Under the Hood by Kevin Jewell



Aluminum in Jaguar History. As the owner of a British sports car, we often visit the local All British Field Meet. The polished aluminum double overhead cam engine head on a Jaguar big six is definite automotive eye candy. Did you realize that Jag first introduced this aluminum head on the 1948 XK-120 sports car?

Jaguar engineers had been doing research on aluminum heads even during WWII. The Jag engine block was still cast iron. Since the combustion process takes place in a chamber enclosed by the cylinder head, much of the heat is

absorbed by the head. Aluminum dissipates heat better than cast iron. The engine block has the piston moving up and down in the cylinder at rapid speeds. The cast iron block is tougher than aluminum and has better lubricating characteristics. At the time, the Jaguar cast iron block with aluminum heads was seen as the best of all worlds. Chevy was a bit late to the aluminum party, but once at the dance the engineers kept trying new applications.

Corvette Aluminum History. In my December column I had mentioned that Corvette had planned to introduce aluminum cylinder heads on the 1960 fuelie engine. However, production problems occurred, Corvette eliminated the aluminum head option and only the Briggs Cunningham race cars (and limited other racers) were equipped with the aluminum heads. With the introduction of the C2 in 1963, Corvette, working with wheel manufacturer Kelsey Hayes, announces an aluminum wheel option. Again, quality problems arose with air leakage and even wheels coming loose in tests and the option was eliminated. Corvette records show 13 sets of wheels sold, but the "Corvette Black Book" reports that no original window stickers showing actual retail delivery of the aluminum wheels in 1963 have been found. By 1964 the aluminum wheels become somewhat commonplace with 800 sets installed, and many wheels are "back dated" to the 1963 model. In 1967, Corvette announces another aluminum cylinder head option, this time for the 427-435 hp optional engine. The heads almost doubled the price of the 427-435 hp engine option. Only 16 engines were so equipped.

Then in 1969 Corvette announced the exotic ZL-1 all aluminum engine option for the Corvette and Camaro. These very special engines were hand assembled in a clean room in the Tonawanda engine plant. Perhaps due to the scrap rate of the engine blocks, the ZL-1 engine was a \$4,700 option, while a base Corvette convertible was priced at about \$4,400. No wonder that only two Corvettes were ZL-1 equipped.

Vega. Working with Reynolds Aluminum, Chevy went all-in on aluminum with the 1970 Vega. Interesting enough, the Vega had a 2.3 liter 4-cylinder aluminum engine block with cast iron cylinder head, the reverse of the Jaguar approach. Initially Vega was a big hit with the automotive press and consumers, but problems soon surfaced. One of the major problems was the aluminum engine block which had a silica wearing surface on the cylinder walls. Partly due to a small radiator and reduced coolant, the engines would overheat, the cylinders distort, and the piston rings would literally scrape off the silica coating. This, coupled with leaking cylinder head gaskets, simply got worse with each heat cycle resulting in excessive oil consumption and finally many of the Vega engines totally failed. Chevy replaced thousands of engines with multiple recalls. Interesting side note to the Vega saga is the Cosworth Vega introduced in 1975 equipped with a British designed twin overhead cam aluminum head for the Vega engine. These Vegas had extensive suspension and brake work and were



excellent handling cars. However, the Cosworth Vega was priced at only about \$1,000 less than a 75 Vette, so it is even somewhat surprising that 3,500 were sold over two years of production. This special Cosworth Vega engine was assembled in that same Tonawanda clean room engine assembly room as the special ZL-1 engine from 1969.

Today, our current Corvette engines (C5 and later) have both aluminum engine blocks and cylinder heads. There is an obvious weight savings which helps both the handling and fuel efficiency of our Corvettes. Chevy uses thin cast iron cylinder liners that are press fit into the aluminum block. The cylinder liners provide the wearing surface for the piston movement up and down in the cylinder. Some engine manufacturers are using a spray-on coating on the aluminum cylinder walls, but at least this writer feels more secure with the cast iron cylinder liners supplied with the current Corvette engines; perhaps because I watched the Vega failure. Aluminum frame was used in the C6 Z06s starting with the 2006 model and the subsequent C6 ZR1s. After a slow start, we can say that aluminum sees extensive use in our current Corvettes.

Formula E. As the world started emphasis on electric vehicles, Formula E was conceived with Season 1 races starting in 2014. Initially the cars didn't have enough battery storage to complete a full race so each driver had two cars. Then with the Gen 2 racers, the race could be accomplished with a single car. However, Formula E has continued to struggle. Many of the major manufacturers announced they were leaving the series at the end of the 2020 and 2021 season. Then in Season 7 at the Valencia race, Formula E suffered an embarrassment when most of the cars were unable to finish the race when they ran out of battery and only 9 cars were at the finish line. This was the result of the former rules regarding how energy was subtracted for laps behind the pace cars, as it was assumed that the cars would use less energy behind the pace car than in full race mode. Yes, the cars would use less energy, but the organizers miscalculated the amount. For season 8, there are new rules about race laps led by the pace car and certainly new entries to replace the former factory teams. For instance, Andretti Motorsports had previously fielded a BMW sponsored team, but now that BMW has pulled out of the series, Andretti had to find a new home. Stepping up was Avalanche, which is a blockchain company, to become the new sponsor of the now named Avalanche Andretti team. I know I had not heard of Avalanche so we should assume that sponsorship is intended to make this company a household name, at least in Europe where most of the Formula E effort exits. Season 8 also has changes involving how each team will complete in short sessions with winners advancing to semi-finals and then onto the finals with the top losers in each race also having the chance to advance to the finals. I read the rules change twice and yet I still don't fully understand how each team advances. It will be interesting to watch how Formula E navigates these changes.

National Corvette Museum (NCM) Report

We are turning the page to Summer this month! Prime driving months for our Corvettes here in the Pacific Northwest. Hopefully you've been out enjoying various club activities in your Corvette and there will be more coming your way. I've

been on a couple of caravans and cruises to various locations, both for day trips, and on overnight trips. CMCS has many activities that you can be involved in that enhances your Corvette ownership experience. The National Corvette Museum has also put together some fabulous Museum in Motion (MiM) events that provide opportunities to take a once in a lifetime trip in your Corvette. Consider signing up for one of these events. There are two Southwest Parks tours, and a Colorado tour that are very doable by those of us in the NW corner of our country. I went on the SW Parks tour in 2019 and it was spectacular. Trip details are further down in this article. Meanwhile, here is some information about a few other things happening from our friends at the NCM:

NCM announces the 2022 members-elect to the Corvette Hall of Fame: The

Corvette Hall of Fame was established by the National Corvette Museum in 1998 to confer official recognition upon the most influential individuals in the history of the Corvette and to honor their achievements. Nominees for the Corvette Hall of Fame are selected by an anonymous panel of Corvette experts and then voted upon by a separate group of 100 anonymous Corvette experts. Since its inception in 1998, the Corvette Hall of Fame has inducted only 75 people. Each year, a leader is inducted into the Corvette Hall of Fame from one of three categories: GM-Chevrolet, Racing, and Enthusiast. The 2022 members-elect are:

- GM-Chevrolet Ed Welburn, Retired VP, GM Global Design
- Racing Gary Pratt & Jim Miller, Founders of Pratt & Miller Engineering
- Enthusiast Elfi Arkus-Duntov, The First Lady of Corvette.

Ed Welburn - began working at GM in 1972 as an associate designer and would rise through the ranks to become the first Global VP of Design ever, with a team of 2,500 people in design studios around the world. To foster a sense of teamwork and cooperation between studios, Ed invited all design staff worldwide to submit their ideas for the C7 Corvette. He held the bar high, encouraging his team to make a Corvette that could be called "Stingray" once again.

Gary Pratt & Jim Miller - In 1989, race car builder Gary Pratt and successful businessman/visionary Jim Miller, joined forces to form Pratt & Miller Engineering. In 1996, Chevrolet would approach them about building and campaigning a factory-backed racing effort beginning with the C5 Corvette. Since their debut in 1999, Corvette Racing has attained eight Le Mans wins and 15 Championships, while working with the Corvette production team to advance the street car development through technology transfer. Their efforts have not only advanced the reputation of Corvette but created a worldwide fan base along the way.

Elfi Arkus-Duntov - Known as the First Lady of Corvette, Elfriede "Elfi" Wolff married Zora Arkus-Duntov in February of 1939 just before the outbreak of World War II. Throughout his career with Chevrolet as the Chief Engineer of Corvette, she was a constant companion, impressing everyone with her grace, enthusiasm, and knowledge of Corvette. After his retirement in 1975, Zora and Elfi would attend many Corvette shows together, often sitting for hours to sign autographs. After his passing in 1996, she became a source and principal enabler behind the definitive biography of Zora's life.

Corvette Hall of Fame members-elect have distinguished themselves not only through their accomplishments but also by their high standards of integrity and character that reflect and enhance the reputation of the Corvette and the National Corvette Museum.

"This year's members-elect are simply remarkable," said Sharon Brawner, President and CEO of the National Corvette Museum. "The Corvette has long engendered a very passionate following, and we are thrilled that these deserving individuals have been recognized for their own extraordinary Corvette stories."

Those interested in attending the induction ceremony of the Corvette Hall of Fame can purchase tickets in June when registration opens for the museum's anniversary event which will be held September 1-3. Nominations for the 2023 Corvette Hall of Fame members-elect will be open from May 2nd-August 5th, 2022. Learn more at corvettehalloffame.org.

Artifact of the Month - ALIEN: Each month in 2022 the curatorial staff at the NCM selects an artifact from their collection that is connected to a significant moment in Corvette history and shares its story with us. This month the featured artifact is "Alien" - A Tom Peters designed model utilized to inspire the GM design teams. Tom worked for 35 years in the GM design division, and ultimately retired as GM Design Team Director of Design for the GM Performance Car Studio. Tom was a 2019 GM inductee into the NCM Hall of Fame He is currently a Consulting Curator of Exhibits at the NCM, a position he started in January 2021.

When it comes to automotive design, inspiration can come from the strangest places. Bill Mitchell, VP of Design at GM from 1958 until 1977, was inspired to create the 1961 Mako Shark Corvette by a mako shark that he

caught off the coast of Florida. With a dark blue upper half that blends into a white lower body, in profile it looks like a shark on wheels.

Other designers took inspiration from fighter jets such as the YF-22, SR-71, F-177, and others. If you don't know those aircraft, look them up and guess which Corvettes they influenced.

Proving that ideas can come from anywhere, this month's featured artifact is a 1/3 scale model created by Tom Peters in the mid-1980s after watching the movie ALIENS. The long forehead, jutting lower jaw, the attitude of it, is part H.R. Giger, part Ridley Scott, and all Tom Peters. For extra measure, this mid-engine monster has another character from the movie worked into the design that we'll let you discover.



As designers push the boundaries in extreme ways such as this, ideas are spawned, mutated, and morphed into the automobiles of the future. You can read more about Tom here: <u>https://www.corvettemuseum.org/tom-peters-retired-gm-design-chief-joins-national-corvette-museum-team/</u>
