55 LAPS AGO: January 1967. The meeting was held in the Satellite Room of the Hyatt House. Top agenda items were appointing a nominating committee for the upcoming club officer elections, selection of the official club jacket and picking up tickets for the Premier of the movie Grand Prix to be shown in Feb. John R Thomas was President, Carl Mollnow handled Publicity & Bruce Kelly was a Board Member. (Thomas,

Mollnow and Kelly are still members in 2022).

The OYM included a detailed tech article by Frank Olsheski entitled, "Protect your Corvette for under \$2.00 that described how to prevent OTHERS from successfully hotwiring YOUR Corvette. It was followed by a quote from Captain George Fuller of the Seattle Police Fraud Bureau "recommending that sports car owners have the last six digits of their car's serial number stamped on all expensive parts of the vehicle". Seattle Police reported high performance engines, bucket seats and special transmissions were among the equipment most frequently stolen.

Tech Tip - Car Batteries Care and Feeding

Part 1: Battery Types & Groups

Many Corvette owners hibernate their car during our colder wetter season which requires special consideration to prevent your battery from dying in it's sleep. For those driving yearround, the colder temperatures can also finish off an older or

abused battery, leaving you stranded. So let's discuss battery technology as it exists today, some basic terminology, maintenance considerations, testing and replacement options.



Part 2 in February will discuss charger/tenders, testing & purchase considerations.

A vast majority of our car "starting" batteries today are lead-acid, which have been the standard for about a 140 years.

Here we discuss only lead acid batteries. The batteries in hybrid and all-electric vehicles are different and require different rules.

Battery Types

Today, most lead-acid batteries are of three types:

Flooded: These are the old-tech lead plates immersed in sulfuric acid. These are now mostly "low maintenance" which means you do not need to check and add water to the cells on a regular basis. Many no longer have removable caps to allow water to be added. These are the lowest cost and are the OEM standard for Corvettes through the C8 series. Most GM dealers only stock AC Delco flooded low maintenance batteries.

AGM: (Absorbed **G**lass **M**at), in which, as the name implies, the acid is absorbed in a "Glass Mat" and are "No Maintenance" from a perspective of adding water. They are also more durable, longer lasting, leak and spill proof; and hold their charge better (lower self-discharge rate). Present prediction is that in four to five years nearly half or more of OEM batteries in new vehicles will be AGM.

AGM batteries should not be "quick charged", as doing so reduces their life and may do serious damage to the battery.

GEL: These hold the acid in a gel, making them spill proof. But they are rare, pricey, sensitive and require a custom alternator system in the vehicle that is designed for GEL batteries. They are not a good alternative for our Corvettes.

Groups

The group designation of a battery defines its physical size (length, width & height), terminal position (top or side) and polarity (positive terminal left or positive terminal right). Some batteries are dual terminal, having both the top and side terminals. These appropriately have a dual group designation as well and will fit cars taking either group. There is also a European Standard (DIN) for battery designations that you may see on some batteries. You should replace your battery with one of the same group, with certain exceptions.

Maintenance

Most Corvette batteries are <u>no</u> maintenance, or <u>low</u> maintenance If it does not have removable caps on the top, it is no maintenance from a perspective of the need to add water. But for long-term storage, you do need to maintain the charge. Allowing a battery to discharge below about 60 percent, or worse, allowing it to "go dead" will significantly shorten its life. It may also take a special procedure to bring some back to life at all, or for an older battery, may cause terminal death. *(continued next month)*

The "OJ": How do I start judging in NCRS? This position is that of an OJ. The OJ, or "Observer Judge", is assigned to a judging team but doesn't have the responsibility of judging ANYTHING. The OJ simply monitors the entire judging process. The best part of being an OJ is being a "fly on the wall" who gets to listen to the judges discuss items, reconcile issues, determine outcomes, possibly make notes on judging

sheets and points. Judges want OJ's to just observe or keep the judging manual in synch with the judging process in case questions arise and the manual needs to be referenced. Advanced OJ's may be directed by judges to make notes on the judging sheets going to the owner. These are judges' decisions but a great judge will make being an OJ very educational. An OJ receives points too. It is recommended someone OJ on a Corvette year the OJ's owns, is buying or is restoring. I have learned so much from OJ'ing on my year of Corvette. You will be an expert in no time! I have been an OJ in my local chapter as well as Nationals and Regionals. I learn something new with every meet. It is helping me immensely in the restoration of my 1970.

An OJ may be moved from one judge to another at the judging event to get exposure to different aspects of the car. Judges direct the OJ's to keep the process moving along smoothly but it sure helps the OJ learn when a judge has time to teach the OJ a thing or two here and there. OI's cannot award points to great judges yet but being saddled up to a great, teaching



judge will greatly aid an OJ's development.

Under the Hood



The upcoming Z06 will have a 5.5-liter double overhead camshaft (DOHC) engine with a flat plane crankshaft. When Chevy presented the C8R race car for IMSA, they used a 5.5-liter 4 cam flat plane crank engine. I understand that IMSA rules require that manufacturers offer a minimum of 300 similar vehicles for the street and Chevy decided to offer the C8 Z06 to

comply. You should realize that flat plane cranks are not new. If you ever had a VW bug, or almost any four-cylinder engine, it had a flat plane crank. What is new, is that Chevy is offering a flat plane crank in a V8 engine. Note that Ford did offer a flat plane crank in the recent GT350, but that engine has now been discontinued. Basically, if you laid a flat plane crank on a table, you would find that it lies flat as all the piston rod journals are in the same line, or plane. The flat plane is also referred to as a 180-degree crank. Most V8 engines (and all previous

Corvette engines including the exotic C4 ZR1) have a 90-degree crank. If you imagine a flat plane crank engine in operation, with every half turn of the crankshaft half of the pistons would be at the top of the cylinder while the other half are at the bottom of the cylinder. The 90-degree crank (also called an off-set crank) has the rod journals located 90 degrees from each other and therefore there are 4 different journal locations. With this 90-degree crank V8 engine, we



would find for the same half rotation of the crank, two pistons might be at top dead center, two at the very bottom and 4 pistons mid location in the cylinder with two going up and two going down. The 90-degree crank has large counterweights which help with the engine balance giving us the typical V8 smoothness and the rather unique V8 rumble. Smoothness is the main reason that almost all V8 manufacturers have used the 90-degree crankshaft. Certainly, GM wanted Cadillac to have an engine that you could barely feel. One manufacturer went so far as to stand a quarter on edge on the hood of their vehicle to demonstrate the smoothness of the running engine. Now that Cadillac V8 smoothness is probably a bit lower on the wish list of the typical Corvette buyer. You might remember that the original Chevy 265 ci V8 had a reputation for its ability to rev and rev up fast. This was partly the result of the lightweight valve train in that engine. Any time we have reciprocating or rotating mass in an engine less mass means the quicker the engine will rev, and in general that same engine will be able to rev higher. Since the flat plane crank does not have the

TOC heavy counterweights of the 90-degree crank, it stands to reason that the flat plane crank engine would rev more freely and be able to rev higher. That is exactly what happens and why Chevy is using this engine in the C8R race car. The standard C8 has 495 hp at 6,450 rpm, and 470 ft-lbs. of torque at 5,150 rpm. The C8 Z06 is expected to develop 670 hp at 8,400 rpm and 460 ft-lbs. torque at 6,300 rpm, all from a slightly smaller displacement engine. There is more to the Z06 engine than the flat plane crank, but undoubtedly the crankshaft design does play a significant role in the new Z06 engine. Plus, won't it be neat to tell people you have a flat plane crank, knowing that most of them won't have any idea of what you are talking about. In addition to the flat plane crank, the new engine will have double overhead cams. While this adds complexity with 4 camshafts (instead of one) and a complex chain drive, the head design allows for lightweight individual components and by eliminating pushrods adds to the ability for higher revs. As the engine revs increase, the engine designers are concerned with piston speed in the cylinders. After all, for every revolution of the engine, the piston must travel both up and down the cylinder, and that peak piston speed has some pitfalls. For the Z06 engine the engineers used a very oversquare cylinder design with a cylinder bore of 4.11 inches and piston stroke of 3.15 inches. That short stroke helps with the ability of the engine to have higher revs, but typically shorter stroke engines have lower torque. Other high-performance goodies for the Z06 engine include dual valve springs, forged pistons, and forged titanium piston rods, adding either light weight or durability. I have tried to explain the upside, but there are also downsides to the new Z06 engine. The 90-degree crank and the counterweights add smoothness. Some of the expected smoothness will be missing in the Z06 engine. While the horsepower numbers and rev limit of the C8 Z06 sound great, I am less impressed with the torque characteristics of the engine and where in the rev band that torque is developed. Did you note that the C8 Z06 max torque is actually slightly less than the standard C8, and that torque is developed about 1,200 rpm higher? Remember the horsepower is a calculated number

a supercharger to bolster the C7 Z06 numbers, but those are real driver numbers. I maintain that most of us drive with torque, rather than horsepower, unless you are driving near the top of the rev limit all the time. I expect that the C8 Z06 will be an absolute blast at Pacific Raceway and will thrill us with its shriek, rather than the more typical Corvette growl or roar. However, perhaps the C8 Z06 will be a little less satisfactory on the street as I anticipate the engine to be a bit "peaky". Chevy has tried to partly solve the peaky problem by installing a much lower (higher numerically) differential gears in an attempt to keep the engine closer to the power band. How well all of this works will be Corvette Forum fodder for a couple years to come. Stay tuned and if you have a Z06 on order I sincerely hope that you will enjoy the experience.

HP=Torque X RPM/5250. If you review the torque numbers of the standard C8 and the Z06, it is obvious that up to 5150 rpm the standard engine is actually putting out more horsepower than the Z06. The Z06 comes on at the higher revs, and of course revs higher. Worse, in this comparison, look at the C7 Z06 with the engine rated at 650 hp at 6,400 rpm, but with an extraordinary 650 ftlbs. of torque at only 3,600 rpm. Yes, it took a bit more engine displacement and

The Highlights of 2021 at the Museum: When I think back over the year about the big picture happenings at the Museum, of course naming Sharon Brawner as the new President and CEO in September tops the list. Other highlights include the acquisition of more adjacent property for museum expansion in September, being recognized as a 2021 TripAdvisor Travelers' Choice award winner in August, delivery of the 14,000th Corvette through the museum Delivery Program in July, and the announcement of a significant museum expansion in



April where the museum is enthusiastically progressing toward a 2 story-30,000 square foot addition of a state-of-the-art campus, with plans to include:

- Specialty Exhibit Spaces and Rotating Displays
- Lifetime Members Lounge
- Open Theater Space
- Sensory Calming Room for Guests with Unique Needs
- Kids Zone Education Center
- Rooftop Members Lounge



What a way to end the year - with a tornado! As most of you know by now 7 states were hard hit with severe tornadoes on December 11th. Kentucky received significant amounts of damage, including in Bowling Green, the home of the NCM. Here is what the museum had to say in a press release: "During the historic storms on December 11, 2021, the National Corvette Museum was spared any significant damage. All staff - National Corvette Museum, NCM Motorsports Park, and NCM Insurance - were reported as safe."

Fifteen hours after the events, the curatorial team verified that all the artifacts and vehicles in the collection were reported secure. Thirty-six hours after the storm, all individuals with an artifact on loan to the Museum were notified that their loaned items were not in harm's way. While much of the storm damage was isolated to the Museum's Amphitheater, the Museum was closed over the weekend while crews restored power, cleared roadways of debris, and ensured that our areas were safe once again. We appreciate the calls, e-mails, and check-ins on our staff and institutions. Our closure was necessary due to the circumstances, but we apologize for any inconvenience you may have encountered and appreciate your patience as we work through this unprecedented situation.

Unfortunately, the NCM Motorsports Park did not have the same fate as the Museum. The Motorsports Park is temporarily unsafe to welcome guests, and all activities are suspended until further







notice. Insurance adjusters and crews have begun the assessment and clean-up efforts to help determine our rebuilding plan of the affected areas. Our hearts are with those across the Commonwealth who these storms have impacted. Anyone who wishes to assist the Bowling Green community can learn to support by visiting bgky.org.

There are storage areas at the Motorsports park where members can rent a garage space so their Corvette is close to the track. GM also uses some of the space to store new Corvettes while awaiting delivery. Yikes!

According to Corvette Blogger.com The National Weather Service has now confirmed the tornado that struck Bowling Green was an EF-3 with winds reaching 155 mph. As those winds swept across the grounds of the Corvette Assembly Plant, they ripped this Corvette Tours sign from the side of the road that circles the factory and launched it into the air.



That sign would travel approximately 30 miles northeast before landing on a family farm in Kessinger, Kentucky. You can bet the NCM and the Motorsports Park are hoping for a better 2022!
