**60 LAPS AGO: November 1963.** Dick Stanley conducted the meeting at Alan Green Chevrolet. **Dick made the announcement that the Club has been officially chartered by the state of Washington as of 5 November 1963.** He also noted that the Board of Trustees (Dick Stanley, Chairman, Bob

Morse, Ron Peters, Bill Fowler & Bill Trippett, Treasurer) would submit their slate of prospective officers at the February meeting, and at that time would entertain other nominations for Club officers from the floor; balloting would

then take place by ballots through the mail. Ken Jones was appointed the new Activities Chairman. Discussion continued regarding an appropriate name for the club's newsletter. "Corvette C Notes" was suggested. It didn't fly. Next month, a new name will be tried. This meeting was the last opportunity to become a Charter Member of CMCS. (Today's trivia: Ken Jones was a Charter Member in 1963. Appeared again on the roster in 1966, then the trail in club archives gets a bit fuzzy. Ken & Joyce re-joined CMCS in 2008 & have been active members since that time. Available records today suggest that Ken is the only current member who is also a Charter Member.)

## Under the Hood

Corvette Racing went out with a bang at the 2023 24 hours at Le Mans. The lone C8.R was racing with 20 other entries in the GTE class. The other entries were Porsche RSR (7 entries), Ferrari 488 (7) and Aston Martin Vantage (6) to give you an idea of the competition. The Corvette team

suffered with a broken shock that put them 2 laps behind, a driver that got sick mid race and pelting rain to finally claw back to win the GTE class. This was the 9th class victory for Corvette Racing since GM returned to Le Mans with the C5 Corvette. The C8.R was 26th overall. The last time Corvette Racing won at Le Mans was 2015. Last year the C8.R was punted out of the race by a competitor in the last hours. 2023 is the last (for now?) Le Mans race for Corvette Racing as GM is abandoning the program at the end of this year.

Some of you might know that Barrett Jackson also auctions memorabilia during the early hours of the auctions. This year an old gas pump reached what I think is a world record price. A 1920's Standard Gold Crown visible gas pump was sold for \$320K. Several CMCS members attended the Bruce Wanta collection tour earlier this year. Steve Weigel and I were seated at a table of 8 enjoying light refreshments when someone at the table mentioned a visible gas pump in the same room. I am not sure that any of the younger people at the table had ever seen, much less used one of these, but both Steve and I had used them "on the farm". In the early days the gas pumps were much less refined. There was a big glass cylinder at the top that was marked with rings and numbers for gallons. You would operate a hand pump to pump gas into the cylinder. The fuel would be forced up from the bottom. To add a bit of excitement (I suppose), there were usually some balls, or vanes (usually at every ring) that would spin as you added the fuel. As an example, the customer would ask for 5 gallons (I think the typical maximum capacity of the cylinder was 10 gallons), the attendant would operate the hand pump until there were 5 gallons in the cylinder and then the fuel would be dispensed by gravity into the customer's vehicle. I would imagine there were lots of ways to cheat the customer. Perhaps a new cylinder would be installed that had thicker glass, or even a smaller diameter, so that there was not a full measure of fuel. If the spinning features were increased in size and made solid, that would increase the displacement of fuel and show an incorrect measure. The unscrupulous didn't have to fudge too far, a simple 5% adjustment to the real fuel measure would increase the unscrupulous' profits and the

customer probably would not be able to prove a 5% shortage. This is probably why the states stepped in with the requirements that the fuel pumps had to be certified for gallonage. Of course, our current pumps are pretty automatic, and I think we can assume are reasonably accurate. In the early days of the more modern pumps, it might have been logical to price a gallon to a tenth of a penny. Today, this seems to be a dinosaur just waiting for extinction. When we are paying \$5.20 per gallon, whether it is \$5.199 or \$5.20 is totally insignificant. How about 0.02% or two hundreds of 1%. BTW, when was the last time you bought gas and noticed that the price did not end in 0.9 cents? Ever? As the automated fuel pumps became widespread, these old glass cylinder pumps were purchased by farmers and others that had bulk fuel storage for off highway equipment. I wonder how many collectors are scoping out the local farms to find one of these very valuable glass cylinder pumps.

If you didn't get to see the Bruce Wanta collection, you missed a great time. Not only was the collection worth seeing, but Bruce was a very gracious host and spent the time explaining in detail several of the vehicles. Certainly, the Brother's Collection in Salem that CMCS visited last year was far superior for muscle cars, but it was limited to muscle cars. The Wanta collection included cars, tractors, a lunar rover, a fantastic outboard motor selection and lots of other memorabilia. I understood that there were at least two other major collections in the same warehouse area of Bellevue.

Corvette no longer offers a manual transmission, but a recent article in the "Wall Street Journal" indicated that the younger generation is fueling a resurgence in manual transmissions vehicles. The percentage of manual transmission vehicles has basically doubled since 2021. Then when you drill down to the real numbers you find that even in 2023 the take rate for manuals is only about 1.7%, so hardly a major factor. Mini (perhaps biased survey?) has completed a survey about how young people feel about manual transmissions. 63% agreed that learning to drive a stick shift was a rite of passage, or life skill. However, only 24% acknowledged owning a manual transmission car. Only 51% of Gen Z (born 1997-2013) say they know how to drive a stick and fully 42% of women say they do not know how to drive a stick. Some of us apparently still like the feeling of being one with our car that we can get with a manual. If the Gen Z's really care, they better get busy and order a manual car. As we transition to EVs fewer and fewer internal combustion engine vehicles will be sold and almost by definition fewer manual transmissions. OK, I am probably beating a dead horse, but I did appreciate reading about the increasing trend in manual transmissions.

Artifact of the Month: Corvette Color Samples Wheel For 2000: Have you ever wondered how automobile manufacturers choose which colors to offer for their cars every year? Usually, this decision depends on data analysis, consumer preferences, and a bit of guesswork. Automobile designers will conduct market research and hold focus groups to forecast which colors are rising in popularity. They also work with paint experts to determine what materials are available for producing colors that best complement their vehicles. The most common colors tend to be white, black, and gray, inoffensive shades that have broad appeal for ordinary cars. However, the Corvette is no ordinary cars.

As General Motors planned Corvette's colors for model year 2000, designers may have used this color sample wheel to see each possibility for themselves. This wheel is about two feet in diameter and shows samples of all 10 colors offered for 2000. The badges identifying each color include both the name and the paint code. At the center of the wheel is the Corvette crossed flags emblem as it appeared during the C5 era from 1997-2004.







The colors featured on this wheel include some time-tested fan favorites. Arctic White first became a Corvette color in the 1990s, but earlier

versions of white were the most popular color in both the C1 and C3 eras. During the C2 run, Nassau Blue was number one among Corvette buyers. However, only 851 Nassau Blue Corvettes were produced in 2000, and the color has not been offered since.

The two new colors for 2000 were Millennium Yellow and Dark Bowling Green. Both Millennium Yellow and Magnetic Red were more expensive options, costing Corvette buyers an additional \$500. These two colors required an extra tinted clear coat to enhance the visual depth of the paint, a coat that required special equipment to apply.

Of all the available colors, the most popular was Torch Red, which adorned 6,700 Corvettes. This number reflects the customer preference for bright reds that began in the C4 era. Black was the second most common color with 5,807 cars. Third was Light Pewter with 5,125 Corvettes. Metallic grays first became a popular choice among Corvette buyers in the C5 years, a trend that continues today. In 2022, Hypersonic Gray Metallic was the third most popular Corvette color, trailing only the classics Torch Red and Arctic White.

Laura Klausser, Sports Car Racing Program Manager at General Motors, featured as the guest speaker for the Mobil 1 Women's High Performance Driving Introduction (HPDI) event: On Saturday, October 21st the NCM motorsports park held a unique HPDI event which was a "ladies only" activity geared toward women of all skill levels. All the participants needed was a car, a passion for driving, and a desire to learn! The Motorsports Park skilled team and professional instructors helped those in attendance feel the thrill of driving safely on the 3.2 mile, 23-turn road course.

In partnership with incredible organizations like Mobil 1 and Women in Motorsports North America (WINNA), the NCM motorsports Park prides itself on providing a fun, safe, and supportive environment perfect for learning and for creating memories that will last a lifetime! In small groups established by comfort and skill level, you can rotate through a series of classroom and on-track activities throughout the day.

Laura Wontrop Klauser has a lot on her plate. As the GM Sports Car Racing Program

Manager, she is responsible for overseeing the Cadillac Racing, Corvette Racing and Camaro GT4.R programs. Handling just one of those efforts is impressive, but all three is herculean.



efforts is impressive, but all three is herculean. Lets learn some more about Laura & her vision.

Klauser has been with General Motors since 2008. She started in motorsports in 2016 as the program manager for the Cadillac ATS-V.R effort in what was then the Pirelli World Challenge Series (now GT World Challenge). She then moved to Cadillac's prototype program in the IMSA WeatherTech SportsCar Championship, referred to at the time as DPi, or Daytona Prototype international. The Camaro GT4.R was soon added to her responsibilities as well. In January 2021, Corvette Racing was also brought into the mix, and Klauser officially started in her newly created current role.

She's been a part of much success in her time working with GM's motorsports programs, but now is perhaps busier than ever. This year, Cadillac Racing transitioned to the Cadillac V-Series.R, its third-generation prototype race car to enter competition. The car is competing in the headlining prototype classes in two of the preeminent sports car sanctioning bodies in the world: the North American-based IMSA WeatherTech SportsCar Championship and the globe trotting FIA World Endurance Championship, or WEC. The classes are known as GTP in the IMSA ranks and Hypercar in WEC competition.

The Cadillac is built to LMDh (Le Mans Daytona hybrid) specs, which currently is what all entrants are running in IMSA. In WEC, the Cadillac competes with vehicles built on the LMH (Le Mans Hypercar) platform. The primary differences between the two are that LMDh cars are required to utilize a common hybrid system and must select a chassis from four licensed chassis suppliers (Cadillac uses a Dallara), while LMH cars can be built from the ground up by a manufacturer and do not need to be a hybrid.

This year, the No. 01 Cadillac V-Series.R prepared by Chip Ganassi Racing is competing in IMSA competition, with the No. 2, also prepared by the team, taking on the global WEC calendar. In addition, the No. 31 Whelen

Engineering Cadillac V-Series.R, campaigned by Action Express Racing, is competing in IMSA.





Meanwhile, Corvette Racing is taking part in both the IMSA and WEC championships for the second consecutive year as it celebrates its 25th anniversary season. In the GTD PRO class of the IMSA WeatherTech SportsCar Championship, the GT3-spec No. 3 Corvette C8.R is looking to continue its storied North American success. In WEC, the No. 33 Corvette C8.R is competing in the GTE Am class after the GTE Pro category was discontinued after 2022. This will also be the final year for the sophisticated GTE machines in WEC competition before the sanctioning body moves to a GT3 platform.

And if that wasn't enough, GM is currently in the final testing and development stages for the Corvette Z06 GT3.R, which will be campaigned by both the Corvette Racing program and customer teams starting in 2024. Of course, the Camaro GT4.R is available to customer teams around the world as well.

While all of the cars on Klauser's watch are distinctly different, each is powered by the most American of engines: the naturally aspirated V-8.

Despite her crazy schedule, Klauser was gracious enough to carve out some time during the week of Super Sebring in March to answer some questions from "THE BLOCK" a Chevrolet Website which offers a wide array of articles, wallpaper downloads, event schedules, and more to get the most out of Chevrolet news. ## The BLOCK: In a broad perspective, why is it important for GM brands to be involved in the highest levels of sports car racing?

Laura Klauser: Racing is pretty critical at GM for a couple of reasons. One is to spread the word about our great products. When you have cars like the Corvette or the Cadillac V-Series, you have these really great performing cars and you want to show the world that we can take our technology to the racetrack and beat competitors that we're competing against in the showroom as well. So it's an opportunity for us to expose

people to our brands and get them interested in the vehicles that we're selling.

It (racing) also gives us a way to work on technology for our vehicles. It's not a one-for-one anymore, you're not taking the exact same car that you're buying and putting it on the racetrack. You can see that with the Cadillac, where clearly we don't sell an LMDh Cadillac in the showroom. But there are different features on the vehicle that come back to production, along with how we tune the vehicle. We've done a lot of technology exchange using simulation work to make our tools better, and production can use them as they're developing the production cars as well. Racing feeds back into that.

Then, we also use racing as a way to develop our people and to give GM a home team to root for. There are many, many people that work for General Motors and we're very proud to represent that. We're proud to represent the United States of America when we race in the WEC, so we want to be able to show what our company and what our country can do.

# TB: You oversee multiple classes and multiple series that compete around the world. How do you personally handle the challenge of overseeing all of that day-to-day?

LK: I have an incredible team that works with me and I'm very privileged to have been able to hand-select them. I could not say enough good things about the people that work in sports car racing, both under me directly in motorsports competition, and then on our engine platform side under Russ O'Blenes. They are great and they all are why the cars are so good.

They also make it so we can basically divide and conquer. There is quite a lot going on between two very big platforms, actually technically three very big platforms because we're still racing the GTE Corvette as we're designing and developing the GT3 Corvette. Then we have the Cadillac out there as well. So it's really having a good team and knowing that's how you can be in multiple places at once, by having good people representing in all those places.

# TB: With IMSA having already gone to a GT3-spec car and WEC doing so next year, how does that change the Corvette Racing program as a whole, along with the brand's approach to building the Z06 road car, knowing there will be a race car version?

LK: In terms of the racing, the big change is that we are getting into customer racing with the platform. For the past 20-plus years we've had a factory team that's been racing two Corvettes and has done a phenomenal job. But GT racing is now getting more into the customers, so we will have way more chassis out there racing with various teams across the world. That's been a huge undertaking, because it's one thing to design

and build a race car - thankfully we have a lot of experience with that and we have a great technical partner in Pratt & Miller that we work with.

However, the customer side of this and the support program that comes along with it has been new territory for us. We got our feet wet with it with our Camaro GT4 program, and I'd say we learned a lot, so we're trying to take all of the things that we know we need to improve on there and build from there. That's been a huge undertaking.



In terms of how we relate back to production, not much has changed. The car that's been racing since 2020 was developed as the C8 platform was being developed. They did the race car and the production car together, so the fundamentals were designed for racing and production at the same time. The new GT3 race car is built off of the Z06 platform, but it gets to take all of the great things that came originally from the (C8) base. Then we're able to improve upon things that we've learned for the past two-and-a-half years of racing the car and make it an even better race car. Then of course all this information gets fed back to production.

I think it's a lot of taking what's already really good and making it even better, and all of this learning will go into the Corvette production as a whole. It'll be there for when we look to maybe doing the next generation, or if we want to do another iteration or something along those lines, we'll have those lessons.

# TB: In your current role now, or in the time you've been in motorsports since 2016, is there anything you've been involved with or any accomplishments that you're particularly proud of with the program?

LK: For sure building the team that I'm so proud of. That is something that will always be one of the highlights of my career, having the opportunity to do that. I'd also say in terms of just basics, we won the Rolex (24 At Daytona) four years in a row with the DPi program. That's pretty special to be able to do that.

Then I would say the performance of what we just had with the Cadillac LMDh in Daytona. We were able to have such a strong car for the entire 24 hours of that race. That's setting us up for great success for this year. Just bringing all that together, working with the people, and it seems like

every time we do something we figure out how to do it better and we're always improving. That's what makes me super proud.

# TB: What are some of the big things you're looking to achieve both this year and in the future? Are there any goals you have outlined that you really want to accomplish?

LK: For the Cadillac program, we are getting ready for the big 24-hour race in Le Mans in June. We got through our January 24-hour race and our eyes are on the prize in France. That's a big goal for us, to do very well at that race. We'd love to win it obviously. That's what we're shooting for.

For the Corvette program, at this point we would like to have a clean launch of the car. We want to be able to place it in the hands of the teams that are going to be running the car first thing in 2024. We want to make sure they have time to get to know it so that we show well and that they feel comfortable with the vehicle, and then roll it out from there. We're going to be delivering cars at the end of '23 through '24, so we want to make sure that each of those deliveries goes smoothly and the team that receives the car feels prepared to take on whatever series they're racing it.

# TB: Outside of wins or podiums, how do you measure success in your role with everything you oversee?

LK: That's a good question. The success on track is definitely helpful because it's easy to tell if you're doing a good job or not, but it's not the only bit to it. I think if you take Rolex for an example, we did not win that with the brand-new Cadillac, but we had probably the most reliable vehicle in the class. I would say that from that standpoint we did a hell of a job and that gave us that strong foundation.

Here at Sebring, again we're shooting to win. If we are able to finish the race again with a reliable package, if we're able to do something that gives us a little extra response on track where it makes something more efficient for the team, and we come out without a success, that's something that we'll look towards as well.

The main goal is to win, and then you look and see, okay, if we didn't achieve that, what did we achieve? Really just in general we want to make sure that the team is strong. We have a lot of people that are involved in this. If they're working together well, and they're able to progress forward, and they're not tripping over each other, I'd say that that's a huge success. When you have those things in place the wins and the podiums come with that.
