

# Under the Hood by Kevin Jewell



In past articles, we have discussed the various advantages of supercharging vs. turbocharging. We also examined the newest Volvo offering that comes with a supercharger for the quick low end punch to be replaced by the turbo once the turbo boost spools up. In this way, they hope to eliminate the dreaded turbo lag that detracts from the performance of some

(many?) turbo engines. I now understand that the Volvo supercharger has an

electromagnetic clutch between the belt drive and the supercharger rotors. All superchargers have some internal drag that takes horsepower to turn the supercharger even when no boost is needed. In the Volvo unit, the clutch decouples the supercharger rotors when cruising. When the car computer senses the need for more power, the computer engages the clutch and the rotors immediately start spinning, providing boost that helps with performance. The belt drive is still spinning some shafts and clutch parts, so there are still some parasitic losses even when no boost is required. The clutch should eliminate a significant part of the losses, which will result in better fuel economy in nonboost conditions. I am still trying to understand why we aren't seeing electric motor driven superchargers where the computer would instantly start the electric motor when boost was needed. It seems to me that this would eliminate even more of the parasitic losses. After all, our newer cars have almost all switched to electrically assisted power steering instead of a hydraulic pump operated off the belt drive; all in the guest for better fuel economy. With today's computers, I could imagine that an electrically powered air pump (all superchargers/turbochargers are basically just air pumps) could accomplish the low speed instantaneous and higher speed boost conditions better than any other option. I understand that Eaton and a few other companies are working on an electric version so stay tuned for future developments.

We recently parked the C7 next to a Subaru WRX, and noted the similarity of exhaust. Both cars have 4 rather massive exhaust tips protruding from the back. Exhaust overkill? I certainly think so. The WRX has a 2.0 liter, 250 hp engine compared to the C7 with a 6.2 liter, 460 hp engine. If the WRX really needed 4 exhaust tips, then shouldn't the C7 be entitled to 7 tips based upon the relative horsepower, or 12 exhaust tips based upon engine displacement? See where this is going? I remember when actual dual exhaust indicated a performance engine. Now, is seems every car, even non-performance versions, are shown with multiple tips, or huge trapezoidal tips. It strikes me as somewhat funny when I see the much smaller round real exhaust pipe behind that huge trapezoidal tip. Obviously, this is style over function. About 20 years ago, Judy bought a Cadillac STS sedan, with the "hot" Northstar V8 engine. A single, rather large, exhaust pipe fed into a single catalytic converter and then split into two mufflers and then split again into 4 exhaust tips. When you start with one pipe, it doesn't really matter how many tips you have; you still have the backpressure of that single pipe. When I was in high school, I worked at a full-service car wash/service station. In the shop bay we had a gas welder. My co-worker owned a 1953 Studebaker low boy V8. He proceeded to install headers and then a full 4 pipe, 4 muffler exhaust system exiting at the rear with 4 tips. Walt was very proud of his "real" 4 exhaust tips, and I do remember that it had a distinct sound. I guess Walt was just years ahead of his time. Now before you beat up on me, I do recognize that the dual mode exhaust available with the C6 and C7 makes the 4 pipes at least somewhat understandable, but do the tips need to be that large? Certainly, the actual pipes right behind those tips are only a fraction of the cross-section area of the tips. Again, style over function. My parting thought on this subject. About 3 years ago, our son's friend had Flyin' Miata in Colorado convert his prized early generation Miata with a Corvette LS3 engine/6 speed. He specifically had them install a single exhaust tip coming out the back, so it looked more like a stock Miata. Talk about a sleeper.

# Computer Corner - Malware by Bill Roberts



Editor Note: Bill is a CMCS member and the owner of cleardata-forensics: Web Site <a href="https://www.cleardata-forensics.com">www.cleardata-forensics.com</a>. He is your go-to guy for your computer repair needs.

The word malware was created as a contraction of malicious software. Malware comes in many shapes, including spyware, keyloggers, viruses, and ransomware, to name a few.

Ransomware is an especially nasty program that works its way

into your computer, encrypting your data and demanding payment in bitcoins. It typically is delivered via email opportunistically as a shipping notice from a delivery company or a document involving a business transaction. The worst variant is delivered from a compromised computer belonging to a trusted sender.

The best way to avoid most forms of malware is to be certain the email and attachments are really from the indicated sender. Configure your email to never automatically download attachments. Never open an attachment directly from an email; always download attachments for examination and opening with your usual program. Configure your PDF reader and Office software, such as Word and Excel to not automatically run scripts or macros.

As in most forms of security, the most effective is also the most taxing. A two pronged approach to avoiding malware is best: Keep daily backups. There should be multiple archived editions to reduce the probability of restoring infected files. All backups should be stored off site, or at least off-line because some forms of malware

seek out and destroy data anywhere within the local network. The second prong is to avoid introducing malware to the computer.

Although in the past malware arrived on USB stick drives or digital picture frames, today's more common entry path is through email or the Internet. Nearly all of us receive some sort of junk email. But, what about an email from a friend with an inviting attachment or an email from a vendor with an attachment labeled "Invoice"? I receive many emails claiming to be from a bank, asking me to log into my account. Before downloading any email attachments or clicking on any links in an email, be certain you know who it is really from. But how? See the examples below. Starting with Figure 1, notice my email program is set to block anything from being automatically downloaded, an absolute must for email security. The first hint it is a phishing attempt is the email is addressed to "Undisclosed recipients". Next, the sender's address is obviously not Bank of America and has probably been spoofed anyway. Some emails or readers may not show the sender's address though. Looking at Figure 2, notice I have allowed the authentic looking logo to be downloaded. Then hover, but do not click, over the link to "Bank of America" and you will see where that link will really take you. Some email programs might require a right click. The www.coxburkhart.com website has been hacked. It was disabled by the server service sometime between 12/16/16 and 1/12/17. Cox Burkhart is/was a clothing shopping service in Los Angeles.

Note to anyone with a website: Clear your browser cache and look at your website regularly so at least you will know when you need to fix things.



The above examples were taken using the Outlook component of Microsoft Office as a mail reader. The next two are from a browser looking at a hotmail.com email account also sometimes called Outlook, a confusing choice of name.

Here is another clue to watch for. The email in Figure 3 originated in the UK. Most two letter domains are foreign countries.

If you are wondering where the email about your long lost money came from, check out

and search for the country associated with the last two letters in the sender's address.

In the next example, you have to hover over the sender's name to see that the email is probably not worth reading. If you want to block this sender you need to block sc40@cox.net, not Mary Ado.

Activities discussed were the Ski Trip to Stevens Pass starting from Northgate, a Tour of McChord AFB in March, a Club Championship Autocross in April, and the Annual Club Awards Banquet and Officer Installation dinner in March. John presented the slate of names running for Board Officer Positions. It was moved and passed to waive the 1 year membership requirement

for eligibility to run for a board position. The Club jacket discussion was tabled for another time.

40 LAPS AGO: February '77. The monthly Club membership meeting took place during the Annual Wet Weekend outing at the Beachwood Resort at Copalis Beach. Forty-five members were in attendance. Voted into full membership were Nick Gutheim, Mick Kion, and Mike Herington. Upcoming Club Activities discussed were this month's Chinatown Tour, the Seattle Mardi

Gras, and a Northwest Rod and Speed Show at the Kingdome. Scheduled for March were a tour of the UW Observatory, a Progressive Dinner, and the Annual Awards Banquet at the Edgewater Inn in Seattle. Newsletter editor Rob Anderson noted he will do a centerfold of a Club member's Corvette if he receives a picture and a history of the Vette and the owner. WWSCC (Western Washington Sports Car Council) noted Acme Hardware was looking to share expenses with the Club in hosting an autocross. This was set to be discussed further at the next Club Board Officers meeting. A motion was passed to pay the Club insurance. The Annual Corvette & High Performance Meet took place at the Western Washington Fairgrounds in Puyallup two days in February. The 22nd Wet Weekend outing took place at Port Ludlow.

20 LAPS AGO: February '97. Jim & Linda Micus' 1988 White 35th Anniversary Coupe was the featured Corvette on the newsletter cover. In May the Club planned to caravan to Sequim to participate in the Sequim Irrigation Festival Parade. Also in May was the Annual Western Corvette Supply Show & Shine. An overnight caravan and tour to Victoria BC was in the planning stages. Barbara Jackson reported on the Club's new Adopt-A-Highway program that was scheduled to start in March. The topic of Club insurance was brought up to ensure coverage was in place prior to the highway program's beginning. 


