Cover - Robert & Carole Koehne's 2009 Convertible

Bob and Carole Koehne joined CMCS in October 2017. Their 2009 convertible is their second Corvette. Bob was in the Air Force, driving his Alfa Romeo roadster in Sacramento in 103 degree heat, when the new 1963 Sting Ray was introduced, the first Corvette with factory air! That and that gorgeous C2 styling was all it took to immediately order a new convertible (only 271 Corvettes with factory air built that year).

Bob and Carole were dating then, and on one date Carole remarked that Bob was the only guy she ever dated who never let her drive his car. Bob's silence ended that conversation, at least until they married in May 1965. Bob had orders to the Philippines for two years and the Vette was shipped over by the Air Force. Bob's



squadron was alternating with a sister squadron, into Viet Nam every two months and a bachelor in the other squadron had a 1964 big block Corvette coupe. Not a good idea to leave a car sitting in that humid tropical climate for two months, so Bob and Carole ended up with two Corvettes to drive for the two months Bob was rotated back to the Philippine home base.



We sold our '63 in July 1967 before coming back to the states with the idea of



buying a larger car and starting a family. Bob surprised Carole with a brand new 1968 Impala convertible, same color as the old Corvette, and the same 250 hp 327 engine, along with a turbo hydramatic 400 automatic transmission, A/C, 15" wheels with front disc brakes, posi-traction, and am-fm radio, very well equipped. We still have the Impala, but it is enjoying semi-retirement at our son's house in Tacoma with over 300,000 miles on the odometer, and a brand new Edelbrock top end taking it to over 300hp. BTW, that turbo 400 has never been overhauled.

We've enjoyed a few sporty cars in between the Corvette years. Bob brought a M-B 190 SL back up to top-notch condition, and our two BMW 3 series convertibles, the second one being a European delivery, were a lot of fun, but of questionable reliability. We started getting a little nostalgic about the Sting Ray of our youth, and 50 years to the month from selling the '63, we bought the 2009 C6, Bob's tenth rag-top, in July 2017 in Fort Worth, with 3412 miles on it and drove it back to the Seattle area at 28 mpg. We tell everyone that the Corvette is our economy car, the other two being an SUV and a pickup. We are really enjoying meeting all the very nice folks in the CMCS and hope to remain active.

Under the Hood by Kevin Jewell



I have commented before about the coming problems with auto loans that are in default, but now I notice that even Fortune magazine has an article on this problem. According to this article more than 7 million Americans are in delinquency, or 90 days late. This is an all-time high. As the big banks have stepped away from making loans to high risk borrowers, nonbank lenders have stepped in. These alternative lenders are not

regulated as prudently as banks. According to the same article 22% of auto loans and 50% of loans written by non-bank lenders, qualify as sub-prime. Wall Street has sold \$223 billion worth of auto loan asset-backed securities. Couple this issue with the fact that many auto borrowers are underwater with their loans, and I still feel that these issues will create problems down the road for the auto manufacturers with lower sales. At some point the car buyers cannot keep trading in cars that are underwater, either from long term loans, or simply that they haven't made all the payments. No question that this auto loan problem pales compared to the sub-prime home lending fiasco, but there could still be pain ahead for some buyers and certainly sellers.

Here in the PNW we have been recycling for years. I am sure we collectively have prevented thousands of tons of materials from filling our trash sites. Chemical giant Dow has developed an asphalt mix using recycled plastics in the mix. Dow claims the road surfaces are cheaper, more eco-friendly, and even more durable than conventional asphalt. Sixty miles of highway have been paved with this mix, and according to the report that 60 miles consumed 200 tons of plastics. Currently, Dow is promoting the hybrid asphalt mix mostly in overseas countries. You might be aware that Washington State has been experimenting with recycled rubber in asphalt paving since 1977. To date, we have used two processes. The wet process basically involves cooking the asphalt long enough that some of the rubber melts and becomes part of binder that holds the aggregates together. Locally, the SR520 bridge and East approaches were one of the test areas. Of course, the bridge paving is long gone with the new bridge, but the State figures this test was a "success" in that the rubberized asphalt provided equivalent performance to conventional asphalt. The only problem is that the cost of the test portions has been 1.1 to 3.7 times as expensive. The State has tried another proprietary process where finely granulated rubber tires are used to replace some of the fine sand in the asphalt mix. These tests have generally been failures where some test sections have failed almost immediately. You might not realize that much of our highway asphalt is already recycled asphalt. I work next door to a large asphalt paving company. When they send those big machines out to scrape down the highways, the scrapings are returned to their plant. This material is recrushed, graded to size, and a portion of this "old" asphalt is added to the new asphalt mix. I wish Dow success in their effort to utilize some of our plastic waste. Final thought on recycled tires: Ash Grove Cement has a large cement plant visible from the West Seattle bridge. Cement manufacturing uses a lot of heat in the process. I have toured the Ash Grove plant and witnessed their use of recycled tires as one of their heat sources. They use whole tires. There is a vertical elevator with hooks that pick up tires, carry them to the top of the kiln and drop the whole tires into the process. The rubber is totally consumed and some of the belting materials provide needed components in the cement production.

Continuing saga of exhaust envy. Many cars or SUVs now have large, fancy, chrome trapezoidal exhaust outlets framed in the bumper. Often if you look closely you will see a small round exhaust pipe inside the large chrome opening. A few days ago, I was behind a new Toyota Corolla hatchback. On the back bumper were two rather small shiny trapezoidal "exhaust outlets". Upon further inspection, I discovered a single exhaust pipe exiting below the back bumper. Appears on this car, the "exhaust outlets" are simply glued on trim on the back bumper. Perhaps we have carried this performance exhaust theme a bit too far.

We all know racing at any level is expensive. I remember when I used to participate in open track events in our C5 Z06, that I would change the brake

pads to a much more aggressive compound prior to the track day and then change back to street pads for everyday driving. Brake usage varied by track, but I could almost count on one hand the number of track days I would get from a set of front pads. Remember that with our front engine Corvettes the front pads would do 70% of the braking effort. You can confirm that by simply looking at the size of the calipers exposed in the wheel spokes. The front calipers are far larger than the rears. I was recently reading an article about the carbon brakes in the Le Mans LMP1 prototype cars (the fastest class). We all have been exposed to the carbon brake rotors in our Corvettes or other marques. For LMP1, Brembo supplies not only carbon rotors, but also carbon fiber pads. Part of this is for weight reasons, as a carbon rotor weighs about 20% of a steel rotor. However, the biggest advantage is the track life. During the 24 hours of Le Mans, the carbon rotors might lose 3-4 mm of thickness, and the carbon pads about 8-10 mm. The carbon pads lose less than half the thickness of the best metallic/ ceramic pads. At Le Mans, there are 11 braking zones, and it is calculated that the typical LMP1 car has over 4200 brake applications per race. Although the carbon pads might last an entire race, most teams will try to have one pad change during the race, so that their car will finish the race on fresher pads. Fresh, thicker, pads allow less fluid behind the caliper pistons meaning less chance of boiling the brake fluid. Do all of these Brembo parts cost more? The calipers are machined from a single block of metal to reduce flex. The caliper pistons are titanium to help heat transfer from the fluid. The carbon rotors are secured by a sprocket arrangement that requires extensive tooling. Each rotor features 430 ventilation holes precision drilled. The estimated cost of a single caliper is \$3,500-\$4,000 and a single rotor is about \$5,000. To think that I used to complain about \$200 for a set of track friendly front brake pads.

The 1968 (green, 390 powered, 4 speed) Mustang driven by Steve McQueen in Bullitt just sold at the January Mecum auction. Final hammer price was \$3.4 million. These auction houses make most of their money on the "Buyer's Premium", and generally that is 10% added to the hammer price. This anonymous phone buyer spent \$3.74 million for a movie car that has no real value, other than it was the Bullitt Mustang. I suspect that the buyer will leave the car as is; dents, faded paint, a bit of rust and even the tubular steel camera mounts that are welded under the car and visible from the side. I would like to dream about the car collection that I could create with just the \$340,000 that this buyer spent on the auction house premium.

Tech Tip - Brighter Backup Lights for a C6 by Bill Roberts

I drive my C6 nearly wherever I go. Backing at night is sometimes a challenge because of limited illumination. For brighter backup lamps I replaced the OEM bulbs with Sylvania ZEVO 3157 LED Bulbs. To access the sockets, reach around and under the rear apron. A partial counter-clockwise turn releases the bulb and socket. One forum contributor posted a need to turn the bulb around in the socket for full brightness, but I didn't notice a difference when I turned mine around.

Vice President Don Schwab conducted the meeting as President Ernie Kahler decided to sit back and let Don perform at the Beachwood Resort following a BBQ steak dinner during the 15th annual Wet Weekend. A motion was passed for CMCS members to volunteer to park cars at SIR (Seattle International Raceway) in exchange for more track time. Rick Stark gave an interesting presentation on the current rule changes affecting Corvettes and the direction that racing is taking.

National Corvette Museum (NCM) Report

Here we are in February and this year we have a leap year, with an extra day in this month. How appropriate that production of the new 2020 C8 Corvette, which is a huge leap forward in many ways, is scheduled to start this month (rumored to be February 10th). As

production starts on the new mid-engine Corvette, here is the latest news out of the National Corvette Museum, which is right across the street from the Corvette Assembly Plant in Bowling Green Kentucky.

Chevrolet Corvette Voted 2020 North American Car of the Year:

The all-new Chevrolet Corvette Stingray has been selected as the 2020 North American Car of the Year by the North American Car, Utility and Truck of the Year (NACTOY) Awards. The awards honor excellence in innovation, design, safety, performance, technology, driver satisfaction and value and are judged by approximately 50 professional automotive journalists from the United States and Canada who work for independent magazines, television, radio, newspapers and industry websites. After evaluating the field of competitors, jurors vote individually by way of Deloitte to determine finalists and winners in each category.

The Stingray was selected not only for its revolutionary mid-engine design, but for its level of refinement and impressive performance. The Corvette was previously honored with this award in 1998 for the introduction of the fifth generation and again in 2014 for the introduction of the seventh generation. Corvette executive chief engineer Tadge Juechter received the award in January at a public ceremony held at the Twin City Federal Saving & Loan Center in Detroit.

"It's humbling to be selected for this award by such an impressive jury of automotive journalists," said Juechter. "Our team poured our hearts and souls into this vehicle, and to see such an overwhelmingly positive reception makes it all worthwhile. We are sure our customers will love the new Corvette as much as these jurors and we can't wait to get them behind the wheel."

"The 2020 Corvette represents a new era for the iconic brand," said Lauren Fix, NACTOY president. "The excitement from consumers has been overwhelming. From a journalist's perspective, this is one of the best-built GM products that exemplifies what it means to be the North American Car of the Year." Corvette production will begin in February 2020 at General Motors' Bowling Green Assembly in Kentucky, with customer deliveries taking place shortly thereafter.



Personalized Plaques Available on Eighth Generation Corvette:

A personalization option that was available for the seventh generation Corvette is also available for the eighth generation Corvette. Those ordering their Corvette can select to have a



personalized interior plaque, which is installed on the 'waterfall speaker' between the driver and passenger seats. The option code for the personalized plaque is BV4, costing an additional \$200. Buyers opting for option R8C, Museum Delivery, will automatically receive a customizable plaque featuring the National Corvette Museum logo. The plaque can accommodate up to 24 characters/ spaces. Buyers also have the choice of all caps or sentence case. Wording can be your name, nickname, slogan or any other wording.

Pre-Production 2019 ZR1 Displayed at Museum:

The National Corvette Museum, a 501(c)(3) nonprofit in Bowling Green, Kentucky, serves as the 'Gateway to All Things Corvette.' Charged with preserving the legendary sports car's past, present and future, the Museum regularly displays vehicles on loan from General Motors as well as private individuals so that no two visits to the Museum are the same.

Joining the Museum's display floor in the coveted 'turntable' display area is the 2019 Pre-Production ZR1, VIN 1G1Y52D93K50002EX - also known as the Nürburgring unofficial 7:04 2019 Corvette ZR1.

Vehicle Dynamics Engineer Jim Mero and his team received this pre-production ZR1 from Bowling Green Assembly in May of 2017. By June, the team had the ZR1 at the Nürburgring and completed the Magnetic Ride Control calibration for that track, despite bad weather.

The ZR1 then returned to the United States and was used as a track development car, primarily driven at Milford Proving Grounds, Willow Springs racetrack in California, and Virginia International Raceway (VIR).

While running endurance tests for exhaust system attachments at VIR in January of 2018, Jim and his team discovered that a Ford GT had set a track record of 2:38.6 on the Grand Course West. Although Jim was running the Corvette tests on the full course, the team moved the ZR1 to the Grand West Course and after only five to six laps on the course, the ZR1 shattered the Ford GT record by running a 2:37.2 lap!

After this amazing record run at VIR, the ZR1 and Jim went back to the Nürburgring with the goal of running a sub-7-minute lap, becoming the first American car to achieve that time. Once at Nürburgring, Jim and the team discovered that the protocol for the run had changed and they would not get a warm-up lap. Starting the lap on cold tires and never having them properly warm during the run, Jim was able to make the lap in a reported 7:04.



Chevrolet would never officially release the lap time, however, after retirement, Jim released the unofficial time of 7:04 so that the Corvette community would know what the ZR1 was capable of. Although devastated that he did not break the seven second mark due to the change in protocol, Jim still believes it is completely obtainable in the ZR1.

The Corvette is on loan from General Motors and is on display in the turntable through mid-April, after which it will be transferred to its new display location - the Nürburgring display in the Design and Engineering section of the Museum.

The National Corvette Restorers Society Foundation has provided funding for the National Corvette Museum to offer a scholarship annually in the amount of \$2,500. All scholarships shall be awarded in a non-discriminate manner, without regard to color, creed, national origin or gender.

Any scholarship awarded is for one year. Recipients shall not be eligible for renewal or reapplication of future scholarships from the Museum. Selection and Eligibility Guidelines

- 1. Applicants must be NCM members or children or grandchildren of NCM members. (membership must be current at time of application and award)
- 2. Applicants must have applied and been accepted at an accredited postsecondary school, technical school, college or university.
- 3. Applicants must be pursuing a degree related to the automotive, museum or non-profit industry, or a field which would work in those industries (i.e. human resources, finance, marketing, information technology, etc.).
- 4. Applicants must be planning to enroll in 12 or more hours per semester.
- 5. While academic and extracurricular performance will be considered, work or volunteer experience in automotive, museum or non-profit related fields and apparent financial need will also be considered in the application. Applicants must include a statement of the source of their funds for their education (i.e. loans, other scholarships, grants, etc.)

Process

Applications are made available online in Jan/Feb each year to students desiring to apply. Applications are available for download on the Museum's website at the URL above. Applications received before or after the posted dates will not be considered. Similarly, applications which are incomplete or contain erroneous information will not be considered. Scholarships are awarded on a one academic year basis. C8 Corvette Training & Driving Report by Craig Bennett - Evergreen Chevrolet Corvette Specialist



I just returned from the Chevrolet Ron Fellows Training class on the all-new C8 2020 Corvette. I have so much stuff going on in my head and really don't know where to begin. The car far exceeds anything that I could have imagined. The drive is both luxury and sporty. I can imagine a comfortable trip to the wine country or an exciting day at a track. Both will be greeted by a vehicle that is designed from the bottom up to perform those tasks with grace and agility unparalleled in todays exotic sports car world. To say that Chevrolet

has made great strides in their new offering is like saying Amazon is a good book provider. Simply, this is the greatest advancement in automobile technology that I have witnessed in my forty-year career with Chevrolet.

Visually, this new super-car is awe inspiring from the first glimpse of the headlights to the unique shape of the back end and the incredible LED display that many will see as this car is not designed to be in the back. The drive that one experiences with the incredibly nimble electric steering and seamless shifting of the all new dual clutch transmission makes any drive a joy. Adding thirty more horsepower than the comparable C7 only gives more credibility to Motor Trends Car of the Year. With the weight balance now shifted to the rear (60/40), the car all but steers itself. Easing off or pushing the throttle to assist in aggressive turns changes the way you can drive in the more exciting modes offered in this Zora Arkus-Duntov dream car. Sixty years ago, brilliant minds such as Duntov's, realized that a mid-engine offered more control to the race car if the chassis could be rigid enough. This car is 10% more rigid than the previously most rigid chassis offered. By the way, that was the C7 chassis.

For the race enthusiast, this car is loaded with the most technology-oriented control features ever offered on a vehicle under \$250,000. The five basic drive modes for the everyday driver are often overlooked. One showing of how the Weather Mode puts the car back on track without driver input when one tries to do a 180 degree turn on wet asphalt is enough of a feature to turn the head of any northwest driver. Track mode is over-kill for those that never leave the roadways of everyday America. That said, if one is apt to find themselves renting track time and testing their skills, Track Mode is just the entry way to the world of exotic race ready vehicles that are now available to those willing to take the

challenge. With Track Mode engaged, you are now ready to see what MyMode and ZMode have to offer those that take the challenge. Set up MyMode to basically tune the car to your personal specs for day to day driving in the manner that you most enjoy. ZMode, every track attack with the car set up for the days track, weather and type venue to maximize what the car can do that day. Try to find this technology on a Lexus!

Something you won't find in this car is the need to shift gears. The all-new eightspeed dual-clutch transmission (DCT) proved to be as exciting as the press that it has received. With two banks of gears on two adjacent shafts, you are never more than a blink away from the gear you are in disengaging to the next gear doing its job. "Two manual gearboxes on a concentric shaft that have the clutches actuated by computers." The shift will be completed in one tenth of a second with no perception of the change other than your speed going up. Excellent feel in Tour or Track! By the way, your paddle shift controls do allow one to shift without a clutch if that is something that you must do.

When I sat in the car with the stereo set up, all fourteen speakers from Bose reminded me of what true stereo sound should be. All I needed was an Edgar Winter Group recording done in quadra sound to move around the car to show me where all the speakers were and just how crisp and clear they were. We had to settle for the Who and the theme from CSI Miami. (Who Are You) Seat comfort is an un-expected surprise with an incredible amount of leg room on both sides. This was largely due to the removal of the engine from the front. With the engine gone, there was an obvious change in structure to increase safety with no needed concern for how to hold the engine. The driver sits sixteen inches forward from the previous generations position, giving a much improved view.

I experienced so much more than words and space permit. It wasn't so much the event that stood out as it was the car. The instructors and drivers were top shelf. As it was with the instructors in "Top Gun" These were the best of the best. But quite clearly, this time around, the car stole the show. I can see that to sell what will be the best of the best in the super-car market, I will have to change my way of thinking. I won't be able to say, "Here's your keys, have a great day". We will be selling a group of buyers that are Corvette enthusiast and Chevrolet loyalists. But this group will not be in the majority with this vehicle. The new majority will be super-car enthusiasts from all walks of life. Some will have never walked into a domestic, let alone Chevrolet dealership before. They are more than willing to pay more, but for that to happen, they must be catered to in the fashion that they have become accustomed. They will require specialized attention and shown what they will receive for their dollar. How it will make them look and feel. These are McLaren, Ferrari, Porsche, Tesla and Lamborghini owners. When I started in this business five decades ago, I prided myself on making sure that my clients had a firm grasp of the vehicle that they were taking home. With this car, I remind myself that they may not be going home; they may be headed for the track. It is my job and the others that take on the responsibility of selling this car, to ensure that each one of them has a firm grasp of this vehicle's abilities and how to control them in the best manner possible. They want to know up front that they will look great because they are driving an excellent choice in an all new "Super-Car" at a fraction of the cost of its competitors. The experience of owning a super car cannot be cheapened by its price.
