55 LAPS AGO: November 1967. Maureen (Mo) Morse was president. The meeting was held in the Charleston Room of the Benjamin Franklin Hotel @ 5th & Virginia (*Wonder what's there now? Its the Westin.*) in downtown Seattle. Cocktails were 85¢ or you could have an "Endless Cup" of coffee for 25¢. A 22-minute movie, "Sports Car Fun" about rallying, autocross and sports car

racing was shown, followed by a migration to Trader Vics (also in the Benjamin Franklin) for Mai Tais & other exotic refreshments.

Newsletter Articles:

• A recap by Frank Olsheski of the October 14th **CMCS Tune Up Session** held at Alan Green Chevrolet. Alan Green provided mechanics, the use of any tools & equipment and a person to man the parts department. By 10am Corvettes with their mouths open occupied all nine stalls in one wing of the shops getting everything from minor plug & points replacement to carburetor (*remember those?*) rebuilds to fuel injection adjustments & distributors removed and tested on the distributor machine (*the what?*). 15 Corvettes and 1 Chevelle passed through the shop during the day. • **Corvettes in Racing** article by member Dick Losk describing how Ken Jones and Rick Stark (*both still members in 2022*) co-drove Jones' 59 Corvette to a second place finish in the Canadian Westwood 7-Hour race proving Corvettes do hold together. The fast Duo beat out a 350 Mustang and a Camaro along with 35 other cars. Rick Stark turned in the fastest lap for the Duo at 1:23:6. The Jones entry also had the largest pit crew turn out of 15 people, not including the drivers. Reporter Losk stated, "Most stops went pretty quick even though it was hinted we looked like a Chinese Fire Drill. The only one mishap all day was a gas bath received by myself during one refueling. I didn't mind the burning pain as much as I resented not being allowed to smoke." (*It's believed that Ken still owns that '59 Corvette in 2022. Has anyone seen it lately?*)

50 LAPS AGO: November 1972. The meeting was held at the Riverside Inn Restaurant in Tukwila. Jeff Weymouth was President. A dinner of appetizers, salad, sirloin steak, baked potatoes, vegetables, rolls/butter, dessert and beverage was \$4.50 including tax & tip. (*Don't we all miss those days.*) A guest speaker gave a talk on handwriting analysis.

Membership: 82. Frank Olsheski was chair. New members were Ed & Barbara Rolfes.

Bylaws: The following amendment to CMCS Bylaws was approved:

"A former member in good standing may rejoin at any time with full payment of regular dues for that year, if they meet all qualifications for membership."

There was a CMCS display at the Autorama.

Articles & Such:

- "Blow Your Engine at SIR" by Jeff Weymouth. Discussed a practice session at the raceway.
- Report on an "Old Highway Tour" by Ruth Bogle. Significant highlights were two women drivers getting bee stings while driving, one refusing to let her daughter take home a frog hitchhiker in the car, and having to turn back due to a snow slide (after a snowball fight) in July. (*Historian notes: The above* referenced daughter of one of those 2 women drivers is now the proud owner of, and has recently restored, her mom's 1970 Mulsanne Blue coupe to NCRS standards and is a current CMCS member. Not sure what happened to the frog.)
- Report on a Westport salmon trip. Highlights were poor results and several spending significant time bending over the rail looking at the water.
- Three different reports including a Skagit tour, beach party and Leavenworth festival.
- A news item on a deal for Chilton Repair Manuals for the different series of Corvettes. (How many of us would be interested in such a manual for a modern car, assuming we had the \$30,000 needed for the tools to use it.)
- "Does Sex Sell?" Discussed whether pretty women in car ads help sell them and offered conclusions by an expert that said yes, if not used too much. (Not kidding here!)



- "A day in the life of a Concours Judge" by Ruth Bogle.
- "Exhaust Gas" by Frank Olsheski. Full of humorous quips and other bits of info that had nothing to do with Corvettes.
- "A 2-week, 2-Vette Vacation" by Ernie & Melody Kahler and John & Penny Grosso. A 3-page small print missive about the 2 couples making a 3-state trip. Both couples driving early C3 big block coupes. The rule was "a place for everything and everything in its place and not a place for one more thing".
- "Early History of the Marque Club". Discussed by whom and how CMCS was formed. (*This was written about 8 years from the 1963 initiation of the club.*)

Under the Hood by Kevin Jewell



Most of us in the automotive fraternity are familiar with the name Smokey Yunick. Smokey was well known as probably the best innovator (some would say cheater) of the NASCAR rule book. I have written before of some of his creative interpretations. However, there is a less known story about Smokey. He supposedly spent 32 years developing a "Vapor

Engine". The basic idea is that the engine was designed to get the air fuel mixture to super-hot temperature before introduction into the cylinder. This would create unbelievable extra power. There is still one automobile with the vapor engine. It is a Pontiac Fiero 2.5-liter 4 cylinder that supposedly will do 0-60 mph in 5 to 6.5 seconds (depending on the article read) and get 51 mpg. With this type of performance and economy it would seem that every car on the road today would be running this technology. If you follow the patent application he filed, the first step in heating the air/fuel mixture is a heat exchanger plate under the carburetor. Hot water from the radiator is pumped through this plate to heat the mixture. I might add that my 67 Sunbeam Tiger had this exact heat exchanger under the carb as supplied by engine supplier Ford. The purpose was simply to heat the air on colder days to improve drivability. Everyone I know immediately removed this heat exchanger for improvement in top end performance, and I still have the heat exchanger in a box in my storage. After this heat exchanger the air/fuel mixture went through the second phase to mix the fuel with a turbine wheel that was driven by the exhaust hot air turbine. That sounds a lot like a turbocharger and worked like a turbo, but in Smokey's patent application this device was called a homogenizer. After the homogenizer the air/fuel mixture was piped to the combustion chamber with all the plumbing wrapped with heat retaining insulation to maximize the intake air/fuel temperature before it entered the cylinder. This little 2.5-liter engine was supposedly putting out over 250 horsepower 30 years ago. I have read that this engine had custom forged pistons, special piston rings, very expensive Carrillo connecting rods and other highperformance components. I assume all these improvements were intended to help the engine survive early detonation that would normally destroy the engine. There is only one known hot vapor engine in existence and that engine is in this same Fiero which has been donated for display at the Big Daddy Don Garlits' museum in Florida. Smokey's family maintain that the real key to the engine was the exact tune needed to keep the engine from detonating itself to death. Of course, that exact tune was not part of the patent application and Smokey supposedly took that key concept to his grave.

Now for some counter points. Those of you that had a carbureted Corvette probably remember how much stronger the engine was on a cool evening rather than during the heat of day. I was raised in eastern/central Washington, and I will assure you that although I wasn't driving a Corvette, we were all aware of the

difference in performance between the heat of the day and evening. Why? Well air is denser when it is cooler. Since engines typically run at a stoichiometric ratio of 14.6:1, denser air equates to more fuel which then equates to better performance. Have you ever installed a cold air intake on one of your cars? The intent is the same; get the coolest densest air into the engine. Turbocharging or supercharging add heat to the air since the compression of the air generates heat. Some lower performance systems will just plumb the compressed air into the intake system, but as the boost pressure increases, higher performance engines will all employ a heat exchanger to REMOVE some of the heat before the air enters the intake. Our C6 ZR1, C7 Z06 and ZR1 all tried to cool the intake air after the supercharger. Seems the exact reverse of the vapor engine. Supposedly, Smokey also had 100 tires specially constructed by Goodyear using Smokey's patented "secret rubber". These tires were claimed to be extra smooth, almost silent in operation and expected to be guaranteed for 100,000 miles. The Fiero has a set of these tires, but in all these years no one has apparently tried to commercialize on this patented special rubber compound. I expect Smokey laughed at the NASCAR inspectors when they couldn't find his latest innovation of the rules, and I wonder if Smokey is still laughing at the rest of us about his vapor engine. If you are a fan of conspiracy stories, Smokey's friend, and owner of the Fiero claims that Chevrolet killed the vapor engine. The vapor engine Fiero would sell for a third of the Corvette price, have better performance and far better gas mileage. What else could Chevrolet do?

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National Corvette Museum (NCM) Report

Today as I put this column together it is raining for the first time in a long time. We are probably back to our typical fall weather now, which may mean less time out driving your Corvette, so now you have more time for a little reading. So, sit back and let's see

what the latest news is from our friends at the National Corvette Museum.

Driven by Design Exhibit is now open: A few months ago, I mentioned that the NCM was working on a new exhibit called "Driven by Design", which is now officially open! The 6,500-square-foot exhibit is focused on the history of Corvette's design process and the stories of the diverse group of individuals responsible for the most iconic sports car design of all time.

This long-term exhibit (currently planned for the next 10 years), located in the Museum's Design and Engineering Gallery, has been developed by the Museum's curatorial staff along with co-curator, Retired GM Design Chief Tom Peters, for several years and was designed to inspire, educate, and entertain National Corvette Museum guests. This exhibit uses interactive elements, artifacts, hands-on objects, and motion-activated content to help guests learn about the design history of the Corvette.

The exhibit features Corvette's Vice Presidents of Design beginning with Harley Earl in the 1950s through Mike Simcoe today. The exhibit also reveals the lesserknown stories of those who worked out of the spotlight but were no less influential in creating the lines that would shape the auto industry. Additionally, this exhibit shines a light on the diversity



of the individuals responsible for Corvette's iconic design.

This exhibit also provides a full overview of the intricate and exciting process of designing a car, from sketches and renderings to clay and prove-out models. From exterior and interior design to future-looking projects and designs. With the use of interactive elements, guests will see the actual tools and models that led to the Corvettes seen on the road today. Various Corvettes from the NCM Collection will be rotated through the ongoing exhibit.

NCM Motorsports Park to Become Nation's First Commercialized Track with Z06

Fleet: The NCM Motorsports Park (MSP) announced in September the expansion of its vehicle fleet with the introduction of two Z06 Corvettes, making

the MSP the first and only commercialized track in the nation to offer consumer facing-driving experiences in the much-anticipated new Corvette model.

MSP will allow guests to experience the power and performance of this amazing vehicle, by driving four (4) laps (above highway speeds) in a lead/follow format around the 3.2-mile, 23-turn road course. Guests can also purchase a Fast Pack which will add a Zero to Sixty launch on the straightaway and a Hot Lap driven by an MSP professional. This add-on is designed to showcase the car's performance capabilities in a safe and fun environment. The Z06s will boast a V8 engine with roughly 670 horsepower and a redline of 8600 rpm, sure to bring excitement to all sports car fans.

"We pride ourselves on delivering world-class experiences to our guests," says Greg Waldon, Executive Director of the NCM Motorsports Park. "By adding the Z06s to our fleet, we're taking our services to the next



level. Being the first track in the nation to offer this kind of experience is special, and we look forward to thrilling Corvette enthusiasts and car lovers from across the country."

The MSP's new Z06s will be built later this month and will be available to the public later in the fall for Touring Laps. In the meantime, fans can help design the Corvette wrap by selecting which Z06 will receive a custom-designed Mobil 1 wrap. They will also have a chance to vote on the wraps theme and select the final design. The contest will be open to the public and voting will take place on the MSP social media channels starting later this month.

The NCM Motorsports Park has started a waiting list for guest interested in booking Z06 Touring Laps, which can be accessed on the website at https://www.motorsportspark.org/. Visitors can currently enjoy C8 Corvette driving experiences, track rentals for personal vehicle driving and racing, and high-speed go-karts. The Motorsports Park also offers group karting as well as corporate and private events.

New Exhibit - Callaway Corvettes: 35 Years Of Making Fast Faster: For thirtyfive years, the most powerful and distinctive Corvettes in the world have been created by a team of dedicated engineers located in Old Lyme, CT, Temecula, CA, and Leingarten, Germany - they are the cars known as Callaway Corvettes, and their creed is "Powerfully Engineered Automobiles."

Known for their engineering and fine attention to detail in the craftsmanship of their products, Callaway has been on the top of the high-performance field for over four decades. Originating in the garage of his Old Lyme home in 1977, Reeves Callaway began with modifications upon BMW 3 Series cars. Out of that work came his first turbo system that received a rave report when reviewed by Car & Driver Magazine. With his first project deemed a success, Callaway



continued to develop other products, often with major vehicle manufacturers, such as Alfa Romeo, constructing the twin turbo system for their GTV6.

It was the Alfa GTV6 Twin Turbo which sparked interest within the ranks of General Motors (GM) towards Callaway Cars and their engineering abilities. In the early 80s, GM was looking at



high performance powertrain options for the Corvette, including turbocharging and multi-valve technologies. GM was aware of Callaway's reputation and the cars it had produced. In fact, they had taken a Callaway Alfa Twin Turbo and examined the work closely. After GM's own single and twin turbo V6 and V8 projects had run their course, Dave McLellan, then Chief Engineer for Corvette, gave the nod to Callaway, authorizing development of a prototype. The resulting powertrain option was introduced in June 1986 under Regular Production Option (RPO) B2K. With 345 hp and 465 lb. ft of torque, the Callaway Twin Turbo engine option was engineered to be the ultimate Corvette package, producing tremendous power while retaining its emissions controls and a warranty.

With Chevrolet's blessing, the Callaway Twin Turbo was officially launched, available through select Chevrolet dealers. It continues to hold the distinction of being the only engine package for the Corvette produced outside of GM to hold a RPO code. Produced between 1987 and 1991, 510 of these special Corvettes were built in coupe, convertible, and at the close of production, in Speedster form. By ordering a Corvette through the dealer, checking the box for RPO B2K triggered a series of events, including special equipment and handling under SEO Z5G.

Throughout production, evolutionary changes were made. Optional cast magnesium Dymag wheels were available in 1987 in a 16-inch diameter and, later, a 17-inch size. In 1988, power levels increased to 382 and torque to 565 lb-ft. That year also saw the 17-inch Dymag wheels as standard equipment with other options such as an automatic transmission and full leather interior being offered. A new option for the 1989 B2K was the handsome AeroBody[™] designed by Paul Deutschman and was first seen on the Callaway Sledgehammer Corvette, which achieved 254.76 MPH, a world-record that would stand for over 25 years. For 1990, horsepower rose to 390 and torque output was 562 lb-ft. However, the automatic transmission was discontinued. 1991 was the final year for this engine package and power was up again, to 403 hp and 575 lb-ft of torque. In 1991, the breathtaking Speedster model was revealed; 10 Series I Speedsters were built, each a unique color combination.

In 1992, GM introduced the second-generation LT1 small block V8. Given inherent challenges to turbocharge, the Callaway SuperNaturalTM Corvettes were born. Previously, Callaway Corvettes made their increased power through positive manifold pressure; now they made additional power through increased

engine displacement or finesse. Initially called the CL1 (LT1) and CR1 (LT5), they designated the chassis from which they were built upon and were offered with a host of options: AeroBodyTM, special paint colors, full leather interiors, special wheels, brakes, and exhaust systems. Cars could either be ordered and shipped directly to Callaway's facility in Old Lyme or a select authorized installer. Existing Corvettes could also be sent for conversion. Available between 1992 and 1996, the series evolved from SuperNaturalTM400, designating 400 horsepower, it grew to become the 425, 435, 440, and finally the 450 model for LT1 (and LT4) based cars. 475 or 490 hp being available for LT5-based cars. Callaway expanded the SuperNaturalTM line to Camaro and Impala models. Callaway also constructed three special vehicles featuring bespoke twinturbocharged LT5's: Two Super Speedsters and a ZR1-based coupe. In 1998, Callaway debuted their own new model called the C12, based on the chassis of the newly released C5 Corvette. With an entirely new body and suspension, this Callaway shared little with the Corvette upon which it was built. To comply with Le Mans GT rulebook, it was built to a maximum width of 2 meters; nearly 6 inches wider than the standard C5. Powered by a naturally aspirated Callaway LS engine, the C12 was beautiful to look at, and extremely powerful. The C12's new skin was penned by Dr. Paul Deutschman and constructed from lightweight carbon fiber. The racing variant C12R took pole position at Le Mans in 2001. In addition to the C12, Callaway also offered a product line for fifth-generation Corvettes called "Power Groups", which included HonkerTM airboxes, top end packages, exhaust, brake, wheel, and interior enhancements.

In 2004, Callaway Cars elevated the performance of Corvettes with their SuperNaturalTM offering for the newly introduced C6 model. Initially offering naturally aspirated packages, SuperNaturalTM 490 and 550 (horsepower) packages were available through select Callaway Dealer. In 2006, Callaway returned to positive manifold pressure on Corvettes, supercharging the C6 with impressive results.

Initially introduced as the Callaway SC560 SuperCharged Corvette, an optional 616 horsepower package was soon available by combining the SuperCharged Corvette options and specific components from the SuperNatural[™] series. With the introduction of the LS3 engine in 2008, power climbed to 580 on the Callaway Corvette and later to 606 with the advent of the TVS2300-series SuperCharged cars. For those who sought even more power, Callaway supercharged the venerable LS7 in the Z06 Corvette, as part of the SC652 model, delivering tremendous power in an extremely well-mannered package. In 2007, Callaway launched project C16. Debuting their handcrafted version of their Corvette-based supercar at the Los Angeles Auto Show, it was fitted with a hand-trimmed full leather and Alcantara interior, along with options from the Callaway Corvette - Le Mans brakes, coilover suspension, carbon fiber/ magnesium wheels and more. Each C16 was built to order and available as a coupe, cabrio or speedster.

For 2012, the 25th Anniversary of working with the Corvette, Callaway was reissued their original RPO (B2K) for use on a limited run of Corvettes. Featuring special paint and equipment from Chevrolet, twenty-six identical Corvettes (25 production and a pilot car) were drop-shipped to Callaway facilities for final conversion under this program. All were Cyber Gray, and as a coupe or convertible, automatic or manual, they delivered 620 supercharged horsepower and featured a full list of Callaway equipment.

In 2014, GM launched the 7th Generation of Corvette and Callaway was ready with their new GenThree Triple-Cooled supercharger system, which raised horsepower to 627 on the Stingray and featured a through-hood design, allowing convective heat transfer from cooler ambient airflow. The following year, the C7 Z06 debuted, and Callaway applied their supercharger (32% larger than the OEM. unit) resulting in 757 hp/777 lb-ft.

The knowledge gained in supercharging thousands of Callaway Corvettes expanded to include Camaros, SportTrucks, SUV's and even sedans.

With the introduction of the C8 Stingray, Callaway was again issued a RPO (PCY) to commemorate the milestone anniversary for the 35th year of working with Corvette. Specific Callaway content is



included in this anniversary model with Corvette order documents, build sheets and other paperwork identifying this significant milestone. Only 35 of these vehicles were built, available through authorized Callaway dealers now.

(Editors note: One of the 35th Anniversary Corvettes was available at Evergreen Chevrolet in Issaquah. It is Corvette #5.)

Callaway Corvettes: 35 Years of Making Fast Faster is NOW OPEN at the National Corvette Museum until late February 2023. <u>Artifact of the Month - Dick Guldstrand Racing Suit</u>: Each month in 2022 the curatorial staff at the NCM selects an artifact from their collection that is connected to a significant moment in Corvette history and shares its story with

us. This month's artifact is a Dick Guldstrand Racing Suit. Dick Guldstrand was a racer, engineer, vehicle designer, and beloved Corvette Hall of Fame member. Recently, the National Corvette Museum added to its Guldstrand Collection hundreds of items of memorabilia collected throughout his lifetime including helmets, banners, racing suits, trophies, and more.

Pictured here is one of Guldstrand's racing suits. Made by Hinchman of Indianapolis, the Pre NOMEX fireproof suit is a light cotton crème colored jumpsuit that offered no fire protection value. Embroidered on the right check in blue is Guldstrand's name, and on the right is Goodyear's Wingfoot logo with three red, yellow, and blue stripes. Not pictured is the back, where another Goodyear logo is between the shoulder blades. Interestingly, a 1.5-inch-long safety pin is in the left leg, suggesting that it could be a good luck charm.



On the back of the Bell 500TX helmet is the safety approval by the Snell Memorial Foundation and a decal deteriorated beyond legibility. These artifacts speak to the rich life among Corvettes and the racing that Dick Guldstrand lived. We are honored to be the torchbearers of his legacy at the National Corvette Museum.
