Happy New Year to everyone, Donna and I joined CMCS in January of 2001. We had just purchased a 2001 Corvette convertible. Our first Corvette was a 1967 red coupe with a black hood scoop, 427 cubic inch, 390 HP, 4 speed, with only 4200 miles. We purchased it for \$3500 in April of 1967. Less than two years later we sold the car as our 2nd child was on the way and we needed more room. Sure wished we could have put the car in storage for forty years.

Thirty two years later we purchased our 2nd Corvette, a

2001,triple black 6-speed convertible. It felt good to be back in a Corvette again. Donna has driven in most parades since 2001. I was working in Alaska, so Donna had our grandkids and girl friends ride with her during parades and weekend outings. In 2003 we drove to Bowling Green and Nashville for the 50th Corvette anniversary party. That was a great trip, 6400 miles.

We both liked the C7 Corvette. In 2015 we saw the Z06 convertible. That was the one we wanted. So on January 18, 2016 we placed our factory order. Eight days later we got confirmation that factory had put the build order into their



system. On April 1st the dealership let us know the car was arriving at the site later in the day, at least four weeks sooner than expected, so our 3rd Corvette is a Z06 3LZ convertible, 7 speed, Arctic White exterior with black wheels and black interior. Both of us really enjoy driving this car. We hope to continue doing parades, wet weekends and summer tours & events. And we might try autocross.

### New 2019 Corvette ZR1 Convertible Debuts

Last Month I reported on the debut of the new 2019 Corvette ZR1 and now the NCM news reports Chevrolet dropped the top on the 2019 Corvette ZR1 with the global introduction of the ZR1 convertible, the first ZR1 drop-top since the original 1970 model-year ZR1.

On sale next spring alongside the Corvette ZR1 coupe, the ZR1 convertible emphasizes Corvette's iconic proportions and functional sculpture,



highlighting the seamless transition between the exterior and interior. The ZR1 coupe will carry a suggested retail price of \$119,995, while the ZR1 convertible will start at \$123,995 (prices include destination charge, but exclude tax, title and other dealer fees).

"The new Corvette ZR1 convertible is a supercar in all respects," said Mark Reuss, executive vice president, Global Product Development, Purchasing and Supply Chain. "Few others can challenge the ZR1 convertible power and speed while offering the exhilaration of top-down motoring."

The performance and technology introduced on the Corvette ZR1 coupe carry over to the new ZR1 convertible. The strength of the Corvette's aluminum chassis means the only structural changes in the convertible are accommodations for the folding top and repositioned safety belt mounts. The power top can be operated remotely or while driving up to 30 mph. In fact, the curb weight difference between the ZR1 coupe and convertible is less than 60 pounds (27 kg), with most of the difference attributed to the folding top hardware.

The Convertible is equipped with the LT5 6.2L supercharged engine which generates an SAE-certified 755 horsepower (563 kW) and 715 lb-ft of torque (969 Nm). A seven-speed manual transmission and a ZR1-first paddle-shift eight-speed automatic transmission are offered with it. Preliminary testing has shown 0-60 mph in under 3.0 seconds and the quarter mile in the high 10-second range when the engine is equipped with the eight-speed automatic.

"The ZR1 convertible is a no-compromise supercar," said Corvette Executive Chief Engineer Tadge Juechter. "Thanks to the strong structure, the suspension tuning between coupe and convertible models is identical, meaning the ZR1 convertible offers the same benchmark performance, including a top speed of over 200 mph."

### Frank Olsheski Award - A CMCS Tradition

Why does The Corvette Marque Club of Seattle have a Frank Olsheski Award? Why is it presented at the annual Christmas party? Who in heck was Frank Olsheski?

There are and have been many CMCS members over the nearly 55 years the club has been in existence. Many, many of those have contributed so much of their time, abilities and knowledge to make the Corvette club what it is today.

For years, one of those who stood out was Frank Olsheski. He probably held every club office, board, and committee position, many, more than once. He organized, led and participated in events. His home was the official mailing address for CMCS. Frank promoted the club to Corvette owners wherever he went. He was a CMCS cheerleader.

On his personal side, Frank was raised in Seattle and attended UW, earning bachelor's and master's degrees. He lived in Bothell and rode his bicycle to work as an industrial arts teacher at Interlake High School. Mr. O, as he was known at school, was devoted to his career in education and was honored as the state's top industrial arts teacher.

With CMCS, one of his favorite things was being Santa at the CMCS Christmas parties. Members would earn, by their actions throughout the year, "gifts" that would be presented in the proper fashion from Santa's bag. The neat thing was that these were hand made. Frank was proud of his Polish heritage and the bag contents reflected it. John Paul Nelson III recalls one such item as being a long set of wires attached to a small battery on one end and a lighted earring on the other, probably because John was one of the first men in CMCS sporting an earring. Because she complained about the membership meeting dinners always starting late, Jan Cockrum remembers getting a small lunch box with a peanut butter and jelly sandwich. The stories go on and on.

Frank Olsheski was 41 when he passed away in 1984 from complications of cancer. Club members Neil and Noreen Millen donated a perpetual annual award to keep alive the memory of Frank's enthusiasm. Since he was Santa at Christmas, we dedicate the Frank Olsheski Award at the December meeting. It goes to a member who has given their time and energy for the betterment of the club.

### Under the Hood by Kevin Jewell



The C7 Corvette engine is rather archaic. Not just because it uses pushrods to actuate the valves rather than overhead cams (although some of that criticism is well deserved), but because it still uses pistons moving up and down to provide a rotational force to the wheels. At 6,000 rpms, each piston is changing direction 12,000 times per minute or 200 times per second. Each piston is also traveling over 60 feet per second in the cylinder bore. Every rotation of the engine has the piston

rapidly accelerating to its maximum speed, stopping, changing direction, and then rapidly accelerating again; one hundred times per second. Multiply that effort by eight, as we have eight-cylinder engines.

What if I was to tell you that there is a new engine that uses an eccentric device to convert pressure into direct rotation force without all that reciprocating action. This engine is more compact, smoother, far less complicated, and more powerful for its weight than the old-fashioned engine. Most of the major manufacturers are conducting testing of this new engine and many have paid big bucks for license rights. Wait a minute, this sounds a lot like the Wankel rotary engine, and all the buzz from 50 years ago. In the 1960's many thought the rotary engine would replace the reciprocating engine. NSU in Germany and Mazda in Japan were probably the two manufacturers that did the most with the rotary. Mazda produced the Cosmos Sport in 1967 with their first commercial rotary engine. Poor fuel economy, even by 1960's standards, relatively low torque and premature oil seal wear doomed the rotary. Even Mazda has stopped production of their RX 8 rotary powered sports car.

Fifty years ago, the Wankel rotary was predicted to revolutionize the auto industry. It seems every month or so, I read about another major proposed break through in engine design. Then months or years later, I realize that this latest and

greatest invention is no longer in the news. What is the lesson here? I suspect we should all be somewhat hesitant to believe that major changes are always right around the corner.

I think everyone would agree that the modern Corvette reciprocating engine is far superior to the original 1955 Chevy V8. The newer engine is more fuel efficient, develops more horsepower per cubic inch, and has much better longevity, while having much better environmental impacts. However, the basic design of the two engines is very similar. When will the basic engine design change? Who knows, but it didn't happen as predicted over 50 years ago. Nor many of the many other predictions in the following 50 years.

There used to be a natural hierarchy of performance vehicles, and Corvette was always at, or near, the top. That natural order has been changing over the years. One current example has Jeep putting the Dodge 707 horsepower engine in the Grand Cherokee. The Grand Cherokee is a heavy vehicle at about 5100 lbs. One measure of a vehicle's performance is the weight each horsepower needs to move. The Jeep has a lbs/hp ratio of about 7.21. The standard C7 Corvette at about 3300 lbs has a ratio of 7.17. Close enough that you might well find one of these Grand Cherokees beating our Vette in the stoplight drags. As the speed increases, the Vette should still come out the winner.

The Vette has a lower coefficient of drag than the Jeep. As the speed increases, aerodynamic drag increases with the square of velocity, so as the speed doubles, the drag increases by a factor of 4. With a lower drag coefficient, the Vette becomes more responsive to the available horsepower than the Jeep. You probably remember this from your bicycle days. When you doubled your speed from 10 mph to 20 mph, your pedaling effort increased about 4 times.

Our Vette fraternity still has the Z06 as our top gun. The Z06 is down 57 horsepower from this Jeep but with a weight of about 3500 lbs, the Z06 shows up for the challenge with a lbs:hp ratio of 5.40. That is more than adequate to put down most challengers.

We don't even need to talk about the new coming ZR1 as I don't think there is a domestic vehicle that could touch it. However, Chevy has thrown down the gauntlet, with the ZR1, so we will see what the competition does in response.

By the end of the 2017 production run, the total number of Corvettes produced in history now is close to 1.6 million. Further it is estimated that there are still 750,000 Corvettes still on the road. I suspect that there are a lot of garage queens in that number. The Corvette has been a halo car for Chevrolet and GM, and at those production numbers you would anticipate that the Corvette has also contributed to the corporate profits as well.

Another halo car has hit a major milestone. Porsche introduced the 911 in 1963, 10 years after the debut of the Corvette. Although Porsche had planned to drop the rear engine 911, the faithful were not happy, and the 911 survived. Porsche has now produced over 1 million 911 variants, and currently offers 22 varieties of the 911. Considering that Porsche has always been more expensive than the standard Corvette, the 1 million milestone is an awesome accomplishment.

# Laps from the Past

**50 Years Ago: January 1968.** President Maureen Morse called the meeting to order at the Pier 91 Officers Club in Seattle on the waterfront of Elliot Bay. Bruce Kelly went over the activities to include a tour of the Olympia Brewery and talked about next months "Cooks" Tour to Grayland. (For those in the club unaware, the "Cooks" Tour was the predecessor to what is known today as the Club's Wet Weekend- Ben). Rally wrap-ups were talked about with WWSCC (Western

Washington Sports Car Council). Alan Green was the host for the awards banquet with Senator Magnuson featured as speaker for the evening. Dues approved and sent to support the Western States Corvette Council (WSCC). The Board presented its list of suggested members to take over offices for 1968. John Thomas proposed the club look into building electronic timing devices to use at autocrosses for two cars at the same time. Discussions of costs and usage throughout the year went on to see if the costs warranted building, buying, or renting as the needs arise. Jim McLees became the first Club member voted into full membership for 1968. The Board Officers gathered at the Bridgeman's home. Dayle Torey declined his nomination for the Secretary Board position for 1968; Larry Shirk volunteered to take up the slot, subject to the votes of the members at large. Each committee chairman kept a record of what their committee did during the current year and submitted a written report at the end of the year. WWSCC did not accept our proposed 2 track dates for the coming year, so that needed further work. Concern of WWSCC organizing a central club house location to conduct business did not sit well with some CMCS members; a questionnaire was to go out for feedback. Cook's Tour to Grayland next month was in the planning stage, phone committee was to notify members to get a head count of those going. Carl Mollnow was looking into usage of the abandoned runway at Fort Lewis for future autocrosses.

**40 Years Ago: January 1978.** The 4th Avenue Meat/Fish and Beverage House in Seattle was the selected eating establishment for the monthly meeting and the evening festivities, both centering around the 3rd Annual Auction, conducted by President Len Hodges. The proceeds would be going to the Variety Club Telethon benefiting the Children's Hospital. The Board proposed to keep the annual dues to the current level. (In 1978 dues were as follows: New Single-\$30, New Couple- \$35, Single renewal- \$14, Couple renewal- \$15; -Ben). Roger Tenbrink, Gary Pullyblank, Ernie & Marlene Zellmer and Ralph Plumber all became new club members, bringing the total to 135. WWSCC held their annual banquet while NWACC held its first meeting at the Swap Meet in Chehalis; Joe Oaks volunteered to be the club's representative. Judy Artley headed up a committee for club constitutional changes. Wet Weekend was set for first weekend in February at Rosario's. The club sent out a thank you card to Pizza Hut for the donated pizzas; Club approved a \$25 donation to Pizza Hut and another for a \$75 rental fee to the Sons of Norway Hall for the post New Year's party. Another order for club jackets was going out soon; Dave Richards was the person to contact. A Silver Anniversary Corvette/Fifteenth Anniversary CMCS party was being planned sometime this summer.

**30 Years Ago: January 1988.** President Jay Cockrum got the monthly meeting started after dinner at the home of the Shelly's. There were 6 potential members joining the meeting. Treasurer noted we should be getting our tax-exempt status any time soon. Glenn Cunningham stepped up to take over the duties of club newsletter publisher. CMCS's 25th Anniversary party was forming up to take place in September.

**20 Years Ago: January 1998.** Steve & Robin Cassidy's 1973 Black Cherry Pearl Metallic Corvette coupe, with a monster 454 engine and an M21 transmission, graced the newsletter's cover. President Ben Benninghoff got the meeting started at the Shoreline Community College's Automotive (ASEP) training department, our first meeting there. Scott Main, club member and son of Gary & Kayla Main, was the head instructor for the GM line, where future Corvette mechanics may come from some day. CMCS started a scholarship fund to support a student needing financial assistance with their tuition. Those funds came from the profits of our annual School Daze event at Seattle International Raceway in Kent. At the end of the meeting Scott was presented a check for \$500 from CMCS for a student's financial needs; Scott was to select the student based upon criteria from Scott for the most deserving student. The club agreed to make this an annual event. Frank & Maureen DePuy, Steve & Miriam Frimer, and Bob & Jan Larsen all became new club members bringing the total to 158. There were 5 other prospective members attending as well. Jim Micus reported there were 20 signed up for Wet Weekend so far next month. Gary Main presented a 3-ring binder he put together for all to review that contained a myriad of "Stuff to do with your Corvette" topics. Jan Cockrum was heading up a committee for the Christmas Party for next December...never too early to secure a place. Cloyd was looking for pictures of member's Corvette for the newsletter's cover. Members were encouraged to get involved with this summer's "School Daze" outing, Sandra Green was the contact focal point.

**10 Years Ago: January 2008.** Molly & Dick Baker's 2006 Z06 Velocity Yellow coupe was featured on the OYM newsletter cover. Molly referred to Dick as her Motorman as he's happiest while in something going fast. With a previous 1998 Torch Red Corvette (owned now by John & Vicky Kingston), being a Harley driver putting over 75,000 miles on 7 different bikes, and, a project 1932 F\*\*d roadster he's trying to make into a car. Don't think too harshly of Dick for having a F\*\*d in his stable, at least he put a small block Chevy motor in it! President Kevin Jewell got the monthly meeting started at Alfy's Pizza in Lynnwood for an afternoon meeting. Kevin read a few thank you letters from some of the charities that CMCS contributed to. He thanked Tim Cox and Oran Petersen for the video they put together that played in the background during lunch. Wayne Kanaby stated that he still had club radios for sale. He then handed the microphone to each of the Board Officers to explain their duties to the club, so all in attendance thinking of running for office knew what officer responsibilities entailed. Mike Dail, Membership chair, introduced new members for approval; Marvin & Gayle Gotner, Michael Wilderman, Robert & Lois Renner, and Aaron & Jennifer Hastings were all approved, bringing the total to 314.
