On Your Marque... Get Set... Go! By Kevin Jewell - CMCS President



I subscribe to many of the same car magazines to which many of you probably also subscribe. Since at least 1997, in almost every Corvette review there have been two universal comments. The first was a negative comment about the width of the Corvette. This negative comment was present even when the comparison car was every bit as wide. I suspect part of this was the visual width, which starting with the C5 did appear wide. Car & Driver's trademark is snarky comments so you expect it from them. However the width issue was reported by most of the mainstream auto press. The second negative comment throughout the C5 & C6 era was the quality of the interior was not in accord with the price level. Now most of us Corvette enthusiasts ignored both comments, as after all we are Corvette enthusiasts. With the advent of the C7, most of the same reviewers were now exclaiming that the Corvette interior was now first class. It appears some perceptions die hard. The May issue of Automobile has a road trip review of the C7 Z06 vs. the McLaren 650S. The point of this comparison is somewhat lost on me, when they reported as tested cost of the McLaren was 4.1 times the cost of the Z06. However, buried in the Automobile review was this comment about the Z06: "Sure I knew I was driving a sports car with a rear end as wide as a movie screen, but...". So, the belief that the Z06, or any Corvette is as excessively wide, is a belief that must die hard. Now the width of a C7 is 73.9" and Automobile reported the width of the wider Z06 as 77.1". You probably guessed this was coming, but Automobile reported the width of the McLaren at 82.4" without any comments about width. If they are going to compare a Z06 to a movie screen, then in all fairness maybe they should have compared the width of the McLaren to an IMAX screen. I guess some myths continue on.

Be careful of what you wish for. In most of the auto buff magazines the rumors are rampant regarding the upcoming mid engine Corvette whether it will be the ultimate C7 special, or the C8. Now, we have been hearing rumors about a mid engine Corvette since Zora went to work with GM, but the rumors seem more frenzied than in the past. To many the key to the Corvette was that it was affordable (although that can be a moving target) and was practical. In fact, one of the selling points of the C5 was that you could put two golf bags in the hatch. A decade ago when Ford debuted their Ford GT, they priced it at about \$150K and promptly sold out the entire batch. Now, Ford has announced a new mid engine super-car at a price level closer to \$300K. I suspect if GM is really looking at a mid engine Corvette, then GM management has watched the Ford situation and the price will be at lot higher than \$150K. Have any of you ever looked close at a mid engine sports car for practicality? There typically is no luggage capacity. Most have an extremely small luggage bin in the sloping front that will hold a small duffel and maybe one pair of driving gloves. Seems to me that the mid engine sports car fails the practical and affordable test.

The CMCS Board is still looking for a Charity chair if we are going to be able to continue the charity auction. If you would like to help out, please get in touch with me before our May board meeting May 7.

Lastly, at our club general meeting on April 11, the discussion about activities consumed about half of the meeting. We are rapidly approaching the car season, so don't miss out. Join in any of the club activities or even join us in touring to activities put on by out of town clubs. See the newsletter for just a partial list of possible activities. Don't look back this fall, and say "I wish I had done more this year with my Corvette and the club".

Attendance: Kevin and Judy Jewell, Dee and Oran Petersen, Gary and Kayla Main, Ken and Joyce Jones, Stan and Billi Trask, Jay Marshall, Bill and Marty Cameron, Dennis and Lorrie Montgomery, Brian Luessen and Steve & Jean Yabroff.

Kevin opened the meeting, asking everyone to spend a moment to gather their thoughts about past SIS events they have attended and what they thought attendees would like to see in a future event (probably 2016). To get people thinking, he passed out some surveys of the 2006 event, as that is what he had in his files.


In no particular order, here's a list of what was mentioned. Note that some of the comments are contradictory with other comments. We expected differences of opinions.

- 1. Other venues, such as St Michele Winery or Columbia Winery
- 2. Club participation dropped over the past few events
- 3. Diminishing club participation from club members. Share event with another club, night driving tour not a good idea when people don't know the area.
- 4. Show N Shine is a waste of time –not unique to our beautiful area. Suggest tour of waterfront homes on Lake Washington... a venue away from here might help.
- 5. The event is dying momentum has been lost. Needs to be totally different.
- 6. A different venue would help keep costs down to get our own club participation
- 7. Different venue like Alderbrook Inn would still capitalize on our water views. A comedian would be good...party boat for hire...other clubs really enjoy our water.
- 8. We need to step back and get more club member involvement and promotion...explain better what our events are about. We have found that if people are involved with the planning they tend to attend, so get the club involved.
- 9. Out of towner like show n shine. Agreed we need a different venue...Big Committee
- 10. In the 2012 SIS, we had to make lots of cuts, because of lower than anticipated attendees. Event was profitable, but barely.
- 11. Drive to new venue. Our club likes to drive and we don't get to if the event is held in Bellevue.

Suggestions:

- Continue to schedule the event the week or so after Labor Day. The Pacific NW is expensive during the summer season, and rates decrease after Labor Day.
- 2. Lake Chelan. Maybe boat trip on the lake to Stehekin Wineries, nice roads, resort with a banquet facility. Campbell's Resort? Better weather possibility east of the mountains.
- 3. Overnight to Leavenworth. However Tacoma Corvette Club already does this.
- 4. Do we want to continue this SIS, or look for a different event to sponsor?
- 5. Most local clubs (whether car clubs or others) have had participation issues the past few years. One could say that the Great Recession precipitated the decline, but there were signs before. Among the local car clubs, most have scaled their signature event down dramatically.
- 6. Locally, we have some big name draws. Chihuly, EMP, the Ferris wheel, our waterfront. Are we bringing people to enjoy Seattle as tourists, or providing a Corvette event? Downtown is expensive. In the past few SIS events, the cost of the boat trip and bus transportation consumed almost the entire registration fee.
- 7. Spokane club was looking for a way to share with another club. Montana has four clubs that rotate who sponsors each year's event. Do we want to team up with another club to put on an event? Either both clubs working together, or each club in their turn putting on the next event.
- 8. Who are we trying to appeal to? CMCS members, or to bring in other clubs.
- 9. Some speculations that we need to get out of town to draw our members. Again the thought was expressed that our members like to drive, and a local event doesn't provide that.
- 10. Do we have enough lead time to do in 2016?
- 11. Event Chair?

It was concluded that we should summarize the discussion for the benefit of the CMCS members that were not able to attend. At this point, the club needs an individual or couple as SIS event chair to continue the planning. Experience has shown that once we have a committed event chair, we do not have issues in getting committee volunteers. CMCS Sponsor Tribute by Dennis Montgomery

At our last meeting, our President mentioned that it is important to support our sponsors. I recently had an experience that helps drive home the point that our sponsors are the best way to go when service or repairs are involved.

I noticed that my 06' Trailblazer SS had a burning odor when I shut it off and suspected it was probably in the transmission. The vehicle has 107,000 miles on the odometer and the transmission fluid had never been changed. I happened to be driving past the Bellevue branch of a very well-known national transmission repair company and decided I should not risk driving all the way to **Speedway Chevrolet** or **Lee Johnson Chevrolet** to get it checked.

The transmission repair shop said the transmission fluid was "burned" and was "too full" to change which was a sign that something was wrong with the transmission. They said they could remove the transmission fluid pan to see if they could find out what the problem was. (The cost was \$106.00). They did the procedure and told me that the transmission would need to be rebuilt because there was a large amount of metal filings on the catch magnet in the pan and there was a significant amount of metal filings in the transmission fluid. They said this was an indication that something was drastically wrong and needed to be fixed ASAP. They said a rebuild of my transmission would cost somewhere between \$2,500 and \$4,000, depending on what parts needed to be replaced. I asked to see the pan and magnet to see the filings and they told me I could not go into the repair area due to insurance/liability reasons. I was uncomfortable with that answer and told them to put the pan back on. When I asked them if the vehicle could safely be driven to **Speedway Chevrolet** they reluctantly said it "should" be OK.

I went to **Speedway Chevrolet** the next day and they reported that when the pan was removed they found no excessive metal in either the pan or attached to the catch magnet. They also reported that it did not appear that the pan had ever been removed. They flushed out the transmission, put in new fluid and a new filter and reassembled the pan. They said that the transmission required no other repair and certainly did not need a rebuild. The cost, with the CMCS 10% member discount was \$253.96. Obviously, there is a large difference between what the national repair chain quoted and what our sponsor charged.

I feel the basic difference is that the national chain was trying to "scam" me and, conversely, our sponsor was looking out for my best interests.

Therefore, I want to also say what the President said. Our sponsors support us and we need to support them. Besides their monetary support, they are interested in making sure CMCS members get treated in a fair manner. My hat is off to the staff at both **Speedway Chevrolet** and **Lee Johnson Chevrolet**.

The 2014 National Corvette Caravan



Jack noted the Club was in need of a committee to handle future Tech & Safety Inspections, and to have emergency equipment on hand at PRI (Pacific Raceway International) in the future. Jack also noted that Ed Baker recommended that all Club members carry a First Aid Kit and Fire Extinguisher in their Corvettes. Jack noted that a new updated membership

list will be available in the near future. Also, a revised and up-to-date Club Constitution was to be sent out to all members. John Thomas and Sue Stanley received a round of applause in thanks from the membership for their joint efforts in producing the Club newsletter. Jack then asked for any suggestions for meetings, rallys, or tours that the membership might be interested in attending in the future. Wally Arrowsmith said he had some Questionnaires that were filled out by Club members concerning ideas for future Club events and activities. Roger Orth asked what the Club position was as far as with the Western Washington Sports Car Council (WWSCC). John Thomas said he would have information and present it at the next Board meeting. Robert & Norma Rhone were voted into full membership. Upcoming activities were announced; an Autocross at the Yakima Firing Center; Autocross and Economy Run at University Village; and, Race at OIR (Oregon International Raceway/ south of Eugene).

40 LAPS AGO: May '75. President Sam Sakura conducted the monthly meeting at the Alki Homestead. New members voted in to full membership were Chuck Hart, Joe Wagenleitner, and, Bill & Kris Hegger. WWSCC (Western Washington Sports Car Council) held their autocross at South Sound Center in Lacy. A question was put before those in attendance; "Does the Club wish to be part of the Daffodil Festival on a permanent basis?" A majority vote confirmed our interest in future participations. WWSCC's sponsorship of an Autocross was set for July 12th. Next month's general membership meeting will be held at the Club's sponsor, the Lee Johnson Chevrolet facilities; it will be a non-dinner meeting. Club activities included an airplane ride in Port Angeles that would leave from the Southcenter area, a Practice Session in Shelton hosted by the Corvettes de Olympia Corvette Club, and, a Medieval Inn feast. Club insurance was still being pursued to find a less costly policy; the Club was then covered by policy with the WWSCC. A further discussion concerning Club Jackets and the color of the jacket will be discussed at the next Board meeting. A surprise birthday party for Jeff Weymouth took place at the Millens home, a BYOB affair.

30 LAPS AGO: May '85. President Mike Shelly got the monthly meeting started at the home of the Starks following a Car Care Session at Rick Stark Enterprises in Kirkland. NWACC had an Open Car Show at Alan Martin Chevrolet in

Bremerton which was attended by the following Club members: the Millens, Mollnows, and Nelsons. Valerie Johansen noted receiving a flyer on Moss Bay Days "Graffiti Night" beginning at 5:30 PM at the Bel-Kirk Drive-In this July. Club activities for the month included a Swap Meet in Monroe, an Open Picnic in Marymoor Park hosted by Classic Chevy, and the Big Sky Corvette Club Meet in Bozeman Montana. NCRS (National Corvette Restorers Society) changed its annual (10th) Corvette Owner's Picnic from Mother's Day in May due to bad weather the past two years, to Father's Day in June. Bryon Crocker submitted an interesting article from the Wall Street Journal concerning the rising car-theft problem throughout the nation. A new federal law adopted by Congress beginning in 1987 required manufacturers to mark parts of cars with a higher rate of theft and 'may' install anti-theft devices for the consumer's protection. General Motors Corp. reported they are developing an electronic-sensing device for the ignition key that would take the potential thief half an hour to defeat. The article goes on to note that car theft has risen to one out of every 48 cars manufactured were either stolen or broken into in 1983, up from one in 53 ten years ago. A company in Boston Massachusetts known as the Lo-Jack Corp. was in the process of testing a revolutionary new electronic system; it would transmit a signal to the police when a car with this device has been reported stolen. It would provide the specific electronic code assigned to that vehicle's in order to track its location and recovery.

Corvette Maintenance and Preservation Department Debuts

2013 and 2014 were record years for car donations at the National Corvette Museum, with 13 being received last year, and 12 in 2013 bringing the grand total of Museum-owned Corvettes to 62. For several years the goal has been to launch a department focused solely on maintenance and upkeep of these prized Corvettes. That goal is now a reality.

Phillip Wheeler and Daniel Decker have joined the Museum's new Vehicle Maintenance and Preservation Department, dedicated to maintaining cars for both the Museum and Motorsports Park.

With over 100 cars of his own (40 that are housed in his personal showroom) Phil knows how to



maintain a collection of cars and looks forward to taking care of the Museum's treasured Corvettes. "We will be going over every car that has been donated to the Museum, and begin a new maintenance record for each one, making sure they are fully serviced and drivable - checking for any leaks or other issues that need to be addressed. In addition to that, we'll be making sure that the fleet of cars at the track are safe, serviced and always ready to go."

Daniel has been restoring and working on cars for the last 27 years of his life. He has ASE certification in steering, suspension and brakes, he's been to paint school in Chicago, and for several years he ran the Midas shop in Bowling Green. The portfolio of cars he has restored in his own shop is a reflection of his passion for cars. "I'm excited to be here. This is a new program so we have a lot of work ahead of us. Once it is up and running, I feel like it is going to be great."

The Museum's maintenance department will initially be located just past the Engineering and Design display area, in what was once the PDI Department. Visitors to the Museum may periodically see Phil and Daniel working in the garage bay, adding another exciting element to the Museum tour experience.

Hosted only once every five years, the next National Corvette Caravan is slated for Labor Day weekend, August 28-31, 2019, marking the 25th Anniversary of the Museum. Leading the charge in planning the caravan is Jeffrey Duda of Hainesport, NJ, a Lifetime Member of the Museum and previous co-captain of the New Jersey 2014 and 2009 Caravans.



"As soon as I returned from the 2009 Caravan, I began work on the 2014 NJ Caravan and again I was the Co-Captain," Jeff said. "The advance planning paid off, as this Caravan was just spectacular with over 3,000 Corvettes from across the world joining the drive to Bowling Green to celebrate the 20th Anniversary of the NCM. It was so much fun planning the event and others could see the enthusiasm I had. I was contacted by Paul Mariano, the National Caravan Chairman, and by Karen Renfrow, the Events Manager at the NCM and was asked to become the 2019 Caravan National Chairman. It was a task that I was honored and humbled to accept the position," Jeff added.

Regional caravans will form and join other caravans as they travel across the United States to meet in Bowling Green, Kentucky for four days of festivities at the National Corvette Museum.
