Tech Tip: Got A Persistent Slow Leak?

Editor's Note: In your tire! This is not a medical journal.

Well I did. It was losing about two pounds each week and I would dutifully add the air back in. This went on for about a month before I finally got off my duff and took the right front wheel off the car to check for nails or whatever might be causing this on-going leak. Finding nothing at all, I pumped the tire up again, took it in to Discount to have it repaired.

Well they said they did find a small nail and they repaired it. So far so good. Our Corvettes have this wonderful DIC (stands for Digital Information Center) including individual tire pressure readings. So after about a week I again checked the front tire pressures on the DIC. Guess what? Down about two pounds again. So back to the tire store where they checked it over again and finding nothing, they dismounted the tire and put on a bead sealer between the wheel and the tire bead. So about a week later checked the DIC and the right front tire was down two pounds again.

So back to the tire store. This time they decided to replace the right front tire under warranty. So I got a new Michelin Pilot Super Sport for free, but decided to replace the left one too so they would be the same.

This should have cured the problem for good, right? But this was not the end of the story! Sure enough, checking the pressure on the DIC the following week, the right front tire was down two pounds. Frustrated, I went back to the tire store and had them replace the valve core. What else could this be? After all, the only thing left was the wheel; everything else had been replaced. Hopefully this would end this saga.

Checking the DIC about a week later and expecting the tire pressures to all be the same, I found the right front tire was again two pounds low!! So back to the tire store where I re-iterated my tale of woe to the Discount Tire Store manager who happened to be waiting on me. He went out and looked at the right front tire on the Corvette and pointed to the tiny rubber threads standing up around the tire and then pointed to several that were caught between the tire bead and the wheel rim. He proposed grinding off all those threads around and near the tire bead and then putting it all back together. At this point I was ready to buy a new wheel, but was certainly willing to try this FREE idea.

So a week later, I checked the DIC for front tire pressures and they were the same!!! But I wasn't ready to declare victory yet. Had to wait an additional week. Checked the DIC and again the tire pressures were right where they should be!!

Finally, VICTORY! So the moral of this story is: if you have a slow tire leak and can't find any reason why, check your threads, before you go and buy a new tire.

Addendum from Oran

Back in the dark ages (really fun times actually) I worked tires for a Chevrolet dealership. This was back when tires were bias ply, and some of them had a bladder device called a "tube". Slow leaks were even more of an issue then.

I made a special tank big enough lay the wheel/tire horizontally under water and used a restraint to keep it completely submerged. I used clean water with just a bit of soap (as in soap bubbles). I overpressured it by about 20 psi to speed things up a bit.

No matter how slow, if there is a leak, eventually you will see a bubble form, or rise to the surface if it is on the botton of the wheel, in which case you flip it over and start over as necessary. Usually, the leaks show quite quickly.

This technique also worked for the tubes, but those suckers were a lot harder to sink.

I still use this system to find very slow leaks in my bicycle tubes.

Under the Hood by Kevin Jewell



Many of us are a bit obsessive about keeping our Corvettes pristine. However, if you do drive it, sooner or later you are going to get a rock chip in the paint no matter how you try to protect the body with masks. Then we get out the little bottle of touch up paint and we have a big glob of paint in the chip, which is less than satisfactory. A recent article in Eckler's newsletter suggests that you never use the brush that comes with the bottle. Use a very small artist brush

and gently work the paint into the chip area, applying several very thin coats, allowing each coat to dry for at least an hour. So, obviously this is not your 5-minute fix, but will provide a more satisfactory solution. For the really focused, they further suggest using superfine (1500 grit) wet sandpaper and with a wood block carefully going over the chip repair until the bump is removed. Then use paint polish and wax to finish the job. If you take this advice, let me know how it turns out. I don't think I have ever had that much patience.

In 2015, the US auto industry broke a 15-year record, selling 17.5 million vehicles. However, to me there are two trends that are not favorable. First, much of this increase is due to the increased demand for light duty trucks. Why not buy that F-150 or Silverado when gas is 2.50/gallon? History should have convinced us that gas prices won't stay this low forever. What happens when gas goes back to \$4 or even higher at \$6/gallon. Will light truck sales tank, and a bunch of people be complaining that they cannot afford to drive to work? I don't feel that I am climbing out on a limb to predict that is exactly what will happen. Maybe not in 2016, but it will happen. The second concern is not only low interest loan rates, but also lending to subprime consumers. It seems like forever that we have enjoyed car loans at 2% or even lower, but we know that won't go indefinitely. Subprime auto loans (those made to buyers with low credit ratings) now amount to 20% of all auto loans. Of course those subprime loans carry a much higher interest rate. The Wall Street Journal reports that many of these subprime auto loans carry interest rates up to 22%, a far cry from the more typically advertised auto loan rates. With 72-84 month terms and high interest rates, these borrowers will be underwater on their auto loans until the loan is finally paid off. It will make it that much harder for them to trade in for a new car in the next 6 years, while the car is worth less than the loan balance. I was rather distressed to find that subprime auto loans have been packaged and sold to investors as high-yield investments. Already almost 5% of those loans are delinquent. This sure sounds a lot like the packaging of subprime home loans that helped fuel the economy's collapse in 2008. Maybe subprime auto loans can't affect us as much as the home loans did, but I suspect there will be more than a few investors that discover that

their "safe, high-yield" bond packages, weren't really safe and certainly not high-yield when they are in default. Is this a case of "History does nothing but repeat itself?".

Many Corvette history fans are aware that in 1954 Oldsmobile produced their F-88 (jet fighter?) concept car. This was the Olds version of a 2 seat Corvette roadster, except that it had an Olds Rocket V8 under the hood. In my opinion it was a better looking car



than the Corvette with the typical big mouth Olds grille, hood scoop, and wrap around windshield. Clearly had Oldsmobile started producing this roadster it probably would have been the end of the Corvette, which was still powered by a 6 cylinder with a 2 speed automatic. The story is that GM killed the F-88, not letting Olds compete with Chevy. Four of these cars were built and only one remained. For many years that remaining F-88 was owned by a Des Moines, WA, man, Gordon Apker. Gordon had a very extensive collection in a warehouse patterned after a Veltex service station, where he first started working as a teenager. Although it was not widely known, he held an open house every August. Perhaps 20 years ago, SOVREN held a major event at his collection and some of you might have attended that event.

Editor's Note: Dee & I did attend the SOVREN event and were very impressed by the collection and the facility, located at an obscure Des Moines loction. I attempted to arrange a CMCS meeting and tour at the site, but due to the private nature of the facility and circumstances at the time I was not able to pull it off.

Gordon was hired in 1964 at a new Shakey's Pizza in Tacoma. Within 3 months he was the assistant manager and within a few years he would be the largest franchisee of Shakey's, with stores in Washington, Oregon and Alaska. I suspect many of you can remember the Shakey's in downtown Bellevue eating at the large family style wood tables. His Shakey's businesses allowed Gordon to start his auto collection in about 1980. The F-88 was sold at a Barrett-Jackson auction in 2005. The winning bid was \$3.3 million. Although Gordon and his wife had moved to Arizona a few years ago for the weather, I still thought of him as one of our many Puget Sound area car collectors. He was more than just a collector. He was a long time Pebble Beach judge, considered a Duesenberg expert. The collector world lost another icon when Gordon passed away in February at the young age of 71. Much of his collection was sold at the January, 2016 Barrett-Jackson auction.

New Club Radio Road Test by Tim Cox



If you haven't yet heard, the club is selling a new radio to members as an alternative to the Motorola radios we've traditionally

used. The new radio is made by Baofeng and is their UV-5R model.

Why are we trying this radio out? The primary reason is its cost. Current price for members is \$40. While it's obviously much cheaper to buy, our goal on our Big Sky trip was to give it a good workout to see if it is suitable for road use. Overall I would have to say the answer to that question is a resounding yes. Here are some of our observations.

The Pros

The range is as good. We were able to converse with people at a range of about a mile. At that point the transmission seems to start breaking

up. That's about where our Motorola peters out as well.



Battery life is excellent. This radio comes with a lithium battery and goes multiple full days without a charge. After two full days of road travel and chatter we were down to 1 of 4 bars of battery life.

Can switch from Channel 1 to Channel 2 with the simple press of a button.

The radio operates on vastly more channels including FM.

There is a mini flashlight/strobe light built in as well as an alarm.

This radio has vastly more operating capabilities and can be programmed with a PC.

The Cons

The speaker is not as good of quality as the Motorola. With both radios on it is obvious the Motorola has a clearer voice. The UV-5R was a little tinny in comparison and sounded more like a radio. That didn't mean we couldn't understand what people were saying, though. When incoming transmission was garbled or crackly it was that way with both old and new radios.

If not properly setup, the radio will be confusing and frustrating to use.

Neutral

The radio comes with a charging base, like the Motorola. We're going to look for a smaller footprint charging cable.

The radio is smaller in size but has a larger antenna. It will fit some hands better and for some it may feel too small. The body could be tucked into a pocket or purse but the antenna makes it more difficult to pack it up completely.

Unknown

We don't know its durability yet as we haven't dropped it. We're not going to rush into that.

Have Smart Phone, Need QR Code

More of our members are using smart phones to replace or supplement a more traditional computer for email and Web browsing. So from this point forward, we are making access to the CMCS newsletter from your smart phone more quick and convenient by the use of a QR Code.

QR Codes (Quick Response Codes) are 2-dimensional bar codes that look like they were done by a mad artist high on something. (See one holding a "secret message" on the right.) QR Codes can hold and manage Web URL's, text messages (SMS), phone numbers and more. We use one for URL access to the on-line newsletter. Look on the back page of this July OYM (or the June

Look on the back page of this July OYM (or the June OYM) to find the code allowing access to the Web version of that newsletter. When you scan it with a QR scanner on your smart phone you can see the URL and



download the newsletter to your phone without typing. Then you can access the newsletter quickly and directly from anywhere using your phone, even without Web access.

If necessary, you can get a QR scanner/reader for your phone from the store for your system or from other sources. You will also need the free Adobe Reader to open the newsletter pdf files on your phone. You can download this app from Adobe.com or get it from your store as necessary.

The newsletter code can be found only on the printed version of your newsletter. This is because our Web system generates a unique URL for each newsletter when we upload it. Since I do not have this URL available until after the upload, I cannot show it in the on-line version. But since the primary purpose is to allow you to easily carry the newsletter on your phone, and not carry the booklet, this is of small concern.

You can delete the pdf file from your phone when a new newsletter arrives to prevent bulking up your storage with old files.

Laps from the Past

50 LAPS AGO: July '66. The normal scheduled monthly meeting was canceled in favor of Club members attending a party at the Bridgemans' home. The following minutes were recorded from the monthly Board of Directors meeting: President John Thomas called the monthly meeting of Board of Directors to order at his home. The Treasurer noted the Club still owed the Stanleys funds from a previous Club event, but due to low Club funds it wasn't possible to pay them at this time. It was suggested something be prepared for new & prospective members letting

them know the Club's history, their privileges of belonging to the Club, a membership list, and a description of typical Club activities throughout the year. The remainder of Club business revolved around discussing the Club's part in the upcoming Corvette Cove and parade-lap prior to the races at PRI (Pacific Raceways, Incorporated) at the end of July.

40 LAPS AGO: July '76. An 'informal' Club meeting was held in a parking lot across the street from Pepe's Villa in Renton, which was conducted by Vice President Len Hodges. Steve & Carrie Forbes were voted into full membership. Club activities included a Sounder's Soccer Game, a Regional/National Race at SIR (Seattle International Raceway), a Clean-up the Car Signs at Joyce Bear's residence, a NWACC (NorthWest Association of Corvette Clubs) meeting at Carl & Kimi Rabun's home, a Normandy Park Party hosted by Mimi Schwab & Dee Esping, and an overnight Club Tour to Winthrop over Cascade Highway #2 (perhaps the first ever Cascade Highway Loop Tour?- Ben). NWACC saw two Rally/Autocross events at Eugene; a closed-exhaust meet, and another in Vancouver, WA. The members discussed the Club's scheduled August Autocross and the need for volunteers to help sweep the track as there was a prior racing event of 64

Funny Cars. Club member Rick Stark needed a pit crew available to travel to Brainerd, Elkhart Lake, and other tracks; and to tow his racing Corvette. Dee Esping noted she had received a request to provide 4 Corvettes for a parade at White Center. Don Schwab was making preparations for our Club Christmas Party. Newsletter articles were published covering Club outings last month to the Lake Whatcom Railway Steam Train Excursion where members gathered at Northgate and saw eleven Corvettes participating, with two more joining the caravan along the freeway. A number of children attended. As sometimes happens, there was a mishap; one child's fingers were accidentally stepped on while he was on board the train's engine. Four bandages later and booboos kissed, he was once again enjoying the train ride through the area's farms and forests. On the return caravan drive Highway 9 was taken for the curvy roads but we were slowed down due to a club of motorcycles with sidecars taking their sweet time through the country. All in all host and leader Ruth Bogle got everyone safely home for an outstanding and different club activity. Another article from "Fiberglass Forever; Corvettes of Fresno, Inc." called "Corvette Anthem" was a great poem about the Corvette; author unknown. Joyce Bear had another article published "G.I. Joe's Rose Cup Trans Am1976" noting last month's venture of 30 Club members attending the Trans Am Races in Portland. The 3-day event saw 8 from the Club attend with Rick Stark finishing in 3rd place over all, after beginning at 17th. Ron McDuffie finished in 10th. Sunday saw a total of 15,000 in attendance with 200 Porsches followed by 80 Corvettes participating in a Parade Lap. Vintage Corvette Enthusiasts 7th Annual Picnic was scheduled for August at the Rainbow Falls State Park, 16 miles west of Chehalis; Frank Olsheski was the Club contact. (Nostalgia moment: the price of first class postage for each mailed newsletters was 13 cents! - Ben)

30 LAPS AGO: July '86. The monthly meeting was called to order by President Frank Brese at the home of Rose Eckenberg in Lake Stevens for a BBQ/Meeting. John Paul Nelson III was elected Vice President (Western Washington) of NCRS (National Corvette Restorers Society). He was to lead a tour to Reno starting at Southcenter at the end of the month. Neil & Noreen Millen indicated to Jeff Schmidt that they would set up and run the course for the upcoming Drag Race event scheduled in Vancouver, WA. next month. Larry Gunselman rejoined the Club, and Terry Maousky & Pat Jubie were voted into full membership. Club members attended the Aqua Fest & Car Show at Lake Stevens. Jan Cockrum expressed the need for a typewriter with large letters. A Parking Session at SIR (Seattle International Raceways) was to be headed by Carl & Ginger Mollnow. John Paul Nelson III took first place in his class at the car show. Ernie Kahler's "Touring" etiquette article from 1974 was reprinted in the newsletter for Club members awareness. The 1986 Autocross schedule was printed in the newsletter, as well as the Northwest Corvette & Performance Expo held at the Western Washington Fairgrounds in Puyallup where the Club will have a booth, and the Glass Odyssey Corvette Club hosted their Autocross & Rallye event. The Club Officer Board meeting (open to all the members as always) took place at the home of the Cockrums; one of the topics discussed was the Club's plans to host a Drag Race event for August. The Spokane Corvette Club celebrated their 10th Anniversary with a Convention where they had a 3-day Concours & Autocross at the Cavanaugh Inn at the Park. The inside pages of the newsletter were printed on blue mimeograph forms. A phone list was included in a 4-page insert in the newsletter listing all current members in good standing by areas: Kirkland, Bellevue, Bothell, North Seattle, Seattle, Renton, South Sound, and Everett & North. The total members listed came to 60 active (Associates & General members) with another 46 as prospective. Four others were 'on the books' requesting a newsletter only.

20 LAPS AGO: July '96. Newest members Vince & Chris Perriello's 1996 Collector's Edition Sebring Silver coupe with black interior the LT4 engine, 6-speed, and ZR1 wheels was the featured Corvette on the newsletter cover. Vince acquired the Vette when in the shop for a scheduled oil change for his 1994 Corvette. It was love at first sight when Vince saw it on display at the dealership and made the deal then and there. Driving it home and showing it off to Chris, she said 'so, where's mine?' Chris shortly thereafter

became the proud owner of a 1978 25th Anniversary Edition Corvette. Now that's love! President Gary Main conducted a brief meeting in the Winston Tower on the SIR Drag Race grounds. Oran Petersen filled in for Secretary Ben Benninghoff as he was showing his visiting sister the town before flying home. Oran also reported that the Club's finances were in good shape and he would be handing in the financial spreadsheet to the Board later in the month. Jerry & Judy Harper were voted into full membership. They attended the meeting driving their 'steel' car but were forgiven as their new 1996 Red Corvette's delivery had been delayed from the factory. Activities included seeing 65 cars participate at the Club's Annual School Daze event at SIR. Gary Main was seeking volunteers for upcoming parades. Other activities included the Annual 4th of July Parades and the following BYO picnic at the Presidential Palace (the Main's home in Bothell). The annual Shadow of the Mountain event was hosted by the Tacoma Corvette Club, the Kla Ha Ya Days Festival was well attended in Snohomish, and Corvettes on the High Desert at Eagle Crest Resort was hosted by the High Desert Corvette Club from Redmond Oregon, while the V&T 21 was hosted by Reno Corvettes. The Summerfest 1996 Return to Lakewood Car Show at Pierce Community College campus was another outing attended by several Club members, while more attended the Blackhills Corvette Classic in Spearfish South Dakota hosted by the Sioux Falls Corvette Club. A KZOK/ Al's Auto Supply Salute to the Classic Car Show was a good classic car event. The Umpteenth Annual Wine Tour was hosted by Club member John Bell who led a 2-day tour (non-overnighter) throughout the Puget Sound region's wine producing region. There was also the 5th Annual Port Gardner Bay Concours d' Elegance where the Club sponsored a class trophy. Several area parades took place for the membership to enjoy, and the Hot August Nights in Reno Nevada took place. Trivia; The Seattle Sonics won the Western Conference.

10 LAPS AGO: July '06. Club activities included the 4th of July Parade in Bothell as well as other parades around the Sound, an All Chevy Show at the XXX Drive-Inn in Issaguah, the Anacortes Open Car Show, an Alaska Cruise for Kids hosted by the Anchorage Corvette Club where contributions went to the Ronald McDonald House in Seattle, and the 13th Annual Take Me Out to the Ball Game with the Everett Aquasox--a Seattle Mariner's A-minor league team. Many other Corvette Clubs provided repeat performances to attend within and outside of the Puget Sound. Co-chair Kevin Jewell of the SIS 2006 (Seattle In September) was calling for support of the membership to get involved in the planning phase of this 3-day event in September, and collecting items to fill raffle baskets to hand out as prizes. Club representative to the NCM (National Corvette Museum), Wes Holmes noted the Museum's website had Christmas ornaments available for purchase.
