#### Cover Car - Ken Huebner's 2016 ROCKETSHIP



I took delivery of my 2016 Long Beach Red Metallic Z51, 7 speed manual with a Spice Red Design Package at the National Corvette Museum on July 12, 2016.

In a word.....a ROCKETSHIP.

I highly recommend taking delivery at Bowling Green. You are treated like a rock star.

My love/hate Corvette journey began in 1970 after 4 years active service in the U.S. Army.

My Dad & I went car shopping with ~\$4000 money I had saved in the service. I found a

real 1966 Cobra 427 canvas top NO sides at a small Ford dealer in little Bellevue for \$5500 but Dad would not co-sign for the difference and said I needed something more drivable for college. What would that car be worth today.

So I settled for a low mileage 1967 Lynndale Blue Corvette small block with a removable hardtop. That 1-owner, \$3500 car was with me for the next 20+ years. In the late 1970's I joined NCRS & became a National Judge on the 1965/66 team and received a top flight 98 plus point rating on my 1967, driving it to the National meets at Bend, Bowling Green, Reno, Boston, Missouri, Colorado and Monterey.

At Danvers, Massachusetts my original, untouched, unrestored 1967 Corvette received the prestigious further most driven, top flight 100% functional original Corvette award, presented by Zora Arkus Duntov. I had this car until the early 90's when I was offered too much money for it so it went down the road.

Meanwhile a series of Corvettes went through my hands including a '67 Marina Blue coupe, a Lynndale Blue coupe, then a Elkhart Blue roadster, a '65 Glen Green coupe and a '63 split window fuelie that cost me \$4000 (it needed a battery). Old time Corvette people will remember my '63 Grand Sport Coupe that I did some SCCA racing in. Sold both. What are they worth today!

Get the picture? The mid-year '63 to '67 (rubber axle) cars were cheap in the 70's & the solid axle cars were almost give away prices. I recall back then nobody wanted the 68/69 model years.

Forgot to mention how many wrecked/totaled Corvettes I bought & parted out.

Along the way I had a new 1986 roadster, Dark Red Metallic, Saddle interior & top, 4 plus 3 manual, a real lemon. It had major electrical issues the week I bought it. I had it towed. The steel block with aluminum head engine went bad within 500 miles. It was "fixed" by GM. The convertible top ripped twice. Finally to my delight, this Corvette & I parted ways before 1 year of ownership.

Next was my 2007 Monterey Red Metallic Z51 roadster with a manual transmission. A fine automobile (a magnet for tickets). I had it until my middle/old age crisis for a new baby, the Rocketship.

All told my 2016 Stingray seems to be the best of the lot, and is more than enough car for this old car guy.

Prez Sez

I would like to start this month with a big thank you to the members that set up and ran the Flight Museum event. **Candy Turi, Harvey Hawks** and **Jim McDonnell** did a great job with the caravan to the museum, the tour of the

museum and the overall arrangements of a complicated event. They got and deserved rave reviews. Final attendance was 53, after 2 that canceled for illness.

The main topic this month concerns the CMCS Web Site improvement plans. Web Sites in general are complex and expensive. Our site also makes extensive use of programming that makes it even more complex. But much of it is old technology and out of date for content, some of which is difficult to change.

The trick is to make many needed fixes and improvements without breaking the treasury and taking 2 years to get it done.

At the June board meeting I made a presentation of possible fixes using some tools that are available, more nimble and give us more flexibility for change than we now have. I can do much of the work myself with this solution, keeping costs down. We continue to investigate other solutions. I am evaluating one now that is targeted towards small clubs, is quite powerful and can combine several or our independent functions into one common tool. We can do most of the work ourselves. I am spending time "learning" it now, but I do not claim to be a Web designer or developer.

We do not seem to have an experienced Web developer in the club that is willing and able to make changes to benefit the club at affordable costs. If you can step up, please let me know.

One issue I am fixing right away is trauma with our multiple calendar and activity lists. We presently have an upcoming activity list and a calendar in each newsletter. We also have the Web calendar, which is independent of those. Each must be linked and synchronized manually so as to not present conflicting information. This takes too much time and is error prone, as a number of members have recently pointed out. The solution is to go to a single source, repeated both in the newsletter and on the Web for your convenience. This single source is the newsletter activity list.

In this July issue, notice that the Activity List has a "snapshot" calendar at the top of each month. You can instantly see which days have meetings, socials, parades, autocross, shows etc. on this calendar. Immediately below we list each activity, similar to earlier lists, to give additional basic details of each. Many have a link to a flyer in the newsletter or to the CMCS Web Site. Non-CMCS activities often have a link directly to the event on the Web Site of the source organization. The three-month calendar page near the back of each newsletter is gone.

We now upload this Activity List from the newsletter into the downloads area of our Web and add a link to it. So you see the same information (same file) in either place.

The list will be updated on the Web as needed during the month, but the newsletter version will be frozen for that issue. We need to retain the same content in both the online and printed versions. The banner for the list shows

the date of the last change. The web version will often be more current than the newsletter version, as in the past. The banner date displays the status. So use the Web list for the most current information. We update only critical information between newsletters. Items such as incorrect date and time, canceled events, etc. that cause members time and trauma if not corrected on a timely basis. Go to the CMCS Web Site Events > Flyers and Forms > Activities to see the most current information.

The actual Web calendar, which is hard to maintain, will eventually show only what <u>day</u> basic CMCS events, such as meetings, shows and tours are scheduled. For details you go to the flyer for the event, or to the activity list which directs you to the flyer as appropriate.

Another change for July and on is the presentation of our **Saturday Socials at the Plum**. They now show only in the snapshot calendars in the activity list. Each calendar has a link to the flyer for the socials. The flyer now also lists the Saturdays that <u>do not</u> have a social formally scheduled. This saves space, solves management issues and informs you which Saturdays <u>do not</u> have a social.

We also have plans to again present photos on our site. The obsolete Silverlight program no longer allows this, so we are looking at alternatives. Stay tuned.

Much more is going on with the CMCS site. Expect an update status report in each newsletter until we get it stabilized and updated.

On another topic, see the <u>CMCS General Meeting Synopsis & RSVP List</u> (page 16). Be sure to RSVP as soon as you can to make it easier for the event coordinators to manage their event. If you cannot remember if you did an RSVP, do it again to be safe. We can eliminate the redundancy in our records.

# Corvette Museum Celebrates 225 Years of Transportation in Kentucky

This year Kentucky celebrates a milestone anniversary - it has been 225 years since its admittance as a state into the Union. Originally a part of Virginia, "the Kentucky County" became the 15th state on June 1, 1792. To celebrate, the National Corvette Museum is hosting a special exhibit, 'Kentucky: 225 Years on the Move' opening August 28, 2017 and running through Spring, 2018.



The exhibit will trace the history of transportation in Kentucky, featuring artifacts like the Mammoth Cave stagecoach, numerous bicycles from the Kentucky Wheelmen, and Louisville & Nashville Railroad archive items.


"The exhibit breaks history down into three 75-year increments and we highlight transportation on land, air and water," said Derek Moore, Curator for the National Corvette Museum. "This tractor represents the role of the family farm, which continues to be a backbone of rural Kentucky today."

# Under the Hood

## Smooth/Un-smooth Running "V" Engines

Think about your Corvette engine when you have your foot to the floor and the engine is turning 5,000 rpms (revolutions per minute). An internal combustion engine is basically just a series of small explosions of gasoline and oxygen that occur to push the piston down in the cylinder

to ultimately provide a rotational force that is transmitted to the tires. Since this is a 4 stoke engine, each cylinder fires every other revolution, so each cylinder is firing 2500 times per minute, or about 42 times per second. When you consider that you have an 8 cylinder engine, that means that there are about 340 mini explosions per second in the engine. It makes one wonder why the engine doesn't simply have a major explosion and self-destruct. The engineers have spent a lot of time trying to balance those mini explosions. I will use some examples for demonstration.

In one of my first jobs, I drove a company-owned International Scout. International had a very nice, smooth running 304 ci V8. For the Scout, they simply cut the V8 in half and provided a 152 ci 4 cylinder engine, which was very un-smooth running. At the time, they weren't using balance shafts, and that engine vibrated so badly that the vehicle developed some serious rattles.

After the two gas crunches of the 1970's, General Motors produced a V6 engine by cutting off two cylinders from the standard Chevy V8. Although the Chevy inline 6 cylinder engine was a smooth running engine, this initial Chevy V6 was not very smooth. Why the difference? Although there are 3 main sources of engine balance, much of the theory of engine balance can be related to the engine configuration, and to the angle of the V in the case of a V oriented engine. In a 4 stoke engine there is a firing pulse every other rotation or every 720 degrees of rotation. There is a simple formula, 720 degrees/number of cylinders = Ideal V angle. Using that formula shows why almost every V8 engine has a 90 degree angle between the two sides of the engine. The 90 degree orientation provides the smoothest running engine for a V8.

An ideal V6 engine would have an angle of 120 degrees, but this isn't as practical for packaging reasons, so most V6 engines have a 60 degree angle, half of the ideal 120 degrees. The original GM V6 engine retained the V8 angle of 90 degrees and as a result required additional measures to

try to smooth the out-of-balance forces. With their latest 3.6 liter DOHC V6 engine used thru out the line-up, GM designed a more balanced 60 degree angle between the V's.

Some of us autocross with the Viper club. When Dodge developed their V10 engine for trucks and the Viper, they added 2 cylinders to their standard 90 degree V8. By this same formula the ideal angle for the V10 would have been 72 degrees. This is partly why the Viper V10 has almost a "tractor like sound". Note that the Lexus LFA supercar featured a 72 degree, V10 which was referenced as "even firing". From an engineering standpoint, the original GM V6 should have been a 60 degree engine and the Viper should have been 72 degrees. However, it was less expensive in both examples to use an existing V8 engine and either remove or add 2 cylinders.

All automotive design has compromises, and the engine V angle is a prime example of compromise. Some compromises work better than others. There are some very smooth running 90 degree angle V6 engines. However, the engineers use added on measures to smooth out the forces, rather than relying on the basic layout. One method is to add a balance shaft. Did you realize that the balance shaft they use is actually an unbalanced shaft? The purpose is to create a counter-balance motion that smooths out the inherent un-balance in the basic engine.

### **Ownership Costs**

Do you cringe whenever you take your Corvette in for routine service because of the cost? Take heart. I recently reviewed an invoice for an oil change in a late model Porsche 911 Turbo. The car takes 9 quarts of Mobil One 0-40 weight oil. With the \$35 oil filter and the \$235 labor charge the total bill was over \$420; just for an oil change.

The average amount financed for new vehicles continues to increase to record highs. Not only are the amounts increasing, but so are the payment terms. Over 30% of new car loans now have terms longer than 72 months. Even in the used car market, we are now seeing almost 20% of auto loans with terms longer than 72 months. There is little chance that most of these loans will ever be paid off. The combined value of all existing auto loans exceeded \$1 trillion by the end of 2016. The same Seattle Times article reports that the average new vehicle loan payment is up to \$506/month.

Which car company has invested over \$7 billion in the last 22 years in a modern factory in the USA? This company now claims to be the largest (by dollar volume) exporter of cars made in the USA. If you guessed

BMW, you are correct. Their plant in South Carolina is the only plant in the world that produces BMW's SUV type vehicles and they are exported around the world. This plant is churning out 1400 vehicles/day. More and more, we are finding that the auto business is truly a world business.

## Passage - Vic Edelbrock, Jr

Another automotive icon passed away June 9 from complications from a cold. Vic Edelbrock, Jr took over the family business in 1962 at the age of 26 when his father passed away. Vic, Jr grew the business dramatically. Although they still had a big business in cylinder heads, camshafts, manifolds and carburetors, in the modern Corvette world they were leaders in supercharger packages. For about 10 years I served on a national industry board with Fred, Vic's brother-in-law. Fred knew I was a "car guy" and he would tease me with his and Vic's exploits. Vic would often take his parts display semi-truck to national outings and would ship a couple of cars as well. Then he and Fred would each drive a rod or Corvette at Hot Rod Power Tour and other such events. Of course, this was all business PR for Vic. Although he was not present in 2016, Vic was generally at the July 4th vintage races at Pacific Raceway with his 1963 Corvette Z06. Vic had two daughters that also often raced with him driving Shelby GT350s. RIP Vic.

**50 LAPS AGO: July '67.** President Maureen Morse got the monthly meeting started at the Hyatt House in Seattle after a buffet dinner served by the pool. Bob Redwing became the latest inductee into CMCS bringing the number to 65. Ene-liis Arrowsmith has tickets for the Underground Tour at \$1 each, a trip to the Blue Banjo was included with the deal. The South Sound Race and Rally Club became the newest

club joining WWSCC. John R. Thomas introduced Rick Sexton, representative from Alan Green Chevrolet, our sponsor, who introduces Ron West and John Cole from the newly formed Pace Setters Camaro Club. They were seeking guidance as to setting up their new club's structure. A no-host bar was to be set up prior to the start of the USRRC race. Rick also brought some samples of the new Corvette interior. Jerry Patten, chairperson for the Corvette Cove at PRI for the USRRC Race

needed volunteers. Alan Green will provide a keg, free tickets to PRI volunteers. Carl Mollnow's club patches had been held up but were expected by race day.

40 LAPS AGO: July '77. The monthly meeting took place at the Black Angus in Bellevue and was called to order by President Len Hodges. Membership climbed to 121 with 4 prospective members voted into full membership: Joe & Valerie Oaks, and Bruce & Connie Schlehuber. Club activities included a Skagit River tour, NWACC (Northwest Association of Corvette Clubs) Autocross in Tacoma, and two WWSCC (Western Washington Sports Car Council) autocrosses in Kent. The Club was asked to provide 12 Corvettes for the White Center parade. Inquiries were made about a Club photographer or historian. Carl & Kimi Rabun were moving, leaving a Board position open. The Club Constitution was discussed pertaining to a prospective member qualifying prior to becoming eligible to be voted into full membership. The Board proposed a guideline that was to be voted on by the general membership at a later date. As the meeting was brought to a close John Sinnar showed home movies of the SIR, Westwood, and the PIR (Portland International Raceway) Trans Am races.
