This photo reveals for the first time the <u>real</u> C8 Corvette to be released later this year, caught taking a test drive on a secret test track. The photos of the thinly disguised Mazdas released earlier effectively distracted the media to help keep the real model a secret. GM decided to go "Retro" with the C8, and revert the car to its earlier smaller open-air sports-car-fun concept. The spoked wheels and highly tuned suspension system are carried over from the C7. (The baseline yellow color will be popular with many CMCS Club members). The high CG allows the mid-engine to be located under the seats.



Under the Hood by Kevin Jewell



For many years the conventional wisdom in the collector car market was that many buyers were purchasing cars that they lusted over during their high school/college years. Consequently, there was a theory that you could tell the approximate age of the buyer by adding 20 to the age of the collector car. This theory has been used to explain why a

pristine Model A Ford can be purchased for extremely reasonable money, as there are few buyers. Another example is the 2 seat Thunderbirds, which have been declining in value for the past decade, compared to the later muscle cars. As a side note, Corvettes seems to be defying this trend, at least somewhat. In the collector car auction market this trend has made many owners of the 50s and 60s classics unwilling to test the markets. As a result, auction sales are down, or flat, and the auction houses are finding the ratio of completed sales declining. Auction houses are reporting that the younger buyers are more willing to buy cars from the 60s to 80s, although at lower prices. They are also apparently looking for cars they can drive down a canyon at 8:00 on a Saturday morning rather than an object to put on display. Frankly, I find this to be a welcome change. The auction house Sotheby's is branching out to counter the decline in car auction returns. Sotheby's will be holding more than 30 online only auctions in the coming year. Sotheby's has also announced a partnership with the San Francisco based ifonly.com, which is touted as an experience marketplace, as compared to an object marketplace. Recently, a 2 1/2 hour sail with the America's Cup champion sold for \$9,375 at a Sotheby's auction. Expect to see more "experience sales" at future Sotheby's events. Although I have never owned an early Corvette, like many of us I am a fan of the C2 generation, and routinely watch the auction results. The Mecum fall auction showed a 72% sold rate. A 67 small block convertible was sold at \$115,000 and a 63 split window coupe at \$110K. For those interested in the C1 model, Mecum sold a 57 for \$85K and a 61 for \$77.5K. Again, I think we find these prices to be down a bit from previous auctions.

Judy and I made our first trip to Europe about 20 years ago, and have returned several times. I have always marveled at the difference in fuel choices. Traditionally in Europe, diesel fuel was significantly less expensive than gasoline and as a result more than 50% of the cars were diesel powered. On a trip to Ireland in 2013, four of us rented a small Citroen van powered by a 1.6 liter diesel/5 speed manual. The Citroen provided a leisurely pace, but we used only two tanks of fuel circumnavigating the entire coast of Ireland. This diesel preference was so pronounced, that many Europeans would talk about the backwards Americans who had yet to embrace the diesel. You can blame the VW

diesel scandal for a major change in attitude. After VW was exposed as cheating on emissions, the Europeans discovered that other manufacturers were also guilty of fudging the emission numbers, although perhaps not nearly as badly as VW. So, the pendulum is rapidly swinging in the other direction. Several of the larger European cities have announced that diesel vehicles will be banned in the downtown areas by 2025. Gasoline powered vehicles increased to 49% of all vehicle sales in the first half of 2017, the highest ratio in 8 years. Although pure electric vehicles in the same period amounted to only 4% of sales, the European manufacturers are all ramping up plans for all electric fleets, including all electric mini-buses capable of carrying a dozen or more people. The youth in Europe appear to be in sync with their North American counterparts in their lack of interest in driving. The United Kingdom licensing authority has reported a 6.2% decline in the number of under 24 year-olds with full licenses in the past 5 years. Closer to home, a 2017 Univ. of Michigan study of 2011 drivers indicted that only 79% of people between the ages of 20 & 24 had a driver's license. This compared with 93% in 1983. This was a comparison of 2011 drivers; I can only imagine that the numbers are much worse today. Now if I was a younger person living in New York City, it is possible I wouldn't have a license, but with 21% of that age group not having a license, that leaves a lot of people outside of NYC not driving.

We all know that Chevrolet beat Ford to the punch in introducing a "sporty car" to the public in 1953. There is some speculation that Ford was working on a sporty car starting in 1951, but the car manufacturing pipeline can be very long and it wasn't until Feb, 1954 when Ford introduced the Thunderbird at the Detroit Auto Show. Although Chevrolet was promoting the Corvette as a sports car more akin to the MGs and Jaguars of the time, Ford decided that the T-Bird would be a personal luxury car. Personal luxury car was a moniker that we would hear about models from every manufacturer for the next few decades. While the Corvette only had the 150 hp Blue Flame 6 in the first two years, in 1955 you could order your Vette with a 265 ci, 195 hp V8. The 1955 T-Bird was introduced with Ford's 292 ci, 198 hp V8. The T-Bird was far more luxurious than the Vette. By 1957 you could even order your T-Bird with a memory seat that automatically moved backwards for exit and then forward when you inserted the key, and even automatic windshield washers. These sound more like our current Vette features. With the introduction of the 1955 T-Bird the sales battle was on, and Ford was the big winner. In 1955, T-Bird out sold Corvette 23:1. T-Bird continued to outsell the Vette by a large margin through the T-Bird two seat era. One can even argue that Ford's T-Bird forced the needed changes in the Corvette, such things as roll up windows and other creature comforts. By 1957, the horsepower race was on between the two. Corvette had the optional 283 ci, 283 hp fuel injected engine, and T-Bird could be ordered with a 312 ci, 300 hp, supercharged V8. However, by 1957 many T-Birds came optionally equipped

with fender skirts, continental tire kits and power options galore. Not quite what we expect from a performance car. Many enthusiasts criticized Ford when they made the 1958 T-Bird a larger 4 seat personal luxury car. However, the buyers proved Ford was correct. There were about 38,000 1958 T-Birds produced compared to 21,000 of the 1957 model. It was obvious Corvette was going for the sporty buyer and T-Bird was cruising for the country club set. When I was in college, my friend Carl's family had two drag cars. The first was a 1954 Vette, which still had the six, but the triple carbs had been replaced with a large 4-barrel (which required a fiberglass blister in the hood) and a shift kit for the Powerglide. Carl drove the Vette often and the performance was only reasonable. Then one day, Carl brought their 1957 Ford Fairlane drag car to show off. While not a T-Bird, the Fairlane sported the T-Bird 312 ci with a tunnel ram intake, two 4barrel carbs, headers and a cam that was barely streetable. He used a can of ether to get the engine started. When that engine fired, it literally shook the ground. You can guess which car made the biggest impression on this young college student.

Laps from the Past

50 Laps Ago: February 1968: President Maureen Morse presided over the Board Meeting held at her home *(minutes from the general meeting are not in the histories- Ben).* Treasurer reported the club was solvent with a positive balance of \$92.12...whoops; a late bill needs to be paid for the WWSCC (Western Washington Sports Car Council) \$10 annual dues bringing the coffers down to \$82.12. New

Board Officer Installations were to take place next month at the Concord Room at the Benjamin Franklin Hotel. Max McKibbon, from the Columbia Corvette Club, was the guest speaker. Mr. & Mrs. Alan Green, our main sponsors, were invited to attend. Mo Morse read a list of sixteen activities the Club did last year. John Thomas read a list of Club equipment on hand and later added item costs. Wally Arrowsmith read another list from the telephone committee of those who contacted the club by phone to advise the membership of club sponsored events. The club did not have a perpetual up to-date membership roster. Mo brought up that the club needed a better printer and offered to look for one.

40 Laps Ago: February 1978: President Len Hodges started the meeting at the annual Wet Weekend outing at Rosario's Resort Hotel. New club members were Fred & Tina Mables and Doug Wagner. Note in the newsletter: "Ron Pierce's stolen Corvette was 'found' 3 weeks later in Seattle with light damage to the body. KIRO's TV/Telethon "Tour 'n Pizza" and a \$3 "promo night tour 1st Ave/Skid Road outing" highlighted the club's monthly activities. CMCS would celebrate its 15th Anniversary in 1978, as Corvette put out a special 25th Anniversary model, designated as the "B2Z" version with special additions and a two-tone exterior paint scheme. A quorum was not present at the general membership meeting so voting for new Board Members for 1978 did not take place.

30 Laps Ago: February 1988: President Jay Cockrum started the monthly meeting at Julio Murphy's. Club membership stood at 110. The 23rd Annual Wet Weekend, held at The Resort at Port Ludlow, and the Puyallup Corvette & High-Performance Meet highlighted the club's activities. WWSCC dues increased to \$25 annually. The club recognized the need for more tours and activities. NWACC (Northwest Association of Corvette Clubs) dues needed to be paid to continue insurance coverage. The Treasurer and President needed to put together a report for the IRS. The club fiscal year ended in February. (Note: The club fiscal year actually ended, and now does end, each March 31st per IRS records. This misunderstanding was corrected in 1994. The club was under the gross income requiring filing in those years, and did not need to file IRS 990 forms.)

20 Laps Ago: February 1998: Bob & Cyndi Robinson's 1972 Dark Sapphire blue metallic Stingray coupe, LT-1, M21 4-speed, was featured on the newsletter cover. President Ben Benninghoff started the monthly meeting at Izzy's Italian Buffet and Restaurant in Federal Way. The annual Wet Weekend took place at Alderbrook Inn Resort on Hood Canal. Kayla's Krazy Kontest revolved around creative sculpturing automotive tools and items that included duct tape, Q-tips, paper clips, a toothbrush, and a rock, with as many rubber bands as one could gather. Membership stood at 168 with several prospective members dropping by during the general meeting to check us out.

10 Laps Ago: February 2008. Ken & Jean Fiorentino's 2007 Arctic White coupe with Monterey Red and Victory Silver accent graphics on the front fenders of their Ron Fellows ALMS GT1 Champion Corvette Z06, was featured on the OYM Newsletter cover. There were only 399 Corvettes built to celebrate the Ron Fellows racing team's accomplishments. Since joining CMCS in February of 2006, the Fiorentino's have had 3 of their Corvettes featured on OYM newsletter covers, including a red one in May 2006 and a yellow one in May 2007. They have been members of several Corvette clubs over the years and have moved no less than 22 times from 1969. Perhaps we can convince them to stay with us a while. President Kevin Jewell called the meeting to order after an early morning breakfast at the Old Country Buffet in Factoria. Kevin announced that the Board agreed to recommend the annual dues remain unchanged. He shared a study of other club dues. Ours remained on the low side of the norm. VP Wayne Kanaby announced that he had club UHF radios for sale at club functions. Bill Farren & son David were voted into full membership, bringing the total to 316. McMenamins' The Edgefield Manor, at Troutdale Oregon was the setting for the 43rd Annual Wet Weekend outing. Lois Kanaby was the host for the event and had a very interesting agenda during the 3-day getaway. The theme was "Academy Awards" so those attending wore their best Hollywood star outfits and walked the Red Carpet on Saturday evening. Kevin reminded all to make reservations for the upcoming March Annual Awards and Board Officer Installation Banquet at the Best Western River's Edge Restaurant in Tukwila. David Ormerod noted that he was the activity chair for the 75th Anniversary of our sponsor Lee Johnson Chevrolet in late May, with a Show and Shine slated for June 1st. Mike & Jane Armstrong reminded all that this year's Seattle in September V (SIS V) was scheduled at the Best Western River's Edge in Tukwila in September. Members wishing to help support this event were welcome to attend meetings in the months to come. The new slate of members running for Board positions was announced and ballots were mailed. (They were counted at Wet Weekend.)

<u>5 Laps Ago:</u> February 2013: Craig & Candy Turi's 2006 Monterey Red convertible was the featured Corvette on the newsletter cover. Craig noted they found each other on April Fool's Day, 2008, both being auto-nuts but from

totally different aspects of the hobby. While Craig has owned more than 50 cars and trucks over the years, even owning a 1962 Corvette in 1968 But he never really fully enjoyed the "Corvette Experience" until Candy came along. Candy comes from a long line of 'active' car clubs including the now defunct Seattle Jeep Club, where she was the club newsletter editor (no Oran, she's not campaigning to be the CMCS newsletter editor). Her next club experience was with the Greater Seattle Studebaker Club, then the Puget Sound Avanti Owners Association. Looks like they saved the best for last (CMCS). The Club held the general meeting at the Plum Delicious Restaurant in Renton with President Stan Trask presiding. Lorrie Montgomery reported she had Club UHF radios to sell at \$209 each. They have been re-programed with the new club frequency (Oran Petersen noted he would re-program member radios as needed). Ron Bundy was voted into full membership, bringing the total to 253. Ken Jones talked about the swap meet at the Puyallup Fair Grounds and the CMCS hosted valve cover races. The annual Wet Weekend took place at the Ocean Shores Polynesian Hotel. Other Club activity saw the Club attending the Tacoma Corvette Club annual event in Auburn. Tim Cox spoke on the Big Sky event, held in Missoula, Montana that year over Memorial Day weekend; activities included an autocross, a show & shine, a poker run and more. Lorrie announced Officer nominations by the Board. Two more were nominated from the floor. Ballots were mailed out. They were counted at Wet Weekend. Billi Trask needed baby items for the Eastside Baby Corner. Carol Feveryear had Club apparel, and cling decals for 75 cents each. Jim McDonnell reported on the start of the Parade season. The first was LaConner on April 13. Paccar held their open house on the same day. Torchlight again asked CMCS to participate. John Thomas received a thank you letter from the State of Washington for our Adopt-A-Highway clean-up participation. SIS 2014 (Seattle In September) was tabled (and later canceled). Lorrie reminded all of the Club about the 50th Anniversary celebration taking place at the Bear Creek Country Club on August 17th. The Annual XXX Show & Shine was scheduled for August 25th.

National Corvette Museum Report

2018 Model Year Corvette Statistics: It's remarkable that here in February of 2018, the shortest month of the year, the final build statistics in what was one of the shortest model years (2018) was released by the National Corvette Museum. A total of 9,686 Corvettes were produced with production starting June 5, 2017 and ending January 28, 2018. The plant was down for three months, making the 2018 model year approximately a mere 5 months long. Here's how the options for 2018 panned

out: 39.3% Stingrays; 31.8% Grand Sport; 28.9% Z06.

17.5% of Corvettes built were convertibles.

Automatic transmissions outsold manuals once again at 78%.

The 1LT package was most popular for Stingray Coupes, while the 2LT was the top pick for Stingray Convertibles and Grand Sports. The 3LZ was again the most popular for Z06 models.

Almost 30% of Z06s opted for the Z07 performance package.

Arctic White once again topped the list as most popular color, and for the first time in several years - when you add the two 'reds' together, they don't beat out white (just barely though)! However the two combined "grays" (Watkins Glen Gray, Ceramic Matrix Gray) total a whopping 22.8%.

Here's how the percentages panned out, in order of popularity:

Arctic White - 20.3%	Black - 16.3%
Torch Red - 14%	Watkins Glen Gray - 11.5%
Ceramic Matrix Gray - 11.3%	Admiral Blue - 7.3%
Long Beach Red - 6.2%	Blade Silver - 5.9%
Corvette Racing Yellow - 4.1%	Black Rose - 2.3%
Sebring Orange8%	

Deliveries of Corvettes were 89% U.S., 6% Canada; 3.5% Europe; and the remaining 1.5% to Mexico, Japan and the Mideast. The Museum delivered 88 Corvettes through the R8C Delivery program.

2017 was an exciting year at the National Corvette Museum: with new exhibits, vintage Corvette rides, go-karts and even Corvettes to drive! The National Corvette Museum and NCM Motorsports Park welcomed new attractions and even more new visitors for 2017. At the track, attendance was 60,840, while at the Museum attendance was 228,744. This is the third consecutive year of increased attendance for the Bowling Green, Kentucky attractions.

In addition to opening an exhibit celebrating Kentucky's 225th anniversary as a state with the story of transportation through the years, visitors were transported back in time with rides in vintage Corvettes. Guests choose from a selection of Museum owned vehicles, with past choices including a 1966 Convertible 327, 1979 Coupe, 1996 Convertible, and 2003 50th Anniversary Convertible. The rides are offered seasonally and weather dependent, Monday through Saturday, 10am-3pm, and are \$20 per person.

At the NCM Motorsports Park, high speed attractions were added to give visitors opportunities to get behind the wheel themselves. The NCM Kartplex opened over the summer, offering high-speed go-karts that for \$20 a session, guests can engage in a little friendly competition. The only requirements are a minimum height of 60" (or drivers' license) and closed toe shoes.

For those yearning to drive America's Sports Car, the track offers a selection of new Stingrays, both automatic and manual, that can be taken for a few laps, or driven as part of an in-depth Corvette Experience. The Corvette Experience combines classroom time and on-track instruction, lunch and a guided Museum VIP tour.

"Visitors love hands-on experiences, so we were thrilled to be able to add several to our repertoire," said Museum Executive Director Wendell Strode. "The success of our 2017 additions led to us adding a racing simulator at the Museum for 2018. It has already proved to be quite popular, so we are excited to offer it to guests".

The new racing simulator puts drivers of any age in the cockpit and behind the wheel of a C6 Corvette. The simulator moves and vibrates much like a real car, providing a life-like experience and is \$10 per session.

Admission to the Museum is \$10 for adults, \$5 for kids age 5-12, and children age 4 and under are free. The Museum is open daily, 8am-5pm CT with trip planning information available at corvettemuseum.org. Admission to the NCM Motorsports Park is free (with the exception of select major events) and activity prices vary. Visit the track's website at motorsportspark.org for a calendar of upcoming events and registration.


