Want a great buy on a new car? The best way to get a great buy is to buy a car that not everyone wants. One source indicates that you can buy a Hyundai Sonata Hybrid for nearly 20% off sticker. Prius C One is selling for up to 16% off sticker. However, if there is a lot of demand for any model, don't expect those types of manufacturer's discounts. A new Corvette Z06? I am sure that everyone would love to buy one for 10% off sticker. However, the demand for any of the new Corvettes (let alone the Z06) is still so high, that we aren't going to see those discounts. Want a new 707 horsepower Dodge Hellcat? Walk into your local Dodge dealer and ask for a big discount and wait for the reaction. They have people standing in line to be the first on the block with a new Hellcat for bragging rights. So where did this car "sticker" come from? In 1958 Senator Monroney from Oklahoma sponsored a bill called the Automobile Disclosure Act of 1958, which required that all new vehicles display a window sticker showing the manufacturer's suggested retail price (MSRP) plus some key features of the vehicle. Prior to this bill, dealers put their own prices on each vehicle. As a result of Senator Monroney, for almost 60 years buyers are telling their neighbors what a great deal they got on their new car purchase, by comparing their purchase price to the sticker. I suspect that some buying reports would fit right in at the local fishing club, so be careful of everything you hear.

For years, many of us have been modifying our cars. In the old days we wanted bigger carbs, a hotter cam, different differential gears, or maybe all three for a bit more pep. Some of us waited until the warranty was up, as the manufacturers would void the warranty for any modification that they could claim contributed to the failure. Of course, this could be a big argument, which resulted in another Federal law called the Maguson-Moss Warranty Act of 1975. With the newer cars the modifications are more complicated and often require computer code as it seems that everything on a new car is governed by a computer. Watch for the new movement to limit your ability to modify any of the computers in your new car. Of course, that will play havoc for tuners around the world. Should the prohibitions be formalized, I suspect it will be another law that will be so widely ignored by the general public that there will be a new Federal Act ultimately passed to void the legislation. It will only take the publicity of a few citizens heavily penalized for putting a chip on their car before even the manufacturers realize what a negative public relations monster they have created. Let's hope that they come to their senses earlier, not later. One additional thought. Today's cars are generally so much better than the "good old days" that the need to modify them for performance has greatly decreased. Compare the performance of a 1985 Corvette or even a 2005 model to today's base Stingray, and you will find the new car is way ahead in performance as well as creature comforts. Of course, that doesn't necessarily mean that we are all satisfied with the

performance. If we were there wouldn't be the need for a new Z06 or then to modify that Z06.

Summer is here and it is time to get come out and join us. Certainly, we have some great club meetings coming up such as July 4 when we return to Perrigo Park in Redmond with a big picnic, and then Snohomish in Aug. Our sponsor, Lee Johnson Chevrolet is sponsoring a no entrance fee car show on July 18. LJ will also be providing lunch and beverages during the day. Come out and show your support to our sponsor. I suspect you will also have the opportunity to check out any new or used vehicle that you have been considering. Cover Car - Bob & Lois Renner's 2015 Z06

Here is a bit of my history regarding Corvettes....

Born in Dayton, OH 1936, about 1950 met Charles F. Kettering (Boss Kett). My aunt was Kett's secretary. Boss was the largest individual shareholder of GM, also largest of Winters National Bank (founded by



Jonathan Winters family). Have a bronze medallion from Boss Kett's 80th birthday party. Boss Kett founded DELCO (Dayton Engineering Laboratories Company). Kett and Alfred P. Sloan were the GM leaders. At age 15-20 during summers I was an apprentice toolmaker at the largest Tool & Die company in Midwest.

1959 bought a wrecked 1958 F.I. Corvette convertible, rebuilt body from a foot behind left door forward including frame re-sectioning. Also bought a used 1957 Chevrolet convertible stick shift. Rebuilt engine, transmission and made traction masters for rear leaf spring hopping. Kettering family arranged for me to talk to Arkus Duntov from Kett's office. I then got Duntov's NASCAR Chevrolet





racing parts catalog. Dealer did not have parts information but ordered full race cams, chilled steel solid valve lifters, etc. from my "catalog". Built the engine with parts, 2-4barrel carbs, clutch pressure plate from 5 ton truck updated with 12-400 lb die springs. Drove this car for two years-7,000 rpm and 60 mph in low, 100 mph in second and about 150 mph in third. Met my future wife (Lois Thesing) at Univ of Dayton. She was the only girl that could drive my car-75# required to push clutch pedal down and shift-so I married her.

Also about same time bought a wrecked car Chev engine and did a similar complete rebuild, made mounts, drive components and installed it in a 15ft plywood boat driving forward through a v-drive-direct drive no clutch=0-60 mph in 100 yards! Water skied on slalom with 100 foot rope, could get to about 90 mph in snap turn. Got married, sold the cars and boat, entered public accounting, joined the National Guard to avoid the draft, bought a 1961 Chev Nomad wagon with 180 Hp slushie.

Knew the Peoria, IL Chev Zone Mgr, Tom Gorman, got a 1969 Camero Rally Sport SS convertible with Hurst 4 spd. Was working with Tom to possibly buy a Chev dealer in future but he developed cancer and died within a year.

Later moved to Los Altos, CA and bought a 1998 Corvette. Paid sticker price but dealer tried a fast deal to sell the car when it arrived-when I caught on they tried to coax me to sell for a \$5,000 profit---NO. Summer, 1999 we visited Taiwan and were able to get a yacht manufacturer to sell us a boat that we designed, a 57 foot x 16 foot beam motor yacht with twin Cummins diesels and all the trimmings that was named The Big Toy. I was the "dealer and importer" for this transaction that closed March, 2000. It was interesting to visit a fuel dock every month for 500+ gallons of diesel. Later Lois "suggested" I only could have one toy at a time so I sold the Corvette. We sold the boat late 2005.

We retired sold our CA house in 18 hours, moved to Sammamish, WA, May, 2006. October 2007 ordered a 2008 Corvette Convertible from Lee Johnson. We had to wait until March, 2008 to get the 4LT interior.

Joined CMCS and by summer, 2014 got the itch for a new "hot rod".

We placed an order for our 2015 Night Race Blue Z06 on September 2nd, 2014, which was accepted by GM September 10th. After some last minute gyrations, our car was delivered June 9, 2015.



Club sponsored events for the month saw a Tour to Wenatchee that began at the Mercer Island Floating Bridge, an Autocross sponsored by the Boeing Car Club in Kent, SCCA (Sports Car Club of America) hosted an Autocross and Rallye at Crossroad Shopping Center, and the Club Beach Party needed to be rescheduled until the following month. John Thomas talked about a Corvette Cove at the USRRC at PRI (Portland Raceway International). New

members voted into full membership were; Forest Bouldry, Tom & Kay Mayfield, Mark Ball, Herb Yound, and Terry Ladding. Board Officer Meeting minutes included mention of a concern that those attending Club meetings were often not aware of those who might be recently joined members, prospective members or guests. It was agreed to have members in good standing introduce those seated next to them for everyone's awareness. John Thomas was looking into the Club's Autocross Insurance cost and coverage. John also was working on putting together a Club Beach Party event. Ron Peters hosted a tour to Lake Wenatchee, while Larry Gibson mentioned a Renton 4th of July Parade the Club should participate in with our Corvettes.

Activities Chair announced that the Club Christmas Party was scheduled for December 13th at the Windjammer South in Des Moines.

30 LAPS AGO: July '85. President Mike Shelly conducted the monthly Club meeting held at the Meatmarket Restaurant. Valerie Johansen received a letter from Club member Judy Artley who recently moved to Texas. Ron & Kathie Willey, Mark Dearing, and Randy Bell were all voted into full membership, each fulfilling their eligibility requirements to be a member in good standing. 20 LAPS AGO: July **'95.** Byron Crocker's 1982 coupe, cross-fire 350 ci with AC and automatic transmission was the Corvette featured on the newsletter cover.

Byron's Corvette Gold had 68,000 'happy' miles on the odometer and was purchased new from Club sponsor Roy Robinson Chevrolet in Marysville. Bryon's first 'roadie' was taking his Vette to the Reno V & T weekend in 1984. The Club monthly meeting was held at Coco's Restaurant in Bellevue, where President Bob Lazaroff conducted the meeting. Treasurer John Thomas noted the Club's finances were in the black and would report on the SIR event's finances in the near future after all the data was collected. 

The end of May means only one thing for Mona and me over the last decade and that's the Big Sky Corvette Meet in Montana. We've gone most years since buying our first Corvette in 2000. This event is held annually around Memorial Day weekend and rotates through six cities. While the basic format of the event

stays fairly constant, the location varies yearly. The six cities that take turns holding the event are Missoula, Helena, Great Falls, Bozeman, Whitefish and Billings—this year's host. This was our first foray to Billings, which proved to be a trip of many firsts. We gathered at the old Ken's Truck Stop location in North Bend, now a combination of Popeye's and Country Pride Restaurant. Joining us were regulars Jack Goodman and Claudia Simmons and Bill and Marty Cameron, along with first-timers Oran and Dee Petersen, Steve and Jean Rummel and Robb Mitchell and Morlene Schatzer. Before we even got in our cars we heard some great news—Robb had proposed to Morlene and she had accepted. For the first time we had an engaged couple going with us. We headed out happy and dry. The sun was shining brightly when we left. Not exactly a first but more a rarity, we hoped it was a sign of things to come. The trip over to our first destination city, Missoula, went well with a lunch stop at the A&W in Post Falls to eat. We love stopping there if nothing more for the frosty mugs of root beer.



Our passage was perfectly executed as we rolled into Missoula right on time. This leg of the trip is the only one where timing is important because if we're late we wouldn't be able to ride the Carousel. At Ruby's Inn we met up with George and Aida Walden, also fairly regulars to Big Sky. We then

The next morning we started the drive to Billings. All drives east of Missoula should include the Pintler Scenic Route between Drummond and Anaconda, so we took the time to drive this slightly slower route. That allowed us to stop at our favorite candy store—the Sweet Palace in Philipsburg. After taking in the sights there and dropping some coin for candy we continued up the beautiful road towards Anaconda.

A quick photo stop along the way and then it was off to the Classic Café in Anaconda for lunch. It's a neat place for car lovers with drivein type food. There are a couple of car bodies for booths and the bases for several tables were car or tractor engines. They are always happy to see us and the food and service were both good. After lunch it was back to the highway for the remainder of the trip to Billings. We love driving the roads in Montana because they aren't crowded for the most



part and you'll see lots of great scenery. You'll see the neatest rocks up around the top of Homestake Pass outside of Butte. By 5pm we arrived at the Billings Hotel and Convention Center and immediately ran into Tommy Taylor in the lobby. He's been a regular to our Seattle in September event and it seems like ages since we've seen him. Hot and tired we checked in, then regrouped to make plans for dinner. It was then we ran into Dave Bennett, our friend and Realtor from Thompson Falls. He introduced us to his friend Hugh who just so happened to own a brand spanking new YELLOW C7 Z06. I couldn't take my eyes off it. I got inside to check it out and once again the sky opened up and literally dumped rain on us. I just slammed the door shut and got to spend 5 uninterrupted minutes checking it out. It was certainly different looking up through the see-through top at the rain pouring down. After being dragged out of the Z06 (I wasn't going willingly) we all headed out to dinner.

Saturday was a lazy day as most of us slowly dragged our butts out of bed. Only George and Aida had the gumption to get up and get their car ready for the show and shine. Most of the rest of us took it easy and had breakfast at Denny's before heading over to the car show. It was held at a very nicely grassed facility and we got a good look at a bunch of cars. There were at least three different new Z06s along with a bunch of new C7s. It was there we ran into other regulars of the Big Sky event, including Mike Hagestad. More on him later. The car show

was really laid back and we pretty much moseyed around looking at cars and talking to friends. We even ran into Roger Tenbrink there, who had come over separately. Next on the agenda was a rally that left from the hotel, but I don't think anyone in our group went on it. We were too far from home to risk a major battle so we settled for lunch instead. Jack had brought along an article about the best burger bar in Billings so a few of us headed there. The place was a dive but was packed so we figured the food must be good so we decided it was worth the wait for our turn to belly up to the bar. As is typical in places like this, the service and the food were both really good. Back at the hotel we finally found some quiet time and got our car and Jack and Claudia's car washed with help from the Cameron pit crew. After that we headed for the first provided dinner which was a BBQ feed at the site of the show and shine. That was also where we got our first look at a Chevy SS. It was a cool car but nobody got to test drive it.

Sunday morning found us getting up way too early for the autocross held a few blocks away. We hung out at the course in the rain while most others headed out for a self-guided tour of Custer's battlefield and the surrounding area. Rain threatened to wash out the autocross but luck was with us and the weather cleared before we started. For those who don't know I've been on a quest ever since going to Big Sky ... a quest to beat Mike Hagestad at autocross. A quest much like Captain Ahab's quest to slay the great white whale. Mike's an ex-CMCS member and has been very regular with his drubbings of me for years. When I first started running against Mike he beat me with his C4 convertible. Then, after buying a C5 Z06 like ours, he has been unreachable. Last year I came really close but made a fatal mistake. My final run was about ½ second faster than his best and I told him about it. He promptly went out and laid down a time that beat me by 0.007 seconds. I was bummed and figured I would never beat him. That was last year, though, and I was sure 2015 would be my time. After two of three runs I had victory in my hands. Mike hit a cone both times out and I was ahead by a good ½ second not even counting the two second penalty. Sitting there in staging Mike was out for his last run and Gene Spranget from the Bozeman club asked if I wanted to know his time. I said no because I didn't want to feel pressured to over-drive the car since the course was still damp in places. Unfortunately for me I didn't get my wish—Mike went out and laid down a time that beat my best by 1 ½ seconds! The crowd broke out with cheering (many knew of the rivalry between Mike and me) and I heard someone say 48 seconds flat. Son of a buck, my year went down the tubes in a heartbeat. I still had one run to go but thought I had no chance. Long story short I drove the absolute best run I could, complete with downshifts to first (risky in an autocross) and a flying finish that left my hands shaking. I looked at Dave, my passenger, and said if I didn't beat him with that run I couldn't beat him. We got to the course exit and the guy there told me great job, I ran a 47.936! Another fantastic first for the trip. I had finally bagged my white whale. My victory was short lived, however, as the event coordinators gave the first place trophy to Mike. Timing had not recorded my last run and they had me listed as 3rd place. They then gave the prize for the overall fastest time of the day to ... you guessed it ... Mike Hagestad. Although the autocross organizers dropped the ball Mike was ever the gallant competitor. As he was awarded each prize he took the mic and explained to the crowd that he did not win and called me to the front to accept the award. He explained that somehow my winning time was not recorded but everybody that was there knew I had won. Tired and grateful, this Captain has finished his

quest. Other than that little gaffe Sunday's buffet was pretty darn good. If there's one thing Montana Corvette Clubs know how to do it's how to put out a good spread. The food was sumptuous and plentiful. Robb Mitchell even won a gas card by sitting in the right chair. It seemed everybody with us had a great time at the event.

Monday came and we started to head our separate ways. Steve and Jean headed out by themselves and the rest headed for breakfast, then a late start heading west. Oran and Dee, along with Bill and Marty, separated from us shortly to head south into Yellowstone. A short while later Robb and Morlene dropped out at Livingston. Jack and Claudia and George and Aida hung with us all the way to Mona's hometown of Thompson Falls, our favorite place to stop on the way back from Big Sky. After dinner we all said our good nights; I think we were all too tired to even think of playing 31. Another first, not one game of 31 got played on this trip. Since we were staying in Thompson Falls a bit longer, Jack led George and Aida west as far as Spokane. We stayed a few more days before spending a night with my sister in Spokane. Our trip was finally coming to an end. If all this sounds like fun to you, consider going with us next year. We already know it will be in Great Falls and we know it will be held May 27-29. We know the event hotel is The Heritage Inn and they will accept your reservation now if you want. That's not a bad idea as the event hotel for Big Sky often fills up. We're already thinking about having a "Thunderball and Lightfoot" tour as that movie was filmed in Great Falls and I know some of the shoot locations. It should be a blast. Here's to going next year with some of you!

Motorsports Park Breaks Ground on Holley Control Tower

A groundbreaking ceremony was held May 28 at the NCM Motorsports Park to celebrate the start of construction of the Holley Control Tower and Events Center.

The facility will encompass 14,635 square feet, and will provide many functional spaces, including meeting rooms, administrative offices, a track retail space, a 2,000 square foot viewing deck and classrooms. The classrooms and meeting spaces will be



available for rent for track customers, meetings and private functions. The project is expected to be completed in eight to nine months by Sunbelt Construction, and has a \$1.8 million price tag.

The NCM Motorsports Park can cross "start stand" off its wish list of track amenities as Corvette enthusiast Don Ghareeb recently came forward to fund the project.


