Under the Hood by Kevin Jewell



We have all had dreams of winning a major lottery. Imagine that you just won the Powerball and after taxes had \$200 million left. Obviously, you have more than enough to feed and house your family, so you next look to what should you buy for your garage. Since you are now clearly part of the 1 percent, may I suggest that you consider a Bugatti Chiron. Although hardly inexpensive

at a base price of \$3 million, you would immediately join a very exclusive group as only 500 Chirons will be built in the next 7 years. Powered by a 16 cylinder engine with four massive turbochargers and putting out 1500 horsepower, it is

supposedly the fastest street legal car built in the world. For this price you also get a four year warranty and included routine service. Now, that routine service comment might sound like a joke, but I understand that an oil change service is priced at \$20,000. Now, to me we are starting to sound like we are joking. The special Michelin tires, which cost over \$5,000/each, still cannot handle the potential sustained top speed, so the Chiron is computer speed limited to the tire rating of 261 mph. The deluxe Accuton stereo has four tweeters, each with a one-carat diamond as part of the speaker mechanism. I used to worry about the replacement cost if I had a blown engine, but with the Chiron, I would also have to worry about over-powering the speakers. The interior leather comes from farms at high altitudes where there are no insects or barb wire to pierce the hides. You had better not climb into this car with that screw driver protruding from your back pocket. Perhaps you would rather use that \$3 million to buy 50 each \$60,000 vehicles and have a different car to drive each week. Tough decisions you 1 percent folks make.

Bugatti is not the only manufacturer to produce a car for the 1 percent. Way back in 1957 GM produced the Cadillac Eldorado Brougham. This Cadillac cost over \$13,000 which was the price of an upscale home and was approximately 3 times the cost of a "normal" Cadillac. Four hundred Broughams were built and each one came with a set of special shot glasses, Arpege perfume, and Fleetwood cigarettes. I anticipate Cadillac assumed that the buyer would be hoisting a smoky Scotch, while enjoying a fine cigarette, and the lady of the house dabbed on a little Arpege, on the way to the country club. Seems rather sexist in today's view. A 57 Eldorado Brougham is on display at the very private General Motors Heritage Center in Detroit. It is not generally open to the public and visitors often make reservations years in advance. The Heritage Center has 700 vehicles, and about 165 on display at any time. Today we have a lot of interest in electric vehicles, but GM had even built a 1966 Corvair with an enormous battery pack in the front trunk. Normally, a rear heavy car, this Corvair must have been very hard to steer with all those batteries located over the front axle. Did you know that Cadillac built the first mass production V8 engine, way back in 1915? The 1915 Caddy is also on display.

It seems with every new technology, some of the pundits will make fools of themselves in touting that new technology. I have no doubt that we are rapidly traveling towards an autonomous automobile future, at least in major cities, but I believe the pace will be far slower than many of the predictions. In September 2016 John Zimmer, the Lyft co-founder claimed "By 2025, private car ownership will all but end in major US cities". Really? You think all those city dwellers will just give up their 5 year old Malibu and not only commute with Lyft, Uber or

whoever, but also use one of these services for their vacations? Sergey Brin, Google co-founder, concluded in Sept, 2012 "You can count on one hand the number of years it will take before ordinary people can experience driverless cars". Obviously, ordinary people were not experiencing autonomous vehicles by 2017. With the recent deaths from autonomous vehicles, I expect it might be quite a while yet before the masses can join that elite fraternity. In past years, almost every death in a vehicle was attributed to driver error. Who, or what, will get the blame for fatalities with driverless vehicles? Again, I expect the liability issue will hold us back from the autonomous future as much as any other detriment. Have you ever glanced at the inside of vehicles parked at your local mall or store? How many were pig pens? Who is going to maintain these car pods? Do I call up a pod for my next trip and get a pod that is totally trashed or worse yet was the pod used to get home after the big party? Can I tell the pod service that this pod is not acceptable and to please send me a replacement pod immediately? Somehow, I doubt that I am going to get this choice. The pod service cannot try to accommodate everyone's varying idea of cleanliness, so I expect we will be told to take the next available pod or walk. Somehow, this does not sound like the great future that is promised. Does the pod idea sound a bit like Seattle's experiment with bicycles? We have broken down bikes littering streets all over Seattle. I know that I still mostly enjoy driving and will be one of the last to give up my private vehicle for some filthy pod. Realistically, I think I am safe, as I expect these fully driverless vehicles are still a long way off. The Popular Science and Popular Mechanics 1950-60 era Jetson flying cars for everyone were presented as a very real prediction back then, and how many of us commute to work with our personal aircraft?

Wheels - Removing Wheel Weight Goo by Steve Yabroff

Want to clean those old wheel weight stickies off your wheels?

How many times have you cleaned your beautiful Corvette, looked at the chrome or polished wheels and thought how nice those lovely fancy wheels would look if there weren't those black strips from the old wheel weights clinging to the wheel barrels?

I've tried many things and then stumbled on the solution. It stinks and shouldn't be used without really good ventilation, but it really works and is easy! And it will also remove tar quickly too. I'm not sure I would use it on any painted surface though.



OK, here it is. 3M Adhesive Cleaner. It comes in a spray can.

Spray the adhesive cleaner on the wheel weight tape residue and let it soak in for a moment. Then using a blue shop paper towel, gently rub the offending junk off the wheel. Follow up with a second application to remove any remaining sticky residue and your good to go. That's it.

Email Spoofing - Be Careful Out There!

Imagine living in a neighborhood frequented by unsavory characters. You hear a knock on the door and an unfamiliar voice identifies itself as Oran Petersen or another friend. Would you open the door without looking first? That is equivalent to what many, if not most, people do when they

open an email without verifying the sender.

Fortunately we don't live in scary neighborhoods, but some of us invite those people into our homes and finances by opening and replying to unverified emails. We have all received an email proclaiming the reader as the recipient of vast sums of money as soon as the import duties have been paid, or at least heard of the attempted scams. Now, the royalty from Nigeria are getting more sophisticated. Some slime balls are attempting to victimize CMCS members by spoofing a legitimate club member's name with the slime ball's return address.

Reminder: **Always hover over the sender's name to see the real sender's address**. That doesn't always work, in which case clicking *reply all* will open up a

reply email showing the real sender's address. Be sure to delete the reply instead of sending it. (Note from Oran: I "forward" these messages as necessary to see the "real" email address. There is less opportunity to accidentally send it by mistake, and you can also see the spoof info.)



Figure 1a is an email received by one of our members. A quick sender verification as shown in Figure 1b saved him from a \$300 scam. (Names have been changed to protect the innocent.)

Figure 2a is how another sender appeared in a spoof email to CMCSMember. CMCSMember then opened the door and replied to this innocuous request, giving the slime ball their real email address. If only they had hovered the cursor before replying they would have seen that the sender wasn't Oran, as shown in Figure 2b.



From Oran:

These attempts now occur several times a month, usually "from" a CMCS officer (myself or Ken Jones) or other member of authority. They are "to"

CMCS aliases, which are published, and designed to protect the "real" member email address. If you reply, they get your real one.

Never respond to money requests under any circumstances. These are all scams.

Some members have shown confusion between a "spoof" and a "hack". A **hack** happens when someone captures your password, and uses your real account for nefarious purposes. In a spoof, someone creates a a secondary account in their email system, and uses someone else's name as a "handle". If the handle has not been used, it is "good" in that system. Most systems allow these multiple accounts to support family members and others. They could also use a hacked account to further protect themselves from detection. "lorineuman3@aol.com" is most likely a hacked account being used by Mr Scumbag.

Laps from the Past

50 Laps Ago: September 1968. The monthly meeting was called to order by President Bruce Kelly at the BARB Restaurant in Burien. Minutes and Treasurer's report were given and John R. CMCS held another practice session at Seattle International Raceway (SIR: New name for PIR). Wendy Hodges moved the Club cover \$40 for insurance during the practice session, which was approved.

30 Laps Ago: September 1988. The monthly meeting gathered at the Ste. Michelle Winery in Woodinville where President Val Johansen had the rather difficult task of foregoing the evening's frolicking to conduct the Club's business at hand. Petty Cash was reported at \$35.25 instead of the normal \$50. NWACC noted an autocross sponsored by the Rose City Corvette Club, combined with a Rally and a Show 'n Shine. Maureen DePuy, Parade Chairperson, thanked all for their participation in the summer's parades throughout the Puget Sound. Barbara Jackson, standing in for Ruth Kelly, mentioned she had Seattle Seahawk tickets, and 4 Mariner tickets to 'give away'. Adopt-A-Highway hosted by Gary Main conducted another sweep of its assigned highway and as usual the volunteers came away with many "treasures." The topic of needed additional funds to support the newsletter increasing production costs became center stage and the Board agreed to look into the matter and report their findings at the next meeting. Any suggestions and/or support from the membership at large would be appreciated. Final notes from the meeting were: Barbara Jackson had two Boyds Buckets each with \$25 of products; Kayla Main reported the recent Fast Women's tour was a great success; Christie Madsen and Maureen DePuy were to plan the next Fast Women's tour; Gary Main spoke with Chris Olson regarding a Seaview/CMCS Show n Shine for next year where Chris said "Let's do it again!". CMCS Christmas Party was set for the General Petroleum Museum in Seattle; and lastly, Ben thanked Gary and Kayla Main for putting together the West Yellowstone tour to the Wild West Vette Fest.

10 Laps Ago: September 2008. Leslie & Doris Wagner's 1958 Red Roadster was featured on the OYM newsletter cover. Vice President David Ormerod got the monthly meeting started following a buffet at Chengdu Chinese Restaurant in Overlake Square in Bellevue. We had a dessert night at the Ronald McDonald house in Seattle, and a "packing session" to box up items to send to the troops overseas. Stan Trask announced that NCRS held its NW Regional Meet in Bend, OR at the Inn of the Seventh Mountain. He also mentioned that owners of 1993 or older Corvettes were now eligible to join NCRS.

Thomas reported on the upcoming 20th NCM, Corvette Caravan, August 27-30, 2014, to Bowling Green, Kentucky. There were 25 drivers signed up to start in Seattle. Steve Yabroff led the caravan from Lee Johnson Chevrolet in Kirkland. Annually, near Labor Day weekend, the museum celebrates the

1994 Grand Opening of the Museum with a participant focused event.

This year's 24th Anniversary milestone focuses on the diversity of the people that Corvettes attract, together with a look back at the Museum's history and forward to the future! The event runs from August 30th - September 1st. Since next year is the 25th Anniversary you know what this means - A Nationwide Caravan of Corvettes heading to Bowling Green, Kentucky. CMCS selected as one of two clubs to be featured in NCM "Enthusiast Exhibit": I recently was notified that our very own Corvette Marque Club of Seattle has been chosen as one of two Corvette Clubs (along with Indy Corvettes out of Indianapolis) to be featured in the "Enthusiast Exhibit" at the National Corvette Museum. Here is the notification I received from Stephanie Morrill, the Membership/Guest Services Manager at the NCM:

"We are so pleased to let you know that Corvette Marque Club of Seattle has been selected as one of our two Corvette Clubs featured in the enthusiast exhibit. I have copied Katie Ellison, Marketing and Communications Manager and Derek Moore, NCM Curator on this message. Katie will work with you on the wording and design of the display panels and Derek will work with you on the items to be displayed in the cases. As a reminder, I have included the dimensions and details below:

The chosen clubs will have the opportunity to be featured on a graphic board measuring 53" tall by 37" wide. This graphic will include printed information about the club, their location, history, memberships, pictures, activities, contact information, etc. All information must be approved by the NCM. In addition to the graphic board, the featured clubs will have a display case measuring 55" tall by 21" wide by 13" deep. Each case will have the capacity for three adjustable shelves. Club memorabilia will be approved by the NCM.

The display will go up at the end of August and will be in place for 1 year.

Corvette named the 'Most American' Car You Can Buy: Corvette has long had the nickname 'America's Sports Car' and according to the annual Kogod Made in America Auto Index, it is also the 'Most American' made vehicle. With a top score of 83.5 points, Corvette earned bragging rights by racking up the points within seven criteria including profit margin; labor; research and

development; inventory, capital and other expenses; engine; transmission; and body, chassis and electrical components. The research is conducted by the Center for Automotive Research to determine total domestic content. The index ranked 544 Vehicles and a total of 24 vehicles finished in the top 10 due to several tie scores, and several vehicle variants. Of those, General Motors had a total of seven vehicles in the top 10 including the Chevrolet Volt, Cadillac ATS, Chevrolet Camaro and GMC Acadia.
