Cover Car - Gene Kinnunen's Carlisle Blue Convertible



I joined CMCS in October of 2005 shortly after buying my first ever Corvette; a 2005 Velocity Yellow manual transmission convertible. I loved that car and was honored to have it featured on the cover of a "On Your Marque" newsletter a few months later. Recently, I have been having more numbness show up in my feet which made driving a manual more difficult so in June 2014 I began looking for an automatic to replace it. I specifically wanted a Carlisle Blue Metallic color.

I searched the Internet for quite some time and finally found only one advertised anywhere in the USA and it was at a dealership in North Prairie, Texas. It had an automatic transmission, 3LT, and titanium gray/ebony interior. I went to Speedway Chevrolet and had Joe work out the details to get it shipped up here. I was quite surprised when it finally arrived in mid-July 2014 to find it had only 825 miles on the odometer. It was virtually a brand new 2 year old car. The only "long" trip I have driven it on was last year's RAD to LaGrande, Oregon. I added on another 1,000-1/4 miles from my garage back to my garage on that trip so I now have just over 2500 miles on it. I have been able to drive my new Corvette in last year's Torchlight parade and again this year and also got to participate in this year's Greenwood parade. Since getting the Corvette I have added a few additional items to personalize it a little and there may be a few more to come. I am finding that because Corvette only painted 42 C-6s in Carlisle Blue Metallic there aren't very many after market items available in that color to spiff up the car. I'm looking forward to many more years of driving pleasure with this car unless a C-7 should somehow need to replace it (that's another story altogether).

Corvette and GM have taken a lot of heat over the perceived "fact" that all advanced cars are now multiple camshafts and 4 valves per cylinder, while Corvette is still offering a single cam in block and 2 valves. Certainly GM offers many multiple cam engines. For Corvette, the official GM line is that they continue to offer the traditional cam in block engine for packaging reasons. Without the multiple cams, the engine can be lower and thus the hood can be lower as well. Regardless of whether that is a valid reason, in almost any Corvette road test there will a negative comment about the "ancient engine architecture". While thinking about this, I happened to pick up a Motor Trend and started reading a test of a \$411K Bentley Mulsanne Speed. Guess what? The Bentley offers a 6.7 liter cam in block, 2 valve V8. Does that sound awfully similar to a Corvette engine? Nowhere in the report did I read anything about the ancient engine architecture of the \$411K Bentley. Now maybe you are thinking that who cares about a Bentley, as we typically don't think of Bentley and performance in the same breath. However, note that this is the Mulsanne (after the LeMans straight) Speed. So, we can assume Bentley is promoting this as their performance model. I should add that even with a 6,000 lb. curb weight, the test shows a quarter mile run in 13.6 seconds at 103 mph. Certainly very respectable.

There is a huge trend to these smaller displacement, multiple cam engines as all the manufacturers try to increase their corporate fuel economy averages. Often these smaller engines include a supercharger or turbocharger to maintain similar performance as the larger engines. Currently we mostly see turbochargers as they are perceived as more efficient than superchargers, although the Corvette is an exception to this trend. The negative is that turbochargers have an inherent lag, as it takes at least some time before the added exhaust gases can spool up the turbo compressor wheel. Some are better than others, but some lag is typical. Some cars will have two turbos, one small one that will "spin up" faster and then a bigger turbo that will take over. Volvo has a rather unique combination of supercharger and turbo. The supercharger helps immediately with power while the turbo builds boost. The planned Bugatti Chiron, that will replace the world class Veyron, is reported to be powered by a 1500 horsepower, 16 cylinder engine with four turbochargers. One interesting design aspect is that two of the turbochargers will be electric driven. Although I don't understand calling the electric powered compressors turbochargers, I assume the logic is similar to Volvo's design. The electric compressor wheels will provide boost almost immediately, while the two exhaust driven compressors build up compressor speed and boost. We know that any supercharger takes some engine horsepower to work, so the idea of the electric compressor is that they are using battery charge which can be replaced when the engine is not needing full horsepower for acceleration. Already, some cars will disable the alternator during acceleration to save those precious few horsepower. The idea is seeking some form of boost

pressure without using any of the engine horsepower. Reminds me of a test done a couple of years ago by a couple of goof-balls at Grassroots Motorsports. They rigged up two gas powered leaf blowers blowing into the intake manifold of a small import sedan. They did actually gain a small amount of performance, but you can imagine it was fairly inefficient as they had to have the leaf blowers running all the time and also rather noisy. I do remember thinking that I wish I had thought of that.

We all enjoy showing off our cars and talking to spectators. With event liability insurance, trophies etc, sometimes it seems that we have to pay big dollars to attend a local car show. If you think some of the show and shines you attended were expensive then you should be aware of some local events that are far more expensive. For instance the local BMW club had their major event July 25 on Mercer Island. It was a judged show. Pre-registration was \$60 and day of event cost was \$80. For that fee you got an event poster, magnet and program, plus the opportunity to compete for trophies. Sort of makes that more normal \$20 fee seem much more reasonable.

We are rapidly approaching the end of what we think of as summer. I hope that you have taken full advantage of this awesome summer to fully enjoy your Corvette, whether that included a car show, autocross, parade, cruise, or just driving it. Our Corvettes are fantastic vehicles in that they do so many things so well.





50 LAPS AGO: September '65. The monthly general membership was called to order by President Ed Baker, at Club sponsor Alan Green's Chevrolet dealership. The Treasurer's report noted the Club being solvent with bills paid. Guests and members in attendance were introduced. Tom Mayfield spoke on the Hare and Hound Rallye, noting Chuck Sienkiewicz won a pin for the best finish of a Corvette. Bill Fowler spoke on the tour to Mount Rainier, and John Thomas spoke about a tour to the Laguna Seca racing facilities (now known as Mazda Raceway Laguna Seca, near Monterey, CA.), and of other sanctioned events for the month; an SCCA (Sports Car Clubs of America)

Fun Day, the SCCA Championship Autocross, the Northwest Gran Prix, and, a Car Show. Dick Stanley mentioned putting the Club in the telephone book, and said we could use Sports Car Center for the answering service.

40 LAPS AGO: September '75. President Sam Sakura presided at the monthly Club meeting held at the Ben Bow Inn in West Seattle. John McCaully was voted into full membership by those in attendance. Sponsor Lee Johnson Chevrolet has

donated \$25 for the purchase of trophies for the upcoming NorthWest Association of Corvette Clubs (NWACC). The Awards Banquet funds had to be collected by October 1st, and the cost per couple was set at \$25. Consideration of new NWACC officers was discussed. CMCS held a WWSCC (Western Washington Sports Car Council) Autocross at SIR (Seattle International Raceway). There was a Picture Rally scheduled to benefit Medic II hosted by PCA (Porsche Club of America). A spaghetti feed and card party was scheduled for October, to be hosted by the Clements, where desserts will be potluck. The Club Halloween Party still needed a location, and a box social and tour was in the planning stage for November. John Thomas volunteered to chair the Wet Weekend outing for next February. Len Hodges needed volunteers for the Club autocross, especially course workers. Club jackets were to be shown at the next board meeting. A thank you letter was received and read at the meeting from the Interlake home. A number of people were interested in the decals for their cars. A Corvette clinic was set to be held in conjunction with a parade in Bellevue. The Homecoming at Interlake High School needed t-tops for their parade in October. It was discussed and approved by the members to visit good and reasonably priced restaurants more than once for Club meetings.

Darrell Odegaard agreed to host the Halloween Party. There was a tour to Leavenworth for the annual Autumn Leaf Festival. The Frank O. Award originally set to be awarded soon, was passed on to the Board. A local radio station, KVI 570 Solid Gold Rock 'n' Roll hosted the Washington History of Motorsports Festival at SIR featuring Vintage & Historic Racing Exhibition; Veteran Sports Cars, Sprint Cars, Motorcycles, Formula 1,2,3, Historical Race Cars and Can-Am's. The Glass Odyssey Corvette Club hosted a 2 day Autocross, Party, and Rallye at Bremerton Raceways. Bert A. Lukens noted in a newsletter article that NCRS (National Corvette Restorers Society) was expanding the years eligible to join and for judging to include the years 1968 through 1972. Newsletter Editor Cloyd Jackson apologized to Cary Wallace for misspelling his last name in the last newsletter. Cloyd also noted that the Club had mailed out our newsletter to the "Vettes on the Net" on the Internet, so watch out world ... here we come! Barbara Jackson presented the Club quilt that was to be raffled off at the 1996 Awards Banquet & Officer Installation event. Proceeds went towards gifts and food items for the Charity Committee's needy family at Christmas time. Ben Benninghoff noted he planned to collect donations of food items at all Club functions for the Northwest Harvest Food Bank during the Thanksgiving time frame. Cary Wallace brought in photo albums of his and Patty's recent Route 66 adventure. Discussions took place on how to offset expenses for Club sponsored activities, such as tours and poker runs. Sandra Green mentioned receiving a letter from SIR requesting the Club submit 3 track dates for our SIR V event. David Barlia provided condensed versions of his plans for the Club's SIR V and the Lake Chelan trip. Gary & Kavla Main host a "Mystery Rallye" to who knows where? Required items recommended; pencil/pen, a pal, a picnic. Also recommended; a driver's license, proof of insurance, navigator, common sense. Things that may not be required (but who knows?) clipboard, umbrella, fish hook, compass, torque wrench, calling card, toilet paper, golf ball, picnic blanket, binoculars, E.L.T., spare tire, tomato, thesaurus, duct tape. Nuclear Submarine Tour Opportunity by Kevin Jewell

CMCS has a unique opportunity to actually tour an Ohio Class Trident nuclear submarine. Club member Bob Renner has contacts with the Navy that have allowed us this tour.

- 1. Date is Thursday, Dec 3. We will meet about noon at the Undersea Warfare Museum near the Bangor base. We will board a Navy bus which will take us to the base. Bus will depart at 12:30 PM. Plan to have lunch before. The tour was only available to us either Tuesday or Thursday, so apologies to those that cannot be available on Thursday.
- 2. Tour is limited to 35. Children at least 11 years old are welcome. We cannot substitute attendees after the names have been submitted to the Navy, so please don't sign up unless you are sure you can attend.
- 3. Everyone will go thru a pre-check by the Navy. You will be provided a form to return. Day of tour you will need either a passport or birth certificate, plus another picture ID. ID could be a driver's license or a student ID card, as long as there is a picture. Without the ID you will not be allowed to board the bus.
- 4. There are no cameras, cell phones, or any other electronic device that could record. Even your Fitbit is prohibited. You will leave these in your car.
- 5. We don't know which submarine yet. The subs return to base for about 6 weeks for retrofit work, and re-provisioning before the next crew departs for about 4-5 months. Each sub has two crews that alternate time at sea. However, the tour is of an actual working nuclear submarine, not a test model.
- 6. There are three levels on a sub. We would expect that you will be on all three levels. You should see the main control area, forward torpedo room, fire control centers for both torpedoes and missiles, auxiliary engine room, the long missile room with silos, officer quarters, crew berthing quarters, crew head, galley etc.
- 7. Several years ago the club had the opportunity to tour the nuclear aircraft carrier, John Stennis, at Bremerton. Many members are still talking about that tour.

Bob Renner will be our coordinator for this tour. If you are interested in being part of the 35 attendees, email Bob at <u>robertgrenner@msn.com</u>, or call (425) 557-6516. Bob will get you the necessary forms for the pre-check. The Navy requires adequate time for the check, so there will be a cut-off date of **Oct 31**, to allow a month for the paperwork. Everything must be back to Bob by Oct 31, so don't delay. Remember to contact Bob Renner for additional details, and the required forms. Our thanks to Bob for using his contacts to arrange this unique tour opportunity.

Also, the tour is limited to CMCS Members only, as there are only 35 openings. If space remains, non-members may sign up after October 25th.

Editor's Note: By the time you read this, over 35 members will have responded. However, once some discover the complexity of the security details they may choose not to participate. All participants will get a background check prior to the event and a number of security checks en route to the site. So if you are sincerely interested, contact Bob to get on the list as an alternate.



What's In Your Museum?

Like fast cars? Then you'll probably like these three Callaways we have on exhibit in the Museum.

Two are 1987 Corvettes with the B2K option. The option was Callaway's first major Corvette tuning project and while not factory installed, could be ordered through participating





twin turbos, a manual transmission, 345hp, 465 lb. torque and the top speed for the car was 177.9 MPH. They were fully assembled at the Corvette Plant, then shipped to Callaway Engineering in Old Lyme, CT for the engine and other modifications. The Bright Red B2K was the very first one produced and was donated to the Museum by Mead Briggs. The Dark Red is graciously on loan from Scott Bartels. The 2003 Z06 Corvette on display was used to develop the Callaway C5 Power Groups, serving as a test mule before the car went into production. Featured in Corvette Enthusiast and Vette Magazine, the car has power group 1, 2 and 3, and it ran an 11.7 at 121 MPH with almost 500 HP. The car was donated by Gary Nichols.

Also new to the floor this week in our Nostalgia area is a 1955 Corvette Roadster, on loan from Gary and Sharon Mortimer of Cincinnati, OH. Nicknamed the "mustard and relish" car by their granddaughter, it is Harvest Gold with a Dark Green Top, one of only 120 made in 1955.

Interesting fact... this was the first year for the V8.

Corvettes with V8s in 1955 were identified by an enlarged gold "V" attached over the small "v" in the Chevrolet script on both front fenders.

This car has undergone a frame-off restoration and judged Top Flight at the NCRS Charlotte Regional, received a Bloomington Gold Award, and the GM Styling Excellence Award at the Concours of America at St. John's.

35th Anniversary Corvette Added to Collection

In preparation for the re-opening of the Skydome, the Museum solicited for display Anniversary and Special Edition Corvettes. When Deb and Rick Seymour saw we were searching for a show quality 35th Anniversary, they knew now was the time to go ahead and donate their Corvette.
