We are both retired and live in south Bellevue, where we have resided for 30 years. We have three sons, and four grandchildren, all of whom live in the area.

This is our third Corvette, having owned a red 1958 convertible with white top and white inserts while in college. After we were married, it became Joan's car (in effect), as she drove it daily to the school where she was a teacher in Edmonds. Since the students were of middle school age, that made her pretty credible with them right away.



With the arrival of our first child we needed three seats, so sold it for a larger car (a 1963 Riviera), and were Corvette-less until we got a red 1985 coupe. That was fun for a number of years, eventually leading up to my lusting for the new C7 Stingray when it first appeared in 2014.

But eight month waiting lists, and huge markups over MSRP caused me to wait until the feeding frenzy died down a little. To bide my time I bought a Porsche 911 model 997, which was a lot of fun, but still not the car I wanted.

Fortunately the time was right late last year when we made the plunge. I found the car I wanted which is 2016 Night Race Blue Metallic with Kalahari tan interior. I also wanted the Z51 package because I knew I will want to drive this on the track at some point in time. It is still too new in my mind to take it to The Ridge or to Pacific Raceways, but I know the day will come. Meanwhile I plan to have all the other kinds of fun I can with it short of the track.

I am impressed with the diverse and plentiful activities that are available for us as members. We look forward to participating in CMCS events and outings, and to get to know as many members as possible.

Technical Tip - Garmin Mount Method for C7 Corvettes by Alton Loe



I've never been a fan of factory GPS systems. Most are difficult to work with and require yearly updates for too much money if you want to keep the maps up to date.

I've been very happy with my Garmin Nuvi. It has a very easy to use GUI. The map updates are free and available more than once per year. The question has always been where to put it. Windshield mounts work, but obstruct your vision and are not even legal in California. The bean bag works, but the only place I

found for it was on the very left side of the dash, and the cord going to the 12v supply was ugly.

My solution was to put a 12v plug into the hidden pocket behind the screen. See the photo. I tied the Garmin into the 12v outlet just below the heater controls. No wires show. It automatically turns off when you turn off the car, so it won't drain the battery. The Garmin gets a good signal and the speaker is loud enough even when the screen is closed.

To answer a few questions. Yes, the Garmin works in the cubby hole. It worked all the way from Montana to Seattle. For that trip it was sitting loose in the cubby. But now I am using the suction cup on the flat plastic disk that comes with the older Garmins. I found a pair of these on EBay for \$1.50. It is very stable in this configuration.

Yes, the radio still works. It works with the screen either up or down. I have noticed that if the screen is down and I shift into reverse, the screen comes up on its own to show the backup camera, so you don't want to have a cord coming from the Garmin to the plug on the console. You can change the stations with the screen down by using the controls on the steering wheel.

As for the power plug, we wired it to the 12v outlet on the console (not the one in the arm rest). There was no room for the plug to stick out from the box because there is only room in that space for the box. There is plastic on both sides and top and bottom. So we ran the wire into the cubby through an existing hole and made a small holder for the 12v adapter that we screwed onto the side of the cubby. You

don't have to use a holder. The adapter could just sit on the bottom of the cubby. But this seemed like a better way to do it.

My Garmin is a Nuvi 2595 LM (Lifetime Maps)


I got this reply to my post on the forum. (Note: I have NOT tested this!)

"The Garmin CAN be powered from the USB port behind the screen. The trick is to buy a power cord from 3BR Powersports. It has an extra pin connected to force the Garmin into NAV mode. A standard USB cord puts the Garmin into computer connected mode. Your traffic feature on the Garmin will not work with this cord, but the basic navigation functions should work."



Front License Plate Information

I recently went to the 41st legislative district candidates show to try to make contact with Representative Judy Clibborn, Chair person of the House Transportation Committee. She has refused to even consider HB 1664- 2015-16 to remove front license plates. She didn't show.

She lives in Federal Way, but the 41st runs from South Bellevue through Mercer Island to Federal Way. Of the 22 members on the Transportation Committee, all but four live on the I-5 Corridor so

perhaps our members can have some influence there.

Her election opponent, in a tight race, is Michael Appleby.

Info from the Washington State Patrol states that you are not required to drill holes in your vehicle to attach a license plate. You can request a waiver for these cars. But on another site there is a claim that Corvettes must have a license plate. The dealers have 4 different mounts available for the Stingray, depending on year, model and state, that do not require drilling holes.

You might try to get a waiver by sending a photo of the front of your car to the State Patrol. Start the process.

In January we need to contact our State house representatives on this matter.

Under the Hood by Kevin Jewell



This past year I have watched the development of a new race track on Vancouver Island, about 45 minutes north of Victoria. Vancouver Island Motorsport Circuit has now opened and they are selling memberships. An Individual Membership is \$48,000 CDN with an annual fee of \$4,800 CDN. For those interested, Founding Membership is available for \$200,000 CDN, with the same low annual fee. For your bucket list gift opportunity, they are already

offering packages including a stay in local resort, track drives with choice of 911 Carrera S, Mercedes Benz GTS etc. Please tell them Kevin sent you and perhaps if enough of you join/attend, they will send me a guest pass. BTW, the prices shown are from the web site and are already considerably higher than what I had seen a few months ago in Automobile magazine.

Do you remember using your Haynes Manual to work on your car? In those days you knew you only needed three things for the engine to run. Air, fuel and spark. It was fairly easy to check for these items and once you found which was lacking, you could start to solve the problem. Although I once installed the distributor 180 degrees out of phase and spent an entire day trying to determine why the engine would not run.

Today, our engine computers are far more complicated, and it no longer is that simple. When I bought our C5 in 2001, we ordered the 3 volume workshop manual set. We know that most auto techs have used their computers for troubleshooting rather than the massive repair manuals for some time. Now, some Audi techs can now turn to a robot. Audi's robot (ART for Audi Robotic Telepresence) is equipped with cameras and screens and lets the local tech communicate with the experts at the Audi technical center in Michigan, for those hard to solve problems. No wonder the auto repair labor costs continue to escalate.

BMW has introduced their M4 GTS with 493 hp, (442 ft-lb of torque) from a 3.0 liter engine. Those are pretty grand numbers. BMW is touting their water injection system allowing more turbo boost to generate these numbers. Under boost conditions, the computer injects a small amount of water into the engine. As the water evaporates. It provides a cooling effect to the intake air which allows more boost without detonation. Water injection was used for many years in military piston powered aircraft for those short bursts of power in take-off or the dogfight. One of the first uses of water injection in cars was the 1962 Oldsmobile F85 Jetfire. This turbocharged 215 ci V8 (remember the 215 ci V8 engine from Sept?) used a blend of distilled water and alcohol to control detonation. At the same time, Chevrolet had a Corvair with a turbocharger.

Chevy reduced the compression ratio of the Corvair engine to help with detonation. Oldsmobile left the compression ratio at 10.25:1, and added the injection. If the water/alcohol tank ran dry, performance suffered. This package only lasted a couple of years, before Oldsmobile introduced the 442 with a larger naturally aspirated engine as their performance model. Interest in water injection waned with the introduction of intercoolers, as they do a great job of cooling the intake air. Now at these very elevated boost pressures, as seen in this new BMW, we are seeing water injection re-introduced in conjunction with intercoolers. All of this reminds me of my college friend with his old Dodge. He rigged an extra windshield washer bottle with a switch controlled vacuum line to the intake manifold. Fill the bottle with used engine oil and you could smoke out anyone behind you by flipping the switch. Not that I was ever present when that happened.

RAD 2016 - Final Event Report by Lou Arnoldi



We early risers met at 7 am at the truck stop east of North Bend. Most were sipping their coffee hoping to awaken.

Fifteen cars motored east and south, eventually down Hwy 97 which runs from Toppenish to Goldendale. This is a pretty stretch of road which parallels the Satus Creek and then over Satus Pass where we run along side the Little Klickitat River, which empties into the mighty Columbia. We get our first taste of steep and curvy down the grade

south of Goldendale. Much more to come! After lunch at Biggs, Oregon, we drifted the high plains, through various sections of curved roads East/South East through the Umatilla National forest. On our way to Anthony Lakes, we entered the Blue Mountain range which Geologists say once was a separate isolated land mass, which drifted to join the north American continent some 200 million years ago. The granite peaks have since been worn down by the series of ice ages 6,000 to 20,000 years ago.



We traversed many curvy and scenic areas on over the 7,392 high Elkhorn Summit. The La Grande Best Western Ramada treated us well. The cowboy café, appropriately named the Dusty Spur Restaurant, served us with good food on "Cowboy Time".

If you thought you had seen curves and grades, wrong, the best was yet to come. The majestic peaks of the Eagle Cap Wilderness were visible as we entered the Hells Canyon Scenic Highway on our way to Enterprise, Oregon, which is just 6 miles north of Joseph. In 1880 the town chose the name in honor of the famous Nez Perce Indian chief whose tribe almost made it to the Canadian border before they were captured by the ATF?

Highway 82 route followed the creased canyons along the Wallowa and Minam rivers. We went up steep switchbacks and then down again only to do the same as we crossed another riverbed. What an exercise of joy and challenge for Corvettes and their passengers. On our way to Anatone, we found another series of canyons. When we arrived for lunch in Lewiston, we met an unexpected detour, caused by the big Lewiston rod and custom car show. I spotted a beautiful red T-bucket out of the corner of my eye, but resisted the temptation for more eye candy, and continued on to the Lunch Box Café where the manager provided good food fast.

Next on the menu, *The Spiral Highway* which was built in 1917 to access the lands to the north of Lewiston. Lucky for us the road was recently repaved. The Spiral has 64 curves and rises 2,000 feet in 8 miles. There is a gorgeous view of Lewiston from the top. What a ride! Our vintage '99 Corvette temperature gauge anxiously reflected the exertion.

From here on North, we rolled through the Palouse, an ocean-like panorama of harvested wheat fields. The Palouse is made up of wind-blown dust that marched across the landscape many unknown years ago when the climate was too dry for the establishment of ground covers. The landscape must have been similar to the imperial sand dunes, which now exist in the southeast corner of California.

We continued through the Palouse and bunked at the Best Western in Colfax.



We dined at various locations of our choice. Next morning, we all motored back to the boring west side of the Cascades, bringing back memories of a truly **"Really Awesome Drive"**.

50 LAPS AGO: November '66. The monthly General Membership Meeting was called to order by John Thomas at the Hyatt House. Wally Arrowsmith gave a committee report on the Christmas Banquet coming up on December 10 which took place at the Hyatt House. It was to be a BYOB (Bring Your Own Bottle) evening with mixers provided, and the affair was a semi-formal dress affair. There were rumors that Santa might show up with his special Bag of Gifts. There was an auction at the December Club meeting where proceeds went to KIRO TVs

Variety Heart Fund Telecast. The Club had scheduled a Christmas Light Tour for December 17. John brought several different jacket styles to the meeting for the membership to consider adopting as the official Club jacket. Corvettes de Olympia Corvette Club scheduled a Corvette and High Performance Swap Meet in January to take place at the Southwestern Washington Fair Grounds. Club Activities scheduled an evening of bowling in January to Belle Lanes Bowling Center in Bellevue.

40 LAPS AGO: November '76. The monthly General Membership meeting was called to order at the Cellar in Bellevue by President Len Hodges. Prospective Members John Sinnar, and, Ed & Midge Moore were voted into full membership by those in attendance, bringing the total to 127 Club members.
