Alton's 2017 Grand Sport 2LT: This is Alton's third Corvette. He had a 2000 C5 (millennium yellow) and a 2009 C6 (crystal red metallic). Alton has been involved in track events even before getting his first Corvette. He taught at Seattle International Raceway (now Pacific Raceways) for the BMW club and at School Days for the Corvette Club. He now reserves his competitive driving for the NWACC autocross events.

Alton was interested in the C7 when it first came out, but didn't really want to upgrade until last

year. He saw the new C7 owned by Mike Roylance and decided that he would get his own C7 in the next year. The plan was to wait until the April announcement of the 2017 car and then decide whether to get a 2016 at the end of the model year (when they get cheaper!) or one of the first 2017 models. With the announcement of the Grand Sport for 2017, the decision was made and the order was placed.

Alton's new C7 is Arctic White with Adrenaline Red Interior, Matt black wheels with a red stripe and blacked out emblems. He and Aldene added Oracle side markers in Ghost White that totally disappear into the body until the lights come on. Then the line of red LED's pop and look terrific. Alton also hides his Garmin GPS behind the infotainment screen because he prefers the Garmin navigation over any factory navigation system. And before you ask, the answer is yes it does get a signal and works perfectly with the screen open or closed.

If you'd like a thrilling ride in his new car, come out to one of the autocross events next year. You won't be disappointed.





Joe's 2017 Grand Sport 3LT: This is Joe's seventh Corvette. His first one arrived in San Diego in 1965-a 64 Saddle Tan Fuel Injected Coupe that was also used for his first run at autocross. He had it for 3 years before it lost out to "anything with a back seat and a trunk," his wife Susan said when told of an imminent transfer to the East Coast. Many years and many cars later, Joe finally got his 2nd Corvette, a new 2006 Le Mans Blue 3LT Z51 Coupe. Over the next 10 years others came and went, justifiably of course. There was the 1970 Cortez Silver 454 Coupe, a 2003 50th Anniversary Red Coupe, George Schwartz's 1987 Gold Metallic 4+3 autocross car, a

2007 Monterey Red 3LT Z51 Coupe, and a 2009 Victory Red 4LT Z51 Convertible, both automatics.

When the C7 launched Joe was less than thrilled with some of its external design features, especially those Camaro-looking taillights. Then the Z06 broke cover, and, the not-round taillights notwithstanding, it was just mean looking from any angle. So what's the best of both Base & Z06 worlds? The Grand Sport, of course. If the stellar first drive reviews in C&D, R&T, and others weren't enough, one right-seat ride in Alton's GS at the last NWACC Autocross of this season firmly planted the you-gotta-have-it seed in Joe's brain. Susan was already a protagonist in the argument for owning one C7 versus owning both a C6 Corvette AND a Mustang GT, so the C6 and the GT left our garage for good.

Like Alton's car, Joe's Grand Sport is Arctic White, but Joe's has Jet Black leather with the suede microfiber seat inserts, roof panel insert and steering wheel cover. It also has the carbon fiber interior package, the Heritage package, the carbon flash badge & outside mirror options and gloss black GS wheels. In the Believe It Or Not Dept., Joe says his new GS and Susan's new Yas Marina Blue Competition Pack-equipped M4 have put their days of almost single-handedly supporting the American car market firmly behind them, waaaay behind them!

Tech Tip - "Summer" Tire Use When It's Cold Outside by Oran Petersen

Several of our members, including Joe Powell, Lyal Schlotterbeck and Steve Yabroff have done research on the summer tires that come factory equipped on our C7 series cars, and that many of you have on other cars as well. This article is a compilation of information from their research. It focuses primarily on the Michelin Pilot Super Sport tires (Ultra High Performance), but other brands of summer tires may have similar limitations due to the rubber compounds used. Contact the manufacturer to get the real scoop for yours.

Bear in mind the following information from Michelin and found in the owner manual for the new Stingrays:

- These tires suffer performance degradation at temperatures below 40 degrees Fahrenheit. Extensive use at these temperatures is not recommended by either Michelin or Chevrolet. They recommend a change to Winter (or all season) tires for these conditions.
- At 20 degrees or below, even moving the car WILL damage the tires by cracking the sidewalls and more. You must warm them before rolling the car. (fortunately we do not get temperatures this cold often in the Pacific Northwest.)

So for folks like Dee & I that do not push performance limits and drive their cars year-round, what are our alternatives? We also want to retain run-flats, or as Michelin calls them "Zero Pressure" (ZP) tires.

- "Winter" tires. Not a great choice in our area with their increased noise, reduced tread wear and performance issues. If you swap out summer and winter by season you have storage issues and swap-out costs, or the cost of a spare set of rims if you want to avoid dismount/mount and balance issues. Even then, most of us cannot easily change them out conveniently with the issues of jacking, tools and handling these large and expensive wheels. The TPMS can make this even more complicated.
- "All Season" tires. All tires are a compromise. For Dee & I, All Season offers the best compromise for performance, wear and summer/winter use. Except for snow/ice situations, which our Stingray will not see, we can drive it like any one of our other cars year-round.

Until recently, Michelin All Season Run-Flat tires for the Z51 did not exist. But then recently on Tire Rack, up they came! **Pilot Sport A/S3 + ZP (W or Y speed rated) Ultra High Performance All-Season**. They are made to fit standard Stingrays and the Z51. For those that wish, they also make a non ZP (no run-flat) version. I estimate that we will get about 30,000 miles on our factory summer Michelins. They will be replaced with the all season run-flats.

My personal criteria is to use freezing (32 degrees Fahrenheit) as an absolute go/no-go point for driving our Stingray until the summer tires are replaced.

This article does not address the Grand Sport/Z06 C7 tires. They use a different size tire that I have not researched.

My Stingray owner manual has 23 pages on tires. Nothing simple on this topic. Hope this article helps you with awareness of the sophistication and limitations of the tires on your C7 and older Corvettes. Let the dialog begin!

Under the Hood by Kevin Jewell



During a recent trip to Germany, I got to thinking about how the German cars are rated. A couple of months ago, this column discussed how our auto engine horsepower is rated and the difference between gross and net horsepower ratings, using SAE (Society of Automotive Engineers) standards. In Germany, they use a different standard (DIN) for horsepower. If you have purchased a German vehicle, I would not be surprised if your friendly

salesperson explained to you that German horsepower is "much higher" than American horsepower. Actually, the salesperson was exaggerating more than a little. SAE and DIN test standards do vary, but not by a lot. The SAE tests are conducted at a higher ambient temperature and slightly lower atmospheric pressure than the DIN tests. However, the difference is only about 1%. Divide your DIN rating by 1.014 to determine your SAE horsepower. You might also have noticed that the European fuel stations advertise 100 octane fuel, while locally we seem to have mostly 91 or 92 octane fuel. Again, the test standards between the US and Europe are different. However, the European 100 octane fuel would be equivalent to our octane rating of 95. Why is this important? As octane levels increase, the engineers can increase the compression ratio of the engine which will provide greater efficiency in extracting the energy in every ounce of fuel. We shouldn't ignore that there are other factors than compression ratio at play. With the advent of direct injection in the C7 Corvette, the cooling effect of direct injection allowed the engineers to increase the C7 engine from 10.7:1 to 11.5:1 compression ratio. A compression ratio of 11.5:1 has been almost unheard of since we outlawed the use of lead as an anti-knock compound. If the engineers knew that the available fuel octane level would increase from 91-92 to 95 octane, they could get even more efficiency (read horsepower) from the same C7 engine by further increasing the compression ratio. Alternatively, they could achieve similar horsepower numbers as today's C7 engine with a smaller displacement engine. Each full point increase in compression ratio will generate about 3-4% additional power in a naturally aspirated (read non-super/turbo charged) engine. One would assume that the smaller engine would get better fuel economy plus have better emissions. This is an advantage the Europeans have had for some time. In fact, it is the reason that some of the German autos are sold in the US with lower relative horsepower ratings than the same car in Germany. With additional lean burning engineering, many automakers are going even higher with the compression ratios. Mazda has been a leader in

this quest and currently offers engines with compression ratios as high as 14:1. As the US government requires ever higher CAFÉ standards Mazda is already designing engines with ratios of 18:1. This is almost diesel engine compression ratios. You can expect that all the manufacturers are experimenting with similar engine technology. The automaker engineers are now pushing to have the US fuel standards brought up to European octane levels. If they succeed, this will be a win for all of us. You might argue that if we have higher octane levels, the fuel price will also increase. That might well be the case, but I think it is safe to assume that if octane increases from 91-92 to 95, that the cost increase will be less than the current cost premium from regular to premium fuel. So, the fuel cost might go up slightly, but if we can extract more energy from the same amount of fuel, we should still benefit in our pocketbook and the environment.

During this same trip to Germany, we saw many late model Mustangs on the road, but not a single Corvette. Special treats seen on the road were a 67 Mustang fastback and a 67-68 Oldsmobile Cutlass convertible. We did some travel on the Autobahn, and generally the speed limit was 100-110 kph, or 60-65 mph. On a couple of occasions would see the unlimited speed sign on the side of the road. However, it seemed that the unlimited speed sections were short stretches of highway. We kept waiting for the Porsche or Ferrari to go screaming past us at 150 mph, but it appears that most people are more sane than we expected. Many of the drivers were 10-20 mph over the limit, and a few well over the limit, but we see that all the time on our non-urban freeways as well.

Audi (notice that everything is German related this month) has announced that it is terminating its FIA World Endurance involvement, which includes the 24 hours at Le Mans. Audi has been a major player at Le Mans in the LMP1 (unlimited prototype class) for the past decade, and several of those years with diesel, or diesel hybrid power. Audi is going to try to dominate Formula E, an open wheel electric power series. BMW and Mercedes are already involved with Formula E, so Audi is the late comer. Will we someday love the whine of electric motors like we currently enjoy the roar or shrill scream of internal combustion? If you have never driven an electric go-cart, you should try one out at K1 Speed locally. The carts are heavier than their gas-powered brothers, but have instant torque, so you don't have quite the need to operate the brake and throttle at the same time which was needed on the gas carts. Of course, there is just the electric motor whine, so it does seem different. Since the carts are electric and computer controlled, the staff can reduce the power of an individual cart if they feel the driver is being too aggressive. How do I know?





Computer Corner by Bill Roberts (CMCS Member)



This is the first of what is hoped to become a series of computer information articles, but first a caveat:

Some of the tips I will present have the potential of causing damage to your computer or a loss of data if other unknown conditions exist. Although I will endeavor to guide readers as safely as possible, neither the author, nor the OYM editor, nor CMCS can assume any liability if anything goes wrong. You

are still the one moving the mouse and clicking.

It is often said that the best defense is a good offense. The same applies to computer security. At the same time the most secure techniques involve some degree of inconvenience. Some baseline conditions that should be in place on every computer are: Use a good anti-virus, beware of free downloads, Block all Auto-runs, the "Administrator" should only access known safe websites and files, and Think before you click.

1) Use a good anti-virus

The most popular anti-virus programs are Norton, AVG and Kaspersky. They are all good with varying degrees of annoyance. Windows even comes with built in anti-virus software by default. Some reports downplay its value, but it is better than nothing. Pick one and keep it updated. The prices are nominal, certainly less than a tank of gas for your favorite ride. Norton Internet Security (NIS) can be downloaded for free from Comcast if you have Comcast as your ISP. NIS does have some features that can slow down a computer. More on setup later to restrict interfering features. Make sure there is only one anti-virus running. AVG is available as a free download, but the weekly pop-ups pitching a free trial of something can be annoying. I've never tried Kaspersky so can't comment on it. I use NIS on my laptops for the better free firewall and AVG on my desktop computers.

2) Beware of free downloads

There are many useful downloads on the Internet. Unfortunately, many downloads include unwanted extra software and some exist solely to pass on a computer virus. A clean download is usually harder to find on the page than the downloads that include unwanted software. Watch carefully as you download and install, as many require you to proactively decline the additional payload. Always try to download software add-ons from the originator's web page.

3) Block all Autoruns (Win 10 on Right)
Also called Autoplay. When you plug in a USB device or insert a CD or DVD, Windows assumes you want to run or play whatever is there and



automatically tries to do so. This is how the Stuxnet virus propagated to destroy Iranian centrifuges in 2007.

To disable Windows autoruns, Click Start, Type autorun in the **Search programs and files** box. As you start to type you will see an entry for Autoplay. Click Autoplay to check or change your settings. For Windows 8.1 and Windows 10, shown above, move the slider to the off position. For Windows 7, uncheck the box to Use AutoPlay... to disable Autoplay completely and click Save. A more serviceable and just as safe improvement, but more difficult to describe in detail or setup would be to leave AutoPlay enabled and select the equivalent of "Ask me" for all of the choices.

4) Disable emails from automatically opening attachments

Windows frequently assumes you want to open any email attachments when you open an email. This is how many ransomware viruses get in. Ransomware is malware that blocks access to your data files until you pay the ransom with bitcoins. Some email programs ask before opening. This will be a subject for a future issue.

5) You, the Administrator should only access known safe websites and files When you first set up windows, you, the primary user are designated an administrator. You and any software running on your behalf has access to nearly everything. Set up a limited user account and use it to explore any areas or attachments you aren't 100% confident in. It wouldn't be a bad idea to open all email and email attachments from the limited user account. This can get cumbersome, but will usually stop malware that gets past antivirus software. To add a user, go to the search box and type user and then click on User Accounts. Make the new user a Limited Account. I give it a silly name to make it easy to tell which is which.

6) Think before you click

Many bad computer things happen from clicking without thinking or understanding. If you think you have a virus or other malware or have lost or unintentionally deleted files or you think your computer is being compromised, shut it off immediately and get it to a professional.
