Under the Hood by Kevin Jewell



In 1831 Michael Faraday published his research on electromagnetic induction, a basic principal in electric motors. Just like Elon Musk appropriated Nikola Tesla's name for his automobile, so did some investors appropriate Faraday when they named their Tesla competitor "Faraday Future". Faraday Future made quite the splash when they jointly announced

with the State of Nevada the construction of a \$1 Billion, 3 million square feet, factory near Las Vegas to produce the latest electric automobile. Nevada has pledged \$335 million in tax breaks and infrastructure improvements. I wonder if the Nevada officials should have talked to Ireland about helping to finance upstart auto manufacturers? The last was a snide reference about Ireland left holding the bag after the DeLorean auto fiasco. Construction of the Faraday Future plant was entrusted to AECOM, one of the world largest design-build contractors. In late November, the plant construction was "temporarily" halted so that Faraday could concentrate on having their cutting-edge vehicle ready for the Consumer Electronics Show in January. Note that we don't release new cars at the LA (or Chicago) Auto Show, but rather a consumer electronics show? Faraday Future is financed by a Chinese billionaire who might be having some growing pains. We should watch how this develops over the next year. Speaking of electric vehicles, Tesla once again missed its own production forecasts. Earlier in 2016 Tesla had forecast 100,000 vehicle production for 2016. About 6 months ago, we discussed how they were already way behind their own forecasts, and Tesla then reduced their forecast to 80-90,000. The final tally for 2016 was 76,230. A February Seattle Times article indicates that Tesla plans to shut down the Freemont, CA factory for a short period to ready the plant for Model 3 production to start near the end of 2017. The article further reports that Tesla claims it will be ramping up production so that it will be producing 500,000 vehicles in 2018. With all the missed forecast, missed starting dates, missed pricing promises, I have serious doubts about the 500,000 vehicles in 2018, with only 2017 to ramp up from the 76,000 produced in 2016.

Locally, more automotive bad news. LeMay's America's Car Museum in Tacoma (Page 3) has sued the City of Tacoma and its bank over the handling of a \$36 million federal loan used to finance the museum's construction. The museum opened in 2012. The dispute involves allegations that the bank mishandled interest payback and the suit was filed to keep the loan from being in default. We sincerely hope that they can resolve the matter and the museum prosper. If you haven't visited the museum, you should put it on your rainy Sunday list of things to do. The museum houses 3 floors of exhibits with a

significant part of the main floor hosting a constantly changing automotive scene. The last time I visited with an out of town guest, the main floor exhibit was split between older trucks and BMW. Both were well presented and worth the visit. At one end of a lower floor, they have driving simulators. Don't try to compare these simulators to your X-Box console. After one visit I did some research and found that the simulators cost about \$70,000 each.

We lost another automotive icon in October with the passing of Brock Yates. Brock was a long-time editor of Car & Driver. However, he was probably best known as the creator of the Cannonball Run, a full banzai run (maybe not PC?) from New York City to Los Angeles. Brock and Dan Gurney won the first year co-driving a Ferrari 365 GTB/4 making the run in just under 36 hours. The Cannonball was repeated several times from 1971-79. While they were not critically acclaimed, the Cannonball inspired the movies Gumball Rally (1976) and Cannonball Run (1981). In later years, there were some publicized reports of blatant cheating. One entrant had two identical cars and an airplane ride in the middle of the Run. I had thought that the highest speed car wouldn't necessarily be the best entrant as you can't drive 150 mph cross country consistently, but you can try to minimize stops. My favorite entry was a full size van (remember this was the 1970's) with 3 drivers, a porta-potty, mini kitchen, sleeping accommodations, and a large extra fuel tank. They even changed drivers on the fly. They didn't win, but they were creative.

F1 (Formula 1) continues to lose audience. In the last decade, the sport has lost over a third of the audience. F1 has never been as big in the USA as it is in other parts of the world. For the past couple of years, the Circuit of Americas in Austin, Texas has hosted the only USA F1 race. The cost to the City is so high that there is speculation that F1 will leave Austin. I like most forms of auto racing (or any racing powered by some form of engine), but I find F1 to be a bit boring. The driver that is ahead at the first turn usually wins the race. Qualify on the pole, drag race your opponent to the first turn, and about 2 hours later you will be on the podium. F1 has also gotten so expensive for all the teams. In a recent photo of a F1 pit stop, I counted 22 crew members around the car, three at each wheel just to handle the tires. A few years ago, the Speed Channel was devoted to all sorts of racing, and on a rainy weekend, I could often be found buried in the latest race. Have you ever watched swamp buggy racing, where we have a boat like hull with four huge diameter paddle tires? When the swamp buggy spins up the engine the car/boat rises on the tires like a hydroplane and throws rooster tails of water as it races across the swamp. One of my favorites was the jet sprint boat racing. In this sport a small flat bottom boat, generally powered by big block auto engine, travels on a man-made water channel track very like an autocross. The driver even has a navigator on board who helps the driver determine which way to run the course. Oh, how I miss Speed Channel.

Computer Corner - Filtering Email by Bill Roberts



Editor Note: Bill is a CMCS member and the owner of cleardata-forensics: Web Site <u>www.cleardata-forensics.com</u>. He is your go-to guy for your computer repair needs.

Email filters are a good way to keep spam at bay and organize your email inbox at the same time. Some web based email systems abilities range from blocking a limited number of senders to sorting

incoming emails into different folders. Email programs such as Microsoft Office Outlook can handle a complex decision tree to sort incoming email while deleting incoming mail from known spam sources.

Each email server and email program is set up differently, but before showing some of the steps, we need to clarify the use of the "Outlook" name. Microsoft in what appears to be a bid for obfuscation (more in a later issue) has chosen the

name Outlook for both their server or web based email and the email component of Microsoft Office. It is important to distinguish which you have.

In the following two figures, pay attention to where the word "Outlook" appears. **Figure 1** shows what hotmail.com looks like in a Firefox browser. MSN.com, live.com, and outlook.com will look similar as will other browsers. **Figure 2** shows what Microsoft Office Outlook 7 looks like.


These are all web based email systems, but should also be accessible with an email program such as Microsoft Office Outlook or Thunderbird. The first list of choices in outlook.com, MSN.com, hotmail.com, and live.com is reached by right clicking an email. Then you will see many choices including "Mark as junk" and "Create rule...".

A second menu of choices is accessed by clicking on the gear icon near the top right corner of the page and then the word Options. A bar will open on the left. Under the Junk email heading you will see access to sub-menus for Blocked senders, Safe Mailing lists, Safe senders, and Filters and reporting. Senders are blocked by entering the email address. Some entire domains can also be blocked. To exit and return to your inbox, click the left arrow next to the word Options near the top left corner.

Gmail

Gmail filters are accessed by clicking on the gear icon near the top of the page and then the word Settings. Then click on the tab about the middle called Filters and Blocked Addresses.

This page will allow you to create email filters and/or block senders. Click on Create a new filter. **Figure 3** shows how a filter would look to eliminate spam purporting to be from myself.



Click on Create filter with this search and choose what you want done with it on the next page.

Microsoft Office Outlook

Microsoft Office Outlook allows even more comprehensive filters. The following example is taken from Microsoft Office Outlook 2007. Other versions may alter the approach. Although you can right click a message and create a rule for that message, more comprehensive filters are accessed by clicking Tools at the top of the screen and then Rules and Alerts. I find it easiest to click on New Rule, then Check messages when they arrive as shown in **Figure 4**.



A lengthy list of choices pops up. Check the desired box(es). If multiple boxes are checked, Outlook will look for emails that satisfy both conditions. Each underlined blue entry is an invitation to enter one or more terms to include. Subsequent choices include what to do with the email and then

optional exceptions. **Figure 5** shows how I would filter out emails falsely claiming to be from me. Again, any underlined blue terms are an invitation to click on the blue term and expand the list of words to be included.

National Corvette Museum News

Museum Commemorates Sinkhole's Third Anniversary With 1962 Corvette Restoration

Three years ago, on February 12, 2014, viewers tuning in to their morning news witnessed and heard an almost unbelievable story - a sinkhole had opened inside the National Corvette Museum in Bowling Green, Kentucky, and eight Corvettes fell victim... lying at the bottom of the more than 30 foot deep gaping hole.

Fortunately, the cars and building were the only things damaged as it occurred in the early morning hours before anyone was in the Museum. The story captivated those who watched it, and while the Museum initially planned to put the past behind them, the interest in the sinkhole and damaged Corvettes was undeniable.



On Thursday, February 9 the 1962 Corvette, still covered in dirt and debris from the sinkhole, was removed from display in the

Sky dome and transferred to a garage bay where it will undergo restoration work to bring it back, better than ever. The on-going work will be performed in the Museum, and guests will be able to see the car's progress, oftentimes as it is happening. In addition to visiting the Museum to witness first-hand the work being performed on the Corvette, enthusiasts can tune in to Facebook and YouTube where a number of videos will be published by the Museum, providing updates and progress reports.

Magnetic Phone Mount for C7 Vettes By Alton Loe

I found a nice way to mount my cell phone in my C7. The mount I got is a Scosche MagicMount. I bought a two-pack from Costco. It has a suction cup on the bottom that mounts on any flat (non-porous) surface. The product comes with two flat

metal plates that the magnet will use to hold your phone securely.

I found a flat spot on the grab handle where I could attach the suction cup. You will want to clean off the spot where you want to attach the suction cup. The product comes with a cover on the bottom of the suction cup that you peel off before mounting it to the grab handle.

I have an iPhone 6s Plus (the big one) with a case. I popped off its case and put the larger of the two metal plates inside.

The photo on the left shows the mount on the grab handle.





I was a bit worried at first about the phone blocking the fan control knob, but that is no problem. Just take the phone off and put it back on when you are done. The magnet is so strong it practically pulls the phone from your hand when you get the back of the phone close.

I have a USB cable coming out of my center console that I plug into the phone so that the Apple Car Play works. The phone does not interfere with my shifting as it is to the right of my hand when going into 7th.



This is a very secure way to mount your

phone, and it is so much better than trying to reach into your pocket to get at it

Addendum to Alton's Phone Mount Article Above by Oran Petersen

Our Club radios are a great communication tool for our tours and other activities, but finding a place to put them in the car where they are handy and secure has always been a problem for me. We usually have water or coffee cups in the cup holders, the visors on the C7 are too thick to clip to, and placing it on the console usually gives you an opportunity to try to locate it under or behind a seat at the next stop. Alton's mount system solves that problem, especially since I never use the cell phone in my moving car and it remains clipped to my belt most of the time.



I did just as Alton suggests above. I mounted the larger plate on the back of the radio. However, our new Baofeng club radios have a small ridge on the back, so that the sticky backing on the plate can't make good contact, and may come loose. I cut about a 2 inch length of *Scotch Extreme Mounting Tape* (1 inch wide) and cut that into 2 strips 1/2 inch wide. These mount outside the ridges. Put another fitted piece in the center between the ridges if you wish. This is the same tape used for the CMCS license plate shields. Make sure you put the plate above the charging contacts for the radio.

I also installed the small plate on my (small) cell phone, so when not needing the radio I can use the mount for the phone, making it easy for Dee to reach; and to plug in a charging cable.

The Costco package includes two mounts and a dual USB charger with glow-ports, shown here inserted into the open power port on the console under the radio. It is nice because I can close the port with the charger inserted, making it handy but out of the way.
