

Under the Hood by Kevin Jewell



One indisputable fact in auto racing is that the team that hires the best talent and spends the most money will probably be at the front at the end of the race. In an effort to encourage more competitive racing, as well as hold down costs, the various racing organizations have tried many things to provide "balance of performance", or similar goals by other names. Several race series

require "sealed engines" that are all built by the same company and are sealed to prevent the teams from any engine modifications. NASCAR routinely used restrictor plates between the carburetor and engine to reduce the amount of air allowed into the engine. Remember that if gasoline burns at a constant air:fuel

ratio as we reduce the amount of air, it will automatically reduce the usable fuel and thus the horsepower. NASCAR no long uses carburetors, but they still will use restrictor plates in the engine intake, especially on the longer speedway tracks. Many sports car racing series will monitor the teams at the beginning of the year and then either require air restrictors, control the turbo boost, or force the teams to add weight in order to better balance the team's performance. The series will further monitor the teams during the year and make more adjustments if it appears that some of the teams have overcome the initial performance obstacles. Drag racing has its own problems with the ever- advancing technology which has resulted in ever higher speeds. After a driver death, NHRA had reduced the actual distance of a race for the top fuel and funny car teams from the traditional ½ mile to 1,000 feet. Less fast classifications still race the full ½ mile. Even with that distance change, speeds for the top teams had increased to over 330 mph in only 1,000 feet. NHRA hasn't tried to force restrictions such as sealed engines on the teams. However, they recently changed the traction compound that is laid down on the track to aid the racers in reducing, or controlling, wheel spin and thus building speed. The traction compound is mixed with alcohol. NHRA has reduced the ratio of traction compound in the solution from 75% to 65%. While the latest races still have shown a few teams near the 330 mph finish, the change has resulted in the teams being more closely grouped. Fans like close racing, and every race series wants to encourage fans. Closer to home, the C7R race car is detuned from our available street Corvettes. Engine size is only 5.5 liters and supercharging is not allowed, so the engine puts out about 550 hp. Of course, the race car is lighter than our street cars, but it is obvious that the C7R is complying with race series rules to control speed and provide closer competition.

In other racing news, it is hard not to be impressed with Courtney Force. Courtney is the daughter of funny car legend John Force, and she is a force to be reckoned with. Courtney is the winningest female funny car driver in history. Even against her father her record is 13-16. Courtney retired from NHRA racing at the end of the 2018 season, but it was a short retirement as she is back on the track. Her older sister, Ashley, was also very competitive and retired in 2011. You might remember that Courtney is married to Indy car driver Graham Rahal. In NASCAR, through the end of the 2017 season, Chevy had been racing the Chevrolet SS, an Australian built V8 powered sedan. GM shut down the Australian factory at the end of 2017 and Chevy switched to the Camaro SS. Yes, I realize you can hardly tell the difference, but the manufacturers still think "win on Sunday, sell on Monday". Anyway, Chevy had their teething problems in 2018 and won few events. Now Ford has announced that their NASCAR entry Ford Fusion will be replaced by Mustang. I think this should be good for both Chevy and Ford as we can all get more enthused about a pony car battle in NASCAR,

than Ford Fusions or a Chevy sedan that hardly anyone could even name. Could we get Dodge back to NASCAR with their Challenger?

Couple of quick thoughts: 1. It is not only Boeing Dreamliners and BMWs that are produced in South Carolina. This state is becoming a manufacturer powerhouse. Kia's assembly plant will celebrate its 10th anniversary in November. This plant has an annual capacity of 340,000 vehicles and about 40% of all Kias sold in the States are built in S.C. 2. It seems I can't pick up a paper or magazine without another article on autonomous vehicles. A recent article compared the long-term design approach taken by various manufacturers. One fact hit me hard. Apparently, we humans stream 500 million hours of YouTube content every day, and the autonomous vehicles are being designed to allow that streaming. All I could think is "That is a lot of cat videos". Probably a lot of advertisement as well.

Laps from the Past

50 Laps Ago: August 1969. President Frank Olsheski conducted the meeting, held at the home of Joe & Donna Bridgeman. About 60 members attended a beach party. Frank reported on a WSCC (Western States Corvette Council) convention with 34 clubs in attendance. An autocross scoreboard committee and trophy committee were appointed. Don Schwab was appointed chairman of publicity and Frank Diss volunteered as activity chairman for the remainder of the year. Ways to improve relations with our main sponsor, Alan Green, were discussed.

40 Laps Ago: August 1979. President Ernie Kahler conducted the meeting at the Kayak Country Club, in conjunction with the CMCS annual Beach Party. Most officer and committee reports were waived and approved as previously recorded. It was confirmed that CMCS insurance with WWSCC (Western Washington Sports Car Council) does not cover activities at SIR (Seattle International Raceways). Membership chairman Dave Richards reported the membership at 104. CMCS activities included a Salmon Fishing Trip at Ocean Shores, a Gold Panning trip on the Sultan River, and a Wine & Cheese tasting party at the Schwab's.

30 Laps Ago: August 1989. President Jan Cockrum conducted the meeting at the annual Beach Party held at John R. Thomas's beach resort. Membership was 102. Two prospective members attended the beach party. NCRS (National Corvette Restorers Society) Nationals was held in Bend, Oregon with 20 CMCS members attending. A main club sponsor was being sought. Jan Cockrum was the contact for activities. CMCS gave parking support in exchange for "fun time" at SIR for club members.

20 Laps Ago: August 1999. Cloyd & Barbara Jackson's 1999 Torch Red convertible was on the cover, one of the last 1999 Corvettes produced. President

Frank DePuy conducted the meeting, held in the "Upper Room" at our sponsor, Seaview Chevrolet, in Lynnwood. New members were Craig & Maureen Homchick, Paul & Becky Culbertson and Bill Sallia, bringing the total to 186. A caravan to the National Corvette Museum's 5-year anniversary departed from Seaview Chevrolet on the last Sunday in August. Barbara Jackson agreed to serve the remaining term of the 2-year Board Member and Activity Chair. Dick Guldstrand was our guest speaker for the evening.

10 Laps Ago: August 2009. Kevin Wilson & Emily Evans' 1962 Sateen Silver roadster 327/300hp was on the cover. President Dennis Montgomery conducted the meeting, held at the Buzz Inn Steakhouse at the Snohomish Airfield. There was a 15- minute pause in CMCS business so members could watch the skydivers landing on the airfield. New members were Paul & Sandi Gay, Greg & Susan Roberson, Seth Sanusi, and, Joe & Lynetta Showaker, bringing the total to 294. Stan & Billie Trask agreed co-host the 2010 SIS (Seattle In September) CMCS event. Other CMCS events were Kayla Main's Ferrous Fanny 500 Tour to Crater Lake, seeing 28 Corvettes from 3 Corvette clubs attending the overnight tour, and the XXX All Corvette Show & Burger Bash in Issaquah. Newsletter Editor Oran Petersen published an article on the history of the OYM newsletter covers from a black and white printing to one of color over the years. June 1994 saw the first black and white photograph of a member's Corvette on the cover. The first color cover in April of 1996, and, the first all-color OYM issue in March of 1998.

5 Laps Ago: August 2014. Scott Robb's 1996 Nassau Blue convertible was on the cover. President Kevin Jewell conducted the meeting at the Poodle Dog Restaurant in Fife. Gary Main's North to Alaska series of articles, day 7 through 10, was reprinted in the newsletter.

National Corvette Museum (NCM) Report

Next Generation Corvette Stingray Officially Revealed on 7-18-19!

The long-awaited C-8 mid-engine Corvette Stingray made its debut at the Tustin Blimp Hanger #2 in Tustin, California, handily just off I-5 near Santa Ana. According to the news out of the

National Corvette Museum the late Zora Arkus-Duntov, the father of the Chevrolet Corvette, had a long-held vision for a mid-engine Corvette, and over the years several mid-engine Vettes were designed and built, but never released into production. That all changes now with the vision coming to life the evening of July 18, 2019, and much of the world watched via live stream from the comfort of their own homes.

Kicking off the proceedings Astronauts Dr. Mae Jemison and Captain Scott Kelly discussed the engineering required to power men to the moon 50 years ago this week, comparing it to the engineering required to launch the new Corvette. Much like this was demonstrated in the recent exhibit at the National Corvette Museum "From Gas Station to Space Station", Corvettes and astronauts have been closely linked since 1962. Scott Kelly quipped "And just like the rocket that took us to the moon, the new Corvette has the engine in the back!" Then a bright Red 2020 Corvette Stingray was fully revealed for the first time for all the world to see, joined later by a white and a blue version.



From the time the first Corvette was revealed on January 17th, 1953, 1.7 million have been produced as the Crown Jewel of General Motors. Some of the quotes from the GM Leadership speaking at the reveal: "One giant leap for Corvette", "Mid-Engine has always been part of Corvette's legacy", "It will be the best Corvette anyone has ever driven" We built on its history and as always drive to the future", "Performance, Design, and Engineering" "12 exterior colors, 6 interior color themes, even 6 choices of seat belt color".

The 2020 Stingray still packs the power and performance that Corvette has consistently delivered over the decades. The 6.2L small block naturally aspirated

V8 LT2 engine produces 495 horsepower and 470 lb.-feet of torque when equipped with the performance exhaust -- the most horsepower and torque for any entry-level Corvette, according to Chevrolet, and 0-60 in less than 3 seconds. "It is an attainable dream car". Price was discussed and it was stated that price starts at less than \$60,000



The new Stingray can be reserved today, and <u>Chevy.com</u> launched a new "visualizer" where you can experience 360-degree, 3D exterior and interior renderings of your potential vehicle, or you can just see your Chevrolet dealer (our Sponsor is Evergreen Chevrolet in Issaquah). The Next Generation Corvette is hitting the road for two national dealership tours that will include vehicle specialists and numerous interactive displays. At these events, Chevy dealers will host customers to showcase the new mid-engine supercar, display customizable parts (seats, wheels, accessories, etc.) and teach people how they can personalize their own Corvette. "With all the excitement around this vehicle, we don't want people to have to wait to experience it in person," said Barry Engle GM VP. "Our national tours will bring the Next Generation car right to our customers' local Chevrolet dealership, where they can start imagining themselves in their very own personalized mid-engine Corvette." The tours will begin on the East and West Coasts and stop at more than 125 select dealerships across the U.S. starting after the reveal and extending through early 2020. Tour dates and cities will be available soon.

Last C-7 Corvette sets record for Charity Auction at 2.7 Million Dollars:

As I reported at our last meeting the Last C-7 Corvette, a black Z06 model, was sold for 2.7 Million Dollars at the Barrett-Jackson Northeast Auction at Mohegan Sun (CT) on June 28th. This winning bid breaks the Barrett-Jackson record for an automaker-donated vehicle.

The Stephen Siller Tunnel to Towers Foundation will receive the 2.7 million dollars from the auction.

"This is going to vibrate across America," said Frank Siller, chairman and CEO of the Stephen Siller Foundation. "This donation will build at least five homes for our catastrophically-injured veterans to give them their independence and a better quality of life."

The foundation builds mortgage-free, accessible smart homes for the most catastrophically injured service members and helps pay off the mortgages for families of first responders killed in the line of duty. 85 homes have been built or are under construction to date, and this donation will allow for construction to begin on five new homes. More information is available at www.tunnel2towers.org.

"It's appropriate that the most iconic vehicle ever built in the US, has the honor of being the highest auctioned vehicle at Barrett-Jackson for a charity," said Steve Hill, GM U.S. Vice President of Sales, Service and Marketing. "What makes me proud to be a GM employee is that fact that we've supported the military and veterans for over 100 years. This is a great evening, but tomorrow morning we get back to work to help more service members in need."

For the past five years, GMC has supported the Stephen Siller Tunnel to Towers Foundation as its national foundation of choice. In that time, it has helped the foundation raise more than \$10 million. That includes \$2.2 million raised last year, with \$925,000 of it coming from the auction of the first production 2019 Corvette ZR1. It was purchased by Chevrolet dealer and NASCAR team owner Rick Hendrick at the 2018 Barrett-Jackson Scottsdale sale. The last C7 was purchased by Daniel Snyder of Clarence, NY.

GM is committed to helping those who have given so much for their country. GM's current and retired workforce includes 60,000 veterans.



How To Find Your Parked Car With Maps On Your Iphone by Dennis Milliken

A number of years ago, I found myself scurrying late to check in for a flight at SeaTac. Knowing that I did not have time for off-site parking, I pulled into the airport parking garage, quickly found a space, and ran into

the terminal, on time. In my haste, I neglected to record my location in the parking garage; in fact, I didn't even think about it until I was out of baggage claim upon my return. Do you have any idea of the immensity of the SeaTac parking garage? After two hours searching, I have full appreciation for its size!





Fast forward to 2019 and the August 22 Launch of the Caravan to the National Corvette Museum in Bowling Green, Kentucky. While all appears to be in order for this exciting trip with eleven CMCS member cars and their respective pilots and co-pilots, memories of my lost car at SeaTac flooded back. With approximately 6,000 registered for the Anniversary Celebration, how will I find my C6 in a sea of Corvettes? Complicating matters, we know that "All Corvettes Are Red." Turns out there is a tech solution using your iPhone and Maps. Maps marks the location of your car with a pin when you disconnect your iPhone from Bluetooth or CarPlay in your car-so you can easily find where you parked. This works! Directions follow:

Before you begin, check these things:

- Turn on Location Services. Go to Settings > Privacy > Location Services.
- Make sure that Significant Locations is on. Go to Settings > Privacy > Location Services > System Services > Significant Locations > Significant Locations.
- Turn on Show Parked Location. Go to Settings > Maps > Show Parked Location.
- Make sure that your iPhone is paired to CarPlay or Bluetooth in your car.

Find your car

When you leave your vehicle, your iPhone disconnects from Bluetooth, which lets Maps mark the location of your car. To edit your car's location, open Maps and tap a or add a photo of where you parked.

When you're ready to go back to your car, follow these steps:

- 1. Open Maps.
- 2. Tap the Search field, and then choose Parked Car from the suggestions list.
- 3. Tap Directions and choose Drive, Walk, Transit, or Ride.
- 4. Select the route that you prefer. When you're ready, tap GO.

To remove a Parked Car pin, tap a on the map. Then swipe up on the menu card, and tap Remove Car. Maps won't mark your parked car if you frequently park in the same location, like at home or work.

Apps for Your Android Phone

Find My Car by Ghrian Technologies

A straightforward app for Android users, Find My Car starts by prompting you to press a "Park Here" button so it records the location of your car. You can then take a photo of your parking space should you wish. When it's time to find your car, tap on the "Get Directions" button. The app then displays the location of your car and serves up an arrow that points to where it's parked.

ParKingLost by HybriEng

ParKingLost displays a marker button that you tap on to save the location of your car. When you're ready to track down your parking spot, tap on the Direction button to display the location and then tap on the Walk button. The app then smartly calls up Google Maps to steer you to the right spot using both an on screen map and verbal directions
