A nice touch was a couple of stickers on the car showing the profile of Zora-Arkus Duntov, who was so instrumental in the development of the early Corvettes, and was a proponent of the mid-engine Corvette in the 60's. He couldn't get the support of the suits at GM since it was felt that the Corvette purists would never go for it and the idea was shelved, until now.

There are several ideas floating around regarding the significance of the 7.18.19 date. One has to do with the C-8's timed lap around the Nurburgring. 

Under the Hood

Last year at an English auction a 1957 BMW 507 was sold for almost \$5,000,000, twice the "going rate" for this model. In the years immediately following WWII, BMW was trying to reestablish itself as a motorcycle and auto manufacturer. They were encouraged by an American importer to produce a performance two-seat roadster, and the 507 was born. This model produced

from 1956-59 was rather exotic for the day and powered by a 3.2 liter aluminum V8. BMW hoped to produce 5,000 per year. Manufacturing costs escalated, resulting in ever higher selling prices, which simply reduced demand. Towards the end of production, the price was \$10,500, a huge amount of money in 1959. Although the 507 was popular with celebrities including John Derek and Elvis Presley (Elvis owned two), it was a commercial failure as only 252 vehicles were produced. So why did this 507 sell for such a high price? As Paul Harvey would say here is the "Rest of the Story". In 1956, British rider John Surtees rode a MV Augusta to the 500cc motorcycle world championship. As a token of appreciation, Count Augusta presented Surtess with a check to purchase a BMW 507. Surtees used the BMW as his daily driver and went on to win three more 500cc motorcycle World Championships. Surtees then switched to Formula One. When he signed on as a driver with the Ferrari Team, Enzo Ferrari supposedly told him he could not be seen in a BMW, and the 507 was returned to his home garage for the duration of his Ferrari career. Surtess won the Formula One World Championship in 1964, and later went on to start a race team, and had some success in Formula 5000 and Formula 2. The 1957 BMW 507 remained a oneowner car until John Surtees' death. Surtees is still the only person that has won a world championship on both two and four wheels. I suspect the ownership provenance contributed greatly to the hammer price.

Are car subscription services the next alternative to leasing? In various forms, many of the major manufacturers are now offering car subscriptions. One major difference from leasing is that most subscription packages are all-inclusive and include insurance and maintenance. You pay your monthly fee, add fuel and drive away. Some packages are closely related to leasing. For instance, Volvo will offer you a compact SUV for \$600/month with a two-year commitment. At the other end of the commitment are programs that BMW, Porsche and Mercedes offer. For \$1,399/month you can drive a BMW 4 series, 5 series, X5 or M2. You are allowed up to 2,000 miles/month and can switch cars at any time. You can also opt out of the program on a month's notice. For \$2,699/month BMW will let you drive a M4 convertible, M5 or M6 convertible. In Washington we need to

add at least 10% tax to those monthly fees. Which means I can subscribe to drive the BMW M models for only about \$36,000/year. Seems like a bargain to me.

I finally viewed my first Bentley Bentayga on the road. Bentley offers this rather large SUV at a starting price of \$232,800. It is claimed to be the fastest SUV available and is powered by a 600 hp, 12 cylinder engine. A fair number of those horses are probably necessary to power the 1950 watt, 22 speaker audio system. If you have the extra cash, you can order the optional Mulliner Tourbillon by Breitling diamond studded mechanical clock for the dash. This option is priced at \$168,100. I spotted the Bentayga parked on Old Main in Bellevue. It was already dark, so I was a bit afraid to get too close to the car to determine if the owner had ordered the dash clock. OK, just call me jealous. Thinking of dash clocks. When I bought my Sunbeam Tiger, it had a block off plate where the clock would go in the dash. In the first restoration of the car, I wanted to add the optional electric clock. I found a source of NOS (new old stock) original clocks and called to place an order. The seller informed me that the clocks were guaranteed for 1 second. Thinking he meant that the clocks were guaranteed to be that accurate, I questioned further. In explanation, the seller told me that if I wired up the clock, the warranty was 1 second, and don't bother calling to complain. I bought and installed the clock, but never wired it to power. I set the hands and it still reads the same as I set it years ago. Have you ever noticed that in almost every single watch or clock advertisement the time is set at 10:10. Apparently, someone did research years ago and determined that this time setting shows off the device better than any other setting.

We Corvette fans can be very passionate about our choice of rides. However, we are not alone in our passion. In an official Porsche publication, I read that the first two Porsche clubs were founded 65 years ago with a total of 13 members. Currently, there are now 675 official Porsche clubs with over 200,000 members. That is an average of 300 members/club. Perhaps they are not all active, but this is an amazing number. If you include all the Mustang, Camaro, Mopar, rod clubs, lowriders etc, it is easy to see that there are millions of people currently involved with car clubs.

Laps from the Past

Suggestions for future tours included Mount Rainier, Orcas Island, and a Viking Cruise. The newsletter editor mentioned a change in the newsletter cover and back sheets and the need for black and white photos of member's Corvettes. Future newsletters were to have advertising for Alan Green Chevrolet, our main sponsor. CMCS had about 40 confirmed orders for Club sanctioned jackets.

40 Laps Ago: May 1979. President Ernie Kahler opened the meeting, held at the home of John & Cece Nelson. Joe Oaks reported on the NWACC (Northwest Association of Corvette Clubs) event held in Vancouver Washington, noting that the turnout was light because of the gas situation in the country. John Paul Nelson III gave a presentation of the purpose and goals of NCRS (National Corvette Restorers Society), including scheduled activities and publications. John was the director of the newly formed Northwest Chapter. A practice session was held at SIR (Seattle International Raceway). The Bothell 4th of July Parade organizers wanted 14 Corvettes to participate. Jim Hobbs organized a caravan to Seaside, Oregon in July to support the Miss Oregon Pageant and to transport the queen. Ruth Bogle became the membership chairperson and gave the membership count as 100. The "how did I end up with this position" newsletter editor Frank Olsheski was looking for someone take over the position. Honorary Membership was granted to Mr. & Mrs. Lee Johnson and Ron & Dee McDuffie. The meeting was adjourned to feast upon a table loaded with deserts and goodies. John Paul Nelson III led a tour through his collection of Corvette and WWII artifact memorabilia.

30 Laps Ago: May 1989. President Jan Cockrum opened the meeting held at the Creekside Café. John R. Thomas was named as contact for those wishing to participate in a SIR summer event. New members were Dave & Ginny Clark, bringing the total to 99. A vote to change the CMCS bylaws to better comply with IRS filing requirements was passed. CMCS rejoined the NWACC insurance program at \$6.50 per family. John R. Thomas furnished a roster to send with the premium payment.

20 Laps Ago: May 1999. Kayla Main's 1993 Bright Aqua Metallic convertible with white leather interior was on the cover. The Navy has extended an invitation to CMCS to tour their top secret U.S. Government facility at Bangor Submarine Base in Bangor, WA on Tuesday, June 11, 2019.

The tour departs from the US Naval Undersea Museum, 1 Garnett Way, Keyport, WA 98345. It includes visits to the Trident Training facility and to a nuclear submarine. The group is limited to 35 total so an early reservation is imperative.

Three forms must be completed by each person, as outlined below. Contact me if you have questions or to request forms. All completed forms must be returned to me by May 21, 2019. Émail completed forms to me at c6redryder@gmail.com. Forms are not accepted after May 21.

Requirements for each person:

- 1. Must be a US Citizen and over the age of 11.
- 2. Completed Tour Roster with current last name, first name, date of birth, last four digits of your social security number, confirmation of US Citizenship, Title, e-mail address and contact phone number
- 3. Completed Request for Tour form, signed and witnessed
- 4. Completed, signed, Privacy Statement

The day of the tour, each person must have proof of US Citizenship to be admitted. The following are acceptable:

- US Passport, or
- Birth Certificate, or
- Enhanced WA Driver's License.

(If your name has changed due to marriage you need a copy of the Marriage Certificate or a driver's license with your current name.)

Active duty and retired military IDs are not accepted because you do not have to be a U.S. citizen to be in the military.

The tour starts at the Naval Undersea Museum at 9:20 am and ends at approximately 3:30 pm.

Be sure to wear closed toe, comfortable shoes because there is a lot of walking and climbing up and down 30 foot ladders in the submarine. Be prepared for a long, but very enjoyable day.

Lunch is available on base for about \$6.50 per person, cash only.

All cell phones, Fitbits, cameras, weapons, and anything with Bluetooth or Wi-Fi capabilities MUST be left at home or in your vehicle. Everyone is subject to search on the base, and all electronics and contraband will be confiscated.

A caravan to the Museum departs from Fry's Electronics (I-405 Exit 5) at 7:30 am.

The subs are active and the Navy may be required to change the event date. I will keep you informed about possible tour changes.

The best vintage racing of the season takes place during the Pacific Northwest Historics around the July 4 holiday (Pacific Raceways track). Screaming Ferraris, thundering Corvettes and Cobras, formula cars and lots of British iron. We can all find multiple cars to like. The paddock is open to all spectators so you can view the cars up close and visit with the drivers, many of whom travel long distances to make this race. You can cross the track and view the action in the S-curves on the back side of the track as well as from the grandstands.

This is the 50th Anniversary of IMSA (International Motor Sports Association) racing and the 31st anniversary for this SOVREN event at Pacific Raceway. As in past years, the net proceeds from the event go to the uncompensated care fund at Children's Hospital in Seattle.

The car corral is a unique opportunity to display our cars adjacent to the paddock. Because of that, we are in the closest parking lot to the track and paddock of any spectators. We actually park along the main straight. Each day they allow up to 250 cars in the car corral with a maximum of 20 from any individual club. We park in a designated area as a club. Car corral participants are allowed parade laps on the track during the lunch break. This is a great opportunity to drive the line on the course at a parade lap brisk pace.

Although the car corral is open Friday-Sunday, CMCS is participating on **Saturday, July 6th**. Some of you know the drill, but for newer members the requirements are below.

- Car Corral participation is for PRE-REGISTERED cars ONLY. There are no exceptions. If you don't have a car corral pass, you will be turned away.
- Cost is \$30 for the car corral pass, which includes driver-spectator admission. Additional adult spectator admission is \$25 each, children 7-16 are \$5 each, and children under 7 are free.
- Arrival is generally 8-10 am: you can depart whenever you want, but most people at least stay for the parade laps. You are not committed to a full day.
- It is not a car show per se, but a display of vehicles of racing fans, and you get close-in reserved parking with other Corvettes.
- Although there is some judging by vehicle age groups and some trophies awarded, most of us driving C5 and newer cars will not be part of the judging.

Since Saturday is the most requested day, it is in our best interest to beat the straggler clubs with our car corral request. There are logistics involved for both CMCS and SOVREN. The event organizers don't have time to deal with

individuals for the car corral and require that one representative from each club compile and send all requests. When the 20 car-per-club limit is reached, further requests are returned unfilled.

The CMCS deadline for receipt of your request/deposit check is Saturday, May 25.

That weekend, I compile and mail the CMCS requests to SOVREN. There are no refunds for cancellations.

A couple weeks before the event, I mail you the car corral pass and the spectator admission tickets. If you decide not to take your Corvette, you can come with your daily driver and park in the normal lot. Your spectator admission tickets are good regardless.

Speculation no more - It's official! The C8 Mid-Engine Corvette is officially going to be revealed 7/18/19 Since the National Corvette Museum (NCM) is directly across the street from the Corvette Assembly plant, they are involved in all things related to the Corvette, including releasing the announcement about the 8th generation.

In Mid April Chevrolet
Corvette Chief Engineer
Tadge Juechter and General
Motors Chairman and CEO
Mary Barra drove a barely
camouflaged next generation
mid-engine Corvette down
7th Avenue near Times
Square in New York to show
it off and to announce the
reveal date.

The Camouflage looks somewhat like leopard spots

and for those who are really into it there is even a likeness of Zora Arkus Duntov's face hidden among the spots.

Benefit Auction of the last C7: With the reality of the new C8 coming out soon, an auction of the Last Seventh Generation Corvette will be held to benefit a worthy charity. Mary Barra stated "GM, GMC and Chevrolet support the Stephen Siller Tunnel to Towers Foundation and its commitment to injured and fallen military members, first responders and their families. The sale of this iconic Corvette will help the foundation continue its good work and pave the way for the Next Generation Corvette that we will introduce on July 18."

The final seventh gen Corvette - a black 2019 Z06 model - will be auctioned at the Barrett-Jackson Northeast sale in Connecticut June 28.

With the 50th Anniversary of the Moon Landing this year the NCM is putting on a special exhibit of Astronauts' Corvettes. The exhibit is titled "From Gas Station to Space Station" and will be in place through July. Corvettes have been associated with America's manned space program from Alan Shepard's first sub-orbital Mercury flight in the Freedom 7 capsule on May 5, 1961 to the final flight of Apollo 17 landing astronauts Eugene Cernan and Harrison Schmitt on the moon on December 11, 1972. It stands to reason that anyone adventurous enough to become an astronaut would prefer similarly exciting earth-bound transportation. Ed Cole, President of General Motors with Jim Rathmann Chevrolet of Melbourne Florida offered the astronauts a special Chevrolet plan in which they were given the use of any Chevrolet automobile for a year at the very nominal cost of \$1. It comes as no surprise that for many astronauts, Corvette was their car of choice.

A 2019 Corvette Grand Sport will be the Pace Car at the 103rd Indianapolis 500 on May 26th. This is the 16th time a Corvette will pace the race and the 30th time for Chevrolet. No other brand or vehicle has served as the 500 Pace Car more than Chevrolet and the Corvette.



With Long Beach Red Metallic Tintcoat, Blade Silver Full Length Racing Dual Stripes, and a unique GM Design Indy 500 decal package, it's a beautiful Corvette!

Donated to NCM: A 2005 Daytona Sunset Orange Corvette (the first of that model year) was recently donated by Crawford, Texas couple Ron and Lori Galt on the very day they took delivery of their new 2019 Arctic White Grand Sport Coupe. They are NCM lifetime members. The Museum is building a collection of every model year of the Corvette produced. Of the 66 Corvette years there are only 25 years that they don't have. (1955, 4 from the 60's, 6 from the 70's, 4 from the 90's;

The XP-897 GT was a mid-engine concept Corvette intended to be the future generation of Corvette that would have been introduced in 1976. GM installed the Wankel Rotary engine as they planned rotary engines to replace standard piston-in-cylinder engines in future models of GM vehicles.

This car was saved by Tom Falconer of England after GM decided to crush the car. The car had been stored in a crate at Vauxhall awaiting its date with the crusher, however, Tom was able to meet with Chuck Jordan, head of Styling for GM, to get approval to save the car.



The car is on display at the National Corvette Museum in the Design & Engineering section. Make plans to see it for yourself!

NASA Exhibit Welcomes Another Astronaut Corvette

The Museum now has two of the three Apollo 15 astronaut Corvettes on display as part of the Gas Station to Space Station exhibit. The three astronauts (David Scott, Al Worden and James Irwin) decided as a group to be patriotic with their Corvettes, with one Mille Miglia Red, one Classic White, and one Bridgehampton Blue. On



top of the colors each had a double stripe placed down the length of the car, just to the left of the center, with the other two colors of the American flag. Added to the display is David Scott's Bridgehampton Blue Corvette.
