thus became Vice President for the remainder of the term. Duncan Johnson reported on the planning for the Club's Labor Day Rally, Party & Autocross. The planning was going well but the Club was looking for additional volunteers to assist with rally workers on Saturday. Kevin Christian & Neil Millen were elected as Club NWACC (NorthWest Association of Corvette Clubs) representatives for next year. It was voted to accept the purchase of Clark's walkie-talkies for \$25. A date for the Practice Session at SIR (Seattle International Raceway) has not been set to date, and may not take place until the first weekend in October.

30 LAPS AGO: August 1984. President John Thomas calls the monthly meeting to order during the annual Beach Party at his parent's home in Quartermaster Harbor on Maury Island. Gyle Atter and Patti Puckett are voted into full membership (no total recorded in the minutes- Ben). The 4th Annual Corvette Drag Race & Swap Meet & Car Show takes place at SIR, with a Poker Run, and a dinner & dance following. The Southern Oregon Corvette Association club puts on a 3-day Corvette Weekend in Medford, with show and shines and a poker run to Crater Lake.

20 LAPS AGO: August 1994. John Bell's 1991 Steel Blue ZR1 coupe is featured on the OYM (On Your Marque) newsletter. John notes he picked up his 350cid LT5 (double overhead cam 32 valve aluminum engine) with 6-speed from our friend and Club sponsor Roy Robinson Chevrolet in Marysville. President Dave Barlia gathers the 26 attending the monthly meeting following dinner at Mitzel's Restaurant in Kent. Mimi Wilden was voted in as a new member but was left off the list inadvertently in the newsletter. Randy Goins' last name was corrected in the minutes. The Treasurer noted all but two bills from the SIR event were paid to date, but was still projected to see a profit from the event that will be set aside for SIR IV next year. Membership Chair Jan Cockrum noted there are 128 paid members in the Club. a new record! Window removable CMCS decals are now available for purchase. Membership asks all to update their personal information with the Club, especially if they have sold or traded their Corvettes. Bob & Sandy Lazaroff host a Mid-Summer Tour to Buckley WA for the town's Arts & Craft Days festival; Patches & Gertrude were there), with a trip to Wally's White River Drive-In for an old fashioned greasy burger and car show. Classical Glass


Corvette Club of Tacoma hosted a great two-day event at the Tacoma Narrows Airport and at the La Quinta Resort. They called this event the 4th Annual 5-Star Corvette Weekend that counted towards NWACC points for the year. Other Club activities involved supporting sister Corvette club events around the Sound like the Majestic Glass Corvette Club's 10th Annual All Corvette Stock & Custom car show in Anacortes; a Corvette Cruise-In in Vancouver WA, and, numerous parades including one in Mukilteo (then known as the 'biggest littlest parade' in WA; all but 2-blocks square!). The start of the National Corvette Museum's Caravan from around the states begins over the last weekend in August, to converge on the museum in Bowling Green Kentucky for their official grand opening over the Labor Day Weekend. Projections on the number of Corvettes taking part in the Caravans are estimated between 2,000 and possibly as many as 8,000.

10 LAPS AGO: August 2004. Dick & Jane Shimanek's 1967 Lynndale Blue 390/427 4-speed, and a 1968 La Mans Blue coupe with almost an identical package, are showcased on the OYM newsletter cover. Dick convinced Jane that the 1967 coupe he discovered in a wrecking yard was worth the effort to do a body-off NCRS (National Corvette Restorer Society) restoration. During the application of 4-gallons of stripping paint they found a flawless fiberglass shell hidden beneath 7 layers of spider webbed white paint. Another restoration followed suit with the 1968. President Tim Cox gets the monthly meeting started during a trip to the Tulalip Casino for a breakfast buffet. A get well card was passed around to sign for Al Dager who was recovering from bypass surgery. Membership Chair Mona Cox had her work cut out for her as she introduced 11 prospective members to those in attendance; Ben & Nancy Remak, Jay & Kim Gordon, Shane McBride, Ed & Lindee Brooks, Tom Cain, Jan Harris, and, Ron & Margaret Holly, which were all approved bringing the total membership to 297. Club sponsor Seaview Chevrolet held their 8th Show and Shine in Lynnwood. Several sister Corvette Clubs around the Sound hosted events, while a Club caravan headed off to West Yellowstone, Montana to participate in the 3day Wild West Vette Fest. New newsletter editor Oran Petersen celebrates his 12th issue with the OYM monthly newsletter since taking over from Cloyd Jackson. Gary Main offers the second part of his and Kayla's extraordinary odyssey to Alaska and back in their 1967 roadster in the monthly newsletter. **5 LAPS AGO: August 2009.** Kevin Wilson & Emily Evans' 1962 Sateen Silver

roadster, 327/300hp is featured on the cover of the OYM newsletter. Kevin acquired the southern California special by a successful EBay bid auctioned off by a police chief from a LA suburb for a 'bad boy' nephew professional baseball player. President Dennis Montgomery conducts the monthly meeting held at the Buzz Inn Steakhouse at the Snohomish Airfield. Al Dager noted he has Club UHF radios for sale and will make them available at all Club events. There was a 15- minute pause in Club business so all the members could watch the skydivers

landing on the air field. Membership Chair Lorrie Montgomery introduced 7 prospective members that were all accepted into full membership; Paul & Sandi Gay, Greg & Susan Roberson, Seth Sanusi, and, Joe & Lynetta Showaker, bringing the total to 294. Stan & Billie Trask will co-host next year's 2010 SIS (Seattle In September) Club event, and note they will begin monthly committee meetings at the Round Table Pizza in Overlake. Numerous activities of the Club, as well as other Corvette clubs in the area, kept the members busy throughout the month. Most notable were Kayla Main's Ferrous Fanny 500 Tour to Crater Lake seeing 28 Corvettes from 3 Corvette clubs attending the overnight tour; the Wild West Vette Fest to West Yellowstone Montana hosted by Corvettes of Southeast Idaho; and, our XXX All Corvette Show & Burger Bash in Issaquah. A call goes out for all interested to donate lap blankets for the veterans we support bi-annually during our support of the Vettes For Veterans outing. Corvettes Unlimited hosted their 14th Annual All Corvette Show and Shine in Bellingham. Newsletter Editor Oran Petersen presents an article noting the history of the OYM monthly newsletter covers and of the ever evolving format from a black and white printing to one of color over the years. June 1994 saw the first black and white photograph of a member's Corvette; the first color photograph cover in April of 1996, and, the first all-color OYM issue in March of 1998.




Dana. "Much of the money collected came from local chapters."

Tech Info - CMCS Metal Shield Mountings for Your Corvette by Oran Petersen

For many years CMCS put a metal Shield (CMCS Logo) in the new member packets. Many were not mounting them on the newer series of Corvettes, so in about 2005 they were discontinued. Many of you may have one around that has never seen a car.

Recently, Steve Yabroff and I developed a simple mount using the license plate screws that works for the C6 and for the C7 Stingray series. The C7 is shown as an example. The C6 uses an identical mount.



I also have one that works on the C4 series through 1988. Not sure if it fits the 1989 and newer.

We also have a mount for C2 and can work something up for C3 based on the year. The C3 has at leased 3 variations of bumper styles that need different treatments.

None of these mounts require modifications to your car.

We have a few shields in stock, and are looking into getting more. They are now \$10 each. The next batch is likely to cost more. Contact Steve Yabroff Membership@CorvetteMarqueClub.com to purchase one.
