Our history with Corvettes goes back a ways. Harv's first car in southern Michigan was a new 1960 Honduras Maroon hardtop with white cove. He actually intended to purchase the car du jour, a Chevy 409 Impala convertible, but the salesman introduced him to "Sherry" and it was love at first sight. A truly exhilarating experience having one of very few Corvettes in

Marshall, Michigan.

After five years, 120,000 miles and a move to southern California (via Route 66) and meeting Ada, it was time to get serious. Next was a new Laguna Blue 1965 convertible with small-block 365 Holly and 4:11 posi. We both had lots of fun with the Les Chevaux Mecaniques (The Mechanical Horses) sports auto club in So Cal. We participated in several slaloms, rallies and outings. However in 1968, after a couple of kids, a job move from Long Beach (Douglas Aircraft) to Seattle (Boeing), we traded the Vette for a station wagon.

For the next 20 or so years it was three kids, two station wagons and a trusty 1972 Pinto. Our love of Corvettes was still there and we would occasionally look into purchasing one, but with three teenagers in the house it wasn't possible. Finally, in 1990 our youngest went away to college and that cleared the way for our purchase of a pre-retirement, cherry 1989 white L98 Hardtop. Back in the saddle again.

Then came August, 2002 and the introduction of the 50th Anniversary Edition. On a short layover at the Detroit Metro airport Ada saw the car on display at the General Motors store. We looked at it, sat in it, drooled over it and as Will Smith says in the "Independence Day" movie -- "I



gotta get me one of these." We immediately put a plan in action to purchase the car and, if possible, take delivery at the factory which we had visited the year before. After checking most of the local dealers and understanding how the allotment plan worked, we decided to go via the Internet to one of the nations largest dealers. We even arranged to have our personalized license mounted on the Anniversary Corvette as it waited for us on display in the National Corvette Museum. Then came the fun part, the 4,500 mile trip back to the Northwest via New Orleans.

We joined CMCS in the summer of 2003 and have since enjoyed many tours, outings and events, (especially the 2019 NCM Corvette caravan) not to mention the camaraderie of like-minded people. That compliments our other interests in grand parenting (eleven grandchildren), church, Seattle Mariners, and travel. Plus Harv is a docent and life member of the Museum of Flight and Ada is an avid quilter.

Under the Hood by Kevin Jewell



The birth of every-man's Porsche. In late 1964, Porsche introduced the 65 Porsche 911 to basically replace the 356. While the 356 was powered by a flat 4-cylinder engine, the 911 had a flat 6 cylinder and was a definite step up from the 356. Base list price was \$6,490. For about 75% of that sum, you could order a well-equipped 65 Corvette, with a big block 425

hp, and 4 speed. To many there was not much comparison. Porsche needed a less expensive entry point and brought out the 914 model for 1970 at a lower price. The Porsche faithful were less than satisfied as the 914 was built by Audi with a VW 1.7 liter flat 4. As a mid-engine car, it handled rather well, but wasn't enough to satisfy the buyers. There was a 914-6 version which had a flat 6, but it was much more expensive, which didn't satisfy the original goal. There was just a stigma attached to the idea of a Porsche powered by a VW engine. In 1976 Porsche introduced the front engine 924, a more modern looking car. Again, built by Audi but this time with an Audi 125 hp inline 4-cylinder engine. Still the Porsche faithful were not satisfied. By 1982 Porsche introduced the 944, a newer variation of the 924, but this time with a Porsche built 2.5 liter inline 4 rated at 150 hp, basically half of the 928 series

V8. In my opinion, the 944 was a good-looking car and a decent performer. I have driven both a stock 944 and an autocross modified 944 and both were reasonably quick and well balanced. This quest for the every-man's Porsche continued with the 1991 introduction of the 968, again an updated version of the 944. The 968 now featured an enlarged 3.0 liter inline 4. There had been 924 and 944 turbo versions, much as Corvette has done with Grand Sports or Z06s to keep us coming back to the showroom after the first few years of a model introduction. The 968 ultimate version was the Turbo S, which had a much-modified engine and suspension and could do 0-60 in 4.7 seconds with a top speed of 175 mph: not bad for 1993. The Turbo S was to be the final 968 version, as the mid-engine Boxster had already been announced. The plan anticipated 100 cars, but due to internal Porsche infighting only 14 were produced. Prior to 2018, while not inexpensive, the 968 Turbo S models routinely sold at auctions for what we would now consider very reasonable prices. Now to some forward-thinking individuals the 968 Turbo S seemed to be a natural to accumulate for investment. Certainly, one Michigan collector did just that. He located 11 of the 14 cars and was able to buy 6. He sold the fifth car at an auction in 2021 for a bit over \$700K. He had previously sold 4 cars in private sales, with 2 of the cars reportedly sold for over \$1 million each. We can assume that he has kept his favorite Turbo S to enjoy and hopeful price appreciation. Final thought: I don't know that Porsche was ever able to market an every-man's Porsche. It seems all models of Porsche are expensive from the factory, and then probably even more expensive by the time the dealers apply their market adjustment prices. No wonder that Porsche is considered the most profitable auto manufacturer in the world. Have you found that next great investment, like the Michigan collector? If so, please let me in on the secret; I promise not to tell anyone else.

Corvette finished the 2021 IMSA GT Le Mans (GTLM) class with a season championship with the C8R. Corvette driver Jordan Taylor finished the season with the most points. However, it was a hollow win as Corvette was the only serious competitor. At some races there were only the two Corvettes and a single Porsche. GTLM was once a highly contested IMSA class with 6-8 different marques competing at any race. In 2020 most of the teams announced they were leaving GTLM for various reasons. Once you sorted through the comments it was obvious that most teams no longer felt the GTLM expense justified the adage "Race on Sunday, sell on Monday". Corvette chose to continue in GTLM for 2021 but had announced that it also would be leaving at the end of the 2021 season. The handwriting was on the wall, but Corvette's departure spelled the end (as least for now) of GTLM. For 2022 Corvette will be fielding two cars in the GT3 class, one racing in the IMSA GTD Pro class and the second in the European FIA World Endurance

Championship. GTD Pro cars have slightly less horsepower than the former GTLM cars, plus different aerodynamics, and some mandatory driver aids such as ABS. Could Corvette end the season as GT3 champion in both series? If so, that would be a first for Corvette, so many of us will be watching the race results. Corvette has also announced that for the first time they will be building "customer" GT3 race cars, starting in 2024. The Bowling Green built frame and a kit of parts will be sent to Pratt Miller where they will assemble the race cars somewhat to customer specification. Porsche has made a lot of money supplying their GT3 race version to any customer that had the money. No word yet on pricing, but I would imagine that the Corvette GT3 cars will cost about half a million dollars. Corvette hasn't yet even started to build customer GT3s, but in an interview they acknowledged that they have one potential buyer that wants to buy 2. Not to race, just to have as toys. I suspect that should Corvette sell the GT3 to this buyer that in two years we will see a Corvette GT3 featured at Barrett Jackson with only 18 miles. This is exactly what is happening today with the latest Ford GT race cars. In Ford's case buyers had to contract that they would not sell the GT for 3 years as Ford wanted to reduce buyers flipping the cars. However, it seems that we see an extremely low mileage Ford GT at every collector car auction. Corvette has announced that it needs to see GT3 customer cars racing, not in climate-controlled collections, so it plans to prioritize sales to people that actually race. GM has never been one to avoid a profit, and I anticipate that they will make as many GT3s as Pratt Miller can accommodate and many of those will go to collectors. It seems that proposals change daily in the racing world, so watch closely for Corvette changes in 2022. Some of what you just read could be out of date by the time this column sees print.

The return of Corvette and Mustang competition. Way back in 1965 the Shelby GT350R Mustang hit Corvette hard on the racetrack. Now it seems we are going to see more competition between the two marques by 2024. Ford has announced that they will be fielding a GT3 car in the 2024 season debuting in the 24 hours of Daytona. There are expected to be two factory backed Mustang GT3s competing directly with Corvette in the GTD-Pro class. Ford will follow Corvette's lead in making GT3s available for customers that will compete in the GTD class. The Ford GT3 will be powered by a 5.0-liter Coyote based engine, and Multimatic of Canada will help in the development. The report indicates that the Mustang GT3 will have a rear mounted transaxle to provide more even weight balance for better handling. Note that Corvette has had a rear mounted transaxle since the C5 introduction in 1997.

National Corvette Museum (NCM) Report

<u>Artifact of the Month - 1956 Daytona Trophy Presented to Betty</u> <u>Skelton:</u> Each month in 2022 the curatorial staff at the NCM selects an artifact from their collection that is connected to a significant moment in Corvette history and shares its story with

us. For Women in History Month (March) the NCM celebrated Betty Skelton, known as "The First Lady of Firsts" and "The Fastest Woman on Earth". Betty was born in Pensacola, Florida in 1926. She took an interest in airplanes very early in her childhood. By the age of eight, after years of watching aircraft from the Pensacola Naval Air Station from her backyard, Betty told her parents that she wanted to be a pilot. Her parents began taking her to the local municipal airport where Betty would hop a ride with any pilot that would take her. During these flights she met Navy Ensign Kenneth Wright who would teach her to fly. Ensign Wright let Betty take the controls of his plane when she was only 12 years old! On her 16th birthday, Betty would make her first legal solo flight, which would lead her to become one of the most successful female pilots in both aerobatic flight and in setting speed records.

After an amazing career in aviation, Betty moved to North Carolina and would meet Bill France, the legendary founder of NASCAR. Bill would convince Betty to drive at the Daytona Speed Weeks where, from 1954 to 1955, she would set numerous records. In 1956, Betty would find herself



working at the Campbell-Ewald advertising firm for General Motors' Chevrolet Division. She was GM's first female technical narrator at auto shows and appeared in television and print ads. She continued driving and returned to Daytona in a 1956 Corvette specially prepared by Zora Arkus-Duntov and Smokey Yunick, and ran the flying mile at 137 mph.

This trophy was presented to Betty for this record setting run.

Although Betty Skelton was never an astronaut, she was given the respect of an astronaut by most, including the Mercury Seven. The Mercury Seven were the seven men who would become America's first astronauts that flew in all Mercury missions. Betty had met Wally Schirra, one



of the Mercury Seven, in 1948 at a hangar in Pensacola. Wally was impressed by



Betty and her capabilities as a pilot, which he never forgot about. When LOOK magazine wanted to write an article on women being in space, they worked with NASA to put Betty Skelton through the same tests as the Mercury Seven. Betty had already accomplished numerous firsts in her career, but as the first woman to pass through astronaut training, Betty proved that women were just as capable as men, in a rocket or in a Corvette.

NCM Announces that Derek E. Moore, Director of Collections and Senior Curator, <u>is leaving</u>: On March 21st NCM President & CEO Sharon Brawner announced that Derek E. Moore, Director of Collections and Senior Curator, tendered his resignation after 5 years of service at the NCM. His last day with the NCM will be on Friday, April 8. After nearly a twenty-year career moving up the ranks in the automotive museum field, Derek has decided to take a step back from the rigors of senior leadership responsibilities and spend more quality time with his young family.



In Derek's letter to the NCM, he shared, "I take with me so much that I have learned here at the NCM, knowing that the personal and professional growth I have experienced will continue with me throughout the rest of my career. As I'll be staying in the Bowling Green/Nashville area, I hope to continue making memories with the many friends I have made at the Museum and in the Corvette community for years to come. I want to thank all of you for our work here together at the NCM, and I cannot wait to see how this institution grows moving forward into the future."

Derek will not be leaving the automotive museum field in its entirety. He has accepted a position at the Lane Motor Museum in Nashville as Curator, allowing him to return to day-to-day, hands-on collections work with their expansive and unique collection. Sharon stated "Pooling our professional museum resources, Derek and I are actively working together to identify potential candidates for his replacement. We will utilize national museum search options through the American Alliance of Museums and the National Association of Automotive Museums organization, and others to recruit qualified candidates for our review. Please join me in thanking Derek for his incredible service to the NCM, and to provide him with our very best wishes as he moves forward".

Corvette Challenge Racing Series Marketing Corvette Donated: Thanks to a generous donation made by John & Perrie Richards, the National Corvette Museum has added to its collection a genuine RPO R7F Corvette built for the 1989 Corvette Challenge Racing Series. 
