## 2019 National Corvette Caravan Information

#### Caravan Registration Date Approaches

Registration opens in September, but you can get information in a number of ways: General information about the caravan may be found in this compilation of Frequently Asked

Questions http://www.corvettecaravan.com/faq/ provided by the National Corvette Museum and at http://www.corvettecaravan.com/. Questions may also be directed to Dennis Milliken, whose contact information is above.

The Pacific Northwest portion of the caravan will depart from prearranged locations with the main locations being Seattle and Portland areas. Departure will be the morning of August 22nd and plan to meet with other groups as we head to Bowling Green, arriving August 28th. We will have exciting events planned along the way with some already organized.

## Tentative schedule of events for the Pacific Northwest Corvette Caravan Day 1 - August 22nd

Leave Evergreen Chevrolet and meet in Tri-Cities for lunch at McCurley Chevrolet. Travel to Lewiston where we will have an evening event hosted by the Valley Corvette Club...

#### Day 2 - August 23rd

Leave Lewiston and travel Highway 12 to Lolo. Highway 12 is a great drive, especially in a Corvette! We will travel on I90 through Bozeman to Livingston, MT for our second night stay. Livingston is a town with a population less than 8000 and they are excited to have us stay in their town. We will have a no-host happy hour at the host hotel, Yellowstone Pioneer Lodge and maybe even an impromptu car show on Main Street.

#### Day 3 - August 24th

Leave Livingston and travel to Rapid City. This will be our longest driving day of the caravan at 458 miles but with the speed limit, it will go by fast! Right before Rapid City is Sturgis, so if you haven't been, it's a great place to visit before the final leg



into Rapid City. You also have the option to go to Mount Rushmore after getting checked in. The park is about 30 minutes south off the caravan path and has a lighting ceremony at 9:00 each evening. There is no charge to get into the park, but there is a cash or check only fee of \$11 to park.

#### Day 4 - August 25th

Leave Rapid City and travel to Sioux Falls. You have the option to drive to Mount Rushmore about 30 minutes south of Rapid City and catch up with the caravan later. We will be heading to Sioux Falls and there are a couple of options. One is to continue on I-90 or the second is to take scenic Highway 44 through Badlands National Park. When we arrive at



Sioux Falls, the North Central Focal, along with the Sioux Falls Corvette Club, will be sponsoring a catered barbecue dinner event at the Falls Park.

#### Day 5 - August 26th

Leave Sioux Falls and stage up outside of town with the North/South Dakota Group and travel to Wisconsin Dells, WI to meet up with the rest of the North Central Caravan at Chula Vista Resort. There are hot laps planned at Dells Raceway or



you can participate in the many activities at the resort. Included in your room rate are free appetizers and cocktails followed by a sit-down dinner.

## Under the Hood by Kevin Jewell



The latest ultimate street Porsche, the GT2RS (base price about \$295K) follows Porsche's practice of offering pricey options, which can easily add 40-50% to the base price. In this example, Porsche offers the Weissach package for \$31,000 that includes magnesium wheels, carbon fiber roof and even carbon fiber antiroll bars. The complete lightweight package reduces the weight

of the car by 40 pounds. Certainly, the lightweight wheels have the advantage of reducing un-sprung weight and reducing rolling inertia, but at about \$800/ pound, this package seems to be more about expanding Porsche's finances than increasing the vehicle's performance. You would get almost the same performance increase if the owner simply lost some weight. How many months of Weight Watchers could we buy for \$31,000? Danica Patrick is probably the best known of recent woman race car drivers. Danica is very petite and weighs about 110 lbs. In every race car the designers are always working to decrease the pounds that each horsepower needs to move. You can see that Danica would have an inherent advantage (assuming all other things being equal) over her heavier competitors. Danica has many detractors who claim that she didn't live up to all the hype. However, I think we should remember that the pyramid to the top of the race world is very steep and a very limited number of drivers can possibly reach the top. Just being very, very good is not enough. Some drivers excelled regardless of their weight. Dan Gurney was 6' 4" tall and probably weighed twice Danica's 110 lbs. Even with that disadvantage Dan was one of the most successful racers in all forms of racing. He won events at Indy, NASCAR, Le Mans and Formula 1. Some of the Ford GT40 race cars had a bump on the top, which was added to give Dan enough room for his helmet. In the later part of his career, Gurney built his own race cars, race engines and designed the Gurney flap which is used on the current Z06 Vette as the "wickerbill" on the rear wing. While Gurney wasn't known as a Corvette driver, one of his early victories was in sports car racing driving a 1957 Corvette fuelie. You probably know that Gurney passed early this year.

Do you wonder where we are going with our current horsepower race? When the C7 Z06 was introduced with 650 hp, I thought we had gone insane. The latest LT5 engine in the ZR1 is rated at 755 hp, and I am even more convinced we are going insane. By way of comparison the "ultimate" 1990 Corvette ZR1 debuted with a 4 cam/32 valve engine rated at 375 hp. This was approximately 50% more than the base Corvette. Then in 2001 the C5 Z06 debuted with 385 hp and that car finally got me off the fence to buy my first Corvette. Now my

2015 Z51 Corvette with "only" 460 hp and skinny tires, makes me feel like the 98 pound weakling at the beach getting sand kicked in my face. With the new ZR1, we have a 66% increase in horsepower compared to the base Corvette. The basic engine size is the same 6.2 liter V8 for the base car, Z06 and ZR1. The Z06 and ZR1 get the added hp from their supercharged boost pressure. The Z06 was designed for a 9.4 psi boost and the ZR1 enjoys 14 psi. For supercharged engines the ZR1 seems to be at the upper end of the boost pressure range, although there are many turbocharged engines running more than 14 psi boost. The ZR1 engine also features 16 fuel injectors. It has eight direct cylinder injectors like the other C7 engines, and eight additional intake port injectors that come on line during high horsepower demands. I understand that the ZR1 LT5 engine will not come with active fuel management which means it will run on eight working cylinders at all times. Somehow, I doubt that many ZR1 buyers are concerned whether active fuel management could save them 1 mpg during cruise. Will we find that the insurance companies put a high premium on the ZR1? We will have to wait until we start hearing from new ZR1 owners to know the story. However, I suspect that the insurance companies are not looking favorably to cars with excess of 500 hp, and this horsepower race will be hindered by insurance premiums.

I don't follow NASCAR as closely as some of our club members. From 2014-17, the Chevrolet entries were "based" upon the Chevy SS, an Australian built V8 powered rear wheel drive sedan. The actual real Chevy SS component amounted to a vinyl wrap on the front of the car that had SS in one corner. The rest of the race car had little resemblance to the actual Chevy SS sedan. However, that is true of all the NASCAR entries as the Fords and Toyotas are not remotely based upon what we can buy in the showroom. Now I am not a Toyota hater. The very first car Judy and I bought after we married was a Toyota that suffered years of spirited driving and served us faithfully for over 100K miles. That Toyota certainly proved the adage that it is more fun to drive a slow car fast, than to drive a fast car slow. Regardless, I have a hard time imagining a Toyota Camry race car with a thumping V8, and rear wheel drive. Toyota apparently did not get the same memo, as Toyota absolutely dominated the 2017 season with 16 major wins compared to Ford and Chevy with 10 wins each. It will be interesting to watch the 2018 season and see how Toyota fares. GM has closed the Australian manufacturing plant, so the Chevy SS is being replaced for the 2018 season with a Camaro ZL1. Again, I suspect the Camaro entry is more vinyl wrap than real Camaro. but that is NASCAR.



## Laps from the Past

**50 Laps Ago: August 1968.** President Bruce Kelly oversaw the monthly business meeting at the home of the Clarks. A modest profit was realized from the past Rally; expenses were less than expected. PRI practices had been arranged for the next month. Jeff Weymouth was handling publicity for the event. Carl Mollnow was working on gathering 39 trophies for the Rally. If profits allowed, the purchase of timing lights would take place. Larry Shirk took care of the tech inspections. Corner workers were still needed; contact

Dan Boemeke or Larry Hillard to volunteer. Frank Olsheski was to take care of timing and John R. Thomas to handle traffic control. A Halloween party was in the works for October, location had not been secured yet. A questionnaire for WWSCC was filled out and future dates and events for the coming year were

announced. The typewriter issue was tabled for further discussions. Wally Arrowsmith asked about the telephone committee and the program chair.

**40 Laps Ago: August 1978.** President Len Hodges opened the monthly meeting after the Club Beach Party and monthly meeting at Kayak Point Park in Marysville, where 32 Club members and friends attended. CMCS celebrated the Corvette's Silver Anniversary Ball at the Windjammer on Shilshole Bay and attended the 9th Vintage Corvette Enthusiasts Picnic at Rainbow Falls State Park. Other events throughout August included the "Island Weekend '78" at Nanaimo, BC, hosted by the Nanaimo Corvette Club, Spokane Corvette Club's 2nd Annual Convention at the Sheraton Hotel and Spokane Raceway, "Fun In The Sun" NWACC meet sponsored by the Hi Desert Corvette Club in Bend Oregon. Since the past 5 out of 8 official monthly meetings have not seen a quorum present, a mail-out ballet for a bylaw change has been sent out to all members for approval. There still existed the requirement for a 2/3 majority vote to carry a motion at a meeting, but this was expected to go a long way to having the meetings be official and legal with respect to dealing with quorum issues. CMCS obtained 1,000 "Would you like to meet other Corvette enthusiasts?" hand out cards. Each member was offered up to 10 free, or for purchase of \$2.50 for 100 of these cards. Window-Bumper Stickers "Road Race Drivers Do It Deeper And Come Out Harder", or, "Have You Hugged Your Car Today", were available for \$5 each; 6 or more for \$3each. Membership chair Melody Kahler requested the Club approve John & Penny Grosso, and Mr. & Mrs. Lee Johnson as honorary members, while voting in new members Conrad Engeness, Sally Christian, and Barb Kelly; all were approved (nothing mentioned in minutes concerning the total membership numbers- Ben).

**30** Laps Ago: August 1988. President Val Johansen held the monthly meeting during the annual Beach Party get-to-gether at the home of John R. Thomas on Vashon Island. No new members were voted in but a few 'prospective' members attended; present membership stood at 93. A new membership log was in the works and would be mailed out as soon as possible. Classical Glass held their sponsored Autocross/Concours in Tacoma while NCRS held its Western Regional Meet in Bend Oregon. Parades around the Sound were in Greenwood, Kent (English Leather Girls!!!), and Seafair. Oak Harbor Auto Center/Wallgreen Tire Center co-hosted an annual Car Show/Competition. Seattle Int'l Raceway (SIR) held its Super Chevy Sunday Bracket Racing and show classes. Anacortes Arts & Crafts and Corvette Show was hosted by Seaside Chevrolet. CMCS and NCRS planned to team up for the first time for their meet to be held at the Ste Michelle Winery in Woodinville in September event so this event would be historic for Our Club. CMCS would be celebrating its 25th Anniversary as well during this event.

**20 Laps Ago: August 1998.** Pavo McDonald's 1976 silver L48 automatic T-Top was featured on the cover of the monthly newsletter. President Ben Benninghoff

conducted the monthly meeting in the Upper Room at Seaview Chevrolet in Lynnwood. Two special guests were introduced: James Schefter, author of "All Corvettes Are Red" and from the National Corvette Museum in Bowling Green, Kentucky; Director Wendell Strode. Both joining us for CMCS's 9th Seaview Chevrolet's Show 'n Shine and driving activities throughout the weekend; club member Vince Perriello had a key part in the invites. Membership stood at 177. Other activities included tours to Mt. Saint Helens, Mukilteo Parade and following both, the 5th Annual Everett Aquasox Baseball game, Fast Women's tour, and the Wild West Vette Fest in West Yellowstone. Unfortunately, Ski Bacs was canceled due to low registration. Barbara Jackson came up with 55 raffle/door prizes for the Seaview show. NCRS toured to Sun Valley for its Regional meet. WCCC and Washington State residents won on House Bill HB1354 noting no emission tests would be required on 'collector cars'. Also, a 5-year pass was given on newer cars.

10 Laps Ago: August 2008. Bill & Margaret Barker's 1966 Sunfire Yellow Coupe graced the OYM newsletter cover. Bill wore out some shoe leather before finding his baby. He was hampered in obtaining the 'right one' to accommodate his 6' 3" frame and spent some time walking Highway 99 going through the specialty car lots and swap meets locally and in Oregon. Bill had been a member of the Vintage Chevrolet Club of America for the past 35 years, so this made sense to add a classic Corvette to his stable. A tour to the dealership was led by Dennis Montgomery from Canyon Park in Bothell, while Lorrie made the arrangements at the dealership. President Kevin Jewell presided at the monthly meeting held at Speedway Chevrolet in Monroe, which supplied pizza, salad, dessert, and drinks for the approximately 70 Club members attending. Kevin introduced Joe Harvey representing Speedway Chevrolet; Joe expressed his thanks for the great turnout and talked about the dealership's ability to meet club member's and other customer's needs in the very competitive automotive business. Joe then introduced Jonny Edwards, Service Adviser who was a graduate of the Shoreline Community College GM-ASEP program that we sponsor annually with scholarships from our Charity Committee (NOTE: donations to ASEP from the Club come from the monthly 50/50 drawing -Ben). Membership Chair Kayla Main introduced 3 prospective members who were voted into full membership-- Dean & Linda Anderson, and Chris Minich, bringing the total to 280. Activities Chair Cheryal Heppner reported on all the scheduled Club activities, while Dennis reviewed the 4th Annual Corvette Show 'n Shine at the XXX Drive-In in Issaguah where an estimated 200 Corvettes showed up; the entry fees were split up and donated to several charities. Jane Armstrong discussed the following month's Seattle In September (SIS) 3-day event, noting that 160 were registered to date. Gary Main announced there was a JP Patches and Gertrude statue unveiling in Freemont; sidekick Gertrude was club member Robert "Fabuls" Newman. Charity Chair Marty Cameron noted

there was a need for volunteers to help serve meals at the Ronald McDonald House in Seattle next month for their Brownie Brigade" event. Marty also mentioned she had a list of items needing to be boxed and shipped to the troops overseas, and needed volunteers to help. Wes Holmes reported that the National Corvette Museum (NCM) in Bowling Green Kentucky will receive 1 cent in donations for each Internet-search that goes to: goodsearch.com and enter: "National Corvette Museum in the box that says "who do you goodsearch for?" \For those who purchase items on-line through "GoodShop" at the same site, a small percentage of expenditures will be donated to the NCM. Jim McDonnell reported on several parades members participated in, and the one scheduled in October for Issaquah, where all will enjoy a delightful lunch at the Newcastle Golf Club. Not only will a great lunch be enjoyed, but all will meet at the Krispy Crème Donuts to stage for the parade. There were then currently 20 open slots for Corvettes for the parade (but with a "dream" event like this they might get 200- Ben!)

**5 Laps Ago: August 2013.** The Club's 50th Anniversary Logo was featured on the OYM newsletter cover. The monthly meeting took place at the Black Diamond Bakery, Black Diamond, WA. President Stan Trask encouraged all in attendance to sign up for the 50th Anniversary Celebration. VP Lorrie Montgomery reminded the membership she had 3 UHF radios on hand for sale at \$200 each. Al & Susie Larpenteur were voted into full membership bringing the total to 245. Upcoming Club activities included the NWACC event at Portland International Raceway, the 500 Corvettes at the Puyallup Fairgrounds coinciding with a new exhibit of Corvettes at the LeMay Museum. The Seattle Times had a representative visit the Club's last Board meeting and interviewed members about the 60th anniversary (LeMay Museum); the article was to be published in the near future. The XXX Drive-Inn event for the All Corvettes Burger Bash was scheduled on August 25th. Next month's activities were to include the semi-annual Vettes for Vets, a Wine Tour to Prosser, a dinner & General membership meeting at Slider's Café in Carnation, and, the 18th Annual All Corvettes Show in Shine show in Birch Bay Square, Blaine, WA. sponsored by Corvettes Unlimited. The Club Thanksgiving Pot Luck & Auction event was scheduled for November 9th at St. Luke's Lutheran Church in Bellevue, while the Christmas Party was set for December 21st. Al Dager, newsletter editor was looking for someone to train as the newsletter back-up; the Club was to buy the software for the person interested. Parade Chair Jim McDonnell noted there were as many as 3 parades every weekend in July. The Club provided 21 Corvettes for the Torchlight parade. Thomas and Steve Yabroff spoke on the 2014 NCM Corvette Caravan that was scheduled to leave Club sponsor Lee Johnson Chevrolet dealership in Kirkland Friday, August 22, 2014. A Special Appreciation was recognized for Gary Rozmierski and Fran Bedard for 1.5 years of service. Dennis Montgomery updated and published "Tour Tips" in the newsletter for all members awareness of what to do and not do when traveling in caravan to/from events; required reading! Dennis also wrote another article concerning CMCS Radio Tips.






## July Picnic - Event Report

# Did You Know - Heating Water in a Microwave Oven by Kayla Main



Most everyone heats water in the microwave. But how many of you place a stir stick (plastic or wooden) in the cup or container while heating water? If you don't, read on for the safety reason why you should. You all know that when you heat water to a certain point it will boil. The bubbling is because the molecules are moving fast and crazy from the heating. The hydrogen and oxygen are splitting. They don't have a place to latch on because the side of the cup or dish is a very slick surface. But since they have no place to latch

Play it SAFE! There have been some bad burns from this lack of knowledge. If still in doubt, check the instructions of the microwave.
