Editor's Note: Carl and Lorene have been CMCS members since January 1997. They also have a 1957 Venetian Red Corvette.

Like many of you, I have wanted a Corvette since I first rode in one in 1964. A friend's father owned a gas station in near Fort Meade, Maryland. He had purchased a Saddle Tan 1963 Corvette, 4 speed Convertible and asked

me if I would like to go for a ride. A 21-year-old kid could not say no. The thing I remember the most was my head nodding forward and backward every time he shifted. I finally had to grab the hand hold in front of me to try stay in my seat while sitting up. That sold me and was the beginning of my desire. 19 years later, 5 kids and lots of full room cars (mostly station wagons and Plymouth Vans) I had to have a Corvette and I had to have it before I was 40. I almost made it. I found what I thought was the perfect car, a 1963 Chevrolet Corvette Red/Red split window coupe. I didn't know about Corvette clubs, matching numbers, people that were over the top on knowledge (John Paul Nelson III) or if I had made a good or bad purchase. After I purchased the car, I got word that there was a person in my neighborhood that was a Corvette intelligence officer (seaman). I met John Paul at his house a few days later and the car was put on a list of "find out all there is to know" about it. He gave me insights on trying to find out all I could about this Corvette. I started my research and finally after 3 years, I found out this car sold at an auction in Texas and that its origin was a junk yard in Texas. Someone there found a good body and put it on a good frame and added a few things. Motor, transmission, paint, and interior. Who could ever know that there could be so many different things a Corvette could be reassembled from? John Paul also introduced me to NCRS which convinced me that I had purchased a car that could never become an original car. That was well before I ever considered having a car judged by NCRS.

So, that is when I started looking again. I have now been through many Corvettes including another 63 split window red/red fuelie, frame off restoration and NCRS judged. After that I started a collection of different Corvettes. Buy one, play with it, sell it, buy another, all newer. My current final purchase is the one on the front cover. A 2016 C7R special edition with a race decorated cover (also shown here somewhere) This is a Corvette Racing Yellow ZO6, LT4 6.2L Supercharged 8-speed paddle shift automatic (so the wife can drive it) (her color also).

I made the trip to Bowling Green in November 2015 and built the engine on the 10th (with a lot of help) and then came home to wait for it to arrive. I have purchased several Corvettes from a dealer in Michigan and he wanted to

purchase a car that he had sold me 3 years earlier. We made a deal that he would send a truck to my local dealer with my new Corvette and pick up my old car and take it back to Michigan. The Corvette was originally going to be here around the end of November or beginning of December but got delayed (weather). I finally picked the car up at my dealership in January and had to wait for a non-rainy day to get it home. (It never rains in Seattle).

This car is truly a special edition in that there are 650 of them in the world. 500 in the United States. It is truly an amazing car. I will admit that I do not get out and drive it very much, but when I do it just puts a smile on my face.





Under the Hood by Kevin Jewell



The early winter and spring auto auctions have concluded, and I imagine that a lot of you watched Barrett-Jackson or Mecum. I know at least one CMCS couple that has traveled each winter to the B-J Scottsdale event as their mid-winter break. Not to buy a car, but to be part of the atmosphere and to have great seats at an impressive car show as well. I routinely record both the B-J and

Mecum events for viewing at my leisure when I can fast forward through the endless advertisements. I have talked before about another auction site, Bring a Trailer, or BaT. BaT was started in 2007 and the name implies what was very common in the early days. Project cars, barn finds, rusted hulks good only for parts were all part of the early BaT offerings. The key point was that you needed a trailer to tow your purchase home. Maybe you would find some half decent drivers being offered on BaT, but you didn't find high end cars. In the last 13 years, BaT has totally changed, and it is growing rapidly. In 2021, \$829 million worth of vehicles traded hands on BaT, more than double the 2020 sales. BaT sales volume now exceeds Mecum and Barrett-Jackson. What fuels this huge sales increase at BaT? Well first it is cost. I will compare BaT with Barrett-Jackson. On BaT sellers pay as little as \$99 and can upgrade to a "Plus Photo" package with a huge number of photos for another \$250. Buyers pay a 5%

commission with a minimum of \$250 and a MAXIMUM of \$5,000 regardless of the selling price. At B-J, sellers pay 8% commission (\$800 minimum) and buyers pay another 10% commission. For a \$50,000 nice driver condition collector vehicle the expected total seller + buyer cost at BaT would be \$2,849 and at B-I the total commissions would be \$9,000. The most expensive vehicle sold on BaT in 2021 was a special Porsche at \$1.9 million. Just think of the difference in the buyer and seller cost between the two sites on this Porsche and it is obvious why BaT has grown so fast. B-I doesn't advertise the fact, but I would speculate that if I were to approach them about my mega-buck Porsche that they might well cut me a deal on the seller commission. I suspect they do this routinely for the large collections when an entire collection is being sold off at their auction. Perhaps B-I also has non-advertised "deals" on the buyer commission for those buyers that routinely purchase at B-J. Probably a case of whatever you can negotiate based upon your dollar volume. In almost all cases the seller and buyer at any of these auctions is probably facing a few more thousand dollars to ship their vehicles to auction or home. However, at BaT the auction is "held" at the seller's garage. Typically, prospective buyers can make arrangement to examine the vehicle, but the buyer needs to travel to each vehicle they might be interested in. Consequently, another advantage for the seller at BaT is no transportation costs. Success breeds imitation and BaT already has one significant competitor that has started advertising in some of the automotive press. Shiftgate Automotive Auctions is promoting that they have NO seller commissions. Another major difference between BaT and B-J is the way the money changes hands. At B-J, assuming the car sells, B-J adds 10% to the auction price and the buyer pays the full amount. B-I subtracts the seller's commission from the auction price and remits the balance to the seller. Thus B-J keeps about 18% of the deal. On BaT, the seller pays the \$99, or \$349 seller package commission when the car is listed. All bidders are pre-registered and have posted a valid credit card with BaT. When a vehicle is sold, BaT charges the buyer's credit card with the buyer commission of between \$250-\$5,000. It is up to the buyer and seller to actually meet to exchange money and take possession of the vehicle. There have been cases where the buyer doesn't complete the purchase. The buyer's credit card has already been charged, so BaT is somewhat whole, but they still have a credibility issue. The harmed seller can now re-list the same vehicle on BaT and the buyer who failed to complete the deal is banned for "life" from the site. About 4 years ago Judy bought her toy, a bright red BMW Z3 M Coupe, the car that is sometimes called the Clown Shoe, for obvious reasons if you have seen one of these cars. We bought the coupe from a local collector vehicle dealer, but he had purchased the car 2 years earlier on a BaT auction. I have found the auction and all the comments from the 6-year-old auction on the BaT web site. It is sometimes funny and sometimes painful to see all the comments, positive and negative, on what we consider a prized possession.

Continuing on the auction report, it appears that quality Corvettes prices are still increasing. At as recent Mecum auction a 1969 L88 Vette sold for \$305K. This car was Bloomington Gold certified but also was Can-Am White, probably not the most popular color for the year. Originally L88 Vettes were not well known

but have become legendary. In 1969, there were three 427 ci engine options. The hydraulic lifter L68 was rated at 400 hp and cost \$327. Most thought the tripower L71 was the big dog. It was rated 435 hp and cost \$437. The L88 had single 4-barrel carb, was only rated 430 hp and cost a whopping \$1,032. Is it any wonder that only 116 L88s were sold vs. 2,722 L71s? However, once the hood was up, the game was over. The L88 didn't really have much of an air cleaner. The little device on top of the carb looked more like a flame arrestor in case the engine backfired. Although today most would acknowledge that the L88 should have been rated at 500+ hp, Corvette purposely understated the real numbers as they intended the L88 to be sold to road racers, more than street driven. Former club member (and former president) Al Dager had a 1968 or 1969 L88 back in the day and extensively street raced the Vette. Al would talk about how he was tuning the engine almost every month. I remember seeing Al's former car on display at the Corvette and High Performance Swap Meet a few years ago. The L88 was a three-year option, offered only 1967-69. In 1970 the 427 engine was replaced with a 454 ci engine rated at 390 hp.

Car Corral at Pacific Raceways Vintage Races

The Pacific Northwest Historics features many of the world's rarest and most beautiful pre-1985 race cars. Two Lotus cars will be on display, the 19 that Dan Gurney drove to victory in the 1st Pacific Northwest Grand Prix September 30, 1962 and the 1965 Lotus 35, number 18 of 22 built. Originally raced 1965-1966 under the Ron Harris Team Lotus. Other Favorite marques include BMW, Mustang, Camaro, Porsche, Alfa Romeo, Corvette, and Cobra will be on display. Most are in mint condition through extensive restoration, and many attain straightaway speeds in excess of 150 miles per hour. Competitors come from all over the West Coast and Canada. The wheel-to-wheel competition runs on the challenging 2.25-mile Pacific Raceways road course. The paddock is open to all spectators so you can view the cars up close and visit with the drivers, many of whom travel long distances to make this race. You can cross the track and view the action in the S curves on the back side of the track.

As in past years, the net proceeds from the event go to the uncompensated care fund at Children's Hospital in Seattle.

The car corral is an unique opportunity to display our cars adjacent to the paddock and the track. Each day they allow up to 250 cars in the car corral with a maximum of 20 from any individual club. We park in a designated Corvette area with other Corvette clubs. Car corral participants are allowed parade laps of the track during the lunch break. This is a great opportunity to drive the line on the race course at a parade lap brisk pace, conditions permitting.

Although the car corral is open Friday-Sunday, CMCS will be participating on Saturday, July 2. Some of you know the drill, but for the newer members I will repeat the details.

Car Corral participation is for PRE-REGISTERED CARS ONLY. There are no exceptions. If you don't have a car corral pass, you will be turned away.

Cost is \$30 for the car corral pass, which includes driver-spectator admission. Additional general admission for adult spectators is \$25 each, children 7-16 are \$5 each, and children under 7 are free. Registration is by check written to CMCS and sent to me at the address on the next page.

Arrival is generally 8-10 AM, and you can depart any time you want, although most people will at least stay until the parade laps. You are not committed to a full day. It is not a car show per se, but a display of vehicles of racing fans, or at least easy, close in reserved parking with other Corvettes. Although there is some judging by vehicle age groups and some trophies awarded, most of us driving C5 and newer cars will not be part of the judging.

Since Saturday is the most requested day, it is in our best interest to beat the straggler clubs with our car corral request. There are logistics involved at both our club end and more so at SOVREN. The organizers don't have time to deal with individuals for the car corral, so they require that one person from each club act as the representative and compile all requests into one. If the organizers hit the maximum number of cars, the remainder of the requests will be returned unfilled. I must receive your check by Saturday, May 28. Sign-ups via the website will not be counted. That weekend, I will be compiling all of the requests and mailing our joint request to SOVREN. I should add that SOVREN does not issue refunds for cancellations. Then a couple weeks before the event, I will be mailing you the car corral pass and the spectator admission ticket(s). Should it be raining and you decide the morning of the event not to drive your Corvette, you can always come with your daily driver and park in the normal lot, as your spectator admission tickets are good regardless.

New this year is Children's Checkered Flag. The Children's Checkered Flag Club is a level of giving opportunity for individuals and businesses to donate \$1,000 deductible contribution to uncompensated care fund for Children's. You will be recognized in the SOVREN program and receive 4 weekend event tickets and two decals that reflect you are a member of the 2022 CCFC. This is a 501c3 tax deductible donation (8.2-3957522). Please contact deborahhaley@msn.com for enrolling. Also, new this year is a COVID Alert: Track policy for wearing masks follows whatever the current Washington State guidelines have mandated, please contact Pacific Raceways pacificraceways.com, (253) 639-5927 or deborahhaley@msn.com. NCRS Report (National Corvette Restorers Society) by Danette Sawin-CMCS NCRS Representative

D-Day is almost here!

In April I started writing about the restoration journey of my 1-owner 1970 Coupe. I wanted to touch on some of the details that make a great restoration complete.

One of the first things I did was to take off the American Racing Turbine wheels that my mother had put on the car in 1972. I could have purchased aftermarket GM Steel Wheels but decided to find OEM





ones. That journey took me 5 months and \$800 later I had 4 date correct wheels. I had them blasted, and painted GM Argent Silver w/a green mist tint (correct for the 70 model year). The car came with the P02 wire baskets and not the standard Rallye wheels. When I pulled the spare tire down I discovered a Firestone Wide Oval 60 in the back. I purchased 4 reproduction Wide Ovals to match. Total Cost: \$2400. Look: Priceless!

The interior was in remarkably great shape for being 52 years old. This car came with the custom interior which includes leather seats. The carpet needed to be replaced and the seat-backs were pretty scuffed up. I have been using NWCrafted Interiors in Everett for my Pontiac restoration and without hesitation took my seats, door panels and back compartment doors to Scott for some much needed TLC. The before and after pictures of the seat backs tell the tale. They turned out beautiful and look like they did the day they rolled off the showroom floor. I decided to leave the leather as is. It def shows some "age" but it has a lot of life in it and should not really factor into deductions in NCRS judging.







Door interior panels were next. Again in great shape with the exception of the carpet inserts. Those were gingerly replaced with replica exact replacement carpet. Thankfully the interior is all black so dye lots are not an issue. As one would say "the devil is in the details". It is safe to say the details has drained my savings. What does a restoration like this cost? Off the top of my head - just for parts - OER, and NOS have run into the 18K range. That does not include any paint and body fees.

The carpet common to the back compartment door was replaced and a new leather loop was also replicated.

These parts are now at Showcase awaiting final reassembly. The chrome is on and it is finally starting to look like a whole car again.



To be able to see the car in this form again after so many years hidden away is a thrill. The plan is to trailer the car back to Bothell in May - tune her up in the garage and then trailer her to the Big Sky Corvette Show in Whitefish, MT Memorial Day weekend. While I would love to drive, I am still working out the bugs. Next month should hopefully be the big reveal - or darn close to it! Stay tuned!

National Corvette Museum (NCM) Report

As we enter the month of May we are also entering prime driving months for our Corvettes here in the Pacific Northwest. Of course our clubs will be having numerous activities you can participate in, whether it's a cruise, autocross, car shows, in person

meetings, or just fun drives. The National Corvette Museum has also put together some fabulous Museum in Motion events that provide opportunities to take a once in a lifetime trip in your Corvette - consider signing up for one of these events. There are two Southwest Parks tours, and a Colorado tour that are very doable by those of us in the NW corner of our country. I went on the SW Parks tour in 2019 and it was spectacular. Trip details are further down in this article. Meanwhile, here is some information about a few other things happening from our friends at the NCM:

Artifact of the Month – Zora Arkus-Duntov Letter: Each month in 2022 the curatorial staff at the NCM selects an artifact from their collection that is connected to a significant moment in Corvette history and shares its story with us. This month a document from the man most people associate with the ultimate success of the early Corvettes is featured. This three-page internal memo, written by Russian-born engineer/race car driver Zora Arkus-Duntov, marked a turning point in the history of Corvette and performance vehicles at General Motors.

Zora had already made a name for himself racing and developing cars with Allard, Porsche, and Daimler-Benz. He had also come up with the overhead valve conversions for the Ford V8 engines, dramatically increasing horsepower. When he saw the Corvette



debuted at the 1953 Motorama, he was impressed with the way the car looked but quickly realized that the Corvette lacked the performance that sports car enthusiasts expected. He wrote to Ed Cole, then Chief Engineer for Chevrolet, about ways the Corvette could be improved. Zora was hired shortly after that as an Assistant Staff Engineer for Chevrolet.

Being a race car driver himself, Zora could see that Ford was building a reputation among those who were looking for higher performance, with no real answer from General Motors. He saw Corvette as a vehicle for changing that.



He wrote this impassioned letter titled, "Thoughts Pertaining to Youth, Hot Rodders and Chevrolet" to Ed Cole and Maurice Olley, the head of R&D Engineering. In it, Zora makes the case that Corvette should get the performance upgrades it needed to compete with Ford and win over racers and "hot rodders."

His persistence would lead to the V8 going into Corvette in 1955, and ultimately the small block Chevrolet V8 engine would become the most universally accepted racing engine in the world.

The original letter was later presented to Herb Fishel by Zora, in recognition of the work Herb was doing as the Executive Director of GM Racing. Herb would then donate this historic document to the National Corvette Museum on September 4, 2015, saying, "This is the most important document in the history of Chevrolet Performance, and it belongs in the Corvette Museum."

This exciting project is made possible by the generosity of donors Tim and Melanie McMichael of Gypsum, Colorado. According to Tim, "It has always been our dream to be a part of an educational experience that could spark a fire or be the catalyst for a child to see that it is possible for them to do or be anything in the world - from an



astronaut, to a doctor, to a car designer."
